REGULATIONS FOR PASSENGERS FROM
THE CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.

HIS Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has directed the publication of the following Proclamation, issued by the Governor of the Cape of Good Hope, for general information.

PROCLAMATION

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE GEORGE
CATHCART, ETC., ETC.

Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Settlement of the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope, in South Africa, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, and Ordinary and Vice Admiral of the same, and Her Majesty's High Commissioner for the settling and adjustment of the affairs of the Territories in Southern Africa, adjacent and contiguous to the Eastern and North Eastern Frontier of the said Colony, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS, by an Act of the Imperial Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, passed in the 15th and 16th years of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled, "*An Act for Regulating the Carriage of Passengers in Merchant Vessels*," it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor of any of Her Majesty's Possessions abroad, by any Proclamation to be by him from time to time issued for that purpose (which shall take effect from the issuing thereof), to declare the Rule of Computation by which the length of the voyage of any ship carrying Passengers from such Possessions to any other place whatever, shall be computed for the purpose of the said Act, and to substitute, for the articles of Food and Provisions specified in the said Act, such other articles of Food and Provisions as shall be a full equivalent for the same; and also to declare what Medicines, Medical Instruments, and other matters shall be deemed necessary for the Medical treatment of the Passengers during such Colonial voyage: Now therefore I, the Honorable GEORGE CATHCART, the Governor aforesaid, by this my Proclamation, issued for that purpose, do declare that the following shall be the Rule of Computation by which the length of the voyage of any ship carrying Passengers from the Cape of Good Hope the several places hereinafter named shall be computed, for the purposes of the said recited Act, that is to say:—

And I do further declare that in addition to and irrespective of any provisions of their own which any Passengers may have on board, the Master of every such ship shall make to each Passenger during the voyage, including the time of detention, if any, at any port or place, before the termination of such voyage, the following issues of pure water, and sweet and wholesome provisions, being in accordance with the dietary scale fixed in the said recited Act; that is to say, of water, at least three quarts daily, and of provisions after the rate per week of two and a half pounds of bread, or biscuit, not inferior in quality to what is usually called Navy biscuit, one pound of wheaten flour, five pounds of oatmeal, two pounds of rice, two ounces of tea, half a pound of sugar, and half a pound of molasses: Provided always, that such issues of provisions shall be made in advance, and not less often than twice a week, the first of such issues to be made on the day of embarkation: Provided, also, that potatoes, when good and sound, may be substituted for either the oatmeal or rice, in the proportion of five pounds of potatoes to one pound of oatmeal or rice.

And lastly, I do hereby further declare, that the medicines, medical instruments, and other matters necessary for the medical treatment of the Passengers during any such voyage, shall be as follows, namely:—

6. All parcels received at the Assay Office will be melted down and cast into bars and stamped with the Government Stamp, specifying the weight and fineness. The Delivery Notes will also specify the equivalent in British standard for facility of calculating the value.

7. The fineness will be expressed according to the decimal system now adopted at the Bank of England. For the guidance of those to whom the new system is not familiar, the fineness will also, for the present, be marked in carats.

8. According to the decimal system, fine gold is expressed as 1000.0, and standard gold of 22 carats as 916.6; gold of 12 carats would be 500.0; gold of 23 carats 958.3, and so on.
