VACCINATION.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR-GENERAL has directed the publication of the following extract of the Notice, dated 11th January, 1847, notifying the Establishment of a Vaccine Institution in Sydney.

VACCINATION.

His Excellency the GOVERNOR directs it to be notified, that a Vaccine Institution has been established in Sydney, and that Dr. Savage, the Health Officer, has been appointed to carry out the objects of the Institution.

His Excellency further directs it to be notified, that Dr. Savage will be in attendance at the Immigration Barracks, Bent-street, between the hours of 10 and 12 o'clock on every Tuesday and Saturday to Vaccinate, free of charge, such children as may be taken to him for the purpose. But as the operation itself, without any proof of its having taken effect, would be insufficient security to the public mind, His Excellency has been pleased to direct,

that the sum of one shilling shall be deposited for every child vaccinated, which sum will be returned on the presentation of the child on the next vaccination day.

His Excellency very strongly recommends Parents and Guardians to avail themselves of the means thus afforded to them of taking this necessary and proper precaution with respect to all children not already vaccinated.

In order that a constant supply may be kept up throughout the Colony, the Health Officer will furnish lymph to any Medical Practitioners in the Country Districts who may apply for the same.

VACCINATION.

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR-GENERAL directs it to be notified, that a Vaccine Institution has been established at Brisbane, Moreton Bay; and that Dr. Swift, the Health Officer, has been appointed to carry out the objects of the Institution.

2. His Excellency further directs it to be notified, that Dr. Swift will be in attendance at the Immigration Barracks, at Brisbane, between the hours of 10 and 12 o'clock on every Tuesday and Saturday, to Vaccinate, free of charge, such children as may be taken to him for the purpose. But as the operation itself, without any proof of its having taken effect, would be insufficient security to the public mind, His Excellency has been pleased to direct, that the sum of one shilling shall be deposited for every child vaccinated, which sum will be returned on the presentation of the child on the next vaccination day.

3. His Excellency very strongly recommends Parents and Guardians to avail themselves of the means thus afforded to them of taking this necessary and proper precaution with respect to all children not already vaccinated.

FERRIES OVER THE RIVER PATERSON, ON THE ROAD LEADING TO HINTON FROM PATERSON; AT HINTON, ACROSS THE RIVER HUNTER; AND AT PITNACREE, ALSO ACROSS THE RIVER HUNTER.

THE dues arising from the undermentioned Ferries will be put up to auction at Maitland, under the direction of the Police Magistrate at that place, on Friday, the 25th instant, at 12 o'clock, for one year, commencing the 1st day of August, 1851.

1st.—The Ferry across the River Paterson, on the road leading to Hinton from Paterson.

GROSE FARM.

**CONVEYANCE AND ESCORT OF GOLD,
FROM THE MINES AT OPHIR, TO
SYDNEY.**

HIS Excellency the GOVERNOR-GENERAL directs it to be notified, that, pending some more permanent measure, an arrangement has been made for the conveyance of Gold, under the charge of an armed Escort, from the Mines at Ophir to Sydney, once a week, by the Mail.

2. Persons having Gold to transmit will therefore have the opportunity of forwarding it with the security of the protection which the Government will be able to afford; but it is to be understood, that in the event of a loss, notwithstanding that protection, the Government will not be responsible for it.

3. The Gold intended to be sent to Sydney is to be delivered to the Commissioner of Crown Lands at Ophir, who, after weighing it, will place it in bags, which are to be sealed, numbered, addressed, and marked by him, with the weight, in the presence of the parties bringing it; and receipts will be granted by him, in which these particulars will be specified, as well as the description of the Gold, and the names of the agents or persons to whom it is to be delivered in Sydney.

4. The chest or safe containing the Gold will be consigned to the Colonial Treasurer in Sydney, who will deliver the bags to the persons or agents appointed to receive them, on their producing authorities, corresponding with the receipts given by the Commissioner, and with the return which will be transmitted by him to the Treasury.

5. A charge will be made by the Government for Gold forwarded under this arrangement, at the rate of one per cent. on its value, estimated at £3 4s. 0d. per ounce for washed Gold, and £2 8s. 0d. for Gold obtained by amalgamation; and payment of the same will be required to be made at the Treasury on the delivery of the packages.

6. The Mails by which Gold may be sent under the protection of an Escort, will leave Ophir every Tuesday morning, arriving in Sydney at 8, a.m., on the Thursday following, commencing on Tuesday, the 22nd instant.

7. The packages of Gold will be delivered at the Colonial Treasury, between the hours of eleven and twelve o'clock, on each Thursday, to the agents or parties authorised to receive them.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

LIGHTHOUSE ON ROTTNEST ISLAND.

A Revolving Catoptric Light will be exhibited from the Lighthouse near the centre of Rottnest Island on and after the night of 1st June, 1851, during the period between sunset and sunrise.

The Lighthouse is a white stone tower, 53 feet in height, erected on the summit of the island, and is surmounted by a lantern 11 feet high.

The light will consist of two groups of three powerful lamps each; the whole revolving once in two minutes, and shewing a flash of light of five seconds' duration every minute, with intervals of 55 seconds of darkness. The centre of the light is 197 feet above high-water level, and at the height of 18 feet may be seen in clear weather at a distance of 7 leagues.

Rottnest Lighthouse is in latitude 32 degrees 0 minutes 19 seconds South, longitude 115 degrees 31 minutes 18 seconds East from Greenwich, and stands 3 miles North 75 degrees East by compass from the West extremity of the Island, and 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ miles West by compass from its East extremity.

LIGHTHOUSE AT ENTRANCE TO SWAN RIVER.

On and after the 1st of June, 1851, a plain continuous light will be exhibited on summit of Arthur's Head, the south point of entrance to Swan River, between sunset and sunrise, for the convenience of shipping making for the anchorage in the night.

The light will be 92 feet above high-water level, supported by a white stone tower erected on summit of a cliff, and will be visible 5 leagues at sea in clear weather from a height of 18 feet.

It is in latitude 32 degrees 3 minutes 13 seconds South, longitude 115 degrees 45 minutes 11 seconds East from Greenwich, and bears South 71 degrees East 12 miles from the revolving light on Rottnest Island.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, made and passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "An Act for the regulation of the Police Force in New South Wales," and numbered "38," it was among other things enacted, "That all Police Magistrates, Magistrates, Superintendents of Police, or other persons having the management or control of the Constabulary, or any portion of the Constabulary, in this Colony, and also all Inspectors of Police, Chief Constables, Constables, and other Peace officers whosoever, appointed, and acting at the time of the passing of this Act, shall, and they are hereby respectively authorised and required, notwithstanding the passing of this Act, to continue to discharge and execute their several duties and offices, with the like powers, privileges, and authorities, and subject to the like obligations, restrictions, liabilities, directions, and regulations as heretofore, until it shall be notified by a Notice to be inserted in the New South Wales *Government Gazette*, by the Inspector General to be appointed under this Act, that the Constabulary Force for the said Colony, or for any portion or district thereof, named in such Notice, is fully organized according to the provisions of this Act; and upon such notification, the appointment and offices of all such Police Magistrates, Magistrates, Superintendents of Police, and other persons as aforesaid, appointed or acting within any such District, so far as the same shall relate to the supervision or control of the Constabulary Force, or any portion thereof, or be otherwise incompatible with the provisions of this Act, or any regulation made in pursuance thereof; and the appointments and offices of all Inspectors of Police, Chief Constables, Constables, or other Peace officers whomsoever, appointed, or acting within any such district, shall become and be void, and they shall severally discontinue acting under any Act, usage, or regulation now in force; and all houses and out-houses, appurtenances, horses, arms, accoutrements, saddles, bridles, clothing, books, papers, and appointments, articles, and things whatever, rented, held, or provided for the use or accommodation of the present Police Force, shall be applied, transferred and employed, and converted to the use and accommodation of the Constabulary Force so organized; and the right, property, and interest therein shall, immediately upon such notification, vest in the Inspector-General for the time being, appointed under this Act."

Now, I, William Spain, the Inspector-General of Police throughout the Colony of New South Wales, duly appointed under the before in part recited Act of Council, in pursuance of the power and authority so vested in me by the said Act, do hereby give notice that the Constabulary Force for the portion or districts of the said Colony hereinafter described, that is to say:—

The Police District of Windsor, in the Counties of Cumberland, Cook, and Hunter, and the United Police Districts of Campbelltown, Camden, and Narullan, and Pieton, in the Counties of Cumberland, Camden, and Westmoreland, are fully organised according to the provisions of the said recited Act.
