GOLD REGULATIONS.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR-GENERAL, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to make the following modifications in the provisional Regulations of the 7th instant, having reference to the draining of ponds or watercourses, for the purpose of searching for Gold.

1. In lieu of uniformly fixing at forty, the number of persons to be employed on any such undertaking, the Government will, on the report of the local Commissioner, determine in each case the number of persons for whom the working of the claim would properly afford employment.

2. The persons undertaking to drain any such pond or watercourse will not, however, be compelled to employ that number of persons during their occupancy, as required by the Notice of the 7th instant; it will be sufficient that during such occupancy they pay for Licenses for the full number of persons so fixed.

TISExcellency the GOVERNOR-GENERAL, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct, that from and after the 1st proximo, all alluvial Gold, or matrix Gold obtained by separation only, which may be tendered to the Government in payment of License fees, will be valued at three pounds per ounce, instead of three pounds four shillings, as determined by the Notice of the 5th August last; and according to this value also, (£3 per ounce,) will be computed the reyalty on matrix Gold, and the commission on the conveyance by the Government of all Gold, except such as may be procured by amalgamation

2. It has not been found necessary to make any alteration in the value at which the Government consents to receive Gold obtained by amalgamation, namely:—Two pounds eight shillings per ounce; and the royalty on such Gold, and the commission on its conveyance will be regulated accordingly.

TOTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this Office, until 12 o'clock of Monday, the 17th November next, for farnishing, for the Colonial Service, in the several Districts, the supplies undermentioned, in such quantities as may be required from 1st January, 1852, to 31st March, 1853, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

PROVISIONS, AND OTHER ARTICLES.

The supplies for each District are intended to be included in one Contract, and therefore no Tenders can be considered unless for supplying the whole that may be required in the entire of a District, and for each District there must be a separate Tender, excepting Campbelltown, Camden and Narellan, and Picton, and Yass, Gunning, and Narrawa, for each of which places Tenders may be sent in separately

CONDÍTIONS. 1. All the articles required by this notice are

to be of the best quality of their several kinds. 2. The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial wheat, from which, when forming part of the Ration to Prisoners of the Crown, 10 per cent., and in all other cases, 20 per cent, has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Beef and Mutton to be issued in such proportions as many be required for the Ration to Immigrants, and when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

5. The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

6. The Tobacco to be Colonial.

7. When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz.:—11b. wheat flour or 11b biscuit equal to 14th of bread; 12 oz. wheat flour equal to 11b. maize meal; 8 ez. wheat flour equal to 1 pint of oatmeal; 11b. salt beef, or 11b. mutton, or 10 oz. salt pork, equal to 11b fresh beef; 1th, coal equal to 3ths, of firewood.

S. These substitutions are to be made only when required by the Officers authorised to draw

the several Rations

10. Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c., &c., except as otherwise provided for in Ration No. 1.

11. In case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, the several articles composing it are to be reckoned in the following proportions, and paid for accordingly, viz.:—

The maize or barley as 4-12; the hay as 5-12; the bran as 2-12; and the straw as 1-12 of the

whole Ration respectively.

14. The supplies are to be delivered at the nearest station, on the requisition of the Officer

15. The Tenders for Provisions and Forage, when required by Rations, according to the scale under their respective heads, are to express the

price per Ration only.

16. The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engage-

ment will be to provide for both Horses and Oxen. 17. In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, composed of persons named by the Government, according to the practice of the Service. But in Country districts, where such a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

18. If the Board, arbitrators, or umpire shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which, it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

19. In the event of any unnecessary delay, or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured,

and charged in like manner.

20. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause injury would be sustained, either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the Department, or Officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the Rations are to be received, shall have power to reject, at the place of delivery, such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality-it being distinctly understood, that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the meantime, he must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing of which it will be obtained by the Officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

21. A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivery or replacing them when required, will also subject the Contractor, upon the report of the Officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor-General may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor-General, upon such repetition, to terminate the Contract forthwith.

22. It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the Contract, by giving in writing, a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the Contract at the expiration of that period, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the Contract is made, or agreed to be made.

23.
