POLICE DISTRICT OF WARRNAMBOOL.

The county of Heytesbury and that portion of the county of Villiers comprised within the following limits, viz.:—

Commencing at the north-western angle of the Town Reserve of Woolsthorpe, thence by the northern boundary of that Reserve and a line due east to the River Hopkins, thence by the River Hopkins to its embouchure at Warrnambool Bay; thence by the sea coast in a westerly direction as far as the main road from Belfast leading through William Rutledge's Special Survey, by that road in a northerly direction to the Town Reserve of Woolsthorpe, and by a portion of the southern and by the western boundary of that Reserve to commencing point.

SUPPLY OF FUEL TO GOVERNMENT OFFICERS IN COUNTRY DISTRICTS.

THE mode in which Fuel has been supplied to officers and other persons in the Government service throughout the county districts, having been brought to the notice of the Lieutenant Governor, the attention of such officers and persons is hereby directed to the following regulations, viz.:—

1. The issue of Fuel for private purposes in all the departments will be discontinued from the 1st of March next, except in special cases and under special authority.
2. Fatigue parties of the police, whenever practicable, will be told off to obtain such quantities as may be required for the force.
3. Each Department will obtain and pay for such quantities as may be needed for the public offices, or for the public requirements, under existing contracts, where such have been entered into; and where no contracts are in force, in such manner as may be deemed by the resident Commissioner to be most economical.
4. In isolated cases where the purchase of Fuel for the Police or others may be indispensable, the weekly consumption at the public expense will be limited to six cubic feet per man in winter, and four cubic feet per man in summer.
5. No demand for payment will be sanctioned which is not in accordance with the foregoing regulations.

THE mode in which Water has been supplied to officers and other persons in the Government service throughout the county districts having been brought to the notice of the Lieutenant Governor, the attention of such officers and persons is hereby directed to the following regulations, viz.:—

1. The issue of Water for private purposes will be discontinued in all the departments from the 1st of March next, except in special cases under special authority.
2. Fatigue parties of the police, wherever practicable, will be told off to obtain such quantities as may be required for the force.
3. Each department will obtain and pay for such quantities as may be needed for the public offices or for the public requirements, under existing contracts, where such have been entered into; and where no contracts are in force, in such manner as may be deemed by the Resident Commissioner to be most economical.
4. In isolated cases where the purchase of Water for the police or others may be indispensable, the consumption at the public expense shall be limited to a scale of one gallon per man per day.
5. No demand for payment will be sanctioned which is not in accordance with the foregoing regulations.

EAST COLLINGWOOD.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria, No. 15, the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct the publication of the substance and prayer of a Petition to His Excellency, signed by four hundred and four householders, resident in the district commonly called and known as "East Collingwood," in the County of Bourke, setting forth—

"The urgent necessity that exists for immediate steps being taken to prevent the streets becoming altogether impassable, and much suffering being thus entailed upon the inhabitants."

And praying His Excellency "to proclaim the district within the following boundaries a township, viz.:—Commencing in Smith-street at its junction with Victoria-parade, bearing north in a direct line to the Merri Creek, following its course to the Yarra Yarra, along the Yarra Yarra to the bottom of Simpson's-road, bearing west to the point of commencement."

PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTI- TUTIONS.

PRAHRAN.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria, No. 15, the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct the publication of the substance and prayer of a Petition to His Excellency, signed by six hundred and ninety-six landowners and householders of the district commonly called and known as "Prahran," in the County of Bourke, setting forth—

The urgent necessity which exists for the immediate operation of the said Act in the district which they represent. The Petitioners state—

"That in order to make a municipality efficient, and to enable it practically to work successfully for the benefit of its inhabitants, as well as to become conducive to general purposes of utility, stability in its resources must form a primary element in its constitution, to secure which your Petitioners would venture to point out the following as the limits or boundaries of the municipal district under which your Petitioners seek to be incorporated, namely:—

"Commencing at the north-east angle of the Botanic Gardens, on the south bank of the River Yarra Yarra; thence south by the eastern boundary of the Botanic Gardens to the Domain Road; thence west by the southern boundary of the said Botanic Gardens to the main road between Melbourne and Brighton; thence south-east by the eastern side of the main Brighton Road to the Junction Hotel; thence south-east by the eastern side of a road one chain wide, to the south-west angle of portion LXVIIIg,

parish of Prahran; thence east by the northern side of a road one chain wide to the south-east angle of portion CCLb, parish of Prahran; thence north by the western side of a road one chain wide to the River Yarra Yarra, and by that river to the commencing point aforesaid."

The Petitioners further state—

"That the parish of Prahran, as laid down in the maps of the Government survey, includes the abovementioned district and a much larger territory over and above, and that the proposed district is considerably less than the area limited by the said Act."

The Petitioners also state as follows:—

"That from the circumstance of the entire district defined as aforesaid being more or less inhabited, and the fact of the portions principally settled upon, forming integral parts of the said parish of Prahran, together with their contiguity to and close connection with each other, it seems not only practicable, but highly expedient that that they should be amalgamated and formed into one township."

"That your Petitioners feel fully persuaded that to restrict the district to narrower limits than the above would be to neutralize a large amount of good which would otherwise result from a hearty and united co-operation of the inhabitants of that district under the Municipal Authorities Act."

And the Petitioners pray as follows:—

"That the beforementioned boundaries may be constituted the limits of the municipal district of Prahran, and that your Excellency will be pleased to issue the necessary proclamation for erecting it into a municipality, and defining the limits accordingly."

PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.

SOUTHERN PRAHRAN AND WINDSOR.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria, No. 15, the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct the publication of the substance and prayer of a Petition to His Excellency, signed by three hundred and forty landowners and householders of "Windsor, St. Kilda without the City and other portions of the southern division of the parish of Prahran," in the County of Bourke, setting forth—

That the petitioners are desirous that that portion of the southern division of the parish of Prahran, hereinafter described, be proclaimed as the Township of "Windsor," and submit the following boundaries:—

"On the north commencing at a point where the natural gully crosses the Brighton Road, in an easterly direction along the centre of a street known as Union-street to a Government road bounding Jackson's Paddock, and marked on plan LXVI.; thence in a southerly direction along the centre of a Government road to a Government road known as the Glen Huntly Road; thence in westerly direction along the centre of the said Glen Huntly Road to the shore of Port Phillip Bay; thence in a northerly direction along the centre of a Government road known as the Punt Road, to

the Junction Hotel; thence in a north-westerly direction along the east side of the main Melbourne road to the starting point."

The petitioners further state that the proposed district is about four square miles, containing about 5000 inhabitants; and that from its beauty and salubrity they confidently anticipate a large increase to their numbers before long."

The Petitioners add:—

"Again your petitioners are most desirous to impress upon your Excellency's notice the benefits to be derived from the division of these very extensive suburbs into two distinct townships, as it will leave the inhabitants of Prahran in possession of that large and populous district, being the northern division of the parish, to be drained by the Yarra river, while the entire district now submitted to your Excellency must be drained directly into Hobson's Bay."

And the prayer is as follows:—

"Your petitioners now pray your Excellency to proclaim as the township of 'Windsor,' the district above described."

"We would further pray your Excellency not to grant the prayer of the petition recently presented to your Excellency by the inhabitants of Lower Prahran, as far as regards their southern boundary; but that such boundary, we most respectfully submit, be the gully in Union-street beforementioned and described as the proposed northern boundary of Windsor."

"Should the inhabitants of St. Kilda, within the City, petition your Excellency (as we are informed they propose doing) to become a portion of the proposed township of Windsor, we shall, with your Excellency's approval, be willing to include them in the boundaries of such township."

"That your petitioners beg respectfully to bring your Excellency's notice to the second clause in the Act of Council, No. 15, being 'An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria,' which declares, that on receipt of a petition signed by 150, at least, of the householders of any certain district, it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor to proclaim the said district a Municipal district."

And praying as follows:—

"Now therefore we, the undersigned householders in the township of Sandhurst, beg respectfully to request your Excellency will cause this township of Sandhurst to be proclaimed a Municipal district under the aforesaid Act."

RICHMOND.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria, No. 15, the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct the publication of the substance and prayer of a Petition to His Excellency, signed by two hundred and sixty-one householders of the district commonly called and known as "Richmond," in the County of Bourke, stating,—

That as inhabitants of a populous and important district not yet proclaimed a town, and suffering from the want of local government, they hail with satisfaction the passing of the said Act: also, that the area of the locality known as 'Richmond,' is a little more than three and a half square miles, and contains a population of upwards of 7000 persons, residing in about 2000 houses. The petitioners further state that—

"The boundaries of the said locality are clearly and equitably defined in Schedule F, No. 5, of an Act, intituled, '*An Act to establish a Constitution in and for the Colony of Victoria*,' which boundaries are as follow:—Commencing at a point on the Yarra Yarra River due south from the south-eastern angle of Gisborne-street, bounded on the west by a line due north to the said angle; thence by the east side of Gisborne-street to Victoria-parade; thence by the southern sides of Victoria-parade and Victoria-street and a prolongation of that line to the Yarra Yarra River; on the east and south by the Yarra Yarra River to the commencing point."

And the prayer is as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore pray that your Excellency may be moved to declare by Proclamation the said locality to be a municipal district, by the name of 'Richmond,' and also that the boundaries of the proposed municipal district be those defined in the said Constitution Act."

SANDRIDGE.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria, No. 15, the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct the publication of the substance and prayer of a Petition to His Excellency, signed by two hundred and seven householders, resident in the district commonly called and known as "Sandridge," South Melbourne, in the County of Bourke, stating, among other things—

That the petitioners presented a memorial to the late Lieutenant Governor, expressing a desire to have the control over their local affairs; that such memorial was favorably received, and representations made that the necessary measures would be adopted for granting its request; and adding—

"That at the time the said memorial was presented, your petitioners, not being on the Electoral Roll, were unrepresented in the proceedings

of the Corporation of Melbourne; but subsequently the said Corporation has been assisted by the Government in borrowing a large sum of money; and your petitioners have cause to fear their interests were overlooked in reference to that loan, inasmuch as the people of Sandridge having been promised separate local government previous to the said Corporation receiving the assistance of the Government; your petitioners reasonably expected they would have been protected from any liabilities on account thereof, more particularly as they had no voice in the raising or expending the said loan, nor had any benefit whatever from it."

The Prayer is as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray your Excellency will be pleased to interpose, so that the influence and authority of the Government may be exerted to shield them from so great an injustice.

"And, further, your petitioners hereby declare their desire that the provisions of the aforesaid Municipalities Act should be extended to them at the earliest possible period, and humbly pray that your Excellency will be pleased, for that purpose, to proclaim the area contained within the following boundaries a Municipal District, that is to say:—Commencing at the Sandridge public pier, running westerly to the junction of the river Yarra Yarra with Hobson's Bay; bounded by Hobson's Bay from the said junction, up the said river to a point on the bank of the said river, opposite the Gas Works; bounded by the river Yarra Yarra from such said point to the Sandridge Road, at a point on the said road about ten chains from the head of the Sandridge Lagoon, in the direction of Emerald Hill; bounded by a straight line from the latter-named point to the boundary of the proposed park, at its junction with a certain place described on the Government Survey Maps as Dundas Place; bounded by a straight line along Dundas Place, by the boundary of the proposed park, to the three-chains-wide road proposed to be made, as laid down in the Government Survey Maps; by the said road to the sea-beach, and from the point where the said road terminates at the sea-beach along the beach to the commencing point, namely, the Sandridge public pier; which said boundaries are shown on the accompanying map, and therein marked red.

"Your petitioners would further state, that the boundary laid down on the map includes the Sandridge Lagoon and Public Baths, also the only spot of rising ground in the township, namely, the hill on which the Customs' officer resides. In reference to the Lagoon, your petitioners consider it ought fairly to be included within their boundary; because, in making their purchases of land of the Government, many of your petitioners have been swayed in their selection by considering the proximity of the Lagoon gave a value to their purchases, whereas the same reasons cannot be urged in favor of a claim thereto by the people of any other district. And your petitioners humbly hope that these facts will meet with the consideration of your Excellency in connection with the prayer of their petition."

Hence it becomes the imperative duty of Officers to make their arrangements so as not to exceed the sum granted by the Legislature.

It will be the duty of the Tender Board not to recommend any Tenders without accompanying their recommendation with a statement of the

amount available to meet the expense. Should such amount be insufficient, notice is to be given to the contractor and architect that only a certain portion of the amount of the contract will be paid during the current year; and that it will be necessary to arrange with the Colonial Engineer, or other superintending officer what part of the work shall be left undone.

It is moreover the intention of the Lieutenant Governor to arrange the accounts so that the appropriation of the money for the service of each financial year shall terminate with that year.

A period of twenty-one days will be allowed for the receipt of correspondence from the country, and on the twenty-second day of January, the books in every public office in the Colony will close.

PASSENGERS' LUGGAGE.—DUTIABLE ARTICLES.

THE Lieutenant Governor has been pleased to sanction the following Regulations relative to the quantity of Spirits, Tobacco, and Cigars allowed to be introduced in the baggage of passengers, viz.:—

1. Passengers arriving in any Port in this Colony from any Australasian Port will be permitted to enter on payment of duty not more than 5 lbs. of tobacco or cigars and one half-gallon of spirits.

2. Passengers arriving in any Port of this Colony from any Port not in Australasia will be permitted to enter on payment of duty not more than 10 lbs. of tobacco or cigars, and one gallon of spirits or four gallons of wine.

3. Any amounts imported by passengers as surplus stores in excess of the above can only be delivered on payment of duty by special permission of the Collector of Customs.

TRANSPORT ALLOWANCES TO GOVERNMENT OFFICERS AND CLERKS.

3. In determining the allowance in each case the current rates of transport by the most economical and expeditious routes will be regarded.

4. No accounts will be entertained except such as shall be incurred in conformity with these regulations.

RULES.

1. Collectors of Public Revenue in Melbourne to pay, *daily*, into the Treasury, the amount collected by them, previous to the hour of Two P.M.

2. Collectors of Public Revenue in the country to make similar payments (into the Treasury or Sub-Treasury, as the case may be) *weekly*, instead of monthly, as at present.

3. The usual vouchers, shewing the head under which each payment is to be credited, must continue to accompany every payment into the Treasury.

4. In the event of a country collection in any instance amounting to a sum not less than £1000, it must at once be remitted, although the usual period for remitting should not have arrived.

5. Collections, however, *whilst under* £100 need not be paid in until, as at present, the end of the month.

NOTE.—The above Rules do not affect the Regulations of the 1st of May, 1853, respecting the amounts to be rendered to the Audit Office, which must be furnished monthly as hitherto, and care must be taken that, in the payment of collections into the Treasury, the transactions of each month be kept entirely distinct.
