WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of June, A.D. 1855, it was declared and appointed that the several Districts therein named should be Local Court Districts, within the meaning of an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "*An Act to amend the Laws relating to the Gold Fields*," and amongst others the boundaries of the Local Court District of the Ovens were in the said Proclamation defined; And whereas it has been deemed expedient to subdivide the said Local Court District of the Ovens and to appoint the portions thereof hereinafter described to be the Districts of Separate Local Courts respectively: Now therefore I, the Governor of the said Colony, do by this my Proclamation, in pursu-

ance of the authority vested in me by the said Act, with the advice of the Executive Council, revoke so much of the said Proclamation as defines the boundaries of the said Local Court District of the Ovens, and with the advice aforesaid I do hereby declare and appoint that the Districts, the boundaries whereof are hereinafter described, shall be the Districts of Separate Local Courts within the meaning of the said Act, and shall be called by the names respectively prefixed thereto, that is to say:—

Local Court District of Beechworth.—Commencing at the junction of the River Ovens with the River Murray; thence by a line westerly to the range dividing the waters of the River Ovens and Broken Creek; thence by that range southwards to the source of the Fifteen-mile Creek; thence by a line southeasterly crossing the River King, to the Dividing Range at the source of the River Whorouly; thence by that range to the Great Dividing Range; thence by the Great Dividing Range to the source of the Indi or Limestone River; and thence by part of the eastern and northern boundaries of the Province of Victoria to the commencing point, excepting the country included within the Local Court District of Yackandandah.

Local Court District of Yackandandah.—Commencing at the junction of the Kiewa River with the River Murray; thence by a line west to the range dividing this river from the waters flowing to the Ovens River; thence by that range to the Bogong Mountains; thence by the Bogong Mountains to the source of the Inomungee River; thence by the Inomungee River to the Mitta Mitta River; thence by the Mitta Mitta River and the River Murray to the commencing point aforesaid.

OVENS DISTRICT.**

IN accordance with the Act of Council, 18 Victoria, No. 37, sec. 17, it is hereby notified that the following Regulations, applicable to the District of the Ovens, as the same was defined in a certain Proclamation, dated the 29th of June last, have been assented to by His Excellency the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council.

Further Regulations made by the Local Court of the District of the Ovens.—Assented to twenty-second November, 1855.

IX.—Number of Miners according to Claims.
Parties shall keep employed one man holding a Miner's Right for each claim held by them under the Regulations.

X.—Transfer of Claims.—Notice.

In the event of the person in whose name the claim is registered parting with his interest in such claim, notice shall be given at once to the Resident Warden by the person succeeding as head of the party.

XI.—Erecting Dams.

No person may erect a dam without the sanction of the Warden.

XII.—Interference with Dams, Races, &c.

No person may cut a dam or race, the property of another party, or otherwise interfere with the supply of water, without the sanction of the Warden.

XIII.—Repair of Races—Bridges.

The owner of any race shall keep it in repair, and shall make a bridge where any road in ordinary use crosses the same, upon being required so to do by the Warden. Upon any repair being pointed out by the Warden as necessary, the owner of the race shall make the necessary repairs, otherwise he shall be considered as guilty of a breach of the Regulations of the Court.

XIV.—Responsible party.

The person in whose name the claim stands registered shall be held responsible for the due observance of these regulations.

**RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE
BUNINYONG GENERAL CEMETERY.**

1. The Cemetery will be open daily, from sunrise to sunset.

2. From and after this date no person will be permitted to inter bodies in this Cemetery without first making an application to the Secretary, by whom all orders for burials shall be received. See Schedule C.

3. Before the ground or vault is opened, all fees and charges must be paid to the Treasurer.

4. The gravedigger employed by the Trustees will make the necessary excavation upon receiving due notice, but when a brick grave is required such must be constructed under the direction of one or more of the Trustees, or other person duly appointed.

5. The procession will be expected to arrive at the Cemetery punctually at the hour appointed for the funeral.

6. The usual hours for interment are from 10 A.M. to 6 P.M., from the 1st of October to the 31st of March, and from 10 A.M. to 4 P.M., from the 1st of April to the 30th of September, with the exception of Sundays, when the hours will be from 8 A.M. to 10 A.M.

7. All monuments, vaults, graves, gravestones, fences, &c., must be kept in thorough repair and proper condition by the relatives of the deceased or the owners thereof.

8. All coffins in vaults or brick graves must be bricked in, cemented closely and covered with a slab of stone or iron.

9. A plan of every monument must be submitted to the Trustees for their approval.

10. A plan of the grounds and a register will be kept, which may be examined on payment of the charges according to Schedule A.

11. The Trustees reserve to themselves the right of making any alteration from time to time in these regulations and charges.

12. In accordance with the 8th section of the Act 17 Victoria, No. 12, the Trustees will grant permission to any person desirous of making a vault, or placing a monument in the Cemetery, subject, however, to certain rules, and upon payment of the established charges. (See Schedule B for form of permission, &c.)

LIGHT HOUSES AT MAURITIUS.

HIS Excellency the Governor directs it to be notified for general information, that the following lights will be exhibited on Flat Island and on the coast of Mauritius, on and from the 1st December next; viz.:—

A first class *revolving* Catoptric Light on Flat Island.

A first class *fixed* Catoptric Light on Cannonier Point.

A red mast light on the left bank, and at the mouth of Grand River.

A green mast light on Cooper's Island at the mouth of the Harbor.

Detailed descriptions of, and sailing directions for these lights are published below for general information.

Sailing Directions for making the Anchorage off the Harbor of Port Louis, Mauritius, with reference to the Light Houses recently erected upon "Flat Island" and "Cannonier Point," and also the two Mast Lights near the entrance of the Harbor.

DESCRIPTION OF THE LIGHTS.

FLAT ISLAND.

This is a revolving Catoptric Light of the first order, situated at the south-west or highest extremity of the Island in latitude S. 19° 53' 26'', and longitude E. 57° 38' 8'', determined by triangulation from the Observatory of Port Louis.

Variation of the Compass 11° 47' 13'' west.

Its elevation above the mean level of the sea (the rise of tide being only about 3 feet) is 366 feet, and it will be visible in clear weather from the deck of a vessel 13 feet above the water a distance of about 25 nautical miles.

CANNONIER POINT.

This is a fixed Catoptric Light, also of the first order.

It is situated in latitude S. 20° 0' 35'' and longitude E. 57° 22' 39''. Its elevation above the mean level of the sea is 39 feet 6 inches, and it will be seen from the deck of a vessel 13 feet above the water a distance of about 10 nautical miles.

The objects of this light are to indicate the position of a dangerous shoal nearly 1½ miles from the shore, and to keep vessels clear of the coral reefs to the north-east and south-west of the Point.

HARBOR MAST LIGHTS.

One of these is placed as a leading light (red) at the Martello Tower at the mouth, and on the left bank of the Grand River; and the other (green) at Fort George, on Tonnelier Island.

GENERAL DIRECTIONS.

Vessels making the land from the eastward (windward) side of the Island, should give a berth of 2½ miles to the reefs off Amber Island and be careful not to approach the light on Flat Island on a course to the westward of N.W. by N. ½ N. until Gunner's Quoin bears west, when they may shape a mid channel course between Gunner's Quoin and Flat Island.

When to the westward of the Quoin the light at Cannonier Point will become visible and must be approached with the Flat Island Light bearing astern E.N.E. ½ N. until abreast of Cannonier Point, when that light will bear S.E. by S., a berth of rather more than 2 nautical miles being thus given to the dangerous reef and shoal

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off the Point. They may then haul up to S.W. by S. for the anchorage distant about 10 nautical miles, taking care to keep the Cannonier Point light white for a distance of 6½ miles when the Flat Island and Cannonier Point lights will appear in one—the change of this color to red within that distance will indicate a too near approach to the land.

The red light at the mouth of the Grand River will now be opened bearing S.S.W. for which vessels may safely steer until the mast light (green) upon Fort George on Tonnelier Island bears S.E. ½ S. when they may immediately let go the anchor, being on the best ground. A nearer approach to the light at Grand River would bring them too close to the reefs.

If the night is clear, the "Corps de Garde" Mountain will be clearly seen in line with the Grand River Light.

It is, however, generally advisable for vessels passing Cannonier Point at night to lay to, keeping sail occasionally upon the ship for the purpose of maintaining a good position for making the anchorage at daybreak, in preference to attempting it at night, by which, in a very few instances, any time will be gained. Considerable risk, as well as the necessity for anchoring outside at all, will also be thus avoided.

Instructions routières pour arriver au mouillage du Port Louis, île Maurice, d'après les feux récemment allumés sur l'île Plate et la Pointe aux Cannoniers, et les deux fanaux près de l'entrée du Port.

DESCRIPTION DES FEUX.

ILE PLATE.

Le feu de l'île Plate est de première classe, à réflecteurs et tournant. Il est placé à l'extrémité S.O., et la plus élevée de l'île, par la lat. 19° 53' 26'' S., et la long. 57° 38' 8'' à l'est de Greenwich.

La variation y est de 11° 47' 13'' O.

Son élévation, au dessus du niveau moyen de la mer est de 366 pieds, et il sera visible, par un temps clair, à environ 25 milles nautiques, l'œil étant à 13 pieds au dessus de la flottaison du navire.

POINTE AUX CANNONIERS.

Ce feu est de première classe, à réflecteurs et immobile. Il est situé par la lat. 20° 00' 35'' S., et la long. 52° 22' 39'' E., à une élévation de 39½ pieds au dessus du niveau moyen de la mer, et sera visible à environ 10 milles nautiques, l'œil étant à 13 pieds au dessus de la flottaison du navire.

Ce feu a pour objet d'indiquer la position d'un récif dangereux qui s'étend vis-à-vis, à près d'un mille un quart au large; et aussi de servir de point de relèvement pour éviter les écueils qui s'étendent au N.E. et au S.O. de la Pointe.

FANAUX DE LA RADE.

L'un d'eux (rouge) est mis comme feu de direction sur la Tour Martello, à la gauche de l'embouchure de la Grande Rivière; l'autre (vert), sur le Fort George à l'île au Tonneliers.

INSTRUCTIONS GENERALES.

Les navires qui atterrissent du côté de l'est (au vent) de l'île, devront passer à 2½ milles au large des récifs de l'île d'Ambro, et ne mettre le cap sur le feu de l'île Plate qu'après l'avoir relevé à l'Ouest du N.O. ¼ N. aussitôt qu'on aura le Coin de Mire à l'ouest, on laissera arriver jusqu'à passer au milieu du Canal entre le Coin de Mire et l'île Plate.

Le Coin de Mire doublé, le feu de la Pointe aux Canoniers s'apercevra; il faut s'en approcher avec le feu de l'île Plate relevant à l'arrière E.N.E., un demi quart nord. Ce Cap vous conduira par le travers de la Pointe, à deux milles au large du récif dangereux qui l'entoure; elle relèvera alors S.E. ¼ S. De là vous pourrez orienter au S.O. ¼ sud, sur le mouillage dont vous serez à peu près à dix milles, en ayant soin de vous conserver dans le rayon blanc du feu de la Pointe jusqu'à distance de 6½ milles; rendu là, vous aurez les feux de l'île Plate et de la Pointe aux Canoniers en ligne et celle-ci prendra une couleur rouge. Si vous rencontrez le rayon rouge avant d'avoir couru cette distance, ce sera preuve que vous aurez trop approché la terre.

Le fanal rouge à l'embouchure de la Grande Rivière paraîtra ensuite: relevez le au S.S.O., et courez dessus en toute sûreté jusqu'à faire porter le fanal vert de l'île aux Tonneliers par votre travers à bas bord: c'est à dire, au S.E. ¼ quart S.; vous serez alors au milieu du mouillage, avec 13 brasses d'eau.—En approchant davantage du fanal de la Grande Rivière vous vous mettrez trop près des récifs.

Si la nuit est belle, le milieu de la montagne du Corps de Garde se verra en ligne avec le fanal de la Grande Rivière au S.S.O. de la boussole.

Il est néanmoins généralement préférable la nuit de se tenir en travers, après avoir arrondi la Pointe aux Canoniers ne faisant servir seulement que pour se maintenir en position convenable. On évite par là beaucoup de risque, et quelquefois la nécessité même de mouiller en dehors du Port.
