PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Charles Joseph La Trobe,
 Esquire, Lieutenant Governor of the
 Colony of Victoria, and its Dependencies,
 &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS Her Majesty has been graciously pleased, by a Commission under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster, the thirty-first day

of December, in the year of Our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty, to constitute and appoint Sir Charles Augustus Fitz Roy, Knight, to be Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief, in, and over the Colony of Victoria.

And whereas, Her said Majesty has also been further pleased, by a Commission under Her Royal Sign Manual and Signet, bearing date at Windsor, the thirty-first day of December, in the year of Our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty, to constitute and appoint me, Charles Joseph La Trobe, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor of the said Colony of Victoria, and its Dependencies; and in case of death, or during the absence of the said Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the said Colony and its Dependencies, for the time being, to exercise and perform all and singular the powers and directions contained in the said Commission to the said Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief.

Now I the Lieutenant Governor aforesaid, do hereby proclaim and declare that I have this day taken the prescribed oaths before William Foster Stawell, Esquire, Her Majesty's Principal Law Officer of the Colony of Victoria, for the time being, and the senior member for the time being of Her Majesty's Executive Council of the said Colony, and that I have accordingly assumed the said office of Lieutenant Governor. And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that Her Majesty has been pleased to nominate and appoint the undermentioned Officers to be Members of the Executive Council of the said Colony of Victoria:—that is to say:—

The Crown Prosecutor, or the principal Law Officer of the Crown for the said Colony, for the time being.

The Sub-Treasurer or Treasurer of the said Colony for the time being.

The Collector of Customs or the Principal Officer of Customs in the said Colony for the time being.

Given under my hand and seal at Melbourne, Victoria, this fifteenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty one, and in the fifteenth year of Her Majesty's reign.

OFFICIAL CORRESPONDENCE.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor directs that until further notice the following Rules are to be invariably observed in conducting official correspondence in this Colony.

1. Letters having reference to patronage, or applications for employment in the Colonial service, are to be addressed to His Excellency's private Secretary.

2. All other correspondence of a public nature is to be carried on through the Colonial Secretary.

3. Subordinate Officers and others of a department are not to address themselves directly to the Colonial Secretary, but are to make their communications through the head of the Department, who in forwarding them will add any observations he may consider necessary to illuminate the subject.

4. Each Letter must be confined to a single subject.

5. Letters are to be written in a distinct hand, on foolscap paper of a uniform size, and in order to reduce the expense of postage as much as possible, ordinary letters should be written on half sheet of foolscap with a quarter margin and in as compact a form as to closeness of lines as distinctness will allow, where the subject is of more than ordinary importance, requiring perhaps reference to other correspondence, or Departments, the

inner margin must be half the width of the page but still written in a compact form.

6. Each Department is to number its letters in succession commencing annually with a fresh series, and if any Department has much correspondence with two or more others, it should have a separate series of numbering for each of them.

7. Letters are to be divided into distinct paragraphs according to the several points, or heads of the subject, and each paragraph is to be numbered for the greater facility of reference.

8. If a letter consists of two or more sheets, the pages should be numbered.

9. In replying to a letter, the date and number of the letter replied to should be given.

10. Where enclosures are necessary, they must be written on paper of a uniform size with the letter, and in as compact a form as possible.

11. The paragraphs of enclosures must also be numbered, and if consisting of more than two sheets, should be likewise paged.

12. Whenever a minute can be made upon a letter referred for further information, this course is to be adopted instead of adding another letter to it.

13. Whenever large packages of returns, &c, exceeding the weight of sixteen ounces, can be *safely* sent by any public conveyance, as by a steam boat or mail cart, at a less cost than if sent by the post, such mode of transit must be adopted: this rule, [however, will principally relate to Departments in Melbourne.]

Address from the right Worshipful the Mayor and Council of the City of Melbourne.

To His Excellency C. J. La Trobe.

We, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Councillors of the City of Melbourne, hail with welcome the arrival of the period, when, in obedience to the commands of our beloved Sovereign, your Excellency enters upon the Administration of the Government of the Colony of Victoria, and the final indication is given us of the consummation of our most anxious hopes—the Colonial Independence of Port Phillip.

We beg to assure your Excellency of our devoted loyalty to our Sovereign, of our attachment to the institutions of the United Empire, and of our high gratification that Her Majesty has been pleased to confer her Royal name upon this young and flourishing Colony. We hope that Her Majesty will never suffer that name to be sullied, nor our adopted land to be polluted by associations with the outcast criminal population of the Mother Country, and we confidently trust that your Excellency will persevere in your endeavour to preserve this bright gem of the British Crown, stainless and pure.

We assure your Excellency of our continued desire to promote as far as lies in our power, all measures tending to the prosperity of this City and the public good.

The distinguished mark of the Royal confidence which Her Majesty has been pleased to confer upon your Excellency, in appointing you Her Representative, with the power and authority which is indispensable to good government, combined with your Excellency's personal experience of the wants and wishes of the Colonists of Victoria, leads us to hope that the future progress of this Colony under your Excellency's Administration of the Government, will be commensurate with the unexampled career of the past.

His Excellency's Reply.

Mr. Mayor and Gentlemen,—

The expression of loyalty to our Gracious Sovereign, and attachment to the British Constitution which you are pleased to present to me on this occasion is the source of sincere pleasure to me, and will, I am persuaded, be appreciated by Her Majesty.

It is gratifying I am sure both to you and myself to reflect that the name by which this Province will henceforth be designated, is one which will ever remind us and our posterity of the love and duty we owe to Her and Her children after her. I fully participate in your anxiety to watch over the moral character as well as the physical development of the country, and am assured of your desire to promote as far as may lie in your power, all measures tending to the prosperity of this City and the public good.

I would take this occasion of offering to the City Council my testimony to the advantage which the community has reaped by the introduction of Municipal Institutions in the City of

Melbourne, and to the general ability which had distinguished the labours of the Corporation for the last nine years.

No one is better able than myself to appreciate and acknowledge the disadvantages under which from circumstances it had to enter upon its functions.

Its claims upon the attention of Government are undeniable, and I shall always feel it a duty to attend to them whenever reasonably advanced and supported, so far as the general interest of the Colony and my powers permit.

May it please your Excellency,—

We, the Bishop of Melbourne and Clergy of the

United Church of England and Ireland in this Diocese, beg respectfully to present to your Excellency our heartfelt congratulations on your appointment to your high position as Lieutenant Governor of Victoria.

It is not our province to enter on political events, nor is it necessary for us to do so. The Colony which has grown up under your firm and judicious rule, and which without mineral wealth, or external patronage, has by the Divine blessing on the energies of a free people advanced with a rapidity unexampled in the previous history of the world, is your best witness and your enduring monument; and we feel that we may as Citizens express our thankfulness, that he who has watched our Colony in its feeble infancy, and guided its unsteady childhood, has been selected by our beloved Sovereign to govern its early, but we hope, not precocious maturity.

But we have higher grounds for thankfulness than these. I receive with very sincere acknowledgment the address which you present to me, and would express, however briefly, the sense I entertain of the terms in which you are pleased to advert to the past progress of the colony, over which I am now called to preside as Lieutenant Governor, as well as to my own past services in connexion with it.

Allow me still to return you my best thanks for the terms in which you have expressed your good wishes for my future administration of the Government of the colony, now more directly committed to my charge; and for the manner in which you include Mrs La Trobe in your prayers and aspirations kind.
