ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH GRANTS.

THE descriptions of the following Grants of Land, which have been appropriated for the purposes hereinafter mentioned, are published for general information, in order that the parties concerned may have an opportunity of correcting any errors or omissions that may have been made inadvertently.

At the expiration of *one month* from this date, if no caveat be lodged, or other cause of uncertainty appear, a Deed of Grant of each will be executed in favour of the approved Trustees, viz. :—

37. Melbourne, 1, One acre, county of Bourke, parish of North Melbourne, allotments Nos. 1, 18, 19, and 20 of section 3; commencing at the south-west corner of the said section, and bounded on the south by Grey-street west, bearing east 2 chains; on the east by allotments Nos. 2 and 17, bearing north 5 chains; on the north by Albert-street, bearing west 2 chains; and on the west by Gisborne-street, bearing south 5 chains.

Authorised as the site for a Roman Catholic Church.

38. Melbourne, 2r, Two roods, county of Bourke, parish of North Melbourne, allotments Nos. 16 and 17 of section 3; bounded on the north by Albert-street, bearing west 2 chains; on the west by allotments Nos. 18 and 19, bearing south 2 chains 50 links; on the south by allotments Nos. 2 and 3, bearing east 2 chains; and on the east by allotment No. 15, bearing north 2 chains 50 links.

Authorised as the site for a Roman Catholic Clergyman's residence.

39. Melbourne, 2r, Two roods, county of Bourke, parish of North Melbourne, allotments Nos. 2 and 3 of section 3; bounded on the south by Grey-street west, bearing east 2 chains; on the east by allotment No. 4, bearing north 2 chains 50 links; on the north by allotments Nos. 16 and 17, bearing west 2 chains; and on the west by allotments Nos. 20 and 1, bearing south 2 chains 50 links.

Authorised as the site for a Roman Catholic School House.

CROWN LANDS BEYOND SETTLED DISTRICTS.

PURCHASE OF PORTIONS OF LICENSED RUNS.

WITH a view to carry into effect the intention of the sixth section of Chapter II. of Her Majesty's Order in Council, dated 9th March, 1847, which confers on Lessees of Crown Lands beyond the Settled Districts, the right of purchasing, during the continuance of the lease, portions of their Runs without competition; and in order to obviate the inconvenience which would be experienced if those who are entitled to exercise that right were compelled to await the issue of leases. His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to notify, that all licensed occupants of Crown Lands in the intermediate and unsettled Districts, who may desire to purchase portions of their Runs, with a view to obtain at once the right of raising produce for sale, or for any other purpose, are now at liberty to forward their applications so to purchase, in conformity with the rules laid down in the above Order in Council, as hereunder enumerated: Provided that their claims to lease the particular lands which they desire to buy, be not the subject of any unsettled dispute before the Boundary Commissioners; and that they be, in all other respects, unquestioned.

2. The conditions specified in Her Majesty's Order in Council are as follows:—

(1.) The extent of land so to be purchased must in no case be less than 160 acres.

(2.) If the lot sold to the licensee be less than 320 acres, the expense of measuring it must be borne by the purchaser.

(3.) The price to be paid for any such lot cannot be less than the general minimum price of one pound per acre; but if there be reason to suppose that any lands so applied for possess peculiar advantages, whether of water frontage or otherwise, which should render it fit that a higher price should be paid for such lands, the Governor may require the land to be assessed by valuers, appointed in the manner directed in the third section of chapter II. of the said Order in Council.

(4.) Each lot must be rectangular, unless the features of the country, or the course of any river or stream, render a

deviation from the rectangular form necessary; and in every case two sides at least, of the lot must be directed to the cardinal points of the compass.

(5.) The two opposite sides of any stream or watercourse which, according to the practice of the department of the Surveyor General, ought to form a boundary between different sections or lots, shall in no case be included in the same lot.

(6.) No single lot shall have more than 440 yards of water frontage for 160 acres, or more than a like proportion of water frontage for any quantity greater than 160 acres, but the water frontage shall be reckoned according to the distance from one extreme point thereof to the other in a right line, and not according to the bendings of the watercourse or river: And the Governor, or other officer duly authorised in that behalf, shall have the right of refusing to sell any lot or lots in every case where it may appear to him that the sale of such lot or lots respectively, might give an undue command over water required for the beneficial occupation and cultivation of the lands adjoining either side of any stream or watercourse.

3. It is of course to be distinctly understood that the Government is not pledged to comply with any such application to purchase, even though the right of the applicant to the lease be unquestioned. The Government will still exercise the right conferred by the eighth section of chapter II. of the Order in Council, to except from any such sale all such lands as it may appear expedient to reserve for, any of the purposes therein referred to.

4. Persons desirous of availing themselves of this Regulation, should address their applications to the Chief Commissioner of Crown Lands, in Sydney, or to His Honor the Superintendent of Port Phillip, if their runs be situated in that District. These applications should show the Commissioner's District, the name of the Licensee, the name of the Run, and should set forth, as accurately as possible, a description of the Land applied for.

5. As this privilege of purchasing will remove all excuse for the sale or barter of produce raised upon Lands held from the Crown for pastoral purposes only, His Excellency desires it to be notified, that such sale or barter will be strictly prohibited in future.

JETTY.—CORIO.

THE following additional Rules for the regulation of the Jetty at Corio, Geelong, Port Phillip, having been made by the Justices of the Peace acting in and for Geelong, and approved by His Excellency the Governor, in terms of the Act of Council, 5th, William IV., No. 13, are published for general information.

- 10.—No warps, chains, or ropes of or belonging to any vessel, shall be made fast to any of the piles of the Jetty, but shall be fastened to the ring bolts provided for that purpose.
- 11.—Vessels first coming at or near the Wharf, to have precedence in coming alongside the Jetty to discharge or take in cargo, and vessels discharging cargo to have the preference of the Wharf.
- 12.—Timber or goods landed at the wooden part of the Jetty to be removed within 12 hours from the time of landing, and are not to be placed upon any ring bolt, so as to obstruct the free use thereof.
- 13.—All vessels to slack down their chain, cables, and other fastenings when required to do so, in order to allow other vessels to come alongside, or to leave the Wharf.
- 14.—Tarpaulins properly stretched and spread, are to be used in shipping or discharging ballast, so as to prevent any part thereof from falling overboard.
- 15.—No ballast, rubbish, or filth, to be thrown from any vessel or boat, at or near the Wharf.
- 16.—All vessels coming alongside the Wharf, are to anchor and drop their anchor at least fifty fathoms from the Jetty.

STOCKADE AND GAOL, MELBOURNE.

HIS Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified, that the Gaol at Melbourne, and the Stockade in course of erection at the western end of that gaol outside the enclosing walls of the airing and treadmill yards, have been appointed places at which male offenders under order or sentence of transportation, or any order or sentence passed in pursuance of the provisions of an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council, passed in the eleventh year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to substitute other punishments for transportation beyond the Seas," shall be detained and be liable to be kept to hard labour.

2. His Excellency also directs it to be notified that, under the provisions of the said Act, any person found at, or near, or in any manner communicating with the said stockade, without the permission of the Governor or other proper officer, will be guilty of a misdemeanour, and, on conviction, be liable to a fine or penalty of £20, or imprisonment for three months, or both;—of which all persons are hereby required to take notice.




