PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES AUGUSTUS FITZ ROY, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor of New South Wales, with the advice of the Legislative Council, passed in the sixth year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled, "*An Act to provide for the division of the Colony of New South Wales into Electoral Districts, and for the election of Members to serve in the Legislative Council,*" it is amongst other things enacted, that as divers of the Electoral Districts appointed by the said Act are far distant from the seat of Government, and of great extent, and unforeseen difficulties or delays may arise in carrying into effect the several provisions in the said Act mentioned, in regard to the Elections for the said Districts, it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, within the period of twenty days before or after the day appointed for the holding of any Election, to extend the time allowed for the holding of such Election, or for the return of the Writ issued for the same; and whereas a Writ was issued for the Election of five members to serve in the Legislative Council for the Electoral District of Port Phillip, which Writ was made returnable on the seventeenth day of October next ensuing, and it is expedient to extend the time for the return of the said Writ: Now, therefore, I, Sir Charles Augustus Fitz Roy, as such Governor aforesaid, do, by this my Proclamation, declare that, with the advice of the Executive Council, I have extended, and I do hereby

extend the time allowed for the return of the said Writ to the thirty-first day of October next ensuing.

Given under my Hand and Seal, at Government House, Sydney, this twenty-ninth day of September, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, and in the twelfth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

FIFTY POUNDS REWARD, OR A CONDITIONAL PARDON.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the Government, that on the morning of Sunday, the 11th June last, a party of Aboriginal Natives, encamped at "Umberlioli," on the Macintyre River, a station belonging to Mr. John Brown, of Singleton, was attacked by a party consisting of seven white men and an Aboriginal native, who murdered a gin named "Bootha;" His Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that a reward of fifty pounds will be paid to any free person or persons not the actual perpetrators of this murder, who may, within six months from the present date, give such information as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of the guilty parties; and if the person giving such information be a Prisoner of the Crown, application will be made to Her Majesty for the allowance to such Prisoner of the Crown of a Conditional Pardon.

It is to be understood that the Mails are to be dispatched on the days and hours to be fixed by the Postmaster-General, either according to the present arrangement, or as he may afterwards determine for the public convenience.

It will be optional with parties to offer for one or more of the above lines of stages, and to propose the mode of conveyance; but on all roads where wheel vehicles can travel, a preference will be given to carriage conveyance, and the Contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to travel at the rate agreed upon. The rate of travelling is not to be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages. The Contractors are to carry all bags and letters which may be delivered to them under authority of the Postmaster-General, or any of the Postmasters, and to provide secure lockers for the Mails in carriages, and dry coverings to the bags on horseback.

Contractors will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet, by any of their servants or passengers, or otherwise, to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under penalty of £5 for each and every offence.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival, except for the first five or ten minutes respectively.

Contractors will be strictly bound not to assign any portion of their Contract without consent of the Postmaster-General.

A Mail Cart or Carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses not more than three passengers and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the driver, under a penalty of £3 for each offence.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of Mails are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster-General, or person appointed by him for that purpose.

The drivers and postmen are to be free men, and of certified good character.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement are to be deducted by the Postmaster-General, from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the Contractor, and to be considered as over and above any penalties provided by any Act of Council.

Each party tendering or an agent for him, must attend at this office on the day appointed for opening the Tenders; and each Tender must bear the signature of two respectable and solvent persons, engaging to enter into a bond with the Contractor

for the safety of the Mails, and the due performance of the Contract, and every stipulation therein.

The hours of starting from each Post Office or stage and other particulars, may be ascertained at the General Post Office, where parties proposing to Tender are invited to seek information.

Printed forms of Tender may be had on application at the General and all other Post Offices throughout the Colony.

CROWN LANDS BEYOND THE SETTLED DISTRICTS.

(RENEWAL OF PASTURAGE LICENSES.)

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR, with the advice of the Executive Council, directs it to be notified for general information, that the state of the Survey not yet admitting of the issue of Leases for Runs beyond the Settled Districts, all existing Licenses for the occupation of Crown Lands so situated, will be renewed for the ensuing year, commencing on the 1st July next, on the same terms as Licenses have been granted for the now current year, subject, of course, to the adjustment of the License Fee according to the quantity of Stock returned by the Commissioner as depastured on every such Run.

2. Adverting to the 5th section of chapter II of Her Majesty's Order in Council, dated 9th March, 1847, which declares that Leases of Runs issued thereunder will be absolutely and indefeasibly forfeited if the stipulated Rent be not paid within the time therein prescribed, His Excellency the GOVERNOR desires it to be distinctly understood, that claims to Leases will, in like manner, be held to have become forfeited and void, if the Licenses for the continued occupation, for the ensuing year, of the Lands for which Leases are sought, shall not have been taken out within the time fixed by the present Notice, namely, between the 1st day of July, and the 30th day of September next.

3. If, within the year commencing the 1st July next, the Government shall be in a position to grant Leases of Runs under Her Majesty's Order in Council, any Licensee under this Notice who may obtain a Lease, will receive credit in the payment of his first year's rent, for so much of the amount paid for his License as may be proportionate to the unexpired part of the term for which the License was granted.

4. The present Regulation does not, however, extend to Lands which have been brought by the Order in Council within the settled class, but which have hitherto been held under Squatting Licenses for pastoral purposes. The occupants of such Lands will be enabled to obtain Leases for the same, on the terms prescribed in sections 22, 23, and 24 of the Notice of 29th March last.

CROWN LANDS BEYOND THE SETTLED DISTRICTS.

(LIMITING THE TIME OF APPLYING FOR LEASES.)

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR, with the advice of the Executive Council has been pleased to direct the publication of the following Regulation limiting the time within which certain claims to leases of runs beyond the Settled Districts, will be entertained by His Excellency.

By the 11th section of chapter II, of Her Majesty's Order in Council, of the 9th March, 1847, it is provided, "That all occupants of Crown Lands, who shall have been in licensed occupation of the same for at least one year, at the time when this Order shall come into effect, are to be entitled to demand leases of their respective runs under the present Regulations, *within six months from the date of the publication of this Order in Council by the Governor but not afterwards.*"

The said Order in Council having been published and brought into effect in the Colony on the 7th October, 1847, the period allowed for preferring claims to leases expired on the 6th April last, as respects those persons, who on the 7th October last, had been in licensed occupation of their runs for one year or more. All such persons, therefore, who failed to demand leases on or before the 6th April last, have lost the right of so doing conferred by the Order in Council. As a matter of grace, however, the Governor has not up to the present time, refused to entertain applications for leases on the ground of their having been sent in subsequently to the expiration of the time prescribed by the Order in Council, nor will His Excellency do so as respects any further applications which may be received before the 30th September next, when the time allowed for taking out Licenses for the current year will expire. But after that date the Governor will not under any circumstances whatever, entertain a demand for a lease of a run from any person whose licensed occupancy of the run had, on the 7th October, 1847, been of not less than one year's duration.

It will of course be understood that this notice does not apply to parties, who having failed to take out their Licenses for the past year, are not entitled to demand Leases under the provisions of Her Majesty's Order in Council above referred to.

CONTRACTS FOR THE COLONIAL SERVICE, FOR 1849.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this Office, until 12 o'clock, of Monday, the 30th October next, for furnishing, for the Colonial Service, in the several Districts, the supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required, during Twelve Calendar Months, commencing 1st January, 1849, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

PROVISIONS.

1. The Ration for Emigrants:—For Men, 24oz. wheaten bread, 16oz. fresh meat, 8oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ z. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. For

Women, 16oz. wheat bread, 12oz. fresh meat, 6oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. Children under ten years to be allowed two-thirds of the Ration of Female Adults; above that age, and under fifteen, the same as Adults.

2. The Ration for Prisoners of the Crown, and others in the employment of Colonial Departments, when authorised to receive it, with the exceptions specified in No. 3—20oz. wheat bread, 8oz. maize meal, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

3. The Ration to Officers in charge of Surveying parties, when in the field, and men composing such parties, and for Soldiers of the Mounted Police, and other Mounted parties, when required—24oz. flour, 16oz. fresh beef, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tobacco, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

4. The Ration for wives of Soldiers of the Mounted Police—8oz. bread, 8oz. meat.

5. The Ration for children of soldiers of Mounted Police above seven years— $5\frac{1}{2}$ oz. of bread, $5\frac{1}{2}$ oz. meat—under 7 years, 4oz. of bread and 4oz. of meat.

6. To prisoners confined in Gaol—12oz. wheat bread, 12oz. maize meal, 4oz. fresh beef, 8oz. vegetables, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap—(Ration No. 2 is issued to Gaol attendants, and to Witnesses and others awaiting bail; and if confined in solitary cells, Ration No. 11.)

7. To children of Female Prisoners confined in Gaol—8oz. best wheat bread, 4oz. fresh beef, 1 pint milk, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. yellow soap.

8. Prisoners confined in Lock-up or Watch-houses—24oz. wheat bread or 20oz. flour—(Ration No. 2 is occasionally issued at Watch-houses to Prisoners of the Crown, when travelling from one station to another, and in other cases when sanctioned by a Magistrate.)

9. Forage for Horses and Oxen—8lbs. maize or barley, or 10lbs. of oats, 4lbs. bran, 12lbs. oat or cultivated grass hay, and 4lbs. wheat straw, for each horse daily, and half that quantity for each bullock.

10. For the Light-house, South Head, and Float-light, Sydney Harbour—Best clarified sperm per imperial gallon; patent wicks each.

11. Flour, bread, meat, tea, sugar, and tobacco, such quantities as may be required, for deserving Mechanics and others in Colonial Establishments when authorised.

12. Fuel and Light—Firewood per 100lbs.; sperm oil, common oil, per imperial gallon; mould candles, dipt candles, cotton wick per lb.

13. To be delivered in Sydney, as required for the Public Service, when ordered—Fresh beef, salt beef, salt pork, fresh mutton, maize meal, bread 1st, 2nd, and 3rd quality, ship biscuit, flour 1st, 2nd, and 3rd quality, arrowroot, sago, rice, tea, sugar, oatmeal, salt, yellow soap, pearl barley, tobacco, lard, candles mould and dipt, salt butter, gelatine, vegetables per lb.; milk, yeast, lime-juice, per quart; port wine, per dozen; rum, vinegar, per imperial gallon; roach lime, per bushel; straw for bedding, per 100lbs.

14. For the Lunatic Asylum, at Tarban Creek—Fresh beef, fresh mutton, suet, wheat bread, bread of the 1st quality, flour, 1st quality, raisins, rice, tea, sugar, salt, pepper, per lb.; milk per quart; tobacco, soap, vegetables, per lb.; port wine per dozen; vinegar per gallon; sago, oatmeal, arrowroot, treacle,

dipt candles, per lb.; common oil, per gallon; cotton wick, per lb.; forage, per ration, roach lime, per bushel; straw, firewood per 100lbs.

MALE ORPHAN SCHOOL, LIVERPOOL.—Daily Ration.

1. To the Master, Schoolmaster, and Men employed as servants or laborers, and to every two of the Master's children—22oz. flour, 16oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{3}{8}$ oz. tea, 2oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

2. To the Wife of the Master and Female servants entitled to Rations—16oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap.

3. Children above 6 years of age—On Holidays, 20oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays, 16oz. flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On other days, 16oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

4. Nursery Children under 6 years of age—On Holidays, 16oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays, 12oz. flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap. On other days, 12oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

For children under 7 years of age, best wheat bread is to be substituted, if required, in the proportion of 8oz. bread for 12oz. flour.

5. For the use of the Establishment—3 pints of oil.

6. For Artificers and Labourers— $\frac{3}{8}$ oz. of tobacco, when authorised.

7. Forage for each Horse—8lbs. of maize.

8. Best wheat bread, flour, tea, sugar, salt, pearl barley, rice, oatmeal, arrowroot, sago, yeast, lard, candles, soap, vinegar, and straw, as required.

FEMALE ORPHAN SCHOOL, PARRAMATTA.—

Daily Rations.

1. To the Superintendent and men employed as laborers or servants, the same as No. 1 of the Male Orphan School.

2. To the Matron and female servants, entitled to Rations, the same as No. 2 of the Male Orphan School.

3. To each of the Female Orphans and Children—On holidays, 16oz. flour, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. raisins or currants, $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap. To the Male Children under 6 years of age:—On holidays, 16oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays, 12oz. flour, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. On other days, 12oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap.

6. For the use of the Establishment:—1 $\frac{3}{4}$ pint oil, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ pint vinegar.

7. Milk and vegetables for the Children, best wheat bread, flour, tea, sugar, salt, pearl barley, rice, oatmeal, arrowroot, sago, yeast, lard, common dipt candles, soap, vinegar, straw, and firewood, as required.

For Children under 7 years of age:—Best wheat read is to be substituted, if required, in the proportion of 8oz. of bread for 12oz. of flour.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Our Lady the Queen, intituled, "*An Act to regulate the admission, in certain cases, of Barristers of the Supreme Court of New South Wales,*" after reciting that it was expedient to make provision, in certain cases, for the admission of properly qualified persons to practise as Barristers of the Supreme Court of New South Wales—

It is enacted, that the Judges of the Supreme Court at Sydney, the Attorney General for the time being, and two Barristers of the Supreme Court, to be annually elected in the month of December for the year then ensuing, by the practising Barristers of the said Court, should form a Board for the approval of properly qualified persons to be Barristers of the Supreme Court of New South Wales, and that the said Board should, as soon as conveniently might be after the passing of the said Act, and from time to time, as might appear to them to be expedient, make and promulgate rules for the examination of candidates in the ancient classics, both Greek and Latin, in Mathematics, in Law, and in such other branches of knowledge as they should deem meet; and that the said Board might, from time to time, depute the examination of such candidates to such persons as they should consider competent to examine such candidates, subject to the payment of such reasonable fees to the examiners respectively, as the said Board should order to be paid by such candidates: Provided that two Barristers should be elected members of the said Board within three months after the passing of the said Act for the present year.

We, the members of the Board of Examiners for the remainder of the present year, in pursuance of the said Act, do hereby make and promulgate the

following rules for the examination of candidates applying to be admitted as Barristers of the Supreme Court of New South Wales during the present year.

1. The Examinations in Law shall be conducted at present by the Board.

2. The examinations in Classics, Mathematics and History, shall be conducted by two Examiners to be previously appointed by the Board for that purpose.

3. The Board shall meet on the first Saturday in every Term to consider the applications, and proceed to the examination of Candidates; and such meeting shall be adjourned from time to time as may be found necessary.

4. The Examiners so appointed shall meet in Sydney, for the examination of Candidates on Thursday, in the second week of Term, at such place and hour as they shall determine; of which hour and place they shall give three clear days' notice to the Prothonotary, and they shall have power to adjourn from time to time if found necessary.

5. Every Candidate shall give written notice to the Board, (through the Attorney General,) fourteen clear days before the first day of Term, of his intention to apply to be admitted a Barrister;—and he shall cause a similar notice, with references to two or more persons respecting his character, to be sent to the Master in Equity, and to the Prothonotary, respectively.

6. The Board shall meet on the third Saturday, in each Term, to determine as to the admission of the Candidates; and it shall then, or on some day of adjournment, consider the examination papers of such Candidates, and decide on their admission or rejection.

7. Every such admission shall be on the last day of the Term, in which the Candidates shall have been examined.

8. The examinations shall severally be by questions in writing, to be given to the Candidate, and answered by him, in the presence of the Board, or of not less than two of them; or of the Examiners appointed by the Board;—and not more than two hours shall be allowed to any Candidate for answering one Examination Paper.

9. The answers shall be in writing, and signed by the Candidate; and such as were before the said Examiners shall be reported upon by them, and then put under seal, and forwarded with the Examination Papers to the Chief Justice for consideration, with all the other Examination Papers, at the next meeting of the Board.

10. The several examinations shall be with reference to Books, to be from time to time specified by the Board; and such Books, for the present, and until further orders, shall be the following:—

- (1.) In Law; Stephens' Commentaries, books 2 and 3, Phillips on Evidence, Stephen on Pleading, Archbold's Practice, book 4, and Selwyn's Nisi Prius, with the exception of the several titles, bills of exchange, bankrupt, rescous, tithes, fishery, game, quo warranto, mandamus, and common.
- (2.) In the Classics; Cicero de Officiis, books 1 and 2, the three first books of the *Æneid*; and in Greek, the Gospel of St. John, and the first book of the *Iliad*.
- (3.) In Mathematics, the first four books of Euclid, and Algebra as far as Quadratic Equations inclusive.

(4.) In History, Hallam's Constitutional History.

11. Each of the Examiners appointed by the Board shall be paid, by each Candidate, a fee of Ten Guineas for his Examination, and the Report thereon;—such fees to be paid into the hand of the Prothonotary for the Examiners, on or before the first day of the Term in which such examination is to take place.
