PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES AUGUSTUS FITZ ROY, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the GOVERNOR of New South Wales, with the advice of the Legislative Council, passed in the second year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for repealing so much of an Act, intituled, 'An Act to continue until further provisions shall be made, certain Duties, Tolls, Rates, Fees, or other sums of money imposed by the Governor of New South Wales, and for other purposes, as relates to the levying of Tolls in New South Wales, and for raising a fund towards making, repairing, and upholding Public Roads, Bridges, and Ferries, and for regulating the collection of Tolls thereon,' it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for the Governor of the said Colony for the time being, by any Proclamation or Proclamations under his hand, from time to time to appoint places at which Tolls shall be collected, and to cause the same to be collected upon any line of road which has been, or shall be wholly or partly made, and which is repaired at the public expense; and to cause Toll to be collected at any Bridge built, purchased, or repaired at the public expense, and at any Ferry, constructed or upheld at the same, and to cause such Gates, Bars,

Chains, Rails, and Fences, to be built and set up, as shall be deemed necessary for preventing passengers, beasts, and carriages from passing, unless there shall be then paid such Toll as shall be due or demandable under the authority of the said recited Act; and whereas it has become necessary to appoint a Public Ferry at the crossing of the River Mary, at Maryborough, where the road meets that river, for the purposes of the said recited Act: Now, I, the Governor aforesaid, in pursuance of the authority vested in me, by the said recited Law or Ordinance, do, by this my Proclamation, hereby appoint the said crossing on the Mary River, to be a place at which a Ferry shall be established, and at which Tolls shall be collected, to the amount, and under the regulations, restrictions, and provisions of the said recited Law or Ordinance, of which Ferry all persons concerned are hereby required to take due notice.

SERVICE, FOR 1851.**

NOTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this Office, until 12 o'clock, of Monday, the 18th November next, for furnishing, for the Colonial Service, in the several Districts, the supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required, during Twelve Calendar Months, commencing 1st January, 1851, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

PROVISIONS, AND OTHER ARTICLES.

1. The Ration to Immigrants:—*Male and Female Adults, of the age of 14 years and upwards*, daily—

- 16 oz. wheat bread
- 16 oz. fresh meat
- 16 oz. vegetables, the whole or a portion to consist of potatoes, at the option of the Agent for Immigration
- $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar
- $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt
- $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap

When required, 8oz. wheat bread may be substituted in lieu of vegetables, and 8oz. of oatmeal in lieu of meat.

One half of the above quantities to Children of Immigrants, under 14 years of age.

2. The Ration to Prisoners on Cockatoo Island, to Wardsmen in Gaol, to Prisoners detained as Witnesses or for want of bail, and to Others in the employment of Colonial Departments, when authorised to receive it:—

- 20 oz. wheat bread
- 8 oz. maize meal
- 16 oz. fresh meat
- $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt
- 1 oz. sugar
- $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap

this Ration is occasionally issued at Watchhouses to Prisoners of the Crown, when travelling from one station to another, and in other cases when sanctioned by a Magistrate.

To the Female Children:—On Holidays, 16oz. flour, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. raisins or currants, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{3}{8}$ oz. soap. 6. For the use of the Establishment:—1 $\frac{3}{4}$ pint oil, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ pint of vinegar.
