LETTERS PATENT FOR INVENTION.

NOTICE is hereby given that HENRY EVANS BAKER, PHILIP GULLEY, HENRY WILLOUGHBY, and WILLIAM RULE, all of the Township of Sandhurst, in this Colony, have petitioned His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, under the provisions of the Act of Council, 17 Victoria, No. 15, intituled, "*An Act to regulate grants of Patents for Inventions in the Colony of Victoria,*" praying that Letters Patent may be granted unto them for the exclusive privilege, in the Colony of Victoria, of making, using and applying an Invention of an Improved Machine for the crushing of quartz and all other auriferous rocks, or deposits of auriferous metal, and extraction of the metal therefrom, of which Invention a specification and drawings have been deposited at this office.

NOTICE TO HEADS OF DEPARTMENTS.
REQUISITIONS.

THE Lieutenant Governor has been pleased to approve of the following Revised Regulations relative to requisitions for supplies heretofore furnished by the Civil Commissariat, and to direct the former regulations on the same subject to be cancelled:—

1. Requisitions for authorized supplies of all kinds are to be made upon the Colonial Storekeeper in the form annexed, and must be signed by the Officer in charge, and by the Head of the Department.

2. The requisitions for general stores are to be made quarterly, on the 1st January, 1st April, 1st July, 1st October, respectively; and Heads of Departments are hereby expressly enjoined to transmit their applications to the Colonial Storekeeper in due time, and to make provision for the requirements of the subsequent three months. Fourteen days after the receipt of the requisition the supplies will be furnished.

3. The requisitions for forage are to be rendered on the 25th of each month, for the service of the month ensuing.

4. Provisions will be supplied as heretofore upon a daily voucher, covered by a monthly requisition.

5. The Storekeeper, unless with the especial sanction of the Lieutenant Governor, is on no account to furnish supplies to any department by which timely provision—as directed by these regulations—shall have been neglected.

6. Such articles only are to be placed in requisition as are allowed by the regulations of the Government Service for the time being, or as are indispensable for the proper conduct of the public service; and in all cases the size, weight, measurement, or quantity is to be given, as well as a correct description of the articles.

7. On receiving requisitions completed in conformity with these regulations, the Storekeeper is to report as to the cost of the articles for the approval of the Lieutenant Governor.

DEPASTURE LICENSES, 1855.

The Lieutenant Governor directs it to be notified to the Occupants of Crown Lands as follows:—

1. The License Fees for the current year are payable at the Colonial Treasury on or before the 31st of March now next ensuing.
2. After the said 31st of March, License Fees will not be received at the Treasury, unless within sixty days thence next ensuing, and upon payment of an additional sum equal to one-fourth of the amount of the License Fee.
3. Defaulters who shall not have made such payment within sixty days as last aforesaid will absolutely forfeit their claims to leases and right to further occupation of their Runs, according to the 5th Section of Chapter 2 of the Order in Council.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE KILMORE GENERAL CEMETERY.

1. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.
2. By the 8th section of the Act, any persons making a vault or erecting and placing a monument in the Cemetery by and with the permission of the Trustees under these rules, and upon the payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the tenor of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons and his or their representatives for ever.
3. Application for such permission to be made at the office of Trustees: a certificate of permission in the form set out in the schedule will be granted to the party applying for such permission on payment of the charges in the schedule.
4. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on the certificate of a minister of religion or other evidence, proving to the satisfaction of the Trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relatives and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.
5. Order for interment will be received by the sexton or by any of the Trustees.

6. The Trustees will cause all graves to be dug, but parties requiring brick graves will be requested to construct them under the direction of the Trustees.

7. A form of application for burial, containing the name, age, late place of residence of the deceased, will be provided and must be filled up where practicable, and entered in the interment book in same form.

8. The time fixed for the funeral must be the time when the procession is to be at the Cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

9. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals will be from ten A.M. to six o'clock P.M. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from ten o'clock A.M. to four o'clock P.M. in the other four months, except on Sundays, when the usual and only hours for funerals will be from two to five o'clock P.M. throughout the year.

10. All monuments, vaults, graves, and grave-stones, to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

11. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in and cemented closely or covered by a slab of stone or iron.

12. A plan of every monument and a copy of every inscription to be submitted to the Trustees for their approval.

13. The plans of all fences to be submitted to the Trustees: all wooden fencing must be after a model to be seen on application.

14. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the Trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

15. The ground will be open daily to the public from sunrise to sunset.

16. A plan of the Cemetery, shewing the situation of the purchased and other graves, is kept at the office and may be inspected at the charge set out in the schedule. A register of all grounds is kept by the Secretary.

17. The keeper has orders to turn out or take into custody, as the case may require, any person who shall be intoxicated, behave indecorously, or commit any trespass or injury to the trees, flowers, or erections, or otherwise infringe the Act of Council relating to the Cemetery or the regulations for the protection of the same, and such person will be proceeded against according to the provisions of the 14th section of the Act.

18. The Trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.

19. No dogs will be allowed to enter the Cemetery.

PRAHRAN.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria, No. 15, the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct the publication of the substance and prayer of a Petition to His Excellency, signed by six hundred and ninety-six landowners and householders of the district commonly called and known as "Prahran," in the County of Bourke, setting forth—

The urgent necessity which exists for the immediate operation of the said Act in the district which they represent. The Petitioners state—

"That in order to make a municipality efficient, and to enable it practically to work successfully for the benefit of its inhabitants, as well as to become conducive to general purposes of utility, stability in its resources must form a primary element in its constitution, to secure which your Petitioners would venture to point out the following as the limits or boundaries of the municipal district under which your Petitioners seek to be incorporated, namely:—

"Commencing at the north-east angle of the Botanic Gardens, on the south bank of the River Yarra Yarra; thence south by the eastern boundary of the Botanic Gardens to the Domain Road; thence west by the southern boundary of the said Botanic Gardens to the main road between Melbourne and Brighton; thence south-east by the eastern side of the main Brighton Road to the Junction Hotel; thence south-east by the eastern side of a road one chain wide, to the south-west angle of portion LXVIIIg, parish of Prahran; thence east by the northern side of a road one chain wide to the south-east

angle of portion CCB, parish of Prahran; thence north by the western side of a road one chain wide to the River Yarra Yarra, and by that river to the commencing point aforesaid."

The Petitioners further state—

"That the parish of Prahran, as laid down in the maps of the Government survey, includes the abovementioned district and a much larger territory over and above, and that the proposed district is considerably less than the area limited by the said Act."

The Petitioners also state as follows:—

"That from the circumstance of the entire district defined as aforesaid being more or less inhabited, and the fact of the portions principally settled upon, forming integral parts of the said parish of Prahran, together with their contiguity to and close connection with each other, it seems not only practicable, but highly expedient that that they should be amalgamated and formed into one township."

IN pursuance of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria, No. 15, the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct the publication of the substance and prayer of a Petition to His Excellency, signed by three hundred and forty landowners and householders of "Windsor, St. Kilda without the City and other portions of the southern division of the parish of Prahran," in the County of Bourke, setting forth—

That the petitioners are desirous that that portion of the southern division of the parish of Prahran, hereinafter described, be proclaimed as the Township of "Windsor," and submit the following boundaries:—

"On the north commencing at a point where the natural gully crosses the Brighton Road, in an easterly direction along the centre of a street known as Union-street to a Government road bounding Jackson's Paddock, and marked on plan LXVI; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of a Government road to a Government road known as the Glen Huntly Road; thence in westerly direction along the centre of the said Glen Huntly Road to the shore of Port Phillip Bay; thence in a northerly direction along the centre of a Government road known as the Punt Road, to

SANDRIDGE.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria, No. 15, the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct the publication of the substance and prayer of a Petition to His Excellency, signed by two hundred and seven householders, resident in the district commonly called and known as "Sandridge," South Melbourne, in the County of Bourke, stating, among things, that the petitioners presented a memorial to the late Lieutenant Governor, expressing a desire to have the control over their local affairs; that such memorial was favorably received, and representations made that the necessary measures would be adopted for granting its request; and adding—

"That at the time the said memorial was presented, your petitioners, not being on the Electoral Roll, were unrepresented in the proceedings

of the Corporation of Melbourne; but subsequently the said Corporation has been assisted by the Government in borrowing a large sum of money; and your petitioners have cause to fear their interests were overlooked in reference to that loan, inasmuch as the people of Sandridge having been promised separate local government previous to the said Corporation receiving the assistance of the Government; your petitioners reasonably expected they would have been protected from any liabilities on account thereof, more particularly as they had no voice in the raising or expending the said loan, nor had any benefit whatever from it."

The Prayer is as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray your Excellency will be pleased to interpose, so that the influence and authority of the Government may be exerted to shield them from so great an injustice.

"And, further, your petitioners hereby declare their desire that the provisions of the aforesaid Municipalities Act should be extended to them at the earliest possible period, and humbly pray that your Excellency will be pleased, for that purpose, to proclaim the area contained within the following boundaries a Municipal District, that is to say:—Commencing at the Sandridge public pier, running westerly to the junction of the river Yarra Yarra with Hobson's Bay; bounded by Hobson's Bay from the said junction, up the said river to a point on the bank of the said river, opposite the Gas Works; bounded by the river Yarra Yarra from such said point to the Sandridge Road, at a point on the said road about ten chains from the head of the Sandridge Lagoon, in the direction of Emerald Hill; bounded by a straight line from the latter-named point to the boundary of the proposed park, at its junction with a certain place described on the Government Survey Maps as Dundas Place; bounded by a straight line along Dundas Place, by the boundary of the proposed park, to the three-chains-wide road proposed to be made, as laid down in the Government Survey Maps; by the said road to the sea-beach, and from the point where the said road terminates at the sea-beach along the beach to the commencing point, namely, the Sandridge public pier; which said boundaries are shown on the accompanying map, and therein marked red.

"Your petitioners would further state, that the boundary laid down on the map includes the Sandridge Lagoon and Public Baths, also the only spot of rising ground in the township, namely, the hill on which the Customs' officer resides. In reference to the Lagoon, your petitioners consider it ought fairly to be included within their boundary; because, in making their purchases of land of the Government, many of your petitioners have been swayed in their selection by considering the proximity of the Lagoon gave a value to their purchases, whereas the same reasons cannot be urged in favor of a claim thereto by the people of any other district. And your petitioners humbly hope that these facts will meet with the consideration of your Excellency in connection with the prayer of their petition."

AMENDED RULES OF THE SUPREME COURT.

NOS. 7, 19, AND 22 OF CHAPTER IV.

THE Lieutenant Governor has directed the following General Rules of the Supreme Court to be published, the same having lain on the Table of the Legislative Council for the full term, in pursuance of the Act of Council, 15 Victoria, No. 10.

REGULÆ GENERALIS.

Dated the fourth day of December, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.

That the Seventh Rule of Chapter Four of the present Rules of Court be repealed, and that in lieu thereof it be ordered as follows:—

That when any defendant has failed to plead within the time limited for pleading, and the plaintiff is not enabled to sign final judgment, but is desirous to assess damages, he may file in the office of the Prothonotary the original summons, and no interlocutory judgment for want of a plea shall be signed, but the filing of the original summons shall have the like effect as signing interlocutory judgment.

That the Nineteenth Rule of Chapter Four of the present Rules of Court be repealed, and that in lieu thereof it be ordered as follows:—

That when damages are to be assessed, or an issue or issues tried in any action, the Prothonotary shall deliver the original summons, or the roll of the pleadings filed in his office, to the Associate of the Judge before whom the assessment or trial is to take place, who shall receive the same, and after the damages are assessed or trial had, the Associate shall note the result on the summons or roll, and return the same to the office of the Prothonotary, and at the time when either party may be entitled to sign final judgment, the result of the assessment or trial, and judgment of the Court thereon, shall be entered on the summons or roll by the Prothonotary, which shall thereupon become the final judgment of the Court.

That the Twenty-second Rule of Chapter Four of the present Rules of Court be repealed, and that in lieu thereof it be ordered as follows:—

That whenever in any action of ejectment the defendant, or person entitled to defend possession of the property claimed, shall not plead within the time limited for pleading, the plaintiff may file in the office of the Prothonotary the original summons, and sign final judgment thereon, tax his costs, and issue execution to recover possession, as also execution to recover his costs of suit; and whenever in any such action the plaintiff may have also sought to recover mesne profits, and demanded in his declaration damages for the wrongful possession of the premises, and the defendant, or person entitled to defend possession of the property claimed, shall not have pleaded within the time limited for pleading, and the plaintiff shall have filed the original summons in the office of the Prothonotary, and signed final judgment thereon to entitle him to recover the possession, he may file in the office of the Prothonotary an affidavit of the amount of such damages then due, and thereupon sign final judgment likewise on such original summons for his mesne profits, tax his costs, and issue execution; and if in any such action brought to recover possession of premises the defendant shall have pleaded and the plaintiff appear at the trial, and the defendant do not appear, the plaintiff shall be entitled to a verdict without adducing any evidence, and shall have judgment for his costs of suit as in other cases; and if in any such action the plaintiff shall have also sought to recover mesne profits and demanded in his declaration damages for the wrongful possession of the premises, and the defendant shall have pleaded, and the plaintiff appear at the trial, and the defendant do not appear, the plaintiff shall be entitled to a verdict to recover possession as well as to his costs of suit, without adducing any evidence, and also to assess his damages at the same time before the same jury as in ordinary cases.

SUPPLY OF FUEL TO GOVERNMENT
OFFICERS IN COUNTY DISTRICTS.

Each Department will obtain and pay for such quantities as may be needed for the public officers, or for the public requirements, under existing contracts, where such have been entered into; and where no contracts are in force, in such manner as may be deemed by the resident Commissioner to be most economical.

4. In isolated cases where the purchase of Fuel for the Police or others may be indispensable, the weekly consumption at the public expense will be limited to six cubic feet per man in winter, and four cubic feet per man in summer.

5. No demand for payment will be sanctioned which is not in accordance with the foregoing regulations.

4. In isolated cases where the purchase of Water for the police or others may be indispensable, the consumption at the public expense shall be limited to a scale of one gallon per man per day.

5. No demand for payment will be sanctioned which is not in accordance with the foregoing regulations.

IMPORTATION OF ARMS INTO NEW ZEALAND.

THE Lieutenant Governor has been pleased to direct the publication of the following proclamation, by request of the Officer administering the Government of New Zealand.

ARMS IMPORTATION ORDINANCE.

(Passed the 13th day of December, 1845.)

In the ninth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.—Session VI. No. 1.

"An Ordinance to empower the Governor of New Zealand to regulate the Importation and Sale of Arms, Gunpowder, and other warlike Stores."

Preamble.

Whereas certain tribes of the native race of New Zealand have taken up arms against the Queen's sovereign authority: And whereas for the purpose of effectually subduing the present insurrection, and of preventing the recurrence of an armed resistance to the authority of Her Majesty, and of securing the peace and good order of the Colony, it is expedient that restrictions should, on fitting occasions, be placed on the importation and sale of arms, gunpowder, and other warlike stores within the same: Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows, that is to say:—

Power to Governor to prohibit the Importation of Arms, &c.

1. It shall be lawful for His Excellency the Governor from time to time, as to him shall seem meet, by proclamation, to prohibit throughout the Colony, or within any district thereof (to be in such proclamation defined), the importation or sale, or both the importation and sale, of arms, gunpowder, and other warlike stores.

And to regulate the Sale thereof.

2. It shall also be lawful for His Excellency the Governor from time to time, as to him shall seem meet, by proclamation, to make provision for regulating and restricting throughout the Colony, or within any district thereof (to be in such proclamation defined), the importation or sale, or both the importation and sale, of arms, gunpowder, and other warlike stores.

Penalty on Importer.

3. Every person who shall import or bring into the Colony any arms, gunpowder, or other warlike stores (whether the owner thereof or not), and who shall wilfully and knowingly, and contrary to the provisions of any such proclamation as aforesaid, land or dispose of, or cause or permit to be landed or otherwise disposed of, such arms, gunpowder, or other warlike stores, or any part thereof, shall for every such offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding £500, to be recovered in a summary way. And any arms, gunpowder, or other warlike stores, which shall have been imported and landed, or otherwise disposed of, contrary to the provisions of any such proclamation as aforesaid, shall be forfeited to Her Majesty, and may be seized by any Justice of the Peace or peace officer, or by any officer of Her Majesty's Customs, or by any person duly authorised and appointed in writing by His Excellency the Governor.

Penalty on Master of Vessel.—Vessel, &c., to be forfeited.

4. The master or person commanding the ship or vessel in which such arms, gunpowder, or other warlike stores shall have been imported, if he shall wilfully and knowingly, and contrary to the provisions of any such proclamation as aforesaid, land, or dispose of, or cause or permit to be landed or otherwise disposed of, such arms, gunpowder, and other warlike stores, or any part thereof, shall

also, for every such offence, forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding 500*l.*, to be recovered in a summary way. And upon the conviction of any such master or person, such ship or vessel, with all her furniture and apparel, shall be forfeited to Her Majesty, and may be seized by any Justice of the Peace or peace officer, or by any officer of Her Majesty's Customs, or by any person duly authorised and appointed by His Excellency the Governor.

Penalty for unlawfully selling arms, &c. Arms, &c., to be forfeited.

5. Every person who shall wilfully and knowingly, and contrary to the provisions of any such proclamation as aforesaid, sell or dispose of any arms, gunpowder, or other warlike stores, shall for every such offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding 500*l.*, to be recovered in a summary way; and all arms, gunpowder, and other warlike stores, so unlawfully sold or disposed of, shall be forfeited to Her Majesty, and may be seized in manner hereinbefore provided.

Power to search.

6. It shall be lawful for any Justice of the Peace to enter and search, or to grant a warrant to any person or persons to enter and search any house, place, ship, or vessel, where such Justice shall, from information on oath, have reasonable grounds to suspect any arms, gunpowder, or other warlike stores, to be deposited for any purpose contrary to this ordinance.

Reward for activity in procuring Convictions.

7. In case of any conviction under the provisions of this ordinance, where any person or persons shall appear to have been active in, or towards the procuring of any such conviction, it shall be lawful for His Excellency the Governor to award to such person or persons such portion of the penalty recovered upon such conviction, but not exceeding in the whole one-half thereof, as to him shall seem meet.

Interpretation Clause.

8. For the purposes of this ordinance, the word "Governor" shall be taken to include the "Lieutenant Governor," or the "Officer administering the Government" of the Colony for the time being; and the word "Vessel" shall be taken to include any boat, barge, punt, or canoe.

LOCAL PAYMENT OF PURCHASE
MONEY FOR CROWN LANDS.

THE Lieutenant Governor has been pleased to authorize the following Regulations, with a view of affording facility to purchasers of Crown Lands at sales held in the Country Districts, to complete the payment of their purchase money at the place of sale, it being understood that they apply only to places where a Gold Receiver's Office or branch of one of the Government Banks is established:—

1. Purchasers of Crown Lands may pay the whole amount of their purchase money to the Police Magistrate, or other officer conducting the sale, at once, if they desire to do so, instead of the deposit of ten per cent. usually taken.

2. Balances of purchase money may be afterwards paid to the officer conducting the sale on the purchaser intimating at the time of sale his intention to do so.

3. Advice of such intention should be given to the Colonial Treasurer or Sub-Treasurer by the officer who forwards the report of sale, so as to prevent the possibility of a balance being twice paid.

4. No such balance would be received at the Treasury or Sub-Treasury, unless it be shown that it has not been paid at the place of sale.

5. The officer conducting the sale will name a day when balances will be received by him, and will forward the same in one remittance in cash by Escort, or by Bank draft procured at par, together with a list of particulars of the balances, which he will transmit in time to ensure their arrival at the Treasury or Sub-Treasury (as the case may be) within the month after the day of sale prescribed by law for the receipt of such balances.

6. The usual Treasury receipts for the balances will be forwarded to the officer who conducted the sale for delivery to the parties entitled to them.

**RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE
PILOT BOARD.**

THE Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to approve of the following Rules and Regulations made by the Pilot Board in conformity with the Act of Council, 17 Victoria, No. 28, sec. 12.

By His Excellency's Command,
J. 13,007. WILLIAM C. HAINES.

By virtue of the authority vested in the Pilot Board of Victoria, by clause 12, of Act No. 28, of 17 Victoria, the following Rules for the regulation of the Pilot service have been adopted.

Meeting of Board.

1. That the Pilot Board shall meet on the fifteenth of every month (or on the day following should the fifteenth fall on a Sunday) for the transaction of general business. But the President may convene a special meeting at any intermediate time, in the event of such being necessary.

Transmission of Pilotage by Customs' Department.

2. That all monies received for pilotage shall be transmitted by the Collector of Customs on or before the seventh of each month, accompanied by a tabular list, containing each vessel's name, tonnage, and date of entrance inwards and clearance outwards.

Accounts.

3. That all accounts shall be made up by the Secretary, balanced by the twelfth of each month, and laid before the Board at the next general meeting.

Mode of receipt and payment of monies by the Board.

4. That all monies received under the Act by which the Pilot Board is constituted shall be paid into the English, Scottish and Australian Chartered Bank, and that all payments duly authorised by the Board be made by cheque, signed by the President, and registered by the Secretary prior to issue.

Classification of pilots and promotion.

5. That the pilots now licensed shall be divided, as at present, into two classes, senior and junior, the senior to pilot ships of all draughts, the junior being limited to vessels of not more than sixteen feet draught of water; such juniors to be promoted at the expiration of twelve months, if considered competent for such promotion by the Pilot Board on examination.

Such pilots as may hereafter be admitted shall also remain in the junior class for twelve months before they are entitled to pass for promotion to the higher grade.

Appointment of harbor pilots.

6. That a sufficient number of harbor pilots be appointed by the Board, the said harbor pilots providing the necessary boats, &c., but not being liable to a share of the expenses of the sea pilots' working establishment.

Division of sea pilots to be regulated by the Board.

7. That the sea pilots shall be kept divided between the Heads and the two ports, as from time to time the exigencies of the service shall appear to the Pilot Board to demand.

Number and equipment of pilot vessels.

8. That there shall be three pilot vessels suitably equipped, each sea pilot taking an equal share in each vessel, the entire expenditure thereof to be borne by the sea pilots only.

Stations of pilot vessels.

9. The pilot vessels shall be stationed as under-mentioned, and relieve each other as circumstances may require:—

Outermost Station—Definition of limits of.

The outermost station, or cruising ground, shall comprise all that space in the general track of inward bound vessels included without a line bearing south-east half east by compass from Barwon Head, the outer boundary of such station being twenty miles outside a line drawn from Point Lonsdale to Point Nepean, always keeping, when under weigh, in the general trade of inward bound vessels.

Innermost Station—Limits of.

The innermost station, or cruising ground, shall be also in the general track of all such vessels, its outer limit being a line bearing south-east half east by compass from Barwon Head, and its inner limits a line drawn from Point Lonsdale to Point Nepean.

Outer vessel to be always on her station.

10. The outside pilot vessel shall be always on her station, to board all inward bound ships within her limits; but in case of all her pilots being berthed, the inner vessel shall proceed immediately to the outer station on a signal being made requiring her so to do.

Inner vessel to be receiving vessel, &c.

11. The vessel on the inner station shall receive on board all pilots from outward bound ships, and shall also supply any ship with a pilot that the outer pilot vessel may have allowed to escape her.

Duties of outermost vessel.

12. In the case of all pilots being shipped, the last vessel on the station shall remain outside until relieved by the other pilot vessel, to give assistance and information to inward bound vessels, and to pick up outward pilots.

Pilot vessels to have necessary signals, &c.

13. Each pilot vessel shall be always provided with a complete code of Marryatt's signals and signal book, with other necessary flags and night signals, for the purpose of signaling to and warning vessels running into danger.

Pilots to join pilot vessels when wanted.

14. When the pilot vessels come inside the Heads, with the Jack up, the pilots on turn at Shortland's Bluff shall lose no time in proceeding on board.

Pilots to receive all their earnings, &c.

15. Each pilot shall receive his individual earnings, subject to such proportionate deduction towards the support of the pilot establishment as the Board may direct.

Pilots to have turns in the order they report themselves.

16. Each pilot shall claim his turn according to the time of day at which he reports himself as ready for duty on board the pilot vessel outside the Heads.

Passengers to have precedence of turn.

17. A pilot arriving at either station as passenger shall be in turn before any pilots that may have brought ships in or out on that day; and no pilot in pilotage charge of a vessel shall interfere with or offer any obstruction to pilots obtaining passages in such vessel.

Pilots to be formed into companies—Privileges and duties thereof.—(16 Vict., No. 12, § 16.)

18. The sea pilots shall be formed into companies of five, who shall have the privilege of piloting outwards all vessels they may have piloted inwards; and on due application being made for an outward pilot for any such vessels, and the inward pilot not available for appointment, the pilot first on turn of such company shall be appointed to her; and should there be no pilot belonging to such company at the station, or should the vessel requiring a pilot not belong to any company, the pilot first on turn belonging to any other company shall be appointed. Pilots so appointed are immediately to repair on board, and are not to leave the vessel, if she is ready, without the written permission of the master, unless in case of severe sickness; but should she not be ready, the pilot must obtain a written statement to that effect from the master or officer in charge, and immediately report himself at the Pilot Office as eligible for the next vessel applying for a pilot.

Nearest vessels to be attended first, unless in case of distress.

19. Pilots cruising or standing out to sea shall offer their services to the vessel nearest them, unless another vessel be observed running into danger, in which case every exertion shall be made to board and assist her.

Penalty in refusing to aid vessels in distress.

20. Any pilot refusing or wilfully omitting to aid a vessel in distress shall forfeit his license.

Pilots going to and fro as passengers to use quickest method.

21. Pilots having to proceed to or from the Heads on duty shall do so by the quickest available mode of conveyance.

Penalty of neglecting or refusing to act, or for illegal combinations.—(16 Vict., No. 12, § 16.)

22. Any pilot neglecting or refusing to act, unless disqualified by illness, shall forfeit his license; and any combination effected or attempted to prevent other pilots from doing their duty, shall be visited by a similar penalty.

Pilots to relinquish charge of one ship for another, if required.—(16 Vict., No. 12, § 16.)

23. No pilot, having taken pilotage charge of a vessel afterwards proving to be not ready, shall refuse to take any other vessel if ready, and waiting for a pilot, on his being required to do so by proper authority.

Pilots only to act in conformity with license, unless in certain cases

24. No pilot shall take charge of a ship as a pilot otherwise than as his license empowers him, unless, in the case of inward bound ships, there shall be no senior pilot in the first pilot vessel that may board such ships, in which case the junior pilot next on turn shall take charge, and a signal be made to the inner pilot vessel to supply a senior pilot, to whom, on boarding, the charge of the vessel shall be delivered; the pilot first in charge not losing his turn by such supercession.

Pilots to keep distinguishing flag flying while in charge.

25. Whenever any vessel shall be in pilotage charge, the pilot shall invariably keep his distinguishing flag flying from sunrise to sunset, or during such times as the vessel may be under weigh.

Inside pilots, taking charge of a vessel, to go out as far as possible.

26. Pilots about to take charge of a vessel approaching the Heads with the signal for a pilot flying (such vessel having passed the outer stations), shall proceed out as far as possible, with his distinguishing flag flying from the bow of the boat in the daytime, and shall show a flash light at night; and, whenever circumstances will permit, the boat shall be placed in such a position as may serve the vessel for a leading mark in.

Pilots not to interfere, when passengers, unless requested.

27. Should a pilot at any time be taking a passage on board a vessel, he shall not in any way interfere with, nor make comments on, the proceedings of the pilot in charge of such vessel, unless his advice or opinion be specially requested by such pilot in charge, or unless extraordinary circumstances render such interference necessary, and then only at the written request of the master.

Certificate of pilotage to be filled up and forwarded to Pilot Office. Certificate to be endorsed by pilot.

28. A certificate of pilotage shall be filled up by the master of each vessel piloted, and immediately on her arrival shall be forwarded or delivered by the pilot to the Secretary to the Pilot Board or at the Pilot Office, and such pilots shall be particularly careful in stating whether it be inside or outside pilotage, and also whether the services of a steam tug have been rendered, and to what extent.

Outward bound pilot not to allow ship to fall to leeward of port.

29. Any pilot having charge of a ship proceeding outside the Heads, shall be cautious that he does not allow her to fall to leeward of the port, but shall steer for the inner pilot vessel, and keep the ship under easy sail until taken out by a pilot boat.

Duties of pilot in charge of outward bound vessel having only paid to the Heads.

30. In the event of an outward bound ship having only paid inside pilotage, the pilot is to hoist his usual flag, and conduct the ship as near the Heads as possible, and to be particularly careful that his flag is hauled down before he leaves the ship.

Pilots not to conduct ships out until pilotage be paid.—(16 Vict., No. 12, § 13.)

31. The pilot shall before taking charge of a vessel outward bound, demand a sight of the Customs' clearance, in order to see if the certificate of pilotage be duly endorsed thereon, and should such fail to be the case, immediate intimation shall be given to that effect at the Pilot Office. The certificate will state whether inside or outside pilotage has been paid, and the vessel is to be piloted accordingly.

Pilots to report themselves on arrival, and also to report extraordinary circumstances.

32. The pilots shall immediately on their arrival inwards at Williamstown or Geelong, and landing, fill up and sign their report in a book to be kept open at the Pilot Office for such purpose, and also report in writing for the information of the Board, any extraordinary circumstances that may have occurred on board whilst under pilotage charge.

Lead lines and leads to be examined and attended to, as also steering gear.

33. Pilots shall at all times, when they take charge of a ship, see that the lead lines in use be properly marked and adapted for service, and that the lead be kept regularly going, and also that the steering apparatus be in order.

Duties of sea pilots piloting ships into Geelong and Hobson's Bay.

34. Every pilot who shall be employed to pilot or conduct a vessel into Geelong shall take the same (her draught of water admitting) to such anchorage or wharf as the master or other person in charge (subject to the orders of the Harbor Master) shall require, or so near thereto as he can safely get, and there moor such vessel in a proper situation; and every pilot who shall be employed to pilot or conduct a vessel into Hobson's Bay, shall remain in charge until relieved by a harbor pilot—the sea pilot's limit being a line bearing east south-east by compass from the black buoy off Gellibrand's Point, where the harbor pilot shall take charge, and conduct the vessel to a proper anchorage for discharge, and there moor her properly before leaving, such harbor pilots always bearing in mind that the nearest vessels are to be boarded first.

Penalty for drunkenness, improper conduct, negligence, &c.—(16 Vict., No. 12, § 16.)

35. A pilot having charge of any vessel shall observe strict sobriety and civility, and if found guilty of improper or unbecoming language or conduct, or shall through negligence, incapacity, or unskillfulness, in any manner occasion injury to such vessel as he may have charge of, or to any other vessel, he shall be liable to such penalty as the Board may direct.

Pilots to take charge of H.M. Ships if ordered by Harbor Master.

36. Any pilot who shall receive an order from the Harbor Master or his deputy, to take pilotage charge of any of Her Majesty's outward bound ships, or ships of any description in Her Majesty's service, shall immediately repair on board and assume such charge, remaining on board until it is intimated to him by proper authority that his services are no longer required.

H.M. Ships and Mail Packets, inward bound, to have preference over other vessels.

37. With reference to the foregoing rule, pilots are to bear in mind that inward bound vessels in Her Majesty's service, and mail packets shall always obtain the preference over other vessels, unless such other vessels shall be in danger, and in urgent need of assistance.

Method of appointment of pilots.

38. In the event of any additional pilots being required for the service, notice shall be inserted in the *Government Gazette* and daily journals, calling for persons considering themselves properly qualified to act as such, to forward to the Pilot Board a written notice of their intention to apply for a license, accompanied by certificates of character, when, if such be deemed satisfactory by the Board, a day will be appointed for examining into the fitness of all candidates, at which examination one or more senior pilots shall always be present.

Pilots to observe all Port Rules.—(16 Vict., No. 12, § 18.)

39. Pilots shall strictly observe all Port Regulations connected with their duties that are now or may hereafter be in force.

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License not to be lent.—(Penalty.)

40. No pilot shall lend his license to any person on any pretence whatever, under penalty of dismissal.

Pilots to enter into a bond.

41. All pilots shall enter into a bond in the sum £100 for the due and faithful discharge of their duty.

Method to be adopted in making complaints regarding the Pilot Service.

42. All complaints by or against any one connected with the pilot service, must be forwarded in writing to the President of the Pilot Board, within seven days of the occurrence of the same, otherwise such complaint will not be entertained, unless at the discretion of the Pilot Board. The President shall, on any such complaint being made to him in accordance with this rule, if the subject require immediate investigation, call a special meeting of the Board, giving the various persons concerned in the case due notice to appear at such meeting.

Punishments for breach of regulations, &c., by pilots.—(16 Vict., No. 12, § 16.)

43. Any pilot being guilty of habitual intoxication, or becoming intoxicated whilst in charge of a vessel, or committing any serious breach of these regulations, or charged with any gross misconduct affecting the character of the service, shall be immediately suspended by the President, or, in his absence, by a member of the Pilot Board, pending an investigation into the case at the next meeting of the Board.

Pilots to be in possession of Rules and License, &c.

44. Every pilot shall be in possession of his license and a copy of the foregoing rules, and shall produce the same for reference if required so to do by the master of any vessel of which such pilot may be in charge.




