THE following Addresses were presented to the Lieutenant Governor during His Excellency's tour through the Gold Fields of Victoria :—

RESIDENTS OF SANDHURST AND THE DISTRICT OF BENDIGO.

To His Excellency SIR CHARLES HOTHAM, K.C.B., Lieutenant Governor of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY—

We, the residents of Sandhurst and the District of Bendigo most cordially congratulate your Excellency and Lady Hotham on your safe arrival in our Colony, and through your Excellency express our feelings of loyalty and attachment to Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria.

We sincerely appreciate the honor of your Excellency's visit to our district so soon after your arrival, and esteem it also a proof of your anxious desire to become acquainted with the wants, and to promote the interests, of all classes of the people committed to your Government.

We are unwilling on this auspicious occasion to impose on your Excellency's attention a detail of the requirements of our important Gold Fields and infant Township, but will express a hope that a portion of the Revenue so largely contributed by this district may be devoted to their improvement and advancement, and that Sandhurst, ere long, may become one of the most important inland Towns in the Colony.

MEMBERS OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND RESIDING AT BENDIGO.

To His Excellency SIR CHARLES HOTHAM, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, Lieutenant Governor of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY—

We, the undersigned, as representatives of the members of the Church of England residing at the Bendigo Gold Field, desire to unite with our fellow colonists in welcoming your Excellency to this district, and to assure you that we always join most earnestly in our public prayer that your Excellency may be so assisted by God's grace that you may use the authority which our Sovereign Lady the Queen has committed into your hand for the advancement of His glory, the good of His church, the honor of Her sacred Majesty, and the welfare of this Colony and people.

We would now request your Excellency's permission to address you upon a subject which we consider to be of the greatest importance, viz., the neglect of the religious education of the population of the Gold Fields. We, and many others, we may add, of our brethren, have always regretted that the aid granted by the Government for the support of religion on the Gold Fields has been so very small, in comparison with the population and amount of revenue derived from them. We believe that we are correct in stating that no money whatever has ever been granted towards the erection of any church belonging to any denomination on any Gold Field in the Colony, and that the only aid supplied has been the grant of salaries for twelve clergymen of all denominations—a number not equal even to that of the Gold Fields themselves.

We are aware that wherever townships are surveyed and land is sold, at these places the residents will come within the provisions of an Act of Council, 16 Victoria, No. 28, intituled, "An Act more effectually to promote the erection of buildings for public worship, and to provide for the maintenance of ministers of religion in the Colony of Victoria;" but your Excellency has doubtless

perceived during your visit that these townships contain but a very small proportion of the whole number of the mining population. For the religious instruction of all beyond those townships no provision is made by the Government, and we cannot refrain from expressing our regret that the distinction between "settled" and "unsettled" districts, recognised by the Government in the allowances made to their officers on the Gold Fields, should have been almost totally forgotten in the distribution of grants for the support of religion.

With respect to the mass of the mining population, deprived as they are of all memorials of religion, we fear that we must admit the truth of a statement in a late number of a colonial paper, that "they are fast relapsing into infidelity."

Most earnestly, then, if we may be allowed to give utterance to our feelings, most earnestly would we implore your Excellency to consider this great evil, and to endeavour, as far as it lies in your power, to remove it.

We trust that your Excellency will not consider this expression of our opinions intrusive. We hope that we are actuated by no other motive than the sense of our duty to God and our fellow men. We have no wish to seek for any favor for any individual, or for the church to which we belong, but we would beg leave respectfully to ask your Excellency for an increase of the grant for the support of religion on the Gold Fields, in which all our Christian brethren as well as ourselves have a share. We ask for this increase, because we consider that the progress of our Christian faith is necessary both for the welfare of this Colony and people, and also for the existence of the Government. Its influence upon the well-being of the people is admitted, we think, by the Government, who (in the preamble to the Act of Council already referred to) acknowledge as one of their duties, "the advancement of the Christian religion and promotion of good morals in the Colony of Victoria." Its necessity for the existence of the Government may be questioned by some, but for ourselves we must say that we agree with the principles of a living author, who states in his preface to an able treatise on the Anglican church, that "he supposes that a state is bound, first of all to maintain its own existence. Because it cannot do this unless its people are educated, it must procure them an education; because there is no other power adequate to educate the mind of a nation or of a man, it must have recourse to religion." (*Maurice's Kingdom of Christ*, vol. iii. page 12, of Preface.)

We would only say in conclusion, that we heartily pray that this Colony, now, we grieve to say, to a great extent the Colony of Mammon and of Bacchus, may, by God's blessing, be made the Colony of Christ; and that your Excellency's administration of its Government may tend to the establishment of peace and happiness, truth and justice, religion and piety, amongst us for all generations.

We, the Resident Minister, Office-bearers, and Members of the Wesleyan Church on the Bendigo Gold Fields, beg most respectfully to congratulate your Excellency, as Her Majesty's Representative, on this your Excellency's first visit to this very important district so early after your arrival in this Colony.

As a Christian Church, we would assure your Excellency that we yield to none in our loyalty and attachment to the Crown, and to the Administrative Government in this land.

It may not be uninteresting to your Excellency to be informed that at present there are six principal Places of Worship in this district, in which there are upwards of thirty religious services held weekly, and attended by more than two thousand persons.

We have also in efficient operation four Public Day Schools, attended by nearly three hundred scholars.

In conclusion, we trust that your Excellency will long be preserved to administer the Government of this country, and that under your Excellency's Administration the increased prosperity and happiness of all classes of the community will be permanently secured.

BENDIGO GOLD DISTRICT GENERAL HOSPITAL.

To His Excellency SIR CHARLES HOTHAM, K.C.B., Lieutenant Governor of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.
MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY—

While the Colony of Victoria resounds with the voice of joy and self-gratulation upon the advent of a Chief Governor, under whose auspicious guidance great prosperity is so reasonably anticipated, it would ill become the Managers of the Bendigo Hospital to be silent upon the occasion of your Excellency's first visit to these Gold Fields. However, sincerely as we unite in the universal sentiment

of loyalty and congratulation which pervades the district at this moment, we shall not occupy your Excellency's precious time by an expression of those feelings which we hold in common with all Her Majesty's subjects in this country—language with which your ear is already so familiar.

But there are peculiar motives which induce this Board of Management to have recourse to the privilege of thus most respectfully approaching your Excellency. We think this a fitting opportunity to acknowledge with much thankfulness how deeply we are indebted to the Government for its most liberal aid towards the erection and support of the Hospital; especially, for we lament to have to admit it, as the hitherto unfixed character of the population appears to have prevented adequate supplies from the public.

Again, we have to request that your Excellency will have the kindness to allow yourself to be nominated Patron of the Hospital. We can assure your Excellency that our best efforts have been used to render the charity as efficient in operation and extensive in application as its circumstances allowed. And here we venture to introduce a subject which we trust you will think worthy of your Excellency's attention. With an establishment too small for more than sixteen patients, and the resident Medical Officer and Wardsmen, the Honorary Medical Board have to refuse admission to very many applicants. The subjects for such an institution are unfortunately too numerous on these mines; countless are the cases of serious, acute, chronic suffering and unforeseen calamity which cry aloud for the enlargement of the Hospital; and we therefore hopefully appeal to your Excellency for such encouragement as you may judge expedient, that we may endeavour to effect this object and thereby extend its usefulness.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY—

We, being deputed by the members of the Bendigo Prospecting Association to approach your Excellency, respectfully beg leave to call your Excellency's attention to the importance and necessity of encouragement being given to prospecting parties, and to inform your Excellency that the Bendigo Prospecting Association has collected by subscription a considerable sum of money in this district, and has now ten men in different parties out prospecting in the neighbourhood of Sandhurst; and to state to your Excellency that we are of opinion that the very altered circumstances of the Gold Fields, and the country in general, imperatively require the most strenuous efforts to maintain their efficiency, as on their success depend at the present the almost universal interests of the Colony, and we would therefore urge on your Excellency the necessity of placing upon the Supplementary Estimates a sum of money to aid in defraying the expenses of prospecting parties on the Gold Fields.

We would beg to suggest that your Excellency would recommend to the Legislative Council the desirability of remitting the License Fee to all properly organized prospecting parties, as this at present forms a very considerable item of expense, and its suspension would materially facilitate the objects of this Association.

We would offer to your Excellency our most hearty thanks for your Excellency's very prompt attention to the request of the president of this Association, respecting the granting of increased claims to *bona fide* discoverers of new digging localities, and our congratulations to your Excellency, as Her Most Gracious Majesty's representative, on your Excellency's assumption of the Government of this important Colony, and trust that under your Excellency's administration the interests of all classes of the community will be secured.

COMMITTEE OF THE BENDIGO LOCAL EXHIBITION.

To His Excellency SIR CHARLES HOTHAM, K.C.B., Lieutenant Governor of the Colony of Victoria,
&c., &c., &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY—

The Committee of this Local Exhibition, in requesting your Excellency to open this building, cannot avoid congratulating the inhabitants of this Township and the surrounding District on the auspicious visit of Victoria's Representative, and Victoria's delegated Ruler.

They flatter themselves that a few days observation will convince your Excellency that the inhabitants of this locality are loyal from principle, pacific from habit, and entirely constitutional in all their aspirations, hopes, and wishes.

The edifice in which we are now assembled is the first public building that has been erected since the township was proclaimed. It is intended to be converted permanently into a Mechanics' Institution; to be, we hope, a nursery for science, a favorite resort of studious youth, as well as of laborious miners and artisans, and even of the fair sex. A place to which all will delight to repair in search either of instruction, recreation, or amusement.

The process of colonization has been usually slow, difficult, and arduous, requiring ages to accomplish that which, through a concurrence of favorable circumstances, in unison with the public spirit of some of the people, have been here effected in a brief period.

A few years ago the neighbourhood of yonder creek was the hunting ground of aborigines and the home of kangaroos and opossums, but since the commencement of mining operations, Sandhurst and many of the contiguous gullies and flats have become hives of human industry, the abodes of a teeming population, and a source of mineral wealth, probably unequalled in the annals of the world.

The aggregate value of the gold that has been extracted from what is popularly called Bendigo must exceed fifteen millions sterling. Immense wealth may yet, by suitable machinery, be obtained from the heaps of yellow earth that meet the eye in all directions. In addition to this, there are, within a circle of fifteen miles from the place where we now stand, numerous gullies and flats which the miner's pick has never penetrated, and where the feet of few have trodden. On the summits of hills around us there are auriferous reefs from the quartz of which it is thought gold may be extracted to an amount that ordinary arithmeticians would find it difficult to compute, and which, as far as regards the abundance of gold at Bendigo, may hereafter verify the saying, "that truth is stranger than fiction."

Your Excellency is fully aware that the inhabitants of the Gold Fields, although themselves living in tents, have been virtually the principal architects of Melbourne. To them the capital of this Colony is indebted for its prosperity, and Victoria for its prestige among the colonies of Great Britain. If Melbourne were by some terrible catastrophe to become a part of Hobson's Bay, our nerves would sustain a severe shock, our pockets might be injured, and all the better feelings of our nature would be called into painful operation; but after our astonishment had subsided and our grief been assuaged by time, a new capital would arise, and the nations of nearly the whole civilised world would continue to send to our shores many of the most enterprising of their sons and of the most lovely of their daughters. But, destroy the Gold Fields, and emigration would at once flow into some other channel; Melbourne and Geelong would speedily contract their limits, and the history of the southern hemisphere would be changed. Only let us have reasonable time, and your Excellency shall, at a future visit, see our canvas tents superseded by commodious habitations, gardens everywhere enclosed, farms well cultivated, flocks and herds in abundance, together with an ample supply of all kinds of vegetables and fruit. At present, however, we are in a state of transition, or rather, we have arrived at the close of one condition without having had time to accomplish our purposes or even to make very definite arrangements for the future.

Under such disadvantageous circumstances the Committee have had to originate and to sustain an organization for the promotion of this Local Exhibition. They have done what they could, and it is hoped that both your Excellency and the public will be of opinion that they have done well.

We hope your Excellency will be present at a second exhibition, and then there shall be a building more spacious, and articles more numerous and diversified.

The Committee of this Local Exhibition, together with the inhabitants of this extensive district, earnestly hope, Sir Charles, that your government of this Colony may be more than ordinarily useful, happy, and protracted, and that when the time shall have arrived for you to quit this mortal state, you may have reason to reflect with satisfaction on the fulfilment of the onerous duties confided to you by Her Most Gracious Majesty, and that posterity may be of opinion that, like the second monarch of Israel, "you efficiently served your generation according to the will of God."

INHABITANTS OF KILMORE AND VICINITY.

To His Excellency SIR CHARLES HOTHAM, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, Lieutenant Governor of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY—

We, the inhabitants of Kilmore and its vicinity, beg to offer our most cordial congratulations upon your Excellency's safe arrival in one of the most important Colonies of Her Majesty's dominions, and your immediate entry upon the Administration of its Government.

We beg to approach your Excellency with feelings of the deepest and most sincere respect on the occasion of your first visit to this portion of the Colony, and to express our sentiments of loyalty and affection to Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, and our respect to your Excellency as Her Majesty's Representative.

From the activity and energy displayed by your Excellency, and the desire already manifested by you to be made acquainted with the grievances and wants of those districts at a distance from the seat of Government, we feel assured that we shall not, as heretofore, remain unthought of; but that a district, holding, as this does, a large population devoted to the pursuits of agriculture (in every country one great source of prosperity) will receive that consideration from your Excellency to which it is justly entitled.

We beg respectfully to call the attention of your Excellency to several matters in which our prosperity and interest are concerned, and—

Firstly, To the deplorable state of the road between this township and Melbourne, by reason of which the whole traffic to the interior, which would otherwise pass through Kilmore, is completely stopped, and diverted into another channel, causing a total and ruinous suspension of trade, a depreciation in property, an exorbitantly high rate for all articles of consumption, and on many occasions a very great delay in the arrival of the mails.

Secondly, We trust that your Excellency will have observed the extent of population and the importance of this district, and its situation in reference to several of the Gold Mines, especially the Ovens Gold Field, which there is every reason to believe will still continue to yield a large amount of gold; and with the probability of fresh discoveries being made, in consequence of your Excellency's late Proclamation respecting Gold Discoveries being acted upon.

And as we may not have the pleasure of receiving another visit from your Excellency for a considerable period, it behoves us to allude to a rumour which has been generally circulated, viz., that it is the intention of your Excellency's Government to divert the main line of road to Sydney, which now passes through Kilmore, entirely away from it. We need scarcely remark that such a step would involve this community to a serious extent; but we have the utmost confidence in the administration of your Excellency's Government, and believe that such a step will not be taken; but that this community having expended large sums of money in the purchasing of lands on the present line of road, will receive due consideration from your Excellency prior to any alteration being made respecting it.

And thirdly, The want of a Court House and Gaol, for the erection of which a large sum was last year placed upon the Estimates, but as yet no steps have been taken for carrying out these most necessary works, thus rendering it imperative, whenever prisoners are committed to our Sessions, to forward them to Melbourne, under escort, at a very enormous expense, and bringing them back again to undergo their trial.

Again expressing our confidence in your Excellency's desire to do justice to all classes of Her Majesty's subjects in this remote portion of Her Realm, and earnestly desiring that you may be long spared to carry out the work you have so auspiciously begun, to your own honor and the welfare of the Colony,

DEVAAR LIGHTHOUSE.

The Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses hereby give notice that a Lighthouse has been built upon the Island of Devaar, at the entrance to the Bay of Campbeltown, in the County of Argyll, the light of which will be exhibited on the night of Monday, 10th July, 1854, and every night thereafter, from the going away of daylight in the evening, till the return of daylight in the morning.

The following is a specification of the Lighthouse, and the appearance of the Light, by MR. DAVID STEVENSON, Engineer to the Commissioners:—

"The Lighthouse is in N. Lat. 55° 25' 45", and W. Long. 5° 32' 16".

"The Devaar Light will be known to mariners as a revolving light, which shews a bright white light once every half-minute.

"The light is elevated about 120 feet above the level of high water of ordinary spring tides, and may be seen at the distance of about 15 nautic miles, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere; to a nearer observer, in favorable circumstances, the light will not wholly disappear between the intervals of greatest brightness. The arc illuminated by this light extends from about S. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. by compass, to about W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. and faces northwards."

And the Commissioners hereby further give notice, that Her Majesty by Order in Council, dated 29th December, 1853, was pleased to order and direct that, upon the erection and lighting of the said light upon the Island of Devaar, there should be paid, in respect thereof, for every vessel belonging to the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland (the same not belonging to Her Majesty, or being navigated wholly in ballast), and for every Foreign vessel which by any Act of Parliament, Order in Council, Convention or Treaty, shall be privileged to enter the Ports of the United Kingdom, upon paying the same duties of tonnage as are paid by British vessels, the same not being navigated wholly in ballast, which shall pass or derive benefit from the said light, that is, which shall arrive at or depart from any port or place in the Bay or Loch of Campbeltown, if the burthen of the same shall not exceed fifty tons, sixpence, and if the same shall exceed fifty tons, for each additional fifty tons, or part of fifty tons, sixpence.

And Her Majesty was further pleased to order and direct, by the said Order in Council, that in respect of the said light on Devaar, and in respect of another light in Loch Ryan, on the south side of the Basin of the Clyde erected by the said Commissioners, there shall be paid by every vessel before described, and under the exemptions aforesaid, which shall navigate on a distinct voyage within the Great Basin of the Clyde, bounded by a line drawn from the Point of Corsewall to Glenarm in Ireland on the south-east, and from another line drawn from the Mull of Kintyre to Fairhead, in Ireland, on the north-

west, and on all other sides by the coasts of Ireland and Scotland surrounding the said basin, a similar rate of toll to that above set forth, being at the rate of threepence for each of the said lights.

Double the said respective tolls for every Foreign vessel not privileged as aforesaid.

Provided always, that vessels arriving at or departing from any port or place within Loch Ryan, or within Campbeltown Loch, and paying the rates for such respective voyages, shall not in addition be liable in payment of the rates for navigating the Basin of the Clyde.

The above rates are, by another Order in Council, declared to be subject to the following abatements on payment:—

Over-sea vessels, twenty-five per cent.

Coasting-vessels, ten per cent.
