LIGHT HOUSE ON CAPE OTWAY.

IIS Excellency the GOVERNOR directs the publication, for general information, of the subjoined memorandum respecting the Light House which has recently been erected on Cape Otway, in Bass's Straits.

His Excellency further directs it to be notified, that at the expiration of one calendar month from the 20th day of October, 1848, the Dues towards the maintenance of the said Light House will become payable at the several Ports in New South Wales, as provided for by the Act of the Governor

and Legislative Council, passed in the eleventh year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act to provide for the payment of Dues towards the maintenance of Light Houses at Gabo Island and Cape Otway, respectively."

THE Light House on Cape Otway, Bass's Straits, latitude 38 degrees 51 minutes south, longitude 143 degrees 29 minutes east, having been completed and lighted on the 29th August, 1848, a light is burning, and will continue from sunset until sunrise.

The reef off Cape Otway is one-half to three-quarters of a mile distant, bearing south-east to south south-west, and extends $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles westward.

The Light House is erected on a cliff 251 feet 6 inches above highwater mark; the supporting column is 45 feet high, and the lantern 7 feet high.

From highwater mark to the centre of the light is 300 feet.

The light is a revolving catoptric of three groups of lamps, each group containing 7 lamps; the entire revolves round once in 2 minutes 39 seconds, shewing a flash of light of 3 seconds duration, and 50 seconds of darkness.

It is estimated that the light will be seen 8 leagues.

THE Dues arising for the year commencing 1st

A bond (in double the amount of the rent,) with two responsible sureties, will be required for the due observance of the conditions of the lease, and the regular payment of the rent by equal monthly instalments, before the expiration of seven days after the termination of each month;—together with a Warrant of Attorney.

THEREAS it has been represented to the Government, that on the night of Saturday, the 2nd ultimo, a party consisting, as it is supposed, of seven white persons, attacked two Aboriginal women in charge of the sheep of Mr. Augustus Morris, of Broomfield, on the Macintyre River, and murdered them, and the infant of one of the women, and that this party then proceeded to Mr. Morris' cattle station, situated about four miles from his home station, where the Aborigines domesticated under his protection, were attacked, and an Aboriginal lad was dangerously wounded by them; His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, that a reward of twenty-five pounds will be paid to any free person or persons who may within six months from the present date, give such information as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of any one of the individuals concerned in these outrages; and if such information be afforded by a Prisoner of the Crown, that application will be made to Her Majesty for the allowance to such convict, of a Conditional Pardon.

His Excellency further directs it to be notified, that a Pardon will be granted to any one of the persons concerned in these outrages, not being the actual perpetrators thereof, who will give such information as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of any one or more of his accomplices.

HEREAS it has been represented to the Government, that a dray belonging to Mr. James Mark, of "Goodar," was, on the 14th ultimo, attacked by the Aborigines, of the Macintyre River, who murdered the bullock driver, and carried off a considerable quantity of flour with which the dray was laden; His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, that a Reward of Twenty-five pounds will be paid to any free person or persons who may,

within six months from the present date, give such information as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of any one of the individuals concerned in this outrage; and if such information be afforded by a prisoner of the Crown, that application will be made to Her Majesty for the allowance to such convict of a Conditional Pardon.

HEREAS it has been represented to the Government, that on the morning of Sunday, the 11th June last, a party of Aboriginal Natives, encamped at "Umberiolli," on the Macintyre River, a station belonging to Mr. John Brown, of Singleton, was attacked by a party consisting of seven white men and an Aboriginal native, who murdered a gin named "Bootha," His Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, that a reward of fifty pounds will be paid to any free person or persons not the actual perpetrators of this murder, who may, within six months from the present date, give such information as shall lead to the apprehension and conviction of the guilty parties; and if the person giving such information be a Prisoner of the Crown, application will be made to Her Majesty for the allowance to such Prisoner of the Crown of a Conditional Pardon.

DENOMINATIONAL SCHOOLS.

IS Excellency the GOVERNOR directs the publication of a letter from the Board for superintending the Denominational Schools in the Middle or Sydney District, with the statement alluded to therein of the proposed distribution of the sum voted by the Legislative Council for their support during the year 1849, and General Regulations for their conduct, which have been approved by His Excellency.

Sir,

We have the honor to forward, for the approval of His Excellency the Governor, and for insertion in the Government Gazette, the distribution proposed by us of the sums placed at our disposal by the vote of the Legislative Council in support of the Denominational Schools of this District for 1849.

We also transmit general regulations for the conduct of the Schools placed under our charge.

We hope to be shortly enabled to submit, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, the names of the parties selected to be Members of the Local School Boards by the Heads of the Denominations, and approved of by us.

GENERAL REGULATIONS FOR THE CONDUCT OF THE DENOMINATIONAL SCHOOLS.

- 1.—The Schools are to open at nine o'clock in the morning and shut at four o'clock in the afternoon, or at any later hour that may be appointed and approved of by the Lecal Board.
- 2.—The Schools to commence and close with prayer, and the devotional demeanour of the children during these periods to be especially attended to by the Teachers.
- 3.—The scholars are to be divided into classes, according to advancement in the course of education, and will be successively taught

Reading, Writing, Arithmetic,

Grammar, Geography, History.

Except in Infant Schools the boys and girls will be formed in separate Classes.

- 4.—Teaching by Monitors under the Superintendence of the Master to be encouraged.
- 5.—The Teachers will see that the children attend School punctually, that they are washed and clean in their persons and apparel, and that they conduct themselves during School hours in a respectful and orderly manner.

No child with infectious disease will be allowed in the School.

- 6.—The Clergyman to whom the Religious Instruction of the Children is confided, will at all times have free access to the Schools.
- 7.—When receiving Religious Instruction, the Children will be taught that it is their duty to pay due respect to those placed in authority over them, to their Clergymen and Teachers, and to love and obey their Parents.
- 8.—It is desirable to establish under the supervision of the Local Boards, a system of Rewards for good scholarship and conduct.

Corporal punishment must be avoided.

- 9.—Children who are incorrigible will be reported to the Local Board, who will take steps in such cases by dismissal or otherwise, as may appear to them to meet the emergency.
- 10.—In each School there will be half-yearly examinations, when returns will be filled up and transmitted to the Central Board, according to a Printed Form, shewing the number and attendance of the Scholars.

The days of examination, and the periods of vacation, will be regulated by the Heads of each Denomination.

The duration of the Holidays in no case to exceed four weeks in the year.
