PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES AUGUSTUS FITZ ROY, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Imperial Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, passed in the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled, "*An Act for the Government of New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land*," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor of New South Wales for the time being, to fix such place or places within any part of the said Colony, and such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Legislative Council constituted under the said recited Act, as he may think fit: Now, therefore, I, Sir Charles Augustus Fitz Roy, as such Governor aforesaid, do hereby in pursuance of the power and authority so in me vested, announce and proclaim that the first Session of the present Legislative Council for the despatch of business shall commence and be holden on Tuesday, the fifteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, at Twelve of the clock at noon, in the building known as the Council Chambers, situated in Macquarie-street, in the City of Sydney; and the Members of the said Council are hereby

required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my hand and seal, at Melbourne, Port Phillip, this twentieth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, and in the twelfth year of Her Majesty's Reign.
