But, in country districts, where a Board of Survey cannot be conveniently assembled, the party objecting will name one person as arbitrator, the contractor or his agent another, and these two will (previously to any other proceeding on their part) concur in naming a third as umpire, who, in the event of

the arbitrators not agreeing in opinion, will be called upon for his decision, which shall be final.

5. If the Board, arbitrators, or umpire shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which, it will be procured by the party requiring it, and the expense charged to the contractor.

6.
