ROADS

IT IS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, having deemed it expedient to open and make a parish road between the townships of Warrnambool and Belfast, county of Villiers, commencing at the northern extremity of Beach-street, in the suburbs of East Belfast on the northern side of the said street, the south-west angle of portion No 10, purchased by Mr James Atkinson, bearing south-east distant 28 1/2 links, and passing through the said purchase of Mr James Atkinson, and along the sand hummocks of Port Fairy Bay by the following bearings, north 53 degrees, east 12 chains; north 68 degrees 30 minutes, east 28 chains; north 73 degrees 30 minutes, east 15 chains; north 79 degrees 20 minutes, east 14 chains; south 79 degrees 50 minutes, east 12 chains; south 75 degrees 20 minutes, east 24 chains; north 40 degrees, east 32 chains and 50 links; north 71 degrees, east 26 chains; north 88 degrees 30 minutes, east 9 chains; north 65 degrees, east 16 chains; north 61 degrees, east 26 chains; east 13 chains; south 73 degrees 30 minutes, east 7 chains; south 68 degrees, east 10 chains; north 81 degrees 40 minutes, east 20 chains; north 73 degrees 20 minutes, east 7 chains; north 47 degrees 30 minutes, east 17 chains; north 75 degrees, east 14 chains; north 85 degrees, east 10 chains; south 76 degrees 40 minutes, east 16 chains and 67 links; north 7 degrees 20 minutes, east 25 chains and 15 links, crossing a small creek at 75 links, and entering the special survey purchased by Mr William Rutledge, at 23 chains 80 links, thence through the said special survey of Mr William Rutledge, by the following bearings, north 58 degrees 20 minutes, east 12 chains 20 links, (a corner stake of said survey, bearing south 41 degrees, east 7 chains and 77 links); north 7 degrees 52 minutes, west 14 chains; north 22 degrees, east 87 chains; north 72

degrees east 36 chains; north 44 degrees, east 15 chains; north 65 degrees, east 71 chains to the northern boundary of Mr William Rutledge's special survey; thence at a distance of 1 chain north parallel to the northern boundary line of the said special survey, bearing north 82 degrees 8 minutes, east 99 chains 20 links; thence through the said special survey and portion No. 1, containing 400 acres, purchased by Mr William Rutledge by a line bearing south 45 degrees 10 minutes, east 141 chains (entering the said survey at 152 links, and passing into portion No. 1, at 101 chains 60 links); thence through said portion No. 1, and through portion No. 3, containing 335 acres 3 roods and 8 perches, purchased by Mr William Rutledge, bearing south 81 degrees, east 49 chains; thence through portion No. 3, and through portion No. 2, containing 384 acres 2 roods and 12 perches, purchased by Messrs Donald and Duncan Cameron Kennedy, bearing south 54 degrees, east 39 chains and 74 links, (entering said portion No. 2 at 170 links); thence east 4 chains to the site of the Funt on the Merri River; thence crossing the river on a bearing of north 45 degrees east 4 chains to a Government Reserve; thence along the northern boundary of the said reserve, and along the suburban allotments in the parish of Wangoom by the following bearings, east 42 chains; south 61 degrees, east 120 chains and 20 links; south 70 degrees, east 25 chains and 38 links to a point on the boundary line of the Township Reserve of Warrnambool 3 chains east from the south-west angle of suburban allotment No. 120, parish of Wangoom. The bearings are magnetic and the distances are measured on the left hand side of the road as you proceed from Belfast towards Warrnambool; notice is hereby given, that in conformity with the provisions of the Act of the Governor and Council 4th William IV, No 11, intituled "An Act for making, altering, and improving the Roads throughout the Colony of New South Wales, and for opening and improving

the Streets in the Towns thereof," a survey or tracing, showing the intended line of the said road, is now deposited in the office of the Surveyor-General in Sydney, and in that of the Surveyor in charge in Melbourne, and all persons interested therein are requested to transmit in writing to the Clerk of the Executive Council, within one month from this date, any well grounded objection which may exist to the formation of the said Road.

**LICENSES TO CUT TIMBER ON
CROWN LANDS.**

PORT PHILLIP DISTRICT.

Former regulations cancelled. New to take effect from 1st January, 1851.

NOTICE is hereby given that the regulations dated the 21st May, 1839, relating to the issue of licenses for cutting timber on Crown Lands, are hereby held to be cancelled, and the following substituted in lieu thereof, to take effect upon and after the 1st day of January 1851.

Applications to be made to the Commissioners.

I. Applications for licenses to cut timber on the vacant crown lands to be addressed to the Commissioner of crown lands for the district in which they will be made use of.

Recommendation required.

II. Every such application must be supported by the recommendation of at least two respectable persons to the satisfaction of the commissioner.

Directions given to issue licenses.

III. The crown commissioners are authorised to exercise a full discretion in the giving or withholding the licenses applied for according to the merits of each case.

Applications to be filed.

IV. Applications for licenses shall be filed of record by the commissioner to whom they may have been addressed, for the convenience of future reference if need be.

Return of applications how to be made.

V. A return of all applications granted or refused is to be made monthly to the Sub-Treasurer by the commissioners. These returns should briefly state the grounds of the decision in any case where the commissioner may have seen fit to refuse the license applied for.

License personal.

VI. The license will be personal, and will entitle no one, but the actual holder to any privilege whatsoever; neither will it be transferable.

A separate license must be taken out by every person actually employed in felling, cutting, sawing, splitting, or removing timber from crown lands; as well as dead timber, underwood, or roots cut for fuel, or growing timber cut for other purposes.

Lessees may cut timber for certain purposes without license.

VII. The preceding regulation does not apply to the lessee, or licensed occupant of crown lands beyond the settled districts, who is at liberty to cut any timber growing thereon for domestic uses, for firebote, fencing, or other convenience for the enjoyment of the land; but not for sale or barter.

No such privilege however is or can be conceded as a matter of right to the lessee of the crown within the settled district.

Fees.

VIII. The fee for a license to cut and remove firewood, shall be £2 per annum, and for a sawyer or splitter £5; which must be paid to the crown commissioner previous to the issue of the license.

The sums paid to the crown commissioners are to be accounted for, and paid over to the Sub-Treasurer monthly.

Operation of license.

IX. The licenses shall be operative only within the commissioners district for which they are granted.

How available in another district.

X. Licenses granted for one district may be made available in another without the payment of any additional fee, provided that the licensee obtain the written consent of the commissioner of such last mentioned district; to be endorsed on the license, and recorded in the office.

Duration of license.

XI. The license shall be in force for twelve months, from the 1st of January in each year licenses taken out on, or after the 1st July shall, in like manner, determine on the 31st December; but they will be charged only half the regulated fee.

Licenses to be notified.

XII. A return will be published from time to time, in the *Government Gazette*, of all timber licenses issued, and also of forfeiture, if any, on account of infringement of these regulations.

Licenses to extend only to vacant crown lands.

XIII. It is to be distinctly understood that licenses granted under these regulations will extend only to the vacant crown lands in the districts for which they are granted; and that they do not extend to any lands which have been, or may hereafter be reserved by public notification to that effect.

Renewal of licenses.

XIV. Persons holding licenses under these regulations may renew them annually, on payment of the regulated fee, without any fresh recommendation, unless the crown commissioner may be aware of any assignable reason for declining a renewal of license in any particular case.

The commissioners of crown lands within and beyond the settled districts are charged with the prosecution of persons illegally cutting timber on crown lands.

Seizure of timber.

XV. The crown commissioner or constables shall seize all timber cut by unlicensed persons, and all cut timber lying on crown lands, which they may have cause to believe has not been cut by a person duly authorised to cut the same.

To avoid misapprehension it is further stated, that the local Act 9th Vict. No. 14, commonly called the "Dead Wood Act," is held applicable to the removal of fallen timber, whether dead or green, from crown lands; and that under the 7 and 8 Geo. IV. ch. 29, a warrant is not necessary for the apprehension where a man is taken in the fact of cutting, or removing wood already severed from the freehold of the Queen.

To be sold.

XVI. All such timber, when seized is to be marked with the broad arrow, sold and the proceeds duly accounted for.

Forfeiture of license.

XVII. Any breach of these regulations by persons holding licenses, will involve the forfeiture of the same.

DISALLOWANCE OF VAGRANT ACT.

REFERRING to the Proclamation of this day's date, intimating the disallowance of the Act of Council 13 Victoria, No 46, His Excellency the Governor is pleased to direct the publication of the following Despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State, explanatory of the reasons for which Her Majesty in Council has seen fit to disallow the Act in question.

SIR,

I have had under my consideration amongst other Acts passed by the Legislature of New South Wales, during its last Session, and reported on in your Despatch No. 246, of the 16th of December last, that numbered 46 of the 13th Victoria, and entitled, "An Act for the more effectual prevention of Vagrancy, and other purposes."

2 You report that this Act closely resembles the Act which it repeals 6 Wm 4, No 6, and re-enacts some of its provisions which had been found very wholesome in a police point of view, but that it extends those provisions to expirée convicts who may arrive in New South Wales from the neighbouring colonies. That these provisions may be very advantageous, as applied to those classes of the population whom the former Acts embraced. I have no reason to doubt, but the Act now before me extends the application of these provisions in a manner which I regard as objectionable. It imposes, in the first place on all persons who shall have been

transported to, or convicted in, any British colony in the southern hemisphere who may arrive in New South Wales the necessity of notifying to the magistrates, within a certain time, every change of residence, and renders them liable to two years imprisonment, with hard labor, for neglecting to do so.

3. This provision indeed (as I understand the Act), ceases to have any force after the expiration of seven years from the latest conviction of a party, so that a prisoner who had been sentenced for instance, in this country, to seven years transportation, and who after three years imprisonment in England, had been sent as an exile to New South Wales, would be free from the necessity of registering his change of residence at the end of four years.

4. But there is a further provision that every such convict who, having been duly summoned by any Justice of the Peace to give an account of his means of support, shall fail to appear without lawful excuse, shall be liable, in like manner, to two years imprisonment with hard labour. I should infer that it must have been the intention of the framers of the Act to confine the operation of this provision, as well as that of requiring the registration of their place of abode, to persons whose latest conviction had been within seven years, but it does not appear to me that from the manner in which it is worded, such would be its effect; on the contrary, if I understand it rightly, every person who having been at any period convicted, should come to the colony, would remain for ever subject to this severe regulation, and to the mark of difference from all other classes of her Majesty's subjects which it imposes.

5. It is obvious that it would be both unjust and impolitic to render all persons who had ever been convicted permanently liable to such a regulation, and both the enactments to which I have adverted, making as they do no exception in favour of those convicts to whom her Majesty may have been pleased to extend either free or conditional pardons, as seriously interfering with the Crown's prerogative of pardon, although I do not doubt they were not so intended. Her Majesty's remission of the whole or part of a sentence passed in this country or elsewhere in her dominions, would be of little avail if, on the arrival of the parties to whom her grace had thus been extended, in a particular portion of her dominions, they were immediately rendered subject to a code of restrictions which would at once materially abridge their freedom, and also perpetuate a distinction between them and other classes of her subjects. In order to show how manifestly objectionable such an enactment would be, it is only necessary to point out that under it, a person to whom her Majesty might have been advised to extend a free pardon on proof of his having been wrongfully convicted, though he would regain all the privileges of any other British subject on his return to this

country, would remain subject in New South Wales to some of the penal consequences of his conviction.

6. It is obvious also that in this respect the present Act very materially differs from the repealed one, which imposed these restrictions only on persons again convicted in the Colony, and was therefore regarded as creating an additional penalty for the commission of a fresh offence.

7. For these reasons I have felt it my duty to advise Her Majesty to disallow this Act, being at the same time aware that as its disallowance will revive the repealed Act of 6 William IV, the police arrangements of the colony will not be materially impeded thereby, and the Legislature will have an opportunity to reconsider the subject.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir Charles Augustus Fitz Roy, Knight Companion of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Territory of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c. &c. &c.

WHEREAS a certain Bill was passed by the Legislative Council of New South Wales in the thirteenth year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for the more effectual prevention of Vagrancy, and for the punishment of idle and disorderly persons, rogues, and vagabonds, and incorrigible rogues in the Colony of New South Wales," which Bill was assented to in Her Majesty's name, by me, as Governor for the time being: And whereas I did, by the first convenient opportunity transmit to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, an authentic copy of the said Bill so assented to, which said copy was received by the Right Honorable Earl Grey, then being one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, on the twenty-third day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty: And whereas Her Majesty, in pursuance of the Act of Parliament, passed in the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty's Reign intituled, "An Act for the Government of New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land," and in exercise of the powers reserved to Her Majesty, hath, by an Order bearing date the fourteenth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council, declared Her disallowance of the said Bill: Now, therefore, I, Sir Charles Augustus Fitz Roy, as such Governor aforesaid, by this my Proclamation, do signify to the said Legislative Council such disallowance, and that I have duly received a Certificate under the Hand and Seal of the Right Honorable Earl Grey, now one of Her Majesty's Principal Sec-

retaries of State, certifying the day on which such Bill was received as aforesaid.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Government House, Sydney, this third day of January, in the Year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, and in the fourteenth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

CONTRACTS FOR THE COLONIAL
SERVICE FOR 1851.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Tenders will be received at this office, until Saturday, 3rd February next, for furnishing the undermentioned supplies for nine calendar months, commencing 1st April, 1851, upon the conditions hereafter specified.

DAILY RATIONS OF PROVISIONS.

No. 1. Emigrants—For men, 24 oz wheaten bread, 16 oz fresh meat, 8 oz vegetables, half oz salt, quarter oz tea, one and a half oz sugar, quarter oz soap. For women—16 oz wheaten bread, 12 oz fresh meat, 6 oz vegetables, half oz salt, quarter oz tea, one and a half oz sugar, half oz soap. Children under ten years to be allowed two-thirds the rations of female adults; above that age and under fifteen the same as adults.

No. 2. To prisoners of the crown and others in the employment of the colonial department—20 oz wheaten bread, 8 oz maize meal, 15 oz fresh beef, quarter oz salt, one oz sugar, quarter oz soap.

No. 3. To officers in charge of surveying parties when in the field, and men composing such parties—24 oz flour, 16 oz fresh or salt beef, half oz salt, half oz tea, two and a half oz sugar, half oz tobacco, quarter oz soap; or, in lieu thereof, if preferred, 24 oz flour, 24 oz fresh or salt beef, one oz salt, half oz tea, 4 oz sugar.

No. 4. Prisoners confined in gaol—12 oz wheaten bread, 12 oz maize meal, 4 oz fresh beef, 8 oz vegetables, half oz salt, quarter oz soap. (Ration No 2, is issued to gaol attendants, and to witnesses, and others waiting bail; and if confined in solitary cells, ration No 8.)

No. 5. Children of female prisoners confined in gaol—8 oz wheaten bread, 4 oz fresh beef, 1 pint milk, quarter oz yellow soap.

No. 6. Prisoners confined in lock-up or watch-houses—24 oz wheaten bread.

No. 7. Forage for horses and oxen, for all colonial service—8 lbs maize or barley, or 10 lbs oats as demanded, 4 lbs bran, 12 lbs oaten or cultivated grass hay, and 4 lbs wheat straw for each horse per day; and half the quantity for each ullock.

No. 8. For men attached to Light-houses, Telegraphs, Water Police, and Harbour Master's boat's crews—24 oz wheat bread, 16 oz fresh beef, a quarter oz salt, one quarter oz soap.

No. 9. Fuel and light—sperm and common oil per gallon, mould and dip candles per lb, cotton wick ditto.

No. 10. For the Lunatic Asylum, Yarra, fresh beef, fresh mutton, suet, wheaten bread, bread of the 1st quality, flour 1st quality, raisins, rice, tea, sugar, salt, pepper, milk, tobacco, soap, vegetables, port wine, vinegar, sago, oatmeal, arrowroot, treacle, dip candles, common oil, common wick, forage, per ration, roach lime, straw in such quantities as may be required.

Military rations of provisions for Native Police or other mounted force, if required, 24 oz flour, 16 oz fresh or salt beef, half oz salt, half oz tea, two and a half oz sugar, half an oz tobacco, quarter oz soap.

For Hospitals, Aboriginal Establishments, Native Police, and all other services, when ordered—20 per cent. flour, fresh beef and mutton, wheaten bread, (first, second; and third quality), maize, meal, bottled port wine, arrowroot, rice, sago, pearl barley, tea, sugar, salt, oatmeal, yellow soap, colonial tobacco, vegetables, milk, vinegar, straw, common oil, dip and mould candles, rum, brandy, porter, cotton wick, salt beef, and salt pork.

CONDITIONS.

1. All the articles required by this notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds.

2. The flour and bread must be the produce of clean sound colonial wheat from which on the ration of emigrants, surveying parties border police, 20 per cent, and on the ration to prisoners of the crown 10 per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Beef and mutton to be issued in such proportions as may be required, and when the quantity admits of it, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

4. The maize meal to be similar in quality to the wheat meal, and to be twice ground.

5. When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz, 1 lb wheat flour or 1 lb biscuit equal to 1½ lb bread; 1 lb salt beef or 1 lb mutton, or 10 oz salt pork, equal to 1 lb of fresh beef.

6. The tobacco to be the best colonial.

7. The above substitutions are not to be made except on the requisition of the officer authorised to draw the several rations.

8. Vegetables to be supplied in reasonable proportions of potatoes, greens, pumpkins, onions, &c. &c.

9. The supplies for road parties and surveying parties are to be delivered at the nearest fixed stations to the places where the party may be employed, on the requisition of the officer in charge; and in case the whole ration of forage be not required or delivered, each of the species to be reckoned as the portion of the ration undermentioned:—The maize or barley 4-12—the hay 5-12—the bran, 2-12—the straw 1-12.

10. The supplies (not specified in the preceding paragraph) are to be delivered direct to the parties or establishments entitled thereto, on the written order of the person duly authorised for the purpose.

11. Provisions and forage, when required by rations, according to the scales under their respective heads, the tenders are to express the price per ration only.

12. The tenders for forage are not required to state the price of the ration for oxen, as when the latter is required, one-half of the allowance fixed for horses will be drawn, and one-half the price allowed

to the contractor, whose engagement is to provide for both horses and oxen.

13. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the party receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a Board of Survey, according to the practice of the service. But in country districts, where a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person, as arbitrator, the contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third, as umpire, who, in the event of the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

14. If the board, arbitrators, or umpire shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing of which it will be procured by the department requiring it, and the expense charged to the contractor.

15. In the event of any unnecessary delay or failure of the contractor to supply the articles when required, they will be otherwise procured and charged in like manner.

16. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or from some other cause, injury would be sustained either by the parties to whom the rations are due or the contractor, by waiting for a Board of Survey, the head of the department or officer in charge of the party or parties for whom the rations are to be received, shall have the power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality; it being distinctly understood that he will be responsible to the government for so doing; and that the contractor will have a right of appeal to the Governor, although in the meantime he must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead, failing of which it will be obtained by the officer or party requiring it, and the expense charged to the contractor.

17. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of any delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon the report of the officer in charge of the parties or establishment, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of his monthly account, as the Governor may direct. It will also be in the power of the Governor, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

18. It will be in the power of either party to limit the duration of the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to the opposite party, and to end the contract at the expiration of that period, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made or agreed to be made.

19. The contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly or quarterly, in the prescribed form; and on

the production thereof, with the requisite vouchers in a complete state, to the Sub-Treasurer for examination, and upon their approval, payment will be made by him at Melbourne.

20. The value of all packages to be included in the price demanded.

21. Printed forms of tender may be obtained from the Sub-Treasurer; and a security of £2000 will be required for the due fulfilment of the contract. No tender can be attended to unless accompanied by a certificate from two responsible parties proposed as security, stating they are willing to become bound as securities for the contractor accordingly, and the bonds must be executed within twenty days from the day of acceptance of the tender being notified, failing of which the contracts will be again advertised or another tender accepted.

22. The tenders to contain the names of the tenderers and their sureties, and places of residence at length.

23. All tenders to be enclosed in a separate envelope, and marked "Tender for Provisions, &c." and to be deposited in a box marked "Tenders" at the western entrance of the Government Offices.

24. The tenders must include the whole of the rations and separate articles above mentioned.
