**FIFTY POUNDS REWARD, OR A CON-  
DITIONAL PARDON.**

**W**HEREAS it has been represented to the Government, that, on the morning of the 7th instant, Patrick M'Namara, a prisoner under committal for trial for murder, effected his escape from Maitland Gaol, His Excellency the GOVERNOR-GENERAL directs it to be notified, that a reward of Fifty pounds will be paid to any person who may, within six months from the present date, give such information as shall lead to the apprehension and lodging in safe custody of the above individual; or if the person giving such information be a Prisoner of the Crown, application will be made to Her Majesty for the allowance to him of a Conditional Pardon.

Name, Patrick M'Namara; ship, Woodbridge; arrival, 1841; condition, free; height, six feet; complexion, florid; hair, black; eyes, hazel; age, twenty-seven years; native place, Limerick.  
Remarks—PM on right fore arm, strong made man, had on a white Guernsey frock with dark spots on it, light fustian trowsers, cabbage-tree hat and brown scarf, dark waistcoat with metal buttons.

Remarks—Nose injured by disease or accident; had on when he escaped, a brown velvet shooting jacket, tweed vest, and moleskin trowsers.

These prisoners are supposed to have proceeded in the direction of Victoria.

It is to be understood that the Mails are to be despatched on the days and hours to be fixed by the Postmaster-General, either according to the present arrangement, or as he may afterwards determine for the public convenience.

It will be optional with parties to offer for one or more of the above lines of stages, and to propose the mode of conveyance; but on all roads where wheel vehicles can travel, a preference will be given to carriage conveyance, and the Contractors will be held strictly bound to use the conveyance they propose, and to travel at the rate agreed upon. The rate of travelling is not to be less than six miles per hour, including all stoppages. The Contractors are to carry all bags, letters, and newspapers which may be delivered to them under authority of the Postmaster-General, or any of the Postmasters, and to provide secure lockers for the Mails in carriages and dry coverings for the bags on horseback.

Contractors will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet, by any of their servants or passengers, or otherwise to the prejudice of the Post Office Revenue, under penalty of £5 for each and every offence.

Contractors will be liable to a fine of five shillings for every five minutes delay after the specified time of starting; and to a like penalty for every ten minutes delay after the specified time of arrival, except for the first five or ten minutes respectively.

Contractors will be strictly bound not to assign any portion of their Contract without consent of the Postmaster-General.

A Mail Cart or Carriage, drawn only by one horse, must not carry more than one passenger; by two horses not more than three passengers; and by three or more horses, not more than six passengers, exclusive of the driver, under a penalty of £3 for each offence.

All vehicles and horses employed in the conveyance of Mails are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval, or rejection of the Postmaster-General, or person appointed by him for that purpose.

The drivers and postmen are to be free men, and of certified good character.

All fines and penalties incurred under the agreement are to be deducted by the Postmaster-General, from the next quarterly instalment falling due to the Contractor, and to be considered as over and above any penalties provided by any Act of Council.

Each party tendering or an agent for him must attend at this Office on the day appointed for opening the Tenders; and each Tender must bear the signature of two respectable and solvent persons, engaging to enter into a bond with the Contractor, for the safety of the Mails, and the due performance of the Contract, and every stipulation therein.

The hours of starting from each Post Office or stage, and other particulars, may be ascertained at the General Post Office, where parties proposing to tender are invited to seek information.

Printed forms of Tender may be had on application at the General and all other Post Offices throughout the Colony.

**WHEREAS** by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, made and passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "An Act for the regulation of the "Police Force in New South Wales," and numbered "38," it was amongst other things enacted, "That all Police Magistrates, Magistrates, Superintendents of Police, or other persons having the management or control of the Constabulary, "or any portion of the Constabulary, in this "Colony, and also all Inspectors of Police, Chief "Constables, Constables, and other Peace officers "whosoever, appointed, and acting at the time of "the passing of this Act, shall, and they are "hereby respectively authorised and required, "notwithstanding the passing of this Act, to continue to discharge and execute their several "duties and offices, with the like powers, privileges, and authorities, and subject to the like "obligations, restrictions, liabilities, directions, "and regulations as heretofore, until it shall be "notified by a Notice to be inserted in the New "South Wales *Government Gazette*, by the "Inspector General to be appointed under this "Act, that the Constabulary Force for the "said Colony, or for any portion or district "thereof, named in such Notice, is fully "organized according to the provisions of this "Act; and upon such notification, the appointment and offices of all such Police Magistrates, "Magistrates, Superintendents of Police, and "other persons as aforesaid, appointed or acting "within any such District, so far as the same "shall relate to the supervision or control of the "Constabulary Force, or any portion thereof, or "be otherwise incompatible with the provisions "of this Act, or any regulation made in pursuance thereof, and the appointments and offices "of all Inspectors of Police, Chief Constables, "Constables, or other Peace officers whomsoever, "appointed, or acting within any such district, "shall become and be void, and they shall severally "discontinue acting under any Act, usage, or "regulation now in force; and all houses and "out-houses, appurtenances, horses, arms, accoutrements, saddles, bridles, clothing, books, "papers, and appointments, articles, and things "whatever, rented, held, or provided for the use "or accommodation of the present Police Force, "shall be applied, transferred and employed, and "converted to the use and accommodation of the "Constabulary Force so organized; and the right, "property, and interest therein shall, immediately "upon such notification, vest in the Inspector-General for the time being, appointed under "this Act;" now, I, William Spain, the Inspector-General of Police throughout the Colony of New South Wales, duly appointed under the before in part recited Act of Council, in pursuance of the power and authority so vested in me by the said Act, do hereby give notice that the Constabulary Force for the portion or district of the said Colony hereinafter described, that is to say:—
