PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES AUGUSTUS FITZ ROY, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, passed in the sixth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to Courts of Requests, and to extend the jurisdiction of such Courts in the County of Cumberland;" and again amended by an Act passed in the eleventh year of the Reign of Her said Majesty, intituled, "An Act to amend the Laws relating to Courts of Requests in the City of Sydney and County of Cumberland, and in the Town of Melbourne and County of Bourke respectively;" it was in the said first recited Act amongst other things enacted, That from and after the first day of January, 1843, Courts of Requests should be holden in and for such Counties and Districts, or other portions of this Colony and its dependencies, and at such places respectively as the Governor should by Proclamation for that purpose from time to time appoint; and whereas by the last recited Act it was enacted, That all Courts of Requests established, or to be established within the City of Sydney and County of Cumberland, and in the Town of Melbourne and County of Bourke should respectively have power and authority to hear and determine, in a summary way, all actions whatsoever, for the recovery of any debt, demand, or damage, whether liquidated or un-

liquidated, to an amount not exceeding thirty pounds: Now I, the said Governor, in pursuance of the power and authority so vested in me by the said first recited Act, do hereby direct and appoint, that Courts of Requests in and for the City of Sydney and County of Cumberland shall be holden, during the year 1848, at the times and places, and for the districts hereinafter respectively mentioned, that is to say:—

The Ordinary Sittings of the Court of Requests for the City of Sydney, for the trial of all cases not exceeding ten pounds, shall be holden on the following days respectively, viz:—Monday, 3rd January; Monday, 7th February; Monday, 6th March; Monday, 3rd April; Monday, 1st May; Monday, 5th June; Monday, 3rd July; Monday, 7th August; Monday, 4th September; Monday, 2nd October; Monday, 6th November; and Monday, 4th December respectively, and for the Police District of Sydney, as described in a certain Notice from the Colonial Secretary's Office, bearing date the 15th day of September, 1841, and published in the *New South Wales Government Gazette*.

The new Sittings of the said Court for the trial of all cases from ten to thirty pounds, shall be holden on the following days respectively, viz:—Monday, 14th February; Monday, 10th April; Monday, 12th June; Monday, 14th August; Monday, 9th October; and Monday, 11th December respectively, at the City of Sydney, for the Police District thereof, as described in the aforesaid Notice.

The Ordinary Sittings of the Courts for the other Districts, in the County of Cumberland, will commence on the undermentioned dates; and the new sittings of the Courts for those districts respectively, shall commence immediately at the close of the Ordinary Sittings.

At the Town of Campbelltown, for such portions of the Police District thereof as are situated in the County of Cumberland, and for such portions of the Police District of Camden and Narrellan as are situated in the County of Cumberland, as described in the aforesaid Notice:—On Monday, 10th January; Monday, 17th April; Monday, 10th July; and Monday, 16th October, respectively.

At the Town of Liverpool for the Police District thereof as described in the aforesaid Notice:—On Wednesday, the 12th January; Wednesday, 19th April; Wednesday, 12th July; and Wednesday, 18th October, respectively.

At the Town of Parramatta, for the Police District thereof, as described in the aforesaid Notice:—On Thursday, 13th January; Thursday, 20th April; Thursday, 13th July; and Thursday, 19th October, respectively.

At the Town of Windsor, and for such portions of the Police District thereof as are situated in the County of Cumberland, as described in the aforesaid Notice:—On Monday, 17th January; Monday, 24th April; Monday, 17th July; and Monday, 23rd October, respectively.

At the Town of Penrith, and for such portions of the Police District thereof as are situated in the County of Cumberland, as described in the aforesaid Notice:—On Thursday, 20th January; Thursday, 27th April; Thursday, 20th July; and Thursday, 26th October.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES AUGUSTUS FITZ ROY, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a certain Act or Ordinance of the Governor and Legislative Council, passed in the third year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled, "*An Act to consolidate and amend the laws for the transportation and punishment of offenders in New South Wales, and for defining the respective powers and authorities of General Quarter Sessions, and of Petty Sessions, and for determining the places at which the same shall be holden, and for better regulating the summary jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace, and for repealing certain Laws and Ordinances relating thereto,*" it was amongst other things enacted, that Courts of General Quarter Sessions, for the

Colony of New South Wales, should be held at Sydney, Parramatta, Campbell Town, Windsor, Maitland, and Bathurst, and at such other places within the said Colony, and at such times as the Governor for the time being should, by any Proclamation duly issued for such purpose, appoint: Now, therefore, I, the Governor, in pursuance of the power and authority so vested in me by the said recited Act, by this my Proclamation, do hereby appoint and direct that Courts of General Quarter Sessions shall be holden at the Town of Goulburn at such times as shall be hereafter fixed, of which all persons concerned are hereby required to take notice.

WHARFAGE AND TONNAGE RATES AT PUBLIC WHARVES.

PROVISIONS.

1. The Ration for Emigrants :—*For Men*, 24oz. wheaten bread, 16oz. fresh meat, 8oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap—*For Women*, 16oz. wheat bread, 12oz. fresh meat, 6oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap—Children under ten years, to be allowed two-thirds of the Ration of Female Adults ; above that age, and under fifteen, the same as Adults.

2. The Ration for Prisoners of the Crown, and others in the employment of Colonial Departments when authorised to receive it, with the exceptions specified in Nos. 3, 6, and 7—20oz. wheat bread, 8oz. maize meal, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap.

3. The Rations to Officers in charge of Surveying parties, when in the field, and men composing such parties ; and for Soldiers of the Mounted Police,

and other Mounted parties, when required :—24oz. flour, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tobacco, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap.

4. The Ration for wives of Soldiers of the Mounted Police :—8oz. bread, 8oz. meat.

5. The Ration for children of Soldiers of Mounted Police above 7 years :— $5\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of bread, $5\frac{1}{2}$ oz. meat—under 7 years, 4oz. of bread and 4oz. of meat.

6. The Ration to the Superintendent and Crew of the Floating-light Vessel, Sydney Harbour :—16oz. biscuit, 8oz. flour, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 3oz. sugar, $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins, 1-14 pint oatmeal, 1-14 pint vinegar.

7. The Ration to Men attending the Light-house, South Head, Telegraphs, and Boatmen in the Departments of Customs, Harbour Master, and Police :—24oz. wheat bread, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap.

8. The Ration to Apprentices to the Colonial Architect :—20oz. bread, 16oz. fresh beef or mutton, 8oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 2oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

9. To prisoners confined in Gaol :—12oz. wheat bread, 12oz. maize meal, 4oz. fresh beef, 8oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap—(Ration No. 2 is issued to Gaol attendants, and to Witnesses and others awaiting bail ; and if confined in solitary cells, Ration No. 11.)

10. To children of Female Prisoners confined in Gaol :—8oz. wheat bread, 4oz. fresh beef, 1 pint milk, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. yellow soap.

11. Prisoners confined in Lock-up or Watch-houses :—24oz. wheat bread or 20oz. flour—(Ration No. 2 is occasionally issued at Watch-houses to Prisoners of the Crown, when travelling from one station to another, and in other cases when sanctioned by a Magistrate.)

12. The Ration to Men, to the Matron, and to the Apprentices in the Government Printing Establishment :—24oz. bread, 16oz. fresh beef or mutton, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap.

13. Forage for Horses and Oxen :—8lbs. maize or barley, or 10lbs. of oats, 4lbs. bran, 12lbs. oaten or cultivated grass hay, and 4lbs. wheat straw, for each horse daily, and half that quantity for each bullock.

14. For the Light-house, South Head, and Floating-light, Sydney Harbour :—Best clarified sperm oil, per imperial gallon ; patent wicks each.

15. Flour, tea, sugar, and tobacco, bread or meat, in such quantities as may be required, for deserving Mechanics and others in Colonial Establishments when authorised.

16. Fuel and Light :—Firewood per 100lbs. ; sperm oil, common oil, per imperial gallon ; mould candles, dipt candles, cotton wick per lb.

To be delivered in Sydney, as required for the Public Service, when ordered :—Fresh beef, salt beef, salt pork, fresh mutton, maize meal, bread 1st, 2nd, and 3rd quality, ship biscuit, flour 1st, 2nd, and 3rd quality, arrowroot, sago, rice, tea, sugar, oatmeal, salt, yellow soap, pearl barley, tobacco, lard, candles mould and dipt, salt butter, gelatine, vegetables per lb. ; milk, yeast, lime-juice, per quart ; port wine, per dozen ; rum, vinegar, per imperial gallon ; roach lime, per bushel ; straw for bedding, per 100lbs.
