NOTICE.

We, the undersigned, being two of the Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners, in exercise of the power vested in us by "The Passengers' Act, 1849," and by an Act passed in the present year, intituled, "An Act to amend the Passengers' Act, 1849," and acting in this behalf under the authority of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, do hereby give notice, that from the 1st day of June, 1851, the following articles of food, and in the following proportions, may be supplied by the Master of any passenger ship, by way of substitutes, for the articles of food required by the said Passengers' Act, 1849, to be issued to passengers, that is to say, potatoes, beef, or pork, preserved meat, dried salt fish, bread, biscuit, or best wheaten flour, or split peas, may be substituted for oatmeal or rice, at the rate of $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. of beef, pork, or preserved meat, or $\frac{3}{4}$ lb. of dried salt fish, or 1 lb. of bread or biscuit, or 1 lb. of best wheaten flour, or 1 lb. of split peas, for $1\frac{1}{2}$ lb. of oatmeal, or for 1 lb. of rice.

Preserved potatoes may be substituted for potatoes, at the rate of $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. of preserved potatoes for 1 lb. of potatoes.

Sugar may be substituted for molasses, at the rate of $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. of sugar for $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. of molasses.

Ceffee or cocoa may be substituted for tea, at the rate of 4 oz. of coffee or cocoa for 2 oz. of Tea.

And in exercise of the power vested in us by the 47th section of the said Passengers' Act, 1849, we hereby also give notice, that the following shall, from the 1st of June, 1851, be the form of contract ticket required by the said Act, with respect to passages to North America.

NOTICES TO PASSENGERS. NOTICES TO PASSENGERS.

1. If the ship do not proceed to sea on the day specified above, Passengers, it ready to go on board and proceed in the vessel, are entitled to subsistence money at the rate of one shilling a day, per Statute Adult (each person over fourteen or two children between one and fourteen years of age being reckoned as a Statute Adult) for each day of delay until the actual clearing out and final departure of the ship; but if the Passengers are belowed and maintained in any establishment. Adult) for each day of delay until the actual clearing out and mai departure of the ship; but if the Passengers are lodged and maintained in any establishment under the superintendence of the Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners, the shilling a day is payable to the Emigration Officer at the port of embarkation. In either case the maney may be recovered by summary process before two magistrates. If, however, the delay arises from unavoidable detention by wind or weather, and if the Passengers be maintained on board in the same manner as its transparence had commenced, no subsistence money is navable.

2. If Passengers fail to obtain a passage in the ship according to their contract, either from her having sailed before the appointed time, or from there being no room in her, or through any default of the owner, charterer, or master, and are not within forty-eight hours provided with a passage in some other equally eligible ship to the same port, then they are entitled to a return of their passage money, and to such compensation, not exceeding £10, as the Justices may award.

CROWN LANDS.

COMMENCEMENT OF PASTORAL LEASES.

IS Excellency the Governor-General with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to establish the following Regulation, with respect to the dates from which are to be computed, the terms of the Leases to be issued for Crown Lands in the Intermediate and Unsettled Districts, under Her Majesty's Order in Council of the 9th March, 1847.

2. As in consequence of the unavoidable delay that has occurred in the intended issue of Pastoral Leases, the licensed occupants of Crown Lands have not hitherto been in the enjoyment of all the advantages which would have accrued to them from the possession of such leases, and as moreover it is known that many persons, in the full conviction that the terms of the leases would be computed from the date of issue, have disposed of their interest in Pastoral Runs subject to that condition, His Excellency with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct, that in regard to all leases to be issued, both for Lands held under licensed occupation previously to the promulgation of the Order in Council above referred to, and for Runs hitherto acquired by Tender, the maximum terms of eight years and fourteen years, as the case may be, shall commence from a future certain day, namely, 1st January, 1852, without reference to the actual date on which the Leases may issue, but, that with respect to all Runs hereafter taken up by Tender, the duration of the lease shall be computed from the date of the first payment of Rent, under the accepted Tender.

The supplies for each District are intended to be included in one Contract, and therefore no Tenders can be considered unless for supplying the whole that may be required in the entire of a District, and for each District there must be a separate Tender, excepting Campbelltown, Camden and Narellan, and Picton, and Yass, Gunning, and Narrawa, for each of which places Tenders may be sent in separately.

CONDITIONS.

1. All the articles required by this notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

2. The Flour and Bread must be the produce of clean sound Colonial wheat, from which, when forming part of the Ration to Prisoners of the Crown, 10 per cent., and in all other cases, 20 per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Beef and Mutton to be issued in such pro portions as may be required for the Ration to Immigrants, and when the quantity admits of it, this, as well as the Convict Ration of Beef to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately

5. The Maize Meal to be similar in quality to the Wheat Meal, and to be twice ground.

6. The Tobacco to be Colonial.

7. When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz.:—11b. wheat flour or 11b biscuit equal to 14lb. of bread; 12 oz. wheat flour equal to 11b. maize meal; 8 oz. wheat flour equal to 1 pint of oatmeal; 11b. salt beef, or 11b. mutton, or 10 oz. salt pork, equal to 11b. fresh beef; 11b. coal equal to 31bs. of firewood.

8. These substitutions are to be made only when required by the Officers authorised to draw

the several Rations.

10. Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c., &c., except as otherwise provided for in Ration No. 1.

11. In case the whole Ration of Forage be not required or delivered, the several articles composing it are to be reckoned in the following proportions, and paid for accordingly, viz.:-

The maize or barley as 4-12; the hay as 5-12; the bran as 2-12; and the straw as 1-12 of the

whole Ration respectively.

14. The supplies are to be delivered at the nearest station, on the requisition of the Officer in charge.

15. The Tenders for Provisions and Forage, when required by Rations, according to the scale under their respective heads, are to express the

16. The Tenders for Forage are not required to state the price of the Ration for Oxen, as when the latter is required, one half of the allowance fixed for Horses will be drawn, and one half the price allowed to the Contractor, whose engagement will be to provide for both Horses and Oxen.

17. In the event of a difference of opinion between the Contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, composed of persons named by the Government, according to the practice of the Service. But in Country districts, where such a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the Contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall

18. If the Board, arbitrators, or umpire shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the Contractor, failing of which, it will be procured by the Department requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.

19. In the event of any unnecessary delay, or failure of the Contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured,

and charged in like manner.

- 20. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause injury would be sustained, either by the parties to whom the Rations are due, or to the Contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the Department, or Officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the Rations are to be received, shall have power to reject, at the place of delivery, such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality-it being distinctly understood, that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and that the Contractor will have a right to appeal to the Governor, although, in the meantime, he must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing of which it will be obtained by the Officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the Contractor.
- 21. A repetition of irregularity in the quality or quantity of the supplies, or of any delay in delivery or replacing them when required, will also subject the Contractor, upon the report of the Officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulet, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor-General may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor-General, upon such repetition, to terminate the Contract forthwith.

22. It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the Contract, by giving in writing, a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the Contract at the expiration of that period, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the Contract is made, or agreed to be made.
