PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES AUGUSTUS FITZ ROY, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

**I**, SIR CHARLES AUGUSTUS FITZ ROY, the Governor aforesaid, do by this my Proclamation, publicly notify and declare, that Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen has been pleased by the Order in Council hereto annexed, to make and establish the additional Rules and Regulations therein contained, for regulating the occupation of Waste Lands of the Crown, in the Colony of New South Wales.

Given under my Hand and Seal, at Sydney, this eleventh day of February, in the Year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, and in the fourteenth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the ninth and tenth years of

Her present Majesty, intituled, "*An Act to amend an Act for regulating the sale of Waste Land belonging to the Crown in the Australian Colonies, and to make further provision for the management thereof,*" after reciting that it was expedient that various rules and regulations should be made respecting the more effectually making demises or licenses for any term of years, not exceeding fourteen, of any such Waste Lands as were therein mentioned, and respecting any right of pre-emption which it might be proper to give to the holders of any such demise or license, it was enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, by any Order in Council, to make and establish all such rules and regulations as to Her Majesty should seem meet for the purposes aforesaid.

And whereas in pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, certain rules and regulations have already been made, and it is expedient that further regulations should be made for the above purposes, with regard to the Colony of New South Wales, it is hereby ordered by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that it shall be competent for the Governor for the time being of the said Colony, or other officer for the time being administering the Government of the said Colony, to grant leases of Land, for periods not exceeding one year, for pastoral or other purposes, in any part of the said Colony.

And it is further ordered that it shall be competent for the said Governor, or other Officer aforesaid, to sell to the holder of any Lease granted in virtue of this Order in Council, any part of the land comprised in any such Lease, for its fair value in an unimproved state, not being less than the minimum upset price prescribed by the Government Regulations for the time being.

And the Right Honorable Earl Grey, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

## CROWN LANDS.

### LEASES FOR OTHER THAN PASTORAL PURPOSES, AND FOR RUNS BROUGHT WITHIN THE SETTLED DISTRICTS.

REFERRING to Her Majesty's Order in Council, dated 19th June, 1850, and published in the *Government Gazette* of this date, which renders it competent for the Governor to grant Leases of Lands, for periods not exceeding one year, for pastoral or other purposes, and also to sell to the holder of such lease any part of the land comprised therein for its fair value in an unimproved state, not being less than the minimum upset price prescribed by the Government Regulations for the time being. His Excellency desires to intimate to the public, that the powers conferred by this Order in Council were given for the purpose of enabling His Excellency to allow the value of their improvements to those licensed occupants of Crown Lands beyond the Boundaries of Location, on whom Her Majesty's Order in Council, of 9th March, 1847, did not confer the right of demanding leases, and who thus lost the privilege appertaining to lessees of purchasing land on which they had made improvements at its estimated value in an unimproved state; and it is not His Excellency's intention to use the powers conferred upon him in any other cases than those which, as above explained, it was intended to meet, namely:—

(1.) The cases of persons who hold land beyond the Boundaries of Location under license, or under the express authority of the Government, for other than pastoral purposes.

(2.) The cases of persons whose holdings or parts of them, though previously beyond the Boundaries of Location as then existing, were, by the Order in Council of 9th March, 1847, brought within the Settled Districts.

2. In order to carry out this intention, His Excellency, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to establish the following additional Regulations:—

#### I.—LANDS HELD FOR OTHER THAN PASTORAL PURPOSES.

(1.) Existing licenses for lands beyond the Settled Districts held for other than pastoral purposes, will not be renewed in their present form, but leases for one year under the new Order in Council will be granted for such lands to the authorized occupants, provided that application be made for them not later than the 30th April next.

(2.) The year for which the new leases will be issued, will commence on the 1st July next, and they will not be renewed. The rent will be the same as that now paid.

(3.) During the currency of these leases, that is to say, between the 1st July next, and the 30th June, 1852, the tenants will be allowed to purchase at the price fixed by the Government, such portions of their holdings as may contain valuable improvements, *provided that they make application so to do when they apply for their leases as above directed.*

#### II.—LANDS BROUGHT WITHIN THE SETTLED DISTRICTS.

(4.) As respects lands held for pastoral purposes which have been brought within the Settled Districts by the operation of the Order in Council, the leases granted under the Regulations of the 29th March, 1848, for the year which commenced on the 1st January last, will be allowed to run out, and on

their expiration, leases for the ensuing year, (1852), will be granted under the new Order in Council, so as to afford to the occupants the privilege of purchasing at the price fixed by the Government, portions of such of the sections containing valuable improvements, and of the contiguous sections thereto, as they have hitherto retained under the special provision made in their favor in the 24th clause of the Settled Lands' Regulations of 29th March, 1848.

(5.) Beyond the year 1852, such sections as are referred to in the preceding paragraph will be no longer specially reserved for the continued occupancy of the existing tenants, but the Government will not object to renew the leases in the same manner as leases are renewed under the 22nd clause of the Regulations of the 29th March, 1848, if the land be not required for sale or for any public purpose, or be not applied for on lease by any holder of purchased lands in the immediate neighbourhood.

(6.) To the leases thus renewed, the tenant's privilege of purchase without competition during the currency of the lease, will of course remain attached, and the Government will further give notice to the tenants in such cases, of any application which may be made by other parties, either for the purchase or lease of lands held by them, so as to afford them an opportunity of retaining possession by effecting a purchase themselves before the expiration of their leases.

#### III.—RULE AS TO EXTENT AND MEASUREMENT.

(7.) As respects country lands, no limit will be imposed as to the extent of land included in his lease, which a tenant may desire to purchase under this notice, but (in conformity with the rules laid down in the Order in Council of 9th March, 1847,) no less quantity than 160 acres will be sold, and if the quantity be less than 320 acres, the expense of survey will be charged to the purchaser. The measurement of the lands will also be made in accordance with the general rules laid down in sect. 7 of chap. II of the said Order in Council.

#### IV.—TOWN LANDS—MEASUREMENT AND EXTENT.

(8.) In towns and their suburbs, the lands must be purchased in allotments according to the general plan of the town, as laid out by the Surveyor General, and no allotments can be sold to the present holders in such cases, under the pre-emptive privilege now conferred upon them, but such as actually contain valuable improvements.

#### V.—PRICE.

(9.) The price at which sales, without competition, will, in ordinary cases, be made to the lessees, will be that fixed by the Government in the usual manner as the minimum upset price for lands in the same locality, but wherever any portions applied for may be considered to possess more than ordinary value, the price will be fixed by the assessment of valuers, in the same manner as if the sale were to be effected under section 8 of chap. II. of Her Majesty's Order in Council, of 9th March, 1847. This price will, of course, be independent of the cost of the survey, where chargeable on the tenants according to this notice.

3. The foregoing Regulations do not apply to the Southern or Port Phillip District.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES AUGUSTUS FITZ ROY, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the GOVERNOR of New South Wales, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, passed in the thirteenth year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the Distillation, Rectifying, and Compounding of Spirits, and to authorise and regulate the warehousing under Bond, and the exportation free of duty, of Spirits distilled within the Colony of New South Wales, and to repeal certain Laws relating thereto"; it was, amongst other things enacted, that from and after the passing of the said Act, it should not be lawful for any person, except as therein excepted, to carry on the business of a Distiller, or a Rectifier and Compounder of Spirits, or to have, keep, or make use of any Still or other utensil for Distilling, or for Rectifying and Compounding Spirits, except in such places as His Excellency the Governor of the said Colony should appoint or direct by Proclamation to be published in the New South Wales Government Gazette, under a penalty of not less than one hundred pounds nor more than five hundred pounds: Now, therefore, I, the GOVERNOR aforesaid, do by this my Proclamation, hereby direct and appoint the premises known as the Brisbane Distillery, in the City of Sydney, to be a place at which the business of a Distiller may be carried on, under and subject to the provisions of the said recited Act.

DISEASED MEAT.

WITH a view to allay, in some measure, the anxiety of the public, with respect to the prevailing epidemic amongst stock, His Excellency the GOVERNOR is pleased to direct the publication of the following Preliminary Report of the Commission recently appointed to enquire into this subject.

SIR,

We, the undersigned Members of the Commission appointed by His Excellency the Governor to enquire into the prevailing epidemic amongst stock, beg to state that, since our appointment, we have collectively or individually availed ourselves of every opportunity of examining cattle and sheep which have died from the disease, as well as respecting those animals which have been killed while labouring under its influence; and we do ourselves the honor to communicate to you, for the information of His Excellency, our opinion on the subject of meat offered for sale as effected by the prevailing disease.

We are of opinion that it would be impossible to impose upon the public the meat of cattle dying from or being killed in an advanced stage of the disease, for the following reason, viz. :—

That in consequence of the excessive engorgement of the capillaries or minute bloodvessels in the flesh and fat, these substances present so dark and discolored an appearance, and decomposition is so rapid, that no butcher could offer the meat for sale with any chance of deceiving the public. If moreover the animal be killed even early in the disease, there are sufficient indications to show the fact to the butcher and we must hope that there are few, if any, so dishonest as to sell meat in such condition.

We believe that the disease is one of acute inflammatory character, destroying the animal in a short period of time, but there is nothing in the state of the constitution previous to the invasion of the disease, calculated to render the flesh unwholesome.

In presenting these observations in this early stage of the investigations, our object is not so much to give a report of our proceedings, (which at present would be premature,) as to furnish grounds for assuaging public alarm.

TWENTY POUNDS REWARD, OR A CONDITIONAL PARDON.

TRANSFERABLE AND REMITTABLE LAND AND IMMIGRATION DEBENTURES.

SEALED Tenders will be received at this Office, until noon of Tuesday, the eleventh February next, from persons desirous of advancing the whole or any portion of the Sum of Ten thousand Pounds on the following security, and subject to the undermentioned terms and conditions, viz. :—

(1.) Each tender must be for an even sum of hundreds of Pounds, and must be endorsed "Tender for Debentures."

(2.) If the Tender be accepted, Land and Immigration Debentures for £100 each, secured upon the Territorial Revenue of the Sydney or Middle District will be issued for the sum advanced, and will bear interest at the rate of 3½d. per diem, or £4 18s. 10½d. per £100 per annum, payable half-yearly, on the first of January, and first of July.

(3.) They will be receivable as cash at any time for the purchase of Crown Lands in the Sydney District, or for any other payment due on account of the Territorial Revenue within the same.

(4.) The principal will not otherwise be payable for a period of less than three years from the date of the Debenture, but it will be redeemable at par at any time thereafter at the option of the Government, but not of the holder, on three months' notice to that effect being given in the *New South Wales* or *London Gazette*, according as the same may be payable in the Colony or in England.

(5.) The principal will also be redeemable at par, at the option of the holder for the time being after the expiration of five years from the date of the Debenture, on his giving three months' notice to that effect to the Colonial Agent General, in London, or the Colonial Treasurer, in Sydney, as the case may be.

(6.) At the expiration of the three months' notice given either by the Government or the holder, the interest on the Debenture to which such notice shall apply, will cease and determine.

(7.) The principal and interest of each Debenture will be payable at the option of the holder for the time being, either in Sydney, or London; any change which it may be desired to make in this respect, being previously registered at the Colonial Treasury, in Sydney, and in the office of the Colonial Agent General, in London, and endorsed upon the Debenture, which must be presented accordingly at both these Offices for that purpose.

(8.) Whenever a Debenture may be made payable in London, a Duplicate thereof will be transmitted by the Colonial Treasurer to the Colonial Agent General, by such opportunity as the holder may desire, in order that the same may be available on proof of the loss of the original.

(9.) The Debentures will be transferable, if made out in blank, in the same manner as Exchequer Bills; but if made payable to any individual or firm, then by endorsement as in the case of Bills of Exchange.

(10.) Any number of Debentures will, for the convenience of the holders, be consolidated into one or more of the aggregate amount, on application at the Colonial Treasury, provided that such consolidate Debentures shall be issued for even sums of £500 or £1000 only.
