ROADS.

WITH reference to the Government Notice, dated the 2nd day of July, 1850, relative to the opening and making of a Parish Road from the Oakhampton Road to West Maitland, across the Falls, and through the Bolwarra Estate to the Paterson High Road; notice is hereby given, in conformity with the Act of Council 4 Will. IV., No. 11, intituled, "An Act for making, altering, and improving the Roads throughout the Colony of New South Wales, and for opening and improving the Streets in the Towns thereof," that after due consideration of all objections to the proposed Road, which have been transmitted in pursuance of the said notice, and in conformity with the said Act, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to alter the said line, and to confirm the same as amended; and it is therefore hereby declared expedient to open and make the Road referred to, as so altered, according to the Map or Plan to be seen at the Office of the Surveyor General; and all persons intending to claim compensation in respect of the said line are hereby reminded that notice must be served upon the Colonial Secretary within forty days from the date hereof, in such manner and forms as are provided by the sixth section of the Act above referred to, or they will be for ever foreclosed from such claim.

ROADS.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR, with the advice of the Executive Council, having deemed it expedient to open and make a Parish Road, to be maintained at the expense of the Parishes through which it is to pass, from the Dam at Cook's River to George's River, near Rocky Point, commencing at the Dam, and proceeding south-westerly through Facker's (now Wenthworth's) 100 acres; thence south-westerly and southerly through Harnam's 60 acres; thence southerly and then south-westerly through part of Flood's 60 acres to its western boundary; thence south-westerly through Mitchell's land to its southern boundary; thence south 14 degrees west to the north-west corner of allotment No. 52, containing 79 acres reserved; thence south 13 degrees east through Chandler's land to the north-west corner of Moore's (late Trace's) 60 acres; thence south along the western boundary of that land, and of Moore's northern portion of 60 acres; thence south 12 degrees east through reserved allotments to the north-west corner of Moore's southern portion of 60 acres; thence south 30 minutes east along the west boundary thereof to its south-west corner; thence south 17 degrees west to the northern boundary line of Rutter's (late Cooper now Chapman's) 100 acres through reserved lands; and from Rutter's northern boundary line last mentioned south 15 degrees 20 minutes, west 23 chains 18 links; and then south 70 degrees 30 minutes west to the landing place for boats at George's River; Notice is hereby given, that, in conformity with the provisions of the Act of the Governor and Council, 4th William IV, No. 11, intituled, "An Act for making, altering, and improving the roads throughout the Colony of New South Wales, and for opening and improving the Streets in the Towns thereof," a survey or tracing, shewing the intended line of the said Road, is now deposited in the Office of the Surveyor General, in Sydney, and all persons interested therein, are requested to transmit, in writing, to the Clerk of the Executive Council, within one month of this date, any well grounded objection which may exist to the formation of the said Road.

PENTRIDGE STOCKADE.—PORT PHILLIP.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that the Stockade erected at the Village of Pentridge, near Melbourne, including the whole of the Government Reserve of forty-three acres three roods and nineteen perches, on which the Stockade is situated, has been appointed a place at which male offenders, under order or sentence of transportation, or any order or sentence passed in pursuance of the provisions of an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council, passed in the eleventh year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act to substitute other punishments for transportation beyond the seas," shall be detained and be liable to be kept to hard labor.

2. His Excellency also directs it to be notified, that under the provisions of the said Act, any person found at or near or in any manner communicating with the said Stockade, or on the said Reserve, without the permission of the Governor or other proper officer, will be guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction, be liable to a fine or penalty of Twenty Pounds, or to imprisonment for three months, or both;—of which all persons are hereby required to take notice.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this Office, until 12 o'clock, of Monday, the 18th November next, for furnishing, for the Colonial Service, in the several Districts, the supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required, during Twelve Calendar Months, commencing 1st January, 1851, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

PROVISIONS, AND OTHER ARTICLES.

When required, 8oz. wheat bread may be substituted in lieu of vegetables, and 8oz. of oatmeal in lieu of meat.

One half of the above quantities to Children of Immigrants, under 14 years of age.

2. The Ration to Prisoners on Cockatoo Island, to Wardsmen in Gaol, to Prisoners detained as Witnesses or for want of bail, and to Others in the employment of Colonial Departments, when authorised to receive it:—

20 oz. wheat bread
8 oz. maize meal
16 oz. fresh meat

1 oz. sugar
 $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. soap

this Ration is occasionally issued at Watchhouses to Prisoners of the Crown, when travelling from one station to another, and in other cases when sanctioned by a Magistrate.
