EXHIBITION OF INDUSTRY OF ALL
NATIONS.

REWARD.

SERVICE, FOR 1851.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this Office, until 12 o'clock, of *Monday, the 18th November next*, for furnishing, for the *Colonial Service*, in the several Districts, the supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required, during Twelve Calendar Months, commencing 1st January, 1851, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

PROVISIONS, AND OTHER ARTICLES.

1. The Ration to Immigrants—*Male and Female Adults, of the age of 14 years and upwards, daily*—

- 16 oz. wheat bread
- 16 oz. fresh meat
- 16 oz. vegetables, the whole or a portion to consist of potatoes, at the option of the Agent for Immigration
- $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar
- $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt
- $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap

When required, 8oz. wheat bread may be substituted in lieu of vegetables, and 8oz. of oatmeal in lieu of meat.

One half of the above quantities to Children of Immigrants, under 14 years of age.

2. The Ration to Prisoners on Cockatoo Island, to Wardsmen in Gaol, to Prisoners detained as Witnesses or for want of bail, and to Others in the employment of Colonial Departments, when authorised to receive it:—

6. The Ration to Children of Female Prisoners confined in Gaol:—

- 8 oz. best wheat bread
- 4 oz. fresh meat
- 1 pint milk
- $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. yellow soap

7. The Ration to female Turnkeys at Darlinghurst and Parramatta Gaols:—

- 24 oz. flour
- 16 oz. fresh meat
- $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt
- $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea
- $2\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar
- $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap

2. To the Matron and female servants, entitled to Rations:—16oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap.

3. To the Male Children above 6 years of age:—on Holidays, 20oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. raisins or currants, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. To the Male Children, under 6 years of age:—On Holidays, 16oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays, 12oz. flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. On other days, 12oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

5. To the Female Children:—On Holidays, 16oz. flour, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. raisins or currants, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap. On Sundays and other days:—12oz. flour, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap.

For Children under 7 years of age, best wheat bread is to be substituted, if required, in the proportion of 8oz. of bread, for 12oz. flour.

6. For the use of the Establishment:—4 pints of oil, 3 pints of vinegar.

7. Forage:—The same as No. 9 of the General Supplies.

Best wheat bread, flour, tea, sugar, salt, pearl barley, sago, rice, oatmeal, arrowroot, yeast, lard, candles, soap, port wine, vinegar, straw, firewood, charcoal, as required.

The Holidays are—New Year's day, Easter day, Christmas day, and the Queen's Birthday.

INSTITUTION FOR DESTITUTE ROMAN CATHOLIC CHILDREN, PARRAMATTA.—Daily Ration.

1. To the Master, Schoolmaster, Storekeeper, and men employed as servants:—22oz. flour, 16oz. meat, $\frac{3}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{3}{8}$ oz. tea, 2oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

2. To the Matron and female servants:—16oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. tea, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap.

3. To the Male Children above 6 years of age:—On Holidays, 20oz. flour, 12oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. raisins or currants, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays, 16oz. flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. raisins or currants, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. To the Male Children under 6 years of age:—On Holidays, 16oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. On Thursdays, 12oz. flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, 1oz. raisins or currants, 1oz. suet, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap. On other days, 12oz. flour, 4oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. soap.

5. To the Female Children:—On Holidays, 16oz. flour, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. sugar, 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. raisins or currants, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. suet, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap. On Sundays and other days, 12oz. flour, 8oz. meat, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. salt, $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. tea, 1oz. sugar, $\frac{3}{4}$ oz. soap.

6. For the use of the Establishment:—1 $\frac{3}{4}$ pint oil, 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ pint of vinegar.

7. Milk and vegetables for the Children, best wheat bread, flour, tea, sugar, salt, pearl barley, rice, oatmeal, arrowroot, sago, yeast, lard, common oil, dipt candles, soap, port wine, vinegar, straw, and firewood, as required.

For children under 7 years of age:—Best wheat bread is to be substituted, if required, in the proportion of 8oz. of bread for 12oz. of flour.

DISTRICTS.

The Districts for which Contracts will be required are as follows, viz.:—

1. Sydney, including Cockatoo Island; 2, Parramatta, Liverpool; 3, Campbelltown, Camden, Narrellan and Picton; 4, Wollongong; 5, Kiama; 6, Shoalhaven; 7, Berrima; 8, Goulburn; 9, Braidwood; 10, Broulee; 11, Queanbeyan; 12, Yass, including Gunning and Narrawa; 13, Windsor; 14, Penrith; 15, Hartley; 16, Bathurst; 17, Orange; 18, Carcoar; 19, Wellington; 20, Mudgee; 21, Gosford, Brisbane Water; 22, Newcastle; 23, Raymond Terrace; 24, Dungog; 25, Port Stephens; 26, Maitland; 27, Wollombi; 28, Macdonald River; 29, Paterson; 30, Patrick's Plains; 31, Merton and Muswellbrook; 32, Scone; 33, Murrumbidgee; 34, Cassilis; 35, Port Macquarie; 36, Brisbane.

The boundaries of the Districts are described in the Notice from this office, dated 17th January, 1850.

Separate Tenders will be required for the forage in the District of Sydney, but the other supplies for that District are to be tendered for together.

The supplies for each of the other Districts, with the exception of those for the Protestant Orphan School, the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children, and the Lunatic Asylums, are intended to be included in one Contract, and therefore no Tenders can be considered, unless for supplying the whole that may be required in the entire of a District, and for each District there must be a separate Tender, excepting Parramatta and Liverpool, Campbelltown, Camden and Narrellan, and Picton, and Yass, Gunning, and Narrawa, for each of which places Tenders may be sent in separately.

The Contract for the District of Newcastle, will not include coals for the Beacon.

Separate Tenders must also be made for the Protestant Orphan School, the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children, and for the Lunatic Asylums.

CONDITIONS.

1. All the articles required by this Notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

2. The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial wheat, from which, when forming part of the Ration to Prisoners of the Crown, 10 per cent, and in all other cases, 20 per cent, has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required for the Ration to Immigrants, and when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

4. Beef to be issued to the Protestant Orphan School on five days, and Mutton on two days of the week, for the Boys; and for the Girls, Beef to be issued three days, and Mutton four days of the week.

5. The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

6. The Tobacco to be Colonial.

7. When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz. :—1lb. wheat flour or 1lb. biscuit equal to $1\frac{1}{4}$ lb. of bread; 12 oz. wheat flour equal to 1lb. maize meal; 8 oz. wheat flour equal to 1 pint of oatmeal; 1lb. salt Beef or 1lb. Mutton, or 10 oz. salt Pork, equal to 1lb. of fresh Beef; 1lb. of Coal equal to 3lbs. of Firewood.

8. These substitutions are to be made only when required by the Officers authorised to draw the several Rations.

9. Hospital Bread is to be supplied to the Children of the Orphan School, and to the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children, when required by the Surgeon, in lieu of the ordinary Ration.

10. Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c., &c., except as otherwise provided for in Ration No. 1.

11. In case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, the several articles composing it are to be reckoned in the following proportions, and paid for accordingly, viz. :—

The Maize or Barley, as 4-12; the Hay, as 5-12; the Bran, as 2-12; and the Straw, as 1-12 of the whole Ration respectively.

12. The Supplies for Immigrants in the Sydney District are to be delivered at such places in the City as may be required by the Agent for Immigration.

13. The supplies of Provisions, Fuel, and Light for the Penal Establishment at Cockatoo Island are to be delivered on the Island by the Contractors.

14. In respect of supplies for other services they are to be delivered at the nearest station, on the requisition of the Officer in charge.

15. The Tenders for Provisions and Forage, when required by Rations, according to the scale under their respective heads, are to express the price per Ration only.

16. The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one-half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one-half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement will be to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

17. In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, composed of persons named by the Government, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts, where such a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

18. If the board, arbitrators, or umpire shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which, it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

19. In the event of any unnecessary delay, or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured, and charged in like manner.

20. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause injury would be

sustained, either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the Department, or Officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the Rations are to be received, shall have power to reject, at the place of delivery, such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality; it being distinctly understood, that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the meantime, he must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing of which it will be obtained by the Officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

21. A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies or of any delay in delivery or replacing them when required, will also subject the Contractor, upon the Report of the Officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the Contract forthwith.

22. Great inconvenience having been experienced in former years from the discontinuance of Contracts, under the option given after three months notice on either side, parties tendering will observe that no such power will be reserved in respect to the Contracts for 1851, but that the same will be for the full period of the year, whatever may be the fluctuations in the prices of provisions or otherwise.

23. The Contractor will be required to prepare his own cash account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers, in a complete state to the Officer receiving the supplies, the same will be forwarded by the latter to the Auditor General, in order that a warrant may be prepared and payment made from the Colonial Treasury.

24. The value of all packages to be included in the prices demanded.

25. Printed forms of Tender may be obtained at this Office, or from the Police Magistrates or Benches of the several Districts; and at the foot of every Tender, there must be a Memorandum, signed by the party tendering, and two responsible persons as sureties, agreeing to be responsible for the due performance of the Contract, in the event of the Tender being accepted, and undertaking in that event, that they will severally execute and deliver, within one month from the usual notification of acceptance, a bond to Her Majesty, for securing such performance, otherwise such Tender will not be taken into consideration.

26. The Tenders to contain the names of the Tenderers and their Sureties, and places of residence at length.

27. Each Tender must be in the form referred to in paragraph 25, and enclosed in a separate envelope, marked "*Tender for Provisions, &c.*"

28. Further particulars and information may be obtained on application at this Office, to the Auditor General, and to the several Police Magistrates or Benches.

29. The Party tendering, or an Agent authorised in writing to act for him, is requested to attend at this Office, at the time appointed for receiving the Tenders, to afford such explanation or information as may be required.

CONDITIONS.

1. Tenders will be received for the whole of a District, or separately for any one or more of the different Stations mentioned above.

2. All the articles required by this notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

3. The flour and bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial Wheat, from which when forming part of the Rations to Prisoners of the Crown, 10 per cent., and in all other cases 20 per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

4. The Tobacco to be Colonial.

5. When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz.:—1lb. wheat flour or 1lb. biscuit, equal to $1\frac{1}{4}$ lb. of bread; 12oz. wheat flour, equal to 1lb. maize meal; 8oz. wheat flour, equal to 1 pint oatmeal; 1lb. salt beef or 1lb. mutton, or 10oz. salt pork, equal to 1lb. fresh beef. These substitutions are to be made only when required by the Officers authorised to draw the several Rations.

6. The supplies are to be delivered at the nearest fixed Stations to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the Officer in charge, and in case the whole ration of forage be not required or delivered the several articles composing it are to be reckoned in the following proportions, and paid for accordingly, viz.:—

The maize or barley as 4-12, the hay as 5-12, the bran as 2-12, and straw as 1-12, of the whole ration respectively.

7. The Tenders are to express the price per Ration only.

8. The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one-half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one-half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement will be to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

9. In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided in the following way; the party objecting, will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his Agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part,) concur in naming a third as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

10. If the arbitrators or umpire, shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which, it will be procured by the party requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

11. In the event of any unnecessary delay, or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured, and charged in like manner.

12. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from any other cause, injury would be sustained either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or by the Contractor, by waiting for the decision of the arbitrators, the Officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the Rations are to be received, shall have power to reject at the place of delivery, such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality—it being distinctly understood, that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the meantime, he must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing of which, it will be obtained by the Officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

13. A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will also subject the Contractor, upon the report of the Officer in charge of the parties, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the Contract forthwith.

14. Great inconvenience having been experienced in former years from the discontinuance of Contracts, under the option given after three months' notice on either side, parties tendering, will observe that no such power will be reserved in respect to the Contracts for 1851, but that the same will be for the full period of the year, whatever may be the fluctuation in the prices of provisions or otherwise.

15.
