PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Charles Joseph La Trobe,
Esquire, Lieutenant Governor of the
Colony of Victoria, and its Dependencies,
&c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS Her Majesty has been graciously pleased, by a Commission under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster, the thirty-first day of December, in the year of Our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty, to constitute and appoint Sir Charles Augustus Fitz Roy, Knight, to be Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief, in and over the Colony of Victoria.

And whereas, Her said Majesty has also been further pleased, by a Commission under Her Royal Sign Manual and Signet, bearing date at Windsor, the thirty-first day of December, in the year of Our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty, to constitute and appoint me, Charles Joseph La Trobe, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor of the said Colony of Victoria, and its Dependencies; and in case of death, or during the absence of the said Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the said Colony and its Dependencies, for the time being, to exercise and perform all and singular the powers and directions contained in the said Commission to the said Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief.

Now I the Lieutenant Governor aforesaid, do hereby proclaim and declare that I have this day taken the prescribed oaths before William Foster Stawell, Esquire, Her Majesty's Principal Law Officer of the Colony of Victoria, for the time being, and the senior member for the time being of Her Majesty's Executive Council of the said Colony, and that I have accordingly assumed the said office of Lieutenant Governor. And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that Her Majesty has been pleased to nominate and appoint the undermentioned Officers to be Members of the Executive Council of the said Colony of Victoria:—that is to say:—

The Crown Prosecutor, or the principal Law Officer of the Crown for the said Colony, for the time being.

The Sub-Treasurer or Treasurer of the said Colony for the time being.

The Collector of Customs or the Principal Officer of Customs in the said Colony for the time being.

this fifteenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred
and fifty one, and in the fifteenth year of Her
Majesty's reign.

GOVERNMENT GAZETTE.

HIS Excellency the Lieutenant Governor directs it to be notified, that as it is intended the Government Gazette of Victoria, shall contain not only the ordinary notices for public information, but likewise all Regulations and Orders, which may from time to time be deemed necessary, for conducting the public business of the Colony, and for the instruction and guidance of the several branches of the Service,—Heads of Departments, Clerks of Petty Sessions, and others to whom the Gazette will be officially issued, will be held responsible that the numbers be filed as soon as they are received, and at the end of the year returned to the Storekeeper, who will replace them by bound volumes, which must be considered as public property attached to the different offices, and carefully retained as a means of future reference.

All Notices, with the exception of those from Poundkeepers, which are intended for publication in the Government Gazette, must, in the first instance, be sent to the Colonial Secretary.

OFFICIAL CORRESPONDENCE.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor directs that until further notice the following Rules are to be invariably observed in conducting official correspondence in this Colony.

1. Letters having reference to patronage, or applications for employment in the Colonial service, are to be addressed to His Excellency's private Secretary.

2. All other correspondence of a public nature is to be carried on through the Colonial Secretary.

3. Subordinate Officers and others of a department are not to address themselves directly to the Colonial Secretary, but are to make their communications through the head of the Department, who in forwarding them will add any observations he may consider necessary to illuminate the subject.

4. Each Letter must be confined to a single subject.

5. Letters are to be written in a distinct hand, on foolscap paper of a uniform size, and in order to reduce the expense of postage as much as possible, ordinary letters should be written on half sheet of foolscap with a quarter margin and in as compact a form as to closeness of lines as distinctness will allow; where the subject is of more than ordinary importance, requiring perhaps reference to other correspondence, or Departments, the inner margin must be half the width of the page, but still written in a compact form.

6. Each Department is to number its letters in succession commencing annually with a fresh series, and if any Department has much correspondence with two or more others, it should have a separate series of numbering for each of them.

7. Letters are to be divided into distinct paragraphs according to the several points, or heads of the subject, and each paragraph is to be numbered for the greater facility of reference.

8. If a letter consists of two or more sheets, the pages should be numbered.

9. In replying to a letter, the date and number of the letter replied to should be given.

10. Where enclosures are necessary, they must be written on paper of a uniform size with the letter, and in as compact a form as possible.

11. The paragraphs of enclosures must also be numbered, and if consisting of more than two sheets, should be likewise paged.

12. Whenever a minute can be made upon a letter referred for further information, this course is to be adopted instead of adding another letter to it.

13. Whenever large packages of returns, &c, exceeding the weight of sixteen ounces, can be safely sent by any public conveyance, as by a steam boat or mail cart, at a less cost than if sent by the post, such mode of transit must be adopted: [this rule, however, will principally relate to Departments in Melbourne.]

14. All letters previously to being posted are to have the proper number of postage stamps attached to them, and when stamps cannot be procured the postage must be prepaid; the amount of postage will be generally ascertained by weighing the letter, but it may be stated as a guide, that half a sheet of foolscap with an ordinary envelope weighs under half an ounce, and the postage is consequently two pence; the postage for three half sheets and envelope four pence; for seven half sheets and envelope eight pence.

15. Postage stamps are to be invariably used whenever it is possible to procure them, in preference to a pre-payment of postage.

16. Heads of Departments in Melbourne, will obtain their stamps from the Postmaster General, and in the country districts, from the several country Postmasters, who will be instructed to keep a supply, requisitions being made for the

the other a daily entry of all letters dispatched, with the number of each class of stamps attached to them. At the end of the month this return will be forwarded to the Colonial Secretary, signed by the Head of the Department, and the clerk who keeps the book.

POSTAGE BETWEEN NEW SOUTH WALES AND VICTORIA.

HIS Excellency the Governor General having conferred with His Honor the Superintendent of Port Phillip, relative to the Postage which will become chargeable on letters, packets, and newspapers, passing between this Colony and Victoria, on the erection of the latter into a separate Dependency of the Crown, has been pleased to direct, that, pending the necessary legislation on the subject, the same charges for Postage shall continue to be made as at present on all such letters, packets, and newspapers; but it being necessary to make such arrangements, in reference to this matter, as will ensure to each Colony, so far as circumstances will permit, the benefit of its postal Revenue, it is to be understood, that Postage Stamps of each Colony, will only be available in posting letters, packets, or newspapers in the Colony to which they are issued; but they will nevertheless, if of sufficient value, free them from further charge on delivery in the other Colony to which they may be conveyed. If not prepaid by money or in stamps they will nevertheless be forwarded to their destination, and in such case they will become chargeable (newspapers excepted) with double postage in the Colony in which they may be delivered. If the value of the stamps be insufficient, the difference necessary to make up the proper amount of postage, will also be charged double on delivery of the letters and packets. The amount received for postage on letters, packets, and newspapers not prepaid will be carried to the credit of the revenue of the Colony in which the same is collected.

RULES OF COURT, OF 17th JULY, 1851.

In the Supreme Court of New South Wales for the District of Port Phillip.

THURSDAY, THE SEVENTEENTH DAY OF JULY, A.D., 1851.

Regulæ Generales—

RULE No. 96.—It is ordered that from and after this date, all proceedings in this Court shall be entitled "In the Supreme Court of New South Wales, for the District of Port Phillip, now called as, and being the Colony of Victoria."

No. 97. That in the margin of every Declaration except where the cause of action is local in its nature, the venire shall be marked by the word "Victoria," and no venire shall be elsewhere stated, nor in any plea—except where a local description is necessary.

No. 98. That the words "And District of Port Phillip" shall be struck out of the Thirty-fourth Rule of this Honorable Court, and the word "Victoria" inserted in lieu thereof.

No. 99. That the Thirty-third General Rule of this Honorable Court be repealed.
