**PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL
INSTITUTIONS.**

WARRNAMBOOL.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria, No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct the publication of the substance and prayer of a Petition to His Excellency, hereinafter set forth, signed by One hundred and sixty-one landowners and householders of the Town of Warrnambool, in the County of Villiers.

The Petitioners state that they are anxious to avail themselves of the provisions of the "*Municipal Institutions Act*," believing that it will be of benefit to the Town by giving the Inhabitants the power to a certain extent of governing themselves; and pray as follows:—

"Your Memorialists therefore most respectfully pray that your Excellency will cause by Pro-

clamation, the Town of Warrnambool to be proclaimed a Municipality, and beg to suggest the following as the boundaries thereof, being the same as defined in schedule F., No. 11, of the '*New Constitution Act*,' viz. :—Commencing at a point on the River Hopkins, being the south-western angle of section 1, parish of Wangoom, and bounded on the east by a line bearing north twenty chains; on the north by a line bearing west to the Merri River; on the west and south-west by the Merri River to its mouth; on the south by the sea coast of Warrnambool Bay, from the mouth of the said river to that of the River Hopkins, and thence to the point of commencement."

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE COUNTY COURT OF WARRNAMBOOL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, made and passed in the sixteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, No. 11, intituled, "An Act to make Provision for the better administration of Justice in County Courts in the Colony of Victoria" (assented to 23rd September, 1852),

It is amongst other things enacted in the sec. 76 :
 "That it shall be lawful for the Judge of any County Court from time to time to make and prescribe such Rules and Regulations touching and concerning the forms of process and pleading, the taking the examination of witnesses and allowing the same as evidence, the admission of counsel and attorneys, the fees to be lawfully demanded in such Court, or by the attorneys practising therein, and the practice and manner of proceeding in all actions to be brought therein, and all other matters and things whatsoever for the conduct and despatch of business in such Court as he may deem applicable and advantageous, and such Rules from time to time to amend, alter, or revoke : Provided, however, that every such Rule shall be forwarded by the said Judge to the Prothonotary or other proper officer of the Supreme Court of the said Colony, to be by him laid before the Judges of such Court, who shall have power to allow or disallow the same, and no such Rule or Regulation shall have effect until it shall have been published in the "Government Gazette"; and every Rule, when so allowed and published as aforesaid, shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in this Act."

In pursuance of such power the following Rules and Regulations are made and prescribed for the County Court of Warrnambool by me the Judge of said Court.

No. 1.

The Schedule of Forms and Scale of Fees hereunto annexed shall form part of these Rules.

No. 2.—Forms to be used.

The forms shall be used as far as may be applicable but may be modified to meet the circumstances of each case.

No. 3.—Priority of hearing.

On the day of hearing, all cases not exceeding £10 shall be first tried, after which all undefended cases in the higher jurisdiction shall be proceeded with and before defended cases are heard. All cases shall be called on according to their numbers in the Cause Book.

No. 4.—Actions shall be classified.

Actions shall be divided into two classes : Actions on Contract ; and, Actions on Wrong.

All technical distinctions of Forms of Action under each respective class shall be unnecessary ; and the term "Damages" shall be held to include "Debt or Damage," as well as "Damage or Damages."

No. 5.—Computation of Time.

In computation of time, Days shall be interpreted to mean Clear Days, and Sundays and Holidays shall be counted, unless any Act to be performed shall fall on such day or days, in which case such Act shall be performed on the day following any such Sunday or Holiday.

No. 6.—Time for filing Pleas, &c., and service thereof.

All Pleas, Summonses, and Particulars of Demand shall be entered in duplicate in the Office of the County Court at least fourteen days before the day appointed for the Sitting of the Court, and where the defendant resides beyond the boundaries of the City or Town in which the Court is holden, and has no place of business in such City or Town, a copy of the same shall be served at least ten days, and in all other cases eight days, before the day appointed for the Sitting of the Court,

No. 7.—Mileage to be paid.

No summons or process shall be served by the Bailiff of the Court, unless the Mileage, where payable, shall have been previously paid into Court by the party suing.

No. 8.—Service on Soldiers or Mariners, &c.

When the defendant shall be living or serving on board any ship or vessel, or quartered in any barrack or cantonment within the jurisdiction of the Court, or serving Her Majesty as a Soldier, Sailor, or Marine, it shall be sufficient to deliver the summons, or other process of the Court, to the Senior Officer on board, or to the person who may at the time appear to have charge of such ship or vessel, or to the Adjutant of the Corps, or any Officer or Sergeant of the Company to which such Soldier or Marine shall belong, or be attached.

No. 9.—Initial of Christian Name, Abode, &c.

The Abode and Addition of the Parties to a suit must be in all cases specified in the Plea and Summons, and if the Initial only of the Christian Name be known, it shall be sufficient in all Process and Pleadings to describe such Person by such Initial and by his Surname.

No. 10.—Trustees, Assignees, &c., to sue and be sued.

The character of Trustees, or of Trustees and Assignees of an Insolvent or Bankrupt, or of Executor, or of Administrator, or of persons authorised by Act of Parliament or Council, to sue and be sued, as nominal parties, shall be taken to be admitted, unless denied by Plea in writing.

No. 11.—Parties how sued.

If two or more persons be jointly sued as Partners, service on any one shall be sufficient, and it shall not be necessary to prove the Partnership unless it be denied by Plea in writing, supported by an Affidavit of the truth thereof.

No. 12.—Time for filing Defences, &c.

Defences or Pleas shall be filed five days before the time appointed for the sitting of the Court ; and in cases in which money is paid into Court by Defendant it must be paid in at the time of filing the Defence or Plea.

No money can be taken out of Court before hearing, unless in full satisfaction of debt and costs.

No. 13.—Plea of Tender not to avail, &c.

A Plea of Tender before action brought shall not avail as a defence unless the amount be paid into Court.

No. 14.—Payment admitted.

Payment admitted by Plaintiff in Bill of Particulars need not be pleaded.

No. 15.—Proof of handwriting, &c.

It shall not be necessary for the Plaintiff to prove the handwriting of any party to a Bill of Exchange, Promissory Note, Cheque, or order for the payment of Money, Deed of Agreement, or Contract declared on, unless the handwriting be denied by affidavit.

No. 16.—Cases to be called on as entered.

At each sitting of the Court numerical lists of the cases undefended and defended shall be prepared by the Registrar of the Court, such lists to be made up according to the time and order in which the summonses are taken out, and each plaintiff shall be required to attend by himself or his attorney, and prosecute his suit at the time and in the order in which his case is called on for hearing, except the Judge may think fit to make an order to the contrary.

No. 17.—Record Books to be kept, &c.

The Registrar shall keep a Record Book for causes under £10, and a Record Book for causes exceeding £10, which books he shall always have in Court upon the trial of causes, and in which he shall enter all proceedings in the several Actions, and also a Cash Book and Order Book, in which shall be kept a distinct account of proceedings ; also an Execution Book,

No. 18.—Absence of material Witness, &c.

If it shall appear to the Court upon oath or affidavit, that any person who is a material witness for either party in any case, doth not attend at the hearing thereof, and that reasonable diligence has been exercised in endeavouring to procure his attendance, the Judge shall, at his discretion, and upon such terms as he may deem fit, either postpone the hearing altogether to a future time then to be appointed by him, or else shall take the examination of such witnesses as appear, and suspend the further hearing of the residue of the case to such future time.

No. 19.—Examination "De Bene Esse."

Examination of witnesses "De Bene Esse" may be taken at any time after plea filed either before the Judge, or Registrar in the absence of the Judge, as may be ordered in each case, previous notice of application having been given to the opposite party, within the time limited by these Rules; and such examination being duly taken and returned, shall be allowed and read at any trial or hearing between the parties in such cause.

No. 20.—Eight per cent. Interest.

When the Judgment shall be upon a Debt payable with interest thereon, interest may be allowed up to the day of the date of the Judgment of the Court, such interest being calculated at a rate not exceeding 8 per cent. per annum, and execution may issue for such debt and interest.

No. 21.—Execution of Process, Levy to whom Paid.

In every case of an Execution for damage and costs, or for costs only, and of the same respectively being paid to the Registrar, the amount shall on demand be paid out by such Registrar to the Suitor to whom the same was awarded, if he shall not have appeared by Attorney, and in such case to the order of such Attorney only.

No. 22.—Execution when to be Levied.

There shall be two days between the last day of the Sitting of the Court and the day in which a party shall be entitled to take out a writ of Execution, unless the Judge shall think fit to order speedy execution, in which case costs may be taxed, and execution issued immediately.

No. 23.—Motion for New Trial.

No Motion for New Trial, or on points of law reserved at the trial, will be entertained, unless written notice of intention to move, and grounds of motion be given to the Registrar, at or before the last day of the Sittings then being holden.

Every application for a New Trial must be supported by an affidavit, as prescribed by the 39th section of the Act, and a copy thereof, with notice of the intended Motion served on the opposite party one clear day previously to the hearing of the application.

When Motion is made on points of law reserved at the trial under the 38th section of the Act, no affidavit is necessary, but notice of intention to move, setting out the points of law reserved, shall be served on the opposite party in like manner one day previous to the hearing of such Motion.

No. 24.—Reviving Judgment.

Notice of intention to apply to revive any Judgment, Decree, or Order, shall be served, and the service thereof proved within the like time, and in the like manner respectively, as Summons under Rule No. 6.

No. 25.—When Original shewn.

It shall not be necessary to the service of any Notice, Summons, Particulars, Order, or Rule, that the Original should be shewn, unless sight thereof be demanded, except in cases where it may be necessary to proceed by attachment.

No. 102.—OCTOBER 12TH, 1855.—6.

No. 26.—Special Summons.

No Special Summons shall be issued without an affidavit to ground the same; and every Summons shall contain a note of the objection or matter intended to be supported at the hearing; and a copy of such Summons and affidavit shall be served on the opposite party one day before the hearing thereof.

No. 27.—Attorneys practising.

In all cases in which a party appears by Attorney, without Counsel, the Attorney shall conduct the case in person, and not by his Clerk, or another Attorney, unless the Judge shall order otherwise.

No. 28.—Taxing Bills of Costs, &c.

The Attorney in the cause shall, before taxing, file his bill of costs, and obtain an appointment to tax from the Registrar, and serve one day's notice of taxation, together with a copy of the bill of costs, on the opposite party, or his Attorney; and if the opposite party does not appear by Attorney, or in person, the Registrar shall proceed to tax the bill; and when the party to be served with notice of taxation resides beyond the limits of the City or Town, such notice may be served by posting the same in the office of the Registrar. But it shall be lawful for the Judge at any time, on reasonable cause shewn, to grant a review of, or a fresh taxation of costs, either generally, or in respect of particular items.

No. 29.—Discontinuance.

That the Plaintiff may discontinue at any stage of the proceedings by giving notice in writing of his intention to the opposite party or his Attorney, and thereupon Defendant may tax his costs incurred, up to receiving such notice, and proceed to execution immediately.

No. 30.—Postponement of hearing Cases.

No Cause will be postponed to a future day of the same Sittings, or to a future Sittings, unless the application for such postponement be supported by affidavit, made after due notice to the opposite party, or be made with the written consent of the opposite party: the costs of such application will be in the discretion of the Judge.

No. 31.—Searches.

Parties shall be at liberty, by themselves or their Attorneys, within office hours, to search the books in the Registrar's Office, and take any copy of such parts of the proceedings as relate to their own Causes, upon payment for such search or copy a fee as per scale.

No. 32.—Unnecessary Witnesses.

Costs of unnecessary Witnesses will not be allowed on taxation, and all costs not fixed by the Judge shall be taxed by the Registrar of the Court.

No. 33.—Mileage, to whom allowed.

Parties, whether plaintiffs or defendants, if summoned by the opposite party and examined as witnesses, on appearing and giving evidence in person in their own cases, to be allowed such expenses as the Judge may direct.

No. 34.—Assessors' Fund.

That in the trial of all cases in which the attendance of Assessors is required, a fee of two shillings and sixpence where the sum sued for shall not exceed Fifty pounds, and a fee of five shillings where the sum shall not exceed £100, and a fee of ten shillings where the sum shall not exceed Two hundred pounds, as a fee of office, to be entitled the "Assessors' Fund," shall be paid to the Registrar of such Court by the party prevailing in the suit, to be charged as costs in the cause against the opposite party, which fee shall be paid before execution can issue.

The hours of arrival and departure will be so arranged as to prove most convenient to Contractors, in all cases when such will not be inconsistent with the proper performance of the service.

STEAM POSTAL COMMUNICATION.—COASTWISE.

1. Between Melbourne and Alberton, weekly.
2. Between Melbourne and Geelong, daily, or as often as circumstances may permit or require.

Contractors will be required to deliver at the respective Post Offices, (Melbourne excepted), all mails immediately on arrival, and receive therefrom all mails on the days and hours fixed by the Postmasters, which in all cases will be subject to the day and hour fixed for departure by Contractors.

CONDITIONS, ETC.

First.—It must be understood, that in all instances the usual mail road between the points abovementioned is to be travelled; and where no mail has heretofore run, that course is to be adopted which the Postmaster General may direct, or the Contractor specify in his tender.

Second.—Intending Contractors must give due consideration to the winter difficulties of the roads, and to the necessity for provision for the crossing of rivers or creeks by boat or otherwise, and they must bear in mind that no excuse for delay will be even entertained, unless supported by certificates from persons of known respectability, as to the cause of delay, and that it is attributable to no want of liberal provision both for ordinary duties and to overcome difficulties arising from stress of weather, or from the occurrence of accidents to the men, horses, or vehicles employed.

Third.—Contractors will be not merely bound to convey on and within such days and hours, and with such celerity (not less than six miles an hour) as the Postmaster General may direct, all mails, bags, letters, packets and newspapers, which may be delivered to them, under the authority of the Postmaster General or any Postmaster, but, further, to provide for that service such means of conveyance both as respects description and extent as may meet every emergency and all variations in the bulk of the mails, whether or not the transmission of such mails (either as respects address or contents) has been or is now customary. When there appears in the opinion of the Postmaster General or any officer by him duly authorised, any failure in respect of such ample provision, the deficiencies may be at once repaired by the hire or purchase of every requisite at the Contractor's cost and risk. The Postmaster General will especially require that due arrangements, either by locker, guard, or other satisfactory precautionary means, be made to protect mails from the possibility of being tampered with or abstracted by passengers or others without the immediate knowledge of the driver or other responsible person.

Fourth.—Contractors are invited to make any propositions for increased frequency of mails or definite arrivals and departures at the various stages on their roads; but they are at the same time cautioned that such special offers will not necessarily be regarded in the consideration of tenders; and so, to ensure their certainly appearing as competitors, they must also tender in a form unlogged by stipulations other than those of the above conditions.

Fifth.—Contractors can obtain the permission of the Postmaster General to convey, in addition to the mails, such limited number of passengers or weight of parcels as their means may appear equal to, such authority being, however, no plea or excuse for delays of mails, the conveyance of which must always be the paramount consideration; and the Postmaster General or other proper officer can at once revoke or modify such permission, when it appears that delays have ensued or are likely to ensue from passenger traffic. Every vehicle employed in the mail service must have painted on its door or body, in conspicuous characters, and in addition to the words "Royal Mail," or other sufficient indication of its being so employed, a statement of the number of passengers which it is permitted to convey. For every passenger, or corresponding weight of parcels carried in excess of such authorised and exhibited number, a penalty of Twenty Pounds sterling will be levied.

Sixth.—Contractors will be bound to prevent the conveyance of any letter or packet by any of their servants or passengers, or otherwise through their instrumentality, to the prejudice of the Post Office revenue; but they are bound to deliver along the prescribed or usual mail road, all loose letters and private bags entrusted or tendered to them either by or under the authority of a Postmaster; as well as to convey, and, at the first Post Office arrived at, deliver up every loose letter or private bag which, beyond the precincts of a post town, they may be required by any one to take charge of.

The penalty on the Contractor for every offence in these respects, as well as for the delivery or receipt within a post town, or within a mile of a Post Office, by a mail-man of any article subject to postage charge, shall be Five pounds.

Seventh.—Contractors will be liable to a fine of Ten shillings for every five minutes' delay after the specified time of starting, unless such delay be under instructions and to await any overdue mail for further conveyance; and a like penalty will be inflicted for every ten minutes' delay in arrival, except for the first five or ten minutes respectively.

Eighth.—Contractors are particularly to remember that both on the main and branch roads they will be fined for the full delay that may, in consequence of their late arrival at any point of such road, ensue in the further transmission of each mail entrusted to them, and not merely for the amount of late arrival at such point. The delaying Contractor is bound to forward the mail by express to its final destination, or till it overtakes the proper conveyance at a Post Office in time for due transference through the hands of a Postmaster.

The Postmaster General will, when it appears not inconsistent with the public service, authorise arrangements dependent upon his continued approval, between Contractors for conjoining lines, to avert by awaiting one another's arrival, ill consequences to themselves and the public, but it is to be distinctly understood that the proper responsibility of each party to such an arrangement will not be altered or removed.

Ninth.—The Postmaster General will offer and pay, at the cost of the Contractor, such reward as in his judgment may appear fit, for the recovery of any lost mail, letter, packet, or newspaper.

Tenth.—For every separate mail package damaged by wet or otherwise injured through failure on the part of any Contractor to make adequate provision for its protection, such Contractor shall be liable to a penalty of One pound sterling, and to a further fine of sixpence for each damaged letter, packet or newspaper of its contents.

Eleventh.—Drivers, postmen and all persons in any way employed on the mail service, must be of certified good character; and they, as well as the horses, vehicles, and all other appliances of every kind, are to be at all times subject to the inspection and approval or rejection of the Postmaster General, or any person duly authorised by him. Every Contractor failing within such reasonable time as may be allowed him to remedy any deficiency in any of these respects, shall, for every such act, be mulcted in a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

Twelfth.—Contractors employing, or required to employ, wheeled vehicles, boats or vessels, will be required, on the requisition of the Postmaster General, to provide free seats therein for officers or servants of the department travelling on the public service; such officers will be counted as authorised passengers.

Thirteenth.—All fines and penalties incurred under contract, may be either deducted by the Postmaster General from the payments becoming due to a Contractor, or recovered by ordinary legal process, and all such fines are to be considered over and above any penalties established by any Act of Council.

Fourteenth.—In all tenders the same division of the roads as shown above must be adopted, and each division (to be designated by number) must be separately tendered for; but a Contractor, desirous of uniting several lines in one service, may accompany his separate tenders for each with an offer of reduction, in the event of all, or any special lot of his tenders being accepted. But tenders for sub-divisions of the roads as above will be entertained, provided that by separate tenders each road as defined be completed.

Fifteenth.—No tender will be entertained which does not bear the *bona fide* signatures of two responsible persons, engaging to enter into a bond with the Contractor in double the amount of contract for the due performance of all its stipulations and the safety of the mails.

Sixteenth.—Contractors will be strictly bound not to sub-let any portion of their contracts without the consent of the Postmaster General.

Seventeenth.—The Postmaster General may appoint deputies to exercise all or any of the powers reposed in him by the contracts.

Eighteenth.—All further particulars may be obtained at the General Post Office, Melbourne, where intending Contractors are requested to apply.

Nineteenth.—Contractors will have to prepare their own accounts (forms for which can be had at the General Post Office), and take the necessary steps for their collection themselves, according to any regulations which exist or may be issued.

Twentieth.—Contractors will enjoy no exemption from payment of tolls, puntage, or any similar charges.

Twenty-first.—Conveyance by wheeled vehicles will be in all cases, where practicable, preferred.
