SPEECH OF HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR ON PROROGUING THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

MR. SPEAKER, AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGIS-LATIVE COUNCIL,

The business of the Session having been brought to a close, I am happy to have the power of releasing you from a further attendance upon your Legislative duties at a season of the year when I am aware that the private avocations of many of you require your personal superintendence.

The Session has not passed over without the enactment of many useful Laws which I doubt not will be found highly beneficial to the public interests.

The important alteration that has been made in the principle of charging the duties on the importation of Spirits by removing those of a discriminating nature, will, I trust, be followed by results advantageous both to the Colony and to those Countries with which it is calculated to open out a direct intercourse.

In thanking you for the supplies which you have liberally voted for the ensuing year, I have pleasure in acknowledging the readiness with which you acceded to the measure I submitted to you for the Assessment on Stock beyond the Boundaries of Location. The additional funds which it is anticipated will be realized under this enactment, will enable me to carry on the public service of the Colony without difficulty or em-

barrassment to the Government, and I beg to assure you, that the whole of the means which you have placed at my disposal, shall be adminis-

tered with due care and economy.

The Address to Our Most Gracious Sovereign, on the subject of Immigration, shall be forwarded to Her Majesty, with my strong recommendation that such measures as may be found practicable, may be speedily adopted for securing the introduction into the Colony, of a sufficient number of Emigrants from the Mother Country, to meet the pressing demands for labor experienced in all the chief branches of Colonial industry.

I now declare this Council to be prorogued until Tuesday, the sixteenth day of November

next ensuing.

OTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this Office, until 12 o'clock, of Monday, the 1st November next, for furnishing, for the Colonial Service, in the several Districts, the supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required, during Twelve Calendar Months, commencing 1st January, 1848, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

PROVISIONS.

1. The Ration for Emigrants:—For Men, 24oz. wheaten bread. 16oz. fresh meat, 8oz. vegetables,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of salt,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea,  $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz soap—For Women, 16oz. wheat bread, 12oz fresh meat, 6oz vegetables,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz tea,  $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar,  $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap—Children under ten years, to be allowed twothirds of the Ration of Female Adults; above that age, and under fifteen, the same as Adults.

6. The Ration to the Superintendent and Crew of the Floating-light Vessel, Sydney Harbour:—
160z. biscuit, 80z. flour, 160z. fresh beef, ½0z. tea, 30z. sugar, 2½0z. raisins, 1-14 pint oatmeal, 1-14 pint pint oatmeal, 1-14

7. The Ration to Men attending the Light-house, South Head, Telegraphs, and Boatmen in the Departments of Customs, Harbour Master, and Police :—

24oz. wheat bread, 16oz. fresh beef, ½oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, ½oz. soap.

8. The Ration to Apprentices to the Colonial 1½oz. sugar, 1½oz raisins or currants, 1½oz suet, Architect:—20oz. bread, 16oz. fresh beef or mutton, 4oz. soap. On other days, 16oz flour, 12oz. meat, 8oz. vegetables, 4oz. tea, 2oz. sugar, ½oz. sult, ½oz soap.

9. To prisoners confined in Gaol:—12oz wheat bread, 12oz. maize meal, 4oz. fresh beef, 8oz. vegetables, ½oz. salt, ½oz soap—(Ration No. 2 is issued to Gaol attendants, and to Witnesses and others awaiting bail; and if confined in solitary cells, Ration No. 11.)

10. To children of Female Prisoners confined in Gaol:—Soz. wheat bread, 4oz. fresh beef, 1 pint

milk,  $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. yellow soap.

11. Prisoners co-fined in Lock-up or Watchhouses:—240z. wheat bread or 20oz. flour—(Ration No. 2 is occasionally issued at Watch-houses to Prisoners of the Crown, when travelling from one station to another, and in other cases when sanctioned by a Magistrate.)

12. The Ration to Men, to the Matron, and to the Apprentices in the Government Printing Establishment:—24oz. bread, 16cz. fresh beef or mutton,

loz. salt, loz. tea, 2loz. sugar, loz. soap.

13. Forage for Horses and Oxen:—81bs. maize or barley, or 10lbs. of oats, 4lbs. bran, 12lbs. oaten or cultivated grass hay, and 4lbs. wheat straw, for each horse daily, and half that quantity for each bullock.

For children under 7 years of age, best wheaten bread is to be substituted, if required, in the propor-

5. For Artificers and Laborers :- The same as No. 6 of the Male Orphan School.

The 31 Districts first mentioned, are the Police Districts described in the Notices from this Office, dated 15th September, 1841, 9th August, 1842, and 25th March, 1845, and further particulars respecting them may be obtained from the Police Magistrates and Benches.

Separate Tenders will be required for the forage in the District of Sydney, but the other supplies for

that District are to be tendered for together.

The supplies for each of the other Districts, with the exception of those for the Male and Female Orphan Schools, the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children, and the Lunatic Asylum, are intended to be included in one Contract, and therefore no Tenders can be received, unless for supplying the whole that may be required in the entire of a District, and for each District there must be a separate Tender, excepting Hartley and Blackheath, and Yass, Gunning, and Narrawa, for each of which places Tenders may be sent in separately.

Separate Tenders must also be made for the Male Orphan School, the Female Orphan School, the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children,

and for the Lunatic Asylum.

The Tenders for the Moreton Bay District, to specify the sum required for the supply of the following articles, daily, for Boatmen, in addition to salt, ½oz. tea, 1½oz. sugar, 1½oz. raisins or currants, the price of their Ration No. 7, viz: -½oz. tea,

#### CONDITIONS.

1. All the articles required by this Notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

2. The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial wheat, from which, on the Ration of Emigrants, Surveying, and Mounted Police or other parties, Superintendent and Crew of the Floating-light, Men at the Light House, Telegraphs, Boatmen, Apprentices, the Orphan Schools, and the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children, 20 per cent., and on the Ration to Prisoners of the Crown, 10 per cent., has been extracted in bran and

3. Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration to Emigrants, and when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

4. Beef to be issued to the Male Orphan School on five days, and Mutton on two days of the week; and to the Female Orphan School, Beef to be issued three days, and Mutton four days of the week.

5. The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

6. The Tobacco to be Colonial.

7. When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz.:-1 lb. wheat flour or 1lb. biscuit equal to 14th. of bread; 1th. salt Beef or 1th. Mutton, or 10oz. salt pork, equal to 1tb. of fresh

8. These substitutions are to be made only when required by the Officers authorised to draw the several Rations.

9. Hospital Bread is to be supplied to the Children of the Orphan Schools, and to the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children when required by the Surgeon, in lieu of the ordinary Ration.

10. Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c.,

- 11. In case the whole ration of Forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the Ration undermentioned :- The Maize or Barley, 4-12; the Hay, 5-12; the Bran, 2-12, and the straw, 1-12.
- 12. The supplies are to be delivered at the nearest fixed station, on the requisition of the Officer in charge; being, previously to removal from the Contractor's premises, approved by a person, if any, authorised for the purpose.
- 13. The Tenders for provisions and Forage, whe required by Rations, according to the scale under their respective heads, are to express the price per
- 14. The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one-half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one-half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement will be to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

15. In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, composed by persons named by the Government, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts, where such a Board of Survey caunot be conveniently assembled, the party month from the usual notification of acceptance, a bond

objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part,) concur in naming a third as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

16. If the board, arbitrators, or umpire shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which, it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

17. In the event of any unnecessary delay, or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured, and

charged in like manner.

18. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause injury would be sustained, either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the Department, or Officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the Rations are to be received, shall have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality; it being distinctly understood, that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the mean time, he must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing of which it will be obtained by the Officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

19. A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will also subject the Contractor, upon the Report of the Officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the Contract forthwith.

- 20. It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the Contract, by giving, in writing, a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the Contract at the expiration of that period, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the Contract is made, or agreed to be made.
- 21. The Contractor will be required to prepare his own cash account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers, in a complete state to the Officer receiving the supplies, the same will be forwarded by the latter to the Auditor General, in order that a warrant may be prepared and payment made from the Colonial Treasury.

22. The value of all packages to be included the prices demanded.

23. Printed forms of Tender may be obtained at this Office, or from the Police Magistrates or Benches of the several Districts; and at the foot of every Tender, there must be a Memorandum, signed by the party tendering, and two responsible persons as sureties, agreeing to be responsible for the due performance of the Contract, in the event of the Tender being accepted, and undertaking, in that event, that they will severally execute and deliver, within one

to Her Majesty, for securing such performance, otherwise such Tender will not be taken into consider-

24. The Tenders to contain the names of the Tenderers and their Sureties, and places of residence,

at length.

25. Each Tender must be in the form referred to in paragraph 23, and to be enclosed in a separate

envelope, and marked "Tender for Provisions, &c." 26. Further particulars and information may be

CONTRACTS FOR SUPPLIES IN THE POLICE DISTRICTS BEYOND THE BOUNDARIES, FOR 1848.

REPAIR OF THE WINDSOR AND RICH-MOND ROAD, BETWEEN FAIRFIELD AND THE RICHMOND COMMON.

650 superficial yards of slabbing for the crossdrain and the two bridges to be of good sound iron bark, to be at least two and a half inches thick, and in length to suit the distance apart of the bracers, to be close jointed, solidly bedded, and firmly dowelled to the bracers, the end of each slab to have a solid bearing.

24 rods of side sleepers for the new drain, and the two bridges, to be one foot in diameter, excepting for the new drain, to be in lengths of not less than 20 feet, of good sound iron bark, to be adzed flat on the under side, so as to bed solid on the slubs, and to be firmly dowelled through the slabs to the

outer bracers.

221 rods of a two-railed fence for the two bridges the posts to be adzed 5 inches square, to be firmly morticed into the side sleepers 9 feet apart, and well stayed both in and outside, the end posts to be one foot in diameter, without bark, and to be sunk at least three feet in the ground at the ends of the sleepers; the tops of all the posts to be 4 feet above the upper side of the sleepers; the rails to be of good straight box saplings, of not less than one foot in circumference without the bark; the upper rails to be inserted into the posts six inches from their tops, the under rail eighteen inches lower.

195 cubic yards of Lapstone metal for the two bridges and the four drains; to be broken so as to pass through a two and a half inch ring, and on no pretence to be subjected to the influence of fire.
