### CLAIMS TO LEASES OF CROWN LAND

BEYOND THE SETTLED DISTRICTS.  
WESTERN PORT DISTRICT.

**H**IS Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified for the information of all persons interested, that in pursuance of Her Majesty's Order in Council, of 9th March, 1847, the under-mentioned persons have demanded Leases of the several Runs of Crown Land, particularised in connexion with their respective names.

Persons who object to any of these claims, either wholly or in part, should lodge Caveats at this Office within two months from the present date, specifying the Lands to which their objections extend, and the grounds on which their objections are based.

It is to be distinctly understood, that the government does not pledge itself to the issue of a Lease in any case until due enquiry has been made into the validity of the claim, and whether or not it may be necessary to reserve any portion of the Land claimed, for any of the public purposes contemplated in the Order in Council.

Bounded on the E. by Rutherford's  
run, on the W by Mr Willoughby, on the

N by a creek unnamed, on the S by Mr  
Smith's run.

The run extends for 12 miles on the  
river Goulbura which bounds it on the  
N and E, the Jerusalem creek is the  
boundary with Messrs Goodman and  
Chenery up to the Goulbura or about  
SE high ranges, the Rubicon and Ache-  
ron creeks form the boundary to S and  
W, a line of fencing between the Rubicon  
and Acheron and part of the Rubicon  
separates the run from Major Davidson,  
the Acheron from the fence, to its junc-  
tion with the Goulbura is the boundary  
with Mr Henry Matson.

Bounded on the N by Mitchell's run, on the S by D Campbell's run, on the E by Tandara and Myers creek, on the W by Bullock creek.

## No. 7.

George S Airey, (per George Playne)  
Name of run—Killingworth Cheviott Hills  
Estimated Area—50,000 acres.  
Estimated grazing capabilities—9,000 sheep  
The run is formed by the junction of the Muddy creek with the Goulburn river, with frontage to the Goulburn of about 9 miles, frontage to the Muddy creek, from its junction with the Goulburn, may be estimated at about 10 miles, and from thence the station is bounded by that occupied by Mr Matson, by a line running SE along the tops of the ranges which divide the fall of the waters betwixt the main chain and limestone creeks; the boundaries with the station of E Cotton to the northward and eastward are by a high tier of ranges, and from a gap in these ranges called the Native Dog gap, the water falling from this gap, and also all the water falling into the same valley on the Goulburn side, being on the station of Mr. Cotton and that on the limestone side to Mr Airey.

Bounded on the front side by Muddy creek, on the back by a line running 6 miles from E to W, and by a creek and line running 7 miles NE and SW, having the stations of Messrs Millar and M'Farlane, and Messrs Hardie, as neighbouring stations; the boundaries having been approved of by Mr. Commissioner Powlett.

Estimated grazing capabilities—500 head of cattle

Scrubby country  
Bounded on the E by the Yarra Yarra river, on the N by Mr Rylie and the Yarra river 1 mile, on the W by barren ranges, and on the S by Messrs Cavanaugh and Canavan 3 miles.

Name of station—Rodborough Vale  
Estimated Area—23,400 acres  
Estimated grazing capabilities—9,000 sheep

Bounded on the W by Mr A. M'Callum, by a marked tree line bearing N by E  $7\frac{1}{2}$  miles and 10 chains long; from thence by D C Simpson, by a ploughed line bearing N E by N  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles long, crossing the Deep creek to a marked tall tree on the plain; from thence by a line bearing E by S 4 miles long to a marked tree at the foot of a wooded hill, from thence on the E by Joyce Brothers by a ploughed line bearing S  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles to its junction with the middle creek, thence by the middle creek bearing S S W 4 miles long to its junction with Major Mitchell's line, from thence on the S by Captain M'Lachlan and Donald Cameron, by the Major's line bearing SW by W  $6\frac{1}{2}$  miles long to its junction with Mr M'Callum's boundary line. The run is principally open country, but has one large swamp and two small ones. It is watered by the Deep Creek.

Estimated grazing capabilities—500 head of cattle

Bounded on the west commencing at a point where the Cape Schanck road crosses the swamp or flat about 2 miles eastward of the homestead, and bearing southerly across Duncan's flat about  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles, dividing from Davey's; on the S by Mrs King bearing N  $7^{\circ}$  E about  $6\frac{1}{2}$  miles, on the E by King and by Willoby's bearing NNW about 5 miles, and by Bryans and Willoby's on the NE bearing across the heath about S  $60^{\circ}$  W,  $4\frac{1}{2}$  miles more or less, and thence along the Schanck road southerly about 2 miles to the commencing point.

Commencing at a point of the Murray river bounding with Messrs Collyer, bearing southerly along a belt of timber for  $5\frac{1}{2}$  miles, and bounded by Messrs Collyer; thence SW about 8 miles, bounded by Messrs Collyer; thence S 4 miles bounded by person unknown, thence NE 8 miles, bounded by Messrs J Aitken and A Sim; thence north easterly by belt of timber 7 miles, and bounded by Mr Sim to the Campaspie river; thence by the Campaspie river southerly to the boundary with Mr Sim on the east side 2 miles; thence easterly for 5 miles, and bounded by Mr Sim and Mr O'Dea; thence northerly to the junction of the Murray and Goulburn  $7\frac{1}{2}$  miles, bounded by Mr O'Dea, and on the north by the Murray river to the commencing point 12 miles.

The leading features are a tier of ranges running from Mount Macedon and Steels creek, which runs through the centre of the run.

Granite ranges about NW by Mr Mollison, Mr Pohlman's ranges NE, Mr Beauchamp's creek, general course SE and range SW, Mr Piper's ranges SW, Mr Peter's ranges N and E, Mr Simmond's ranges SW, creek about E marked lines being boundaries.

Estimated grazing capabilities—1,000 head of cattle, 7,000 sheep

Bounded by the Campaspie on the W to the junction of a gully known as the paddock gully with the Campaspie, thence by a range north of the said gully in an

easterly direction to the Back creek below the junction of Briggs creek and the Back creek, thence by Briggs creek running SE to the high range forming the boundary between the said run and Dr Baynton, thence the back creek to a tree marked B forming the boundary between said run and Mr Pohlman, thence a line nearly west to a bald hill on Pohlman's creek, thence a line nearly west to the Campaspie.

Estimated grazing capabilities—500 head of cattle, 3,000 sheep

The run is bounded on the north by a range running east the division between Messrs Pohlman and Baynton, thence by a line west to a creek known as Pipers creek forming the boundary on the western side for about  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles the division between said run and Mr Mitchell, thence a line of marked trees running east to a gully known as the Jews Harp gully, dividing with Mr Piper, thence the aforesaid gully and a line of marked trees running north to a creek known as Mealings creek forming the division between said run and Dr Baynton.

Estimated grazing capabilities—1,000 head of cattle or 8,000 sheep

Bounded on the north by the Aboriginal station and thick forest, on the east by the Goulburn river, on the south by a line commencing 1 mile to the northward of the junction of Mitchell's creek with the Goulburn, and running in southwesterly direction to a chain of hills forming with forest and scrub the western boundary.

Estimated grazing capabilities—300 head of cattle, 12,000 sheep

Situated about 30 miles from Melbourne on a tributary of the Deep creek, bounded on the north by Lancefield station, on the south by S and W Jackson and W and J Headlam, east by Mr Newsom's and Mr Clarke, west by Riddle and Hamilton, and J P Fawcner NW

## No. 20.

Estimated area—9,600 acres

Estimated grazing capabilities—600 head of cattle

Bounded on the W by the Wooloomerang Creek, on the N & NE by unoccu-

ped barren land, and on every other part by salt water.

## No. 21.

Estimated area—30,000 acres

Estimated grazing capabilities—7,000 sheep

Commencing from the W side of Hawkings' Inn, following Messrs Heape & Grice's marked trees to a range where they join Mr Bryant's boundary, following Mr Bryant's blazed trees as Mr Cameron's boundary, then SE about a mile to a burnt hut, then E by S about 2½ miles to a high stoney range, then following a range down to a creek running about E & W from that creek a line bearing E by S to Mr Orr's boundary, thence a line across the ranges to a blazed tree marked No. 7, from that tree in a straight line to the lowest and most eastern dip of Mount Alexander, from thence following the principal range of Mount Alexander to the commencement of Messrs Heape & Grice's boundary with all the falls of water to this side, from thence by Messrs Heape & Grice's blazed trees as far as Hawkings' run.

Commencing at the junction of the Serpentine Creek with the Loddon River; bounded on or towards the E by the Serpentine Creek and John Bear's run in a line by the course of said creek 14 miles 30 chains, then by a line bearing W 1 mile 14 chains and bounded on the N by part of A. Thorpe's run, then by a line bearing S 9 miles and 40 chains, and bounded on the W by said A. Thorpe's run, then by a line bearing W and terminating at the Loddon River about 2½ miles, then by the course of the Loddon River aforesaid to the junction with the Serpentine Creek or commencing point, and bounded on or towards the SW by Heape and Grice's run which said described land is known as the East Loddon Station.

Bounded on or towards the N by M'Millan's run by a line bearing easterly and westerly crossing the centre of Lake Leager and terminating at the E side at the Loddon River, distant from the Lake

2 miles, on the W by Mallie scrub distant from the Lake 1 mile, on or towards the E by the Loddon River and Booth & Argyle's run, continuing the course of the Loddon River southerly, extending beyond the hut known as Thorpe's hut ½ mile on or towards the S by A. Thorpe's run, being a line bearing W 6 miles, then by a line bearing south westerly to the Mallie scrub about 6 miles, and on or towards the W by Mallie scrub and Bucka-ah Banyal ranges, bearing north easterly to the termination of the line running westerly from Lake Leager aforesaid.

Bounded on the S by Abel Thorpe's run, being a line bearing E from Johnson's public house (commencing on the S side) 7 miles 46 chains to the Bullock Creek, on or towards the E by the Bullock Creek and part of J. Aitken and W. F. Mitchell's runs along the course of the Bullock Creek 15 miles 75 chains, on the N by Booth and Argyle's run being a line bearing W 14 miles 21 chains, and terminating at the Serpentine Creek, and on or towards the west by the Serpentine Creek and Bear and Godfrey's run, by a line along the course of the Serpentine Creek to Johnson's public house or starting point 15 miles 30 chains.

N 45° E 1½ miles by marked trees, S 48° E 4½ miles by a creek; boundary by 7 hills station by S 33½° W 2½ miles and by a creek running S 48° W 1½ miles.

Estimated grazing capabilities—10,000 sheep

Boundary with Mr. John Hepburn by a creek bearing S 52° E 6½ miles; boundary with Mr. F. Landen by the same creek 2 miles; boundary by Boolarook station S 33½° W 2½ miles and by a creek running S 48° W 1½ miles;

boundary with Mr. W. J. T. Clarke N 29° W by marked trees 2 miles, N 3° W by a marked tree road 1½ mile, N 71½° W 1 mile 3 chains marked trees, W 47 chains and W 47 chains top scrubby hill N 26½° E 58 chains; boundary with Mr. D. Coghill N 5° W 2 miles by marked trees N 25° W 1½ miles S, N 42° W 2½ miles by a creek; boundary with Mr. Campbell N 42° E 1½ miles by a ploughed line.

Michael Bourke and James Neville  
Name of run—Minton's Creek  
Estimated area—12,800 acres  
Estimated grazing capabilities—400 head of cattle

Bounded on the N by ranges, on the S by Captain Howey and Mrs Larimore, on the W by ranges, on the E by the Deep creek.

## No. 29.

Booth and Argyle  
Name of run—Duck Swamp  
Estimated area—115,000 acres  
Estimated grazing capabilities—2,500 head of cattle and 8,000 sheep

Bounded on the S by a line running due E 8 miles from a marked tree on the Serpentine creek, being the boundary with John Bear, then due N about 6 miles and N E about 9½ miles to Pyramid creek, being boundary line with Jeffery Brothers, then by Pyramid creek about 2 miles to a marked tree, thence due W about 17 miles to a marked tree on the Loddon river being a settled boundary with A. M'Callum, then by E bank of Loddon river about 17 miles to a marked tree on Loddon about 1½ miles due E, then due S about 2½ miles, then due E 1½ miles to Serpentine creek, being boundary lines between A. Thorpe as laid out by Mr. Powlett, C.C.L.

Estimated area—17,280 acres  
Estimated grazing capabilities—960 head of cattle, 6,000 sheep

Bounded on the N by a ploughed furrow 1½ miles to the Sydney road, being part of the boundary of Pontesford station of Messrs Tootals, then by a ploughed

furrow and marked tree line 4½ miles to the dry creek, being part of the boundary of Moranding (station of Mr. Sutherland), on the NE by a part of the boundary of the Dean (station of Mr. Beveridge), on E by a marked tree line running 6 miles to the big hill being part of the boundary of Mr. Malcolm's station, then by a gully running from the big hill 1½ miles, and by a ploughed furrow 2 miles being part of the boundary of Mr. Budd; on the SE by a marked tree line 3½ miles to a creek, being part of Mr. Malcolm's boundary; on the S by Brock's creek 1½ miles, being part of Mr Brock's boundary; on the SW by Steele's creek, part of Mr. Steele's boundary 2½ miles, and part of Mr. Purves' boundary 1 mile; on the W by a marked tree line and ploughed furrow 4½ miles part of Major Boyd's boundary, and on the NW by a marked tree line 2½ miles, part of Captain Cain's boundary.

Estimated grazing capabilities—4,000 sheep

Bounded on the N by the continuation of the line from Bertram's Inn E, on the S by the continuation of the line from the Campaspie marked tree E, on the E by the Mount Campbell range, on the W by the Barrie Down run.

## No. 32.

John and Robert Bakewell  
Name of run—Burneweng  
Estimated area—112,913 acres  
Estimated grazing capabilities—800 head of cattle 12,000 sheep

Bounded on the N by Alexander Sim's run commencing at a marked tree on the range, and bearing W to a mound and trench 17 miles 17 chains (crossing the Campaspie river at 4 miles 62 chains); on the W by John Aitken's run bearing S 10 miles 10 chains to the Picaninny creek; on the S by Francis Robertson's run, bearing E 8 miles 61 chains 30 links to a marked tree on the Campaspie river, by the Campaspie river downwards to the confluence of the Mount Pleasant creek, which creek it follows up for 2 miles in a direct line to a marked double tree; thence a line E 6 miles 11 chains 40 links to a stone heap on the range, and on the E by the said range which separates it from James Cooper and Edward Curr's runs, bearing N in a direct line 10 miles 66 chains to the commencing point.

## No. 33.

Estimated area—3,258 acres  
Estimated grazing capabilities—1,629 sheep

Commencing at a marked tree on the Caimada creek, where the present Portland road crosses it, and bounded by that creek towards its source 175 chains from point to point to its junction with a small gully, then along the gully a line bearing  $22^{\circ}$  S of W extending 38 chains to a plough furrow bearing  $3\frac{1}{2}$  S of W extending 82 chains to the head of a gully; thence a line of marked trees bearing  $6^{\circ}$  N of W extending 101 chains to a dry creek; thence along the dry creek to its junction with the Lerderberg river, bearing about  $20^{\circ}$  S of W 22 chains; bounded thence by the Lerderberg river for 161 chains from point to point; thence a line bearing E 92 chains, S 60 chains, E 40 chains, N 40 chains, E 40 chains to the Caimada creek where the present Portland road crosses it.

Estimated grazing capabilities—16,000 sheep

On the north by a line from Bertram's Inn running north, and a line running W from a known crossing place on the Campaspie; on the S by a line E from a marked tree within about 3 miles of Caldwell and Ross's head station, and a line W from the junction of the Axe Creek with the Campaspie; on the E by Mount Pasant run, and on the W by Henpe and Grice's stations.

## No. 35.

G. S. and R. Brodie

Name of run—Campaspie

Estimated area—20,000 acres

Estimated grazing capabilities—8,000 sheep

From a marked tree a little beyond the highest point of the range, running from the head station in a southerly direction up a creek or gully (striking said creek at the angle opposite Mr Raleigh's out-station hut) to the commencement of a ploughed furrow distance about 2 miles; bounded by Messrs Raleigh and Orr, from thence along a plough furrow to the top of a stony hill, course SE, distance about  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile; from thence along the plough furrow to the Coliban, general bearing ESE, distance about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles; bounded by Mr Orr, from this point proceeding up the Coliban a few hundred yards, to what is called the Major's line, crossing the river and in an easterly direction along said line through the ranges, distance about 2 miles; thence along said line (marked as well by a plough furrow) to the Campaspie, general bearing SE, distance about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles; bounded by Mr Mitchell, from thence across the Campaspie and along the Major's line a little past the head of a Stoney Gully, general bearing ENE, distance

about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles; thence along a track to Mourro's paddock, including a water-hole at the corner of the western paddock, general bearing NNE, distance about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles, from thence down a dry creek or gully to the Campaspie, general bearing WNW, distance about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles; bounded by Mr Beauchamp, crossing to the W bank of the Campaspie here and proceeding down for about  $\frac{1}{2}$  of a mile; and immediately opposite the point of a bald hill, on the E side of that river; from this point NW (leaving a clump of gums close on the right hand) to the Coliban, distance about 1 mile, crossing the Coliban a few hundred yards further down; from thence up a deep gully (about midway between two bald hills) to the top of a hill bearing NW, and from thence along the top of the dividing range, general bearing WNW, distance about 6 miles, bounded by Mr Jennings, from thence in a SE direction crossing the 11 mile creek about a mile from this latter point, and at the angle about  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile below Mr Raleigh's Cockatoo hut, to the marked tree at the point of the range, being the commencing point, distance about 4 miles, bounded by Mr Raleigh.

## ROADS.

### PORT PHILLIP DISTRICT.

**H**IS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council having deemed it expedient to open and make certain Parish Roads, in the District of Port Phillip, namely:—

1. Proposed line of road from the marked Heidelberg Road, at the reserve north of the suburban allotment No 88, in the parish of Jika Jika, to the north-east corner of the parish of Merriang, generally known as the "Upper Plenty Road."

2. Branch Road from the "marked Heidelberg Road," on the division line between James Watson and Richard Henry Brown's purchases, in the parish of Keelbundora, crossing the Yarra Yarra Rivulet to the north-east corner of Francis Dawe Wickham's purchases, in the parish of Nillumbik.

**DAILY RATIONS OF PROVISIONS.**

**No. 1. Emigrants**—For men, 24 oz wheaten bread, 16 oz fresh meat, 8 oz vegetables, half oz salt, quarter oz tea, one and a half oz sugar, quarter oz soap. For women—16 oz wheaten bread, 12 oz fresh meat, 6 oz vegetables, half oz salt, quarter oz tea, one and a half oz sugar, half oz soap. Children under ten years to be allowed two-thirds the rations of female adults; above that age and under fifteen the same as adults.

**No. 2. To prisoners of the crown and others in the employment of the colonial departments**—20 oz wheaten bread 8 oz maize meal, 16 oz fresh beef, quarter oz salt, one oz sugar, quarter oz soap.

**No. 3. To officers in charge of surveying parties when in the field, and men composing such parties**—24 oz flour, 16 oz fresh or salt beef, half oz salt, half oz tea, two and a half oz sugar, half oz tobacco, quarter oz soap; or, in lieu thereof, if preferred, 24 oz flour, 24 oz fresh or salt beef, one oz salt, half oz tea, 4 oz sugar.

**No. 4. The rations for wives of soldiers of the Mounted Police**—8 oz bread, 8 oz meat.

**No. 5. The ration for children of soldiers of the Mounted Police above seven years**—five and one-third oz bread, five and one-third oz meat, under seven years—4 oz bread, 4 oz meat.

**No. 6. Prisoners confined in gaol**—12 oz wheaten bread, 12 oz maize meal, 4 oz fresh beef, 8 oz vegetables, half oz salt, quarter oz soap. (Ration No. 2 is issued to gaol attendants, and to witnesses, and others waiting bail; and if confined in solitary cells, ration No. 8.)

**No. 7. Children of female prisoners confined in gaol**—8 oz wheaten bread, 4 oz fresh beef, 1 pint milk, quarter oz yellow soap.

**No. 8. Prisoners confined in lock-up or watch-houses**—24 oz wheaten bread.

**No. 9. Forage for horses and oxen, for all colonial services**—8 lbs maize or barley, or 10 lbs oats as demanded, 4 lbs bran, 12 lbs oaten or cultivated grass hay, and 4 lbs wheat straw for each horse per day, and half the quantity for each bullock.

**No. 10. For the Lighthouses**—best clarified sperm oil, per imperial gallon; patent wicks each.

**No. 11. For men attached to Lighthouses, Telegraphs, Water Police, and Harbour Master's boat's crews**—24 oz wheat bread, 16 oz fresh beef, a quarter oz salt, one quarter oz soap.

**No. 12. Fuel and light**—sperm and common oil per gallon, mould and dip candles per lb, cotton wick ditto.

**No. 13. For the Lunatic Asylum, Yarra**—Fresh beef, fresh mutton, suet,

wheaten bread, bread of the 1st quality, flour 1st quality, raisins, rice, tea, sugar, salt, pepper, milk, tobacco, soap, vegetables, port wine, vinegar, sago, oatmeal, arrowroot, treacle, dipt candles, common oil, cotton wick, forage, per ration, roach lime, straw, in such quantities as may be required.

Military rations of provisions for mounted police or other mounted force, and native police, if required, 24 oz flour, 16 oz fresh or salt beef, half oz salt, half oz tea, two and half oz sugar, half oz tobacco, quarter oz soap.

For Hospitals, Chief Protector's department, Native Police, and all other services when ordered—20 per cent flour, fresh beef and mutton, wheaten bread, (first, second, and third quality), maize meal, bottled port wine, arrowroot, rice, sago, pearl barley, tea, sugar, salt, oatmeal, yellow soap, colonial tobacco, vegetables, milk, vinegar, straw, common oil, dip and mould candles, rum, brandy, porter, cotton wick, salt beef, and salt pork.

**CONDITIONS.**

1. All the articles required by this notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

2. The flour and bread must be the produce of clean sound colonial wheat, from which on the ration of emigrants, surveying parties, border police, mounted police 20 per cent, and on the ration to prisoners of the crown 10 per cent; has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Beef and mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required, and, when the quantity admits of it, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

4. The maize meal to be similar in quality to the wheat meal, and to be twice ground.

5. When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz.—1 lb wheat flour or 1 lb biscuit equal to 1½ lb bread; 1 lb salt beef or 1 lb mutton, or 10 oz salt pork, equal to 1 lb of fresh beef.

6. The tobacco to be the best colonial.

7. These substitutions are not to be made except on the requisition of the officer authorised to draw the several rations.

8. Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c., &c.

9. The supplies for road parties and surveying parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed stations to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the officer in charge; and in case the whole ration of forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the ration undermentioned:—The maize or barley 4-12—the hay 5-12—the bran 2-12—the straw 1-12.

10. The supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph) are to be delivered direct to the parties or establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorized for the purpose.

11. Provisions and forage, when required by rations, according to the scales under their respective heads, the tenders are to express the price per ration only.

12. The tenders for forage are not required to state the price of the ration for oxen, as when the latter is required one half of the allowance fixed for horses will be drawn, and one half the price allowed to the contractor, whose engagement is to provide for both horses and oxen.

13. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts, where a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third, as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

14. If the board, arbitrators, or umpire shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing of which it will be procured by the department requiring it, and the expense charged to the contractor.

15. In the event of any unnecessary delay or failure of the contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured and charged in like manner.

16. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause, injury would be sustained either by the parties to whom the rations are due or to the contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department or officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the rations are to be received, shall have the power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality; it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although in the meantime, he must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead, failing of which it will be obtained by the officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the contractor.

17. A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon the report of the officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

18. It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving in writing a notice of

three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the contract at the expiration of that period, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made or agreed to be made.

19. The contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers in a complete state, to the Sub-Treasurer for examination, and upon their approval, payment will be made by him at Melbourne.

20. The value of all packages to be included in the prices demanded.

21. Printed forms of tender may be obtained from the Sub-Treasurer; and a security of £2000 will be required for the due fulfilment of the contract. No tender can be attended to unless accompanied by a certificate from two responsible parties proposed as security, stating they are willing to become bound as securities for the contractor accordingly, and the bonds must be executed within twenty days from the day of acceptance of the tender being notified, failing of which the contracts will be again advertised or another tender accepted.

From the post office in Melbourne to vessels in Hobson's bay, once or twice a day, as may be required, and from vessels in Hobson's bay to the post office in Melbourne, as often as mails may arrive, always by the eastern beach.

It is to be understood that the mails are to be despatched on the days and hours to be fixed by the Chief Postmaster, either according to the present arrangement or

as he may afterwards determine for the public convenience.

It will be optional with parties to offer for one or more of the above lines of stages, and to propose the mode of conveyance; but on all roads where wheel vehicles can travel, a preference will be given to carriage conveyance, and the contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to travel at the rate agreed upon. The rate of travelling is not to be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages. The contractors are to carry all bags and letters which may be delivered to them under authority of the Chief Postmaster, or any of the Postmasters, and to provide secure lockers for the mails in carriages, and dry coverings for the bags on horse-back.

Contractors will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet by any of their servants or passengers, or otherwise, to the prejudice of the Post-office Revenue, but all loose letters collected on the road are to be delivered up to the Postmaster at first Post Office arrived at, under penalty of £5 for each and every offence.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival, except for the first five or ten minutes respectively.

Contractors will be strictly bound not to assign any portion of their contract without consent of the Chief Postmaster.

A mail-cart or carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses, not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the driver, under the penalty of £3 for each offence.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of mails are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the Chief Postmaster, or person appointed by him for that purpose.

The drivers and postmen are to be free men and of certified good character.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement are to be deducted by the Chief Postmaster from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the contractor, and to be considered as over and above any penalties provided by any Act of Council.

Each party tendering, or an agent for him, must attend at this office on the day appointed for opening the Tenders, and each Tender must bear the signature of two respectable and solvent persons, engaging to enter into a bond with the contractor, for the safety of the mails and the due performance of the contract, and every stipulation therein.
