PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES AUGUSTUS FITZ ROY, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the GOVERNOR of New South Wales, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, passed in the thirteenth year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled, "*An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the Distillation, Rectifying, and Compounding of Spirits, and to authorise and regulate the warehousing under Bond, and the exportation free of duty, of Spirits distilled within the Colony of New South Wales, and to repeal certain Laws relating thereto;*" it was, amongst other things enacted, that from and after the passing of the said Act, it should not be lawful for

any person, except as therein excepted, to carry on the business of a Distiller, or a Rectifier and Compounder of Spirits, or to have, keep, or make use of any Still or other utensil for Distilling, or for Rectifying and Compounding Spirits, except in such places as His Excellency the Governor of the said Colony should appoint or direct by Proclamation to be published in the New South Wales *Government Gazette*, under a penalty of not less than one hundred pounds nor more than five hundred pounds: Now, therefore, I, the GOVERNOR aforesaid, do by this my Proclamation, hereby direct and appoint the premises known as the Brisbane Distillery, in the City of Sydney; and also, the premises known as Evans's Rectifying and Compounding Establishment, situated in Hutchinson-street, Surry Hills, in the City of Sydney, to be places at which the business of a Rectifier and Compounder of Spirits may be carried on, under and subject to the provisions of the said recited Act.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Government House, Sydney, this twenty-fourth day of December, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, and in the thirteenth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

SIR,

In reference to my Circular Despatch of 24th May last, enclosing the Report of the Committee of Her Majesty's Privy Council for Trade and Foreign Plantations, on which the Bill for the better Government of Her Majesty's Australian Colonies, recently introduced into the House of Commons, was founded, I have now to inform you, with very great regret, that it has been found impossible to proceed with that Bill during the Session just concluded, in consequence of the heavy pressure of business of a most urgent character which has occupied the attention of Parliament even down to its close.

2. It will, however, be again introduced with the least possible delay, after the re-assembling of Parliament, modified in one important particular only. The provisions for a general and uniform Tariff, to be established by the Act itself and unalterable except by the General Assembly when convoked, will be omitted. For while Her Majesty's Government continue to think it of the utmost importance that all possible freedom should be given to that inter-colonial trade which is year by year increasing in importance between the Australian Settlements, enquiry and discussion have rendered it evident, that the proposed uniformity could not be carried into practical effect without a variety of subsidiary arrangements, which could only be well considered and matured on the spot.

3. The Bill, therefore, when re-introduced, while it will empower the Colonies to establish an uniform Tariff through the General Assembly, will not impose one upon them. There will, probably, be some other changes introduced into the measure with the view of rendering it more perfect in detail, but, with the exception above mentioned, it will be substantially the same with that of the late Session; and I sincerely hope that the delay thus unavoidably interposed may be productive of advantage, by enabling Parliament to consider these questions of detail with greater preparation.

SIR,

1. I have much satisfaction in acquainting you, that Parliament has, on the recommendation of Her Majesty's Government, granted a sum of money in order to enable the Government to send free Emigrants to those Colonies, which receive Convicts from this Country. The intention of Her Majesty's Government is to send, as nearly as they may find practicable, a number of free persons equal to that of the Male Convicts received in each Colony, which co-operates with this Country in carrying into effect this important part of penal discipline.

2. I much regretted, as you are aware, that the Financial State of the Country last year did not admit of carrying into effect this arrangement in favor of New South Wales, as I had hoped when I directed you to ascertain the views of the Legislative Council. I trust, however, that in the measure now adopted, the Legislature and the inhabitants of the Colony may recognize the earnest desire which Her Majesty's Government entertain to conciliate their willing assent to the policy which has been adopted on this subject. I am quite sensible that without the co-operation of the Colonists, the system of Convict discipline which has now been adopted, however promising it may be in other respects, can hardly be expected to succeed. On the other hand, with that co-operation, I hope that it may at once furnish each Colony receiving Convicts with useful labor, and materially conduce to the reform of the prisoners who are removed thither, while the numbers sent being moderate, and the Convicts being placed under judicious management, no perceptible injury may accrue to the moral tone of the Community. It is needless to say, that this last and most important result may be expected to be greatly promoted by the provision now made for introducing simultaneously with the prisoners an equal number of persons who have never been convicted of any offence against the Laws of the Country.

3. Part of the vote will be expended in sending out the wives and families of the Convicts, a measure which appears at all times to have been considered desirable for promoting good order and the reformation of the Convicts.

4. I may further take the present opportunity of apprizing you, that Her Majesty's Government have made arrangements for sending out, whenever practicable, Military Pensioners as the Guard in Convict Ships, instead of as at present Soldiers proceeding to join their Regiments in Australia. This will be done at the expense of the general funds applicable to transportation, and the effect will be without cost to the Colonies, to increase their supply of labor, and the elements of security and good order, by introducing men acquainted with the use of arms and accustomed to Military discipline. But as some of the Pensioners will be married men, and as it is obviously desirable to provide for enabling them to be joined by their families, it has been determined that some portion of the grant cannot be more properly employed than in sending out the wives and children of these Military Emigrants.

5. Considering the importance of endeavouring to introduce a due proportion of females into those Colonies to which Male Convicts are sent, I shall direct the Commissioners to devote part of this grant more particularly to promoting the Emigration of females, and especially of girls properly selected from the workhouses in different parts of the Kingdom.

6. If there should not be a sufficient number of Emigrants under the foregoing descriptions to employ the whole of the grant, the balance will probably be expended in sending Emigrants under the same rules as established for those sent by the Colonial Land funds.

7. In all the uses to which this vote may be turned, the great object will be to employ it in the manner which shall appear calculated at once to supply the largest number of free people in proportion to the amount expended, and likewise to compose them of those classes which may be best calculated to obviate the peculiar evils apprehended from the introduction of Convicts.

8. I shall give the Commissioners of Emigration the necessary instructions for entering without delay on the expenditure of the Grant.

MEASUREMENT OF THE BOUNDARIES OF RUNS.

WITH reference to the Notice issued on the 28th July, 1849, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct the issue of

the following further Notice respecting the Surveys of the Boundaries of Runs, for the purposes of the Leases claimed under Her Majesty's Order in Council of the 9th March, 1847.

1. The Surveyor General having reported that the price of £2 per linear mile is now found to be much higher than is required to cover the expense of the measurement of the Boundaries of Runs, the price is hereby reduced to *Ten Shillings* per linear mile, which will be charged in all cases in which it may be necessary to have recourse to measurement, in order to render the descriptions of the boundaries sufficiently complete to satisfy the rule of law, which holds any grant or other conveyance from the Crown to be absolutely null and void if the property intended to be conveyed be not described with certainty.

2. A formal survey will not be required by the Government in any case in which the claimant of a Lease shall have furnished, under the Notice of the 7th October, 1847, such a description of the Boundaries of his Run as will satisfy the requirement of the law above referred to, or will admit of being rendered sufficiently perfect for that purpose by explanation afforded on the spot to the Commissioner of Crown Lands, or other person employed by him to estimate the extent and grazing capabilities of the Run.

3. Where no survey is made there will, of course, be no charge, but any person who may have furnished a description sufficiently perfect to enable the Government to dispense with a survey, but who may nevertheless be desirous, for the sake of his own greater security, to obtain a technical description in his Lease, can have the boundaries of his Run measured at the above stated rate, of ten shillings per linear mile.

4. The charge for measurements performed by the Surveyors employed under the direction of the Commissioners for the settlement of disputed boundaries will be the same as that fixed by this notice for other measurements, viz.: — Ten shillings per linear mile; but where the descriptions furnished by the applicants are deemed sufficient for the lease, it will not be necessary that a measured survey should be made of any portion of the boundary excepting that which is immediately the subject of dispute.

5. Wherever the boundaries of a Run are coincident with those of a Reserve, or with any lines which have been surveyed by the Government for a public purpose, no charge on account of their measurement will be made to the Lessee.

6. In reference to a misapprehension which appears to have been entertained respecting the meaning of the Notice of the 28th July, 1849, in this particular, it is hereby explained that the Government does not intend to take a double payment for the same survey, and that, therefore, where the boundaries of two Runs requiring measurement are coincident, the expense of the measurement will be divided equally between the two parties, each being charged one-half of the fixed rate of ten shillings per mile.
