SHELTER SHEDS.

(Originated by Mrs. CHISHOLM.)

TENDERS will be received until noon on Friday, the 10th August, for the erection of one or more of the Shelter Sheds or Protection Posts, to be built at the following places, in accordance with plans and specifications, to be seen on application at the Immigration Office:—

The contractor will be allowed to cut, without charge, the necessary timber for the blocks, &c., on Crown Lands, in localities which will be named.

Tenders for wooden, zinc or iron houses, suitable for the purpose, will be received.

The tenders (sealed) must be endorsed "Tenders for Shelter Sheds," and be addressed to the Chairman of the Tender Board, Audit Office, Melbourne.

One sum should be named for which the whole work tendered for by any tenderer, including materials, transport and labor will be performed.

No tender will be recognised unless accompanied by the signatures of two responsible persons, willing to become sureties in one-third the amount, for the due performance of the contract on or before a date to be named, and which will be inserted in the bond.

The lowest or any tender will not necessarily be accepted.

The decision on the tenders will be notified on the 18th day of August.
