WHEREAS the Legislative Council of Victoria, has been and now stands prorogued to Tuesday, the Twenty-seventh day of April instant; and it is deemed expedient further to prorogue the same: Now, therefore, I, Charles Joseph La Trobe, Esquire, in pursuance of the power and authority in me vested as Lieutenant Governor of the said Colony, do hereby further Prorogue the said Legislative Council to Tuesday the twenty-fifth of May next.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony of Victoria, at Melbourne, this twentieth day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, and in the fifteenth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

PROCLAMATION,

By His Excellency Charles Joseph La Trobe, Esquire, Lieutenant-Governor of the Colony of Victoria and its dependencies.

or maintained at the Public Expense, as and for Public Gaols, Prisons, and Houses of Correction, within the said Colony and its Dependencies, and which should by Proclamation to be from time to time published in the New South Wales *Government Gazette*, by order of the Governor for the time being of the said Colony, be declared and notified as such Public Gaols, Prisons, or Houses of Correction; should from and after the publication of such Notification, be severally deemed and taken to be the Public Gaol of the Place or District where the same was or should be situated, within the said Colony or its Dependencies respectively; and should be subject to the several provisions thereafter made for the regulation, management, care and discipline of the Public Gaols, Prisons, and Houses of Correction, belonging to the said Colony and its Dependencies, and of the Prisoners confined within the same; AND WHEREAS it is expedient that the Building now called and known as the "Watch-house," at Portland, in the Colony of Victoria, should be and be declared as a Public Gaol, Prison, and House of Correction; Now THEREFORE, I the Lieutenant-Governor aforesaid by virtue of the said recited Act, and in furtherance of the power and authority thereby in me vested, and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf: do hereby proclaim, declare, and notify the Building known as the Watch-house, at Portland, in the Colony of Victoria aforesaid, to be a Public Gaol, Prison, and House of Correction.

PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Council of New South Wales, passed in the Fourth Year of the reign of Her Present Majesty, intituled, "*An Act for the Regulation of Gaols, Prisons, and Houses of Correction, in the Colony of New South Wales and its Dependencies, and for other Purposes relating thereto,*" it is enacted: That all Buildings, Erections, Houses and Premises, which should thereafter be erected, built, purchased, enlarged or maintained at the Public Expense, as and for Public Gaols, Prisons, and Houses of Correction, within the said Colony and its Dependencies, and which should by Proclamation to be from time to time published in the New South Wales *Government Gazette*, by order of the Governor for the time-being of the said Colony, be declared and notified as such Public Gaols, Prisons, or Houses of Correction; should from and after the publication of such Notification, be severally deemed and taken to be the Public Gaol of the Place or District where the same was or should be situated, within the said Colony or its Dependencies respectively; and should be subject to the several provisions thereafter made for the regulation, management, care and discipline of the Public Gaols, Prisons, and Houses of Correction, belonging to the said Colony and its Dependencies, and of the Prisoners confined within the same; And whereas it is expedient that the Building and Premises now called and known as the "Penridge Stockade," with the Reserve attached thereto, in the Colony of Victoria, should be and be declared as a House of Correction; Now, therefore, I the Lieutenant Governor aforesaid, by virtue of the said recited Act, and in furtherance of the power and authority thereby in me vested, and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf: do hereby proclaim, declare, and notify the Buildings and Premises called and known as the "Penridge Stockade," with the Reserve attached thereto, containing forty-five acres, one rood, and sixteen perches, in the parish of Jika Jika, in the County of Bourke, in the Colony of Victoria aforesaid, commencing at the north-east corner of allotment 9 of Section 3, and bounded on the east by a line bearing 29 chains to the Merri Creek; on the north by the Merri Creek, and by part of the northern boundary of the Village Reserve, bearing west 6 chains 25 links; on the west by a line bearing south 30 chains; and on the south by a line bearing east 16 chains to the commencing point,—to be a House of Correction.

ROADS.

HIS Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, having deemed it expedient to open and make the following Parish Roads, as hereunder described, viz. :—

(1.) Road from the Village Reserve of Broadmeadows, Parish of Will Will Rook easterly to the Upper Plenty Road in the parish of Keelbundora.

Commencing at a point bearing south 27 chains from the north-east corner of the Village Reserve of Broadmeadows, and passing through Section No. 10, in the parish of Will Will Rook, being C. J. Garrard's purchase of 959 acres, by lines bearing east 34 chains, north 63 degrees east 15 chains, south 41 degrees east 5 chains, south 3 degrees east 15 chains, thence along the Section line to the old Sydney or Pascoeville road east 12 chains 57 links, crossing the said road and continuing along the said section line, east 164 chains to the New Sydney road, thence crossing the said road and along the same section line east 61 chains 50 links to the Merri Creek, (where the southern side of this road strikes the Merri Creek it bears south 48 degrees east 2 chains 80 links, and north 60 degrees east 2 chains 93 links, to allow a good crossing); thence passing over that Creek and entering the parish of Keelbundora along the Section line east 172 chains to the Wollert road, crossing that road and continuing east along the Section line 131 chains 50 links to the Darebin Creek, passing over that Creek by a line east 3 chains. (The bearings as far as this point being taken from the centre of the road.) The road then bears south 3 chains 50 links south 37 degrees east 2 chains 50 links, south 71 degrees east 4 chains, south 84 degrees east 2 chains 50 links, north 55 degrees east 2 chains, north 34 degrees east 6 chains 35 links to the south boundary of John Gardner's 1182 acres; (these bearings being taken from the south side of the road); thence along the Section line east 57 chains 25 links to the Upper Plenty road. The bearings are magnetic, and the road one chain wide throughout.

(2.) Wollert Road.

Commencing at the south-east corner of section 25, in the parish of Keelbundora, being Messrs. Westgarth and Carr's 640 acres, and following the Section lines dividing the said purchase from Mr. Robert Campbell's 947 acres by a line bearing north 80 chains, then entering Hughes and Hosking's purchase of 1268 acres, by a line bearing north 50 links, west 24 chains 75 links, and north 1 degree 30 minutes, east 79 chains 50 links, to the northern boundary of the said purchase. The bearings are magnetic, and the Road described from the centre one chain wide throughout.

(3.) Road connecting the parishes of Wollert, Yuroke, and Bulla Bulla, by a continuation of the Road from the Deep Creek eastward.

Commencing at the south-west corner of Section No. 24, containing 660 acres, in the parish of Yuroke, bearing east, along the Section line, 74 chains to the Merri Creek; crossing which

Creek, it continues the same bearing 166 chains, to the south-east corner of section No. 16, containing 1260 acres. The bearings are magnetic, and described from the centre.

Notice is hereby given, that in conformity with the provisions of the Act of the Governor and Council, 4 Wm. IV., No. 11, intituled "*An Act for the Making, Altering, and Improving the Roads throughout the Colony of New South Wales, and for Opening and Improving the Streets in the Towns thereof*," a Survey or Tracing, shewing the intended lines of the said Roads, is now deposited in the Office of the Surveyor General, in Melbourne; and all persons interested therein are requested to transmit in writing to the Clerk of the Executive Council, within one month from this date, any well-grounded objection which may exist to the formation of the said Roads.

ELECTORAL LISTS.

2. It is to be remembered that Collectors for the preparation of the Electoral Lists are to be appointed not later than the first June next, and that the lists are to be completed between the first and the twenty-eighth day of June in all Electoral Districts except Corporate Towns, in which the lists must be prepared by the twenty-fifth of June.
