THE Lieutenant Governor has been pleased to make the following Rules and Regulations, and to appoint the undermentioned Fees or Rates for the transmission of communications. for the transmission of communications by the Electric Telegraph to take effect from the 1st day of December now current, in lieu of all former Rules and Regulations, Fees or Rates, under the provisions of the Act of Council, 17 Victoria, No 22. RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. No charge will be made for the date, address

or signature to any message.

2. Messages must be written with ink, in a clear and legible manner, and bear a proper date,

address and genuine signature.

3. Messages will be delivered free of charge within one mile of the Office, over that distance porterage will be charged; and messages to be delivered on shipboard, an extra charge to cover best expanses will be made. boat expenses will be made.

4. Messages will be transmitted in the order of their reception, and no precedence will be allowed in transmission, except for Government Despatches, the Police Service, and in cases of sickness or of death.

5. All messages will be held strictly confidential. 6. Payment of charges in advance will be

required, except for replies to interrogatory messages on which may have been written the words, "Reply paid for."
7. To lessen as much as possible any liability

to error in the transmission of messages from defective manuscript, it is desirable that the use of figures should be avoided, and that words at length be substituted; and the public in using the Electric Tolegraph, are requested to be particular in giving a full and correct address to every message, so that no delay in delivery may occur.

SCALE OF CHARGES. For any distance under ten (10) miles, one shilling and sixpence for the first ten words, and

one penny for each additional word. No. 119.—December 19th, 1854 —1.

Over ten and under twenty (20) miles, two shillings for the first ten words, and twopence for each additional word.

Over twenty and under fifty (50) miles, four shillings for the first ten words, and threepence for each additional word.

Over fifty and under one hundred (100) miles, six shillings for the first ten words, and fourpence for each additional word.

LICENSES TO WORK COAL FIELDS. A PPLICATION having been made to the Government by Charles Black, Esquire, on behalf of Richard Davis and John Watkins, the reputed discoverers of a workable coal field in the vicinity of Cape Paterson, for a lease of such portion of land in that locality as may lead to a thorough test of the usefulness of the dis-covery, and some doubt having arisen as to the power of the Local Government to grant more than annual licenses, and that such licenses should be offered by auction, the Lieutenant Governor has been pleased, pending the decision of the Right Honorable the Secretary of State (to whom application has been made respecting the leasing of mineral lands not auriferous), and with a view to determine without delay the actual benefit of this discovery, to order that annual licenses to occupy the sections of lands hereafter described and said to contain coal shall be put up to auction at an upset price of £10 per section.

The purchaser of the section now in the occupation of the said Charles Black shall pay over to the present occupant the value of his improvements, the amount whereof will be notified in the Government Gazette prior to sale.

At the expiration of the annual license, should the occupant be dispossessed by another licensee, an amount equal to the value of the improvements actually made by him, bona fide in working for coal, shall be paid by the in-coming occupant to the person so dispossessed—such amount in case of dispute to be ascertained by two competent persons, one to be appointed by the person dispossessed, and the other by the Government, and in case of their differing, to be decided by, an umpire, appointed by the said arbitrators.

RETURNS AND REMITTANCES.

UCH inconvenience being experienced at the Treasury from the different course adopted by the several Clerks of Benches and other Collectors of Revenue in the manner of forwarding their monthly returns and remit-tances, the Lieutenant Governor directs the following rules to be observed :-

3. Care should be taken to exclude all notes of other Colonies, or foreign coin, from remittances on account of revenue.

4. The practice of cashing private cheques or orders, and forwarding them as part of collections, is very irregular, and must be discontinued.
