ITH reference to the Government notice of 2nd July last, relative to the intention of the Government to open a Parish Road from Merton to Cassilis: Notice is hereby given, in conformity with the Act of Council, 4th Will. IV., No. 11, intituled, " An Act for making, altering, " and improving the Roads throughout the Colony
of New South Wales, and for opening and im"proving the Sreeets in the Towns thereof," that after due consideration of all objections to the proposed line of road, which have been transmitted in pursuance of the said notice, and in conformity with the said Act, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to confirm the said road, and it is therefore hereby declared expedient to open and make the same according to the map or plan thereof to be seen at the Office of the Surveyor General; and all persons intending to claim compensation in respect of the said line, are hereby reminded that notice must be served upon the Colonial Secretary within forty days from the date hereof, in such manner and forms as are provided by the 6th and 32nd sections of the Act above referred to, or they will be for ever foreclosed from such claim.

## PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

A LL persons having claims on the Colonial Treasury are requested to furnish their accounts through the proper channel, before the end of the year, or as soon thereafter as practicable.

- 2. The several Collectors and Officers in the receipt of Public Monies will pay over to the Colonial Treasurer, on or before the 31st of December, the amount of all collections remaining in their hands respectively up to that date, so that the entire Revenue collected by each may be credited in the accounts of the year within which it was received.
- 3. The Heads of Departments and other Officers who have received advances to enable them to defray expenses incurred under their superintendence, are requested to furnish to the Audit Office, as far as practicable and with all convenient despatch, the accounts of the expenditure thereof, and on or before the last day of December to pay into the Colonial Treasury the unexpended balance of such advances, that the adjustment of the same may appear in the accounts to the 31st proximo.
- 4. They will also, as soon as practicable after the close of the year, bring forward all accounts of expenses incurred within the same which do not admit of being previously settled, so that if possible, all the expenses incurred in the present year may be finally adjusted and liquidated within one month after its termination.
- 5. The Colonial Treasurer is requested to use his endeavours to give effect to these directions, and to report through the proper channel, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, any instance of neglect in complying therewith on the part of the Government Officers concerned.

# CONTRACTS FOR THE COLONIAL SERVICE, FOR 1851.

OTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this Office, until 12 o'clock, of Monday, the 18th November next, for furnishing, for the Colonial Service, in the several Districts, the supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required, during Twelve Calendar Months, commencing 1st January, 1851, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

PROVISIONS, AND OTHER ARTICLES.

1. The Ration to Immigrants:—Male and Female Adults, of the age of 14 years and upwards, daily—

16 oz. wheat bread

16 oz. fresh meat

16 oz. vegetables, the whole or a portion to consist of potatoes, at the option of the Agent for Immigration

4oz. tea 110z. sugar 2oz. salt 2oz. soap

When required, Soz. wheat bread may be substituted in lieu of vegetables, and Soz. of oatmeal in lieu of meat.

One half of the above quantities to Children of Immigrants, under 14 years of age.

Separate Tenders will be required for the forage in the District of Sydney, but the other supplies for that District are to be tendered for together.

The supplies for each of the other Districts, with the exception of those for the Protestant Orphan School, the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children, and the Lunatic Asylums, are intended to be included in one Contract, and therefore no Tenders can be considered, unless for supplying the whole that may be required in the entire of a District, and for each District there must be a separate Tender, excepting Parramatta and Liverpool, Campbelltown, Camden and Narellan, and Picton, and Yass, Gunning, and Narrawa, for each of which places Tenders may be sent in separately.

The Contract for the District of Newcastle,

will not include coals for the Beacon.

Separate Tenders must also be made for the Protestant Orphan School, the Institution for Destitute Roman Catholic Children, and for the Lunatic Asylůms.
