GIPPS' LAND COUNTY COURT.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir CHARLES HOTHAM, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, Captain General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

HEREAS by an Act of the Licutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "An Act to make provision for the better "Administration of Justice in County Courts "in the Colony of Victoria," it was amongst other things enacted, that Local Courts, the act of the county courts and the courts of the courts called County Courts, should be established and holden in and for such Cities, Towns, Counties, and other portions of the said Colony of Victoria as the Lieutenant Governor should appoint; and that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor of the said Colony from time to time to define by Proclamation the limits and boundadaries of such Cities, Towns, Counties, and portions of the said Colony, and the times and places at which such Courts should be holden, and such limits, boundaries, places and times to vary, alter and repeal as the said Lieutenant Governor should think fit: Now therefore I, the Governor of the said Colony, in pursuance of the said Act, and under and by virtue of the powers in me vested, do hereby declare and appoint that a County Court, to be called the County Court of Gipps' Land, shall be established and holden in and for the District of Gipps' Land, the boundaries of which are hereby defined to be as follows, that is to say :-Bounded on the south and east by the sea; on the north by a line running in a westerly direction from Cape Howe to the source of the nearest tributary of the Murray and the Australian Alps; again on the west by the Alps and the counties of Evelyn and Mornington; And I hereby further direct and appoint that the said County Court of Gipps' Land shall, until other-

wise ordered, be holden at the time and place following, that is to say,-at Alberton, on the fifth day of November, A.D. 1855; And I do further declare and appoint that if the Judge of the said Court should not arrive at the place aforesaid in time to open such Court on the day hereinbefore appointed, the same may be opened and held on any day or days following such day so appointed.

HEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "An Act to make provision for the better "General Sessions of the Colony of Victoria," it was amongst other things enacted that Courts of General Sessions of the Peace should be established and holden in certain places therein named, and such other places and districts within the said Colony as the Lieutenant Governor thereof should appoint; and that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor of the said Colony from time to time to define and appoint by Proclamation the limits and boundaries of such places or districts within which all such *Courts should have jurisdiction respectively, and the places and times at which such Courts should be holden, and such limits, districts, places and times respectively to revoke, alter or vary as the said Lieutenant Governor should think fit: Now therefore I, the Governor of the said Colony, in pursuance of the said Act and under and by virtue of the powers and authorities in me vested, do hereby declare and appoint that a Court of General Sessions of the Peace, to be called the Court of General Sessions for Gipps' Land, shall be established and holden in and for the District of Gipps' Land, having jurisdiction within the said District, the boundaries whereof are hereby defined to be as follow, that is to say:—Bounded on the south and east by the sea; on the north by a line running in a westerly direction from Cape Howe to the source of the nearest tributary of the Murray and the Australian Alps; again on the west by the Alps and the Counties of Evelyn and Mornington; And I do further direct and No. 92.—September 18th, 1855.—2.

STORES AND TRANSPORT.

IS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct that the following Code of Regulations for the governance of the Department of Stores and Transport, be observed in lieu of all former Regulations on the same subject.

STORES.

Stores for the public service of the Colony are to be procured for the several departments by the Colonial Storekeeper.

To this rule the following exceptions will be admitted, in each case under special regulations now in force or hereafter to be promulgated:

(1.) All supplies for the military will be obtained by the Military Commissariat.

(2.) All building materials, tools for the construction of machinery, and furniture of the description known as cabinet work, will be furnished by the Colonial Engineer.

(3.) Bookbinding, printing, and printed forms will be supplied by the Government Printer.

(4.) Postage stamps will be furnished by the Postmaster General.

(5.) Fuel and water for office purposes, except in Mel-bourne and Geelong, will be obtained by the departments requiring them.

On the 30th August in each year, or at such other date as may be named, the head of every department will furnish to the Colonial Storekeeper full information respecting the requirements of his department for the year commencing on the 1st of January following, and will specify whether in his opinion the various articles should be obtained by means of annual or special contracts, and whether locally or in Melbourne. The calculation is to be based upon the strength set down in the estimates and approved of by His Excellency the Governor, and is to be framed with a view to the efficiency of the service and a stringent economy of the public money.

IV.

IV.

All supplies above the value of £5 which may be required on the public account are to be provided, if possible, by public tender; but should it, under extraordinary circumstances, be considered desirable to make purchases by private contract, the nevessity of the case, with full particulars of each intended purchase, except as hereinafter provided, is to be reported in writing by the Colonial Storekeeper, for the approval of His Excellency the Governor.

The Colonial Storekeeper is to be charged with the entering upon and the carrying out of all contracts for supplies under these regulations. On the 1st October in each year, or so soon thereafter as may be practicable, he is to prepare schedules of all contracts which may be required for the ensuing year, classified in accordance with the various descriptions of supply, and is to submit them for the approval of His Excellency. Whenever also it may be necessary to procure supplies above the value of £100, which may not be included in annual contracts, he is to submit a schedule in like manner for approval.

VI. After receiving the approval of His Excellency, the schedules, with such conditions as may be determined upon, are to be advertised in the Government Gazetts and in such local newspapers as may be deemed advisable, in order that the public generally may have an opportunity of competing for the supply.

When goods not exceeding £100 in value are required, the Colonial Storekeeper will call for tenders by advertisement in the newspapers only, taking care that at least three day's notice is given, and that due competition is encouraged.

The Colonial Storekeeper is authorised to purchase supplies not exceeding in value £5. He is however to exercise this power only when the circumstances of the case may demand it.

TENDERS.

All advertisements calling for supplies are to contain the particulars of the supply, the period for and within which it is to be furnished, the mode and time of paywhich it is to be furnished, the mode and time of payment, the amount of bond required, with all other necessary information; and due notice is to be given of the day and hour before which the Tenders are to be sent in, sealed and described as "Tenders for, &c.," on the envelope. The date when the Tenders will be accepted is also, if possible, to be given, and when the supplies are not to be furnished under annual contract as much time as the nature of the case may seem to require is to be allowed between the date of the acceptance of the Tenders and that on which the articles are to be delivered. and that on which the articles are to be delivered.

All Tenders are to be opened by a Board to be composed of such officers as His Excellency shall see fit from time to time to appoint. On being opened they are to be numbered consecutively, and to be initialled by each member of the Board present. No Tenders are to be recognised in which the advertised conditions of contract both has been investigated and the property of the second of the sec shall have been in material points departed from, so as to preclude an accurate comparison with other Tenders for the same supply.

The Board will be guided in their decision by the quality of the sample, the price at which it is tendered, and by the responsibility of the person tendering and of his securities. Should two Tenders for a like amount be received, the reason for accepting one of them is to be given. Whenever the lowest Tender is not accepted, full reasons are to be stated.

XII.

When the supply is of the value of £100 or upwards, the Board are to notify their decision upon the face of the Tenders which they may recommend for acceptance, and the Colonial Storckeeper is to submit them to the Colonial Secretary with those which may be rejected, for confirmation by His Excellency the Governor; after which, the particulars of the accepted Tenders are to be published in the Government Gazette for public information, the documents being returned to the Colonial Storckeeper.

When the supply tendered for does not exceed in value the sum of £100, the acceptance or rejection of the Tenders is to rest under these regulations with the Board. Should the rate named be excessive, or should no Tenders be recived, the articles are to be purchased by the Colonial Storekeeper, and the particulars of the several purchases are to be entered upon the minutes of the Board.

XIV.

XIV.

The following documents are to be retained in the Colonial Storekeeper's Office for reference and record:—
(1.) The contract including Tender and bond.
(2.) The advertisement.

If the information embraced in these documents shall be at any time required for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness or otherwise of accounts, certified copies are to be furnished to the Auditor General; but, as a rule, a reference on the face of the account to the publication in the Gazette of the accepted Tender is to be doemed sufficient.

XV.

Whenever the Colonial Storekeeper shall find it necessary under these regulations to make purchases, he is to use his utmost endeavours to do so upon the most advantageous terms, remembering that his best security against combination, and other undue means of raising prices beyond a fair standard, is in the strict impartiality of his dealings, and the prompt discharge of every engagement.

REQUISITIONS.

XVI.

Requisitions for stores are to be addressed to the Colonial Storekeeper, upon the authorised form (No 1), and are to be made quarterly, on the 1st January, 1st April, 1st July, and 1st October respectively. All heads of departments are expressly enjoined to transmit their applications in due time, and to make provision for the requirements of the subsequent three months. No supplies will be furnished until 14 days after the receipt of the Requisition.

XVII.

The Requisitions for forage, in the Melbourne district, are to be rendered on the 25th of each month, for the service of the month ensuing.

In Geelong and the country districts, the forage, for which contracts have been or may be entered into, will be supplied by the contractor on the order of the Inspector of Police for the district, and is to be accounted for in the prescribed form (No. 2). All other forage, for the country districts, is to be procured from the Colonial Storekeeper by means of Requisitions which are to be addressed to him by the Chief Commissioner of Police, at such times as the season of the year, the rates of transport, and the amount of storage accommodation at the stations may amount of storage accommodation at the stations may render advisable.

XVIII.

Rations of provisions for immigrants, prisoners, lunatics, &c., will be supplied by contractors to the several departments, upon the order of the officer in charge of the station, and accounts are to be rendered monthly.

XIX.

The Colonial Storekeeper, unless with the especial sanction of the Governor, is on no account to furnish supplies to any department for which timely provision, as directed by these regulations, shall have been neglected.

AA.

Such articles only are to be placed in Requisition as are allowed by the regulations for the time being, or as are indispensable for the proper conduct of the public service; and in all cases the size, weight, measurement or quantity, is to be given, as well as a correct description of the articles.

XXI.

XXII.

On receiving Requisitions, completed in conformity with these regulations, the Colonial Storekeeper is to report as to the cost of the articles, for the approval of His Excel-

lency the Governor.

If it should, however, appear that any Requisition is for quantities greater than the nature of the service may seem to demand, or for articles which are not necessarily required, he is to state the circumstances and the grounds of his objection, for the consideration of His Excellency.

CUSTODY OF STORES.

XXIII.

Every officer entrusted with the custody of supplies is every omeer entrusted with the custody of supplies is to keep a clear and exact account of every article which may in any manner be placed under his charge. He is to be particularly attentive to the preservation of the supplies, and is to give positive orders to this effect to the persons employed under him.

XXIV.

No articles whatever are to be lent, sold, or exchanged, except under competent authority in writing.

All articles in store should be constantly under observation, and should be frequently inspected in detail. The contents of each package should at all times be correctly noted in conspicuous characters on a label attached to the package itself.

The officer immediately in charge should from time to time inspect his stores, and see that due order and regu-larity are maintained by his clerk or issuer.

XXVII.

The police at every station are to exert themselves to ensure the forage being stored in such a manner as to prevent any injury through the effects of weather or other causes, and should any damage or loss occur, the strictest investigation is to be made, and the person who, from negligence or culpability, allowed the same to take place is to be held personally liable for it.

XXVIII.

At out-stations at which no sufficient storage accommodation has been provided, the police, wherever the necessary materials can be obtained in the immediate neighbourhood, must construct huts of bark or timber, for the protection of the forage; and wherever the stores are kept in a tent or insecure building of any kind, they are to erect a strong fence round the same to prevent damage from cattle &c. At all stations minor repairs to the forage stores are to be executed by the police.

No goats, pigs, poultry, &c., are allowed to be kept in the neighbourhood of a forage store by any person in the employment of Government.

XXX.

Proper precautions against loss by fire are in all cases to be taken.

XXXI.

XXXI.

At every station where there is grass in the neighbourhood, officers in charge of police will, when it is advisable, turn out duty horses to graze, issuing to them only half rations, or such other allowance as may be deemed necessary, due regard being had to their being kept in serviceable condition.

If possible, where there is good grass, the horses should be kept altogether without the usual rations of oats, bran, and hav.

and hay.

XXXII.

On the 1st July and 1st January in each year, and oftener if considered necessary, the stock on hand, whether of stores or forage, is to be ascertained by the officer in charge by actual tally and inspection, and is to be reconciled with the balances as shewn in the stock account.

XXXIII.

When an officer in charge or his subordinate is removed from any station, he is to balance his accounts, and to take care that the stock handed over to his successor is correct. In like manner the person taking charge is to ascertain that the stock on hand is in all respects the same as that shewn by the accounts, and should any discrepancies be afterwards discovered he will be held

responsible.

Wherever practicable, the person retiring and the person relieving him should go through the stock at the same time, and certify conjointly to the correctness of

SUPPLIES FURNISHED DEPARTMENTS BY CONTRACTORS.

XXXIV.

To prevent misunderstanding between a department and a contractor, the Colonial Storekeeper is to furnish to each department a copy of the conditions of any contract specially affecting it, which may now be in existence or which may hereafter be accepted; and it will be the duty of every officer to make himself acquainted with the conditions of any contract under which he may receive supplies direct from a contractor. plies direct from a contractor.

XXXV.
All contracts entered into by the Tender Board are to be considered as binding upon the department for which they were intended.

XXXVI.

Timely notice is, in all cases, to be given to the contractor, when supplies are required.

XXXVII.

The conditions of all annual contracts hereafter entered into for ordinary supplies, such as rations, forage, &c., are to be so framed that the head of a department or officer in charge of a station, where Boards of officers can be assembled, shall be empowered to form Boards of Survey for the purpose of deciding upon the quality of the supplies in all cases where doubts or disputes may arise as to their sufficiency or fitness; and the decision of such Result is the final Board is to be final.

NXXVIII.

The strictest injunctions are to be given to the Board of Survey to conform, in all respects, to the conditions of the contract; as it will be impossible to charge upon the contractor the losses which may result, unless the prescribed forms are adhered to.

XXXIX.

In all cases where a Board of a sufficient number of officers cannot conveniently be formed, the contract must provide for the rejection, by the officer in charge, of articles of inferior quality; he being responsible to His Excellency the Governor for so doing.

XL.

The inspection and approval by a competent officer of all supplies, previously to receiving delivery, is to be deemed essential, and is never, in any case, to be dis-

pensed with.

XLI.

No person in the employment of the Government is to be permitted to act as agent for a contractor, in the supply of articles for the public service; and any person so employed, receiving from a contractor any fee, remuneration, or reward, will subject himself to immediate

SERVICEABLE STORES NO LONGER REQUIRED.

XIII.

In the case of serviceable stores which may no longer be required by a particular department, an inventory is to be prepared and forwarded to the Colonial Storekeeper, who is to take measures to receive them into store, or to dispose of them as may be best for the interest of the

SURVEYS ON UNSERVICEABLE STORES.

XLIII

No articles, which may be issued to any department, are to be considered as unserviceable until they shall have been inspected by a Board of Survey, and have been

XLIV. XLIV.

The head of each department is authorised at convenient times to convene a Board for the purpose of inspecting such stores as in his opinion may have become unserviceable. In Melbourne, Geelong, and at the head station of each Gold Field, an officer of the Colonial Storekeeper's department is to be a member of each Board of Survey, but in other places it is to consist of such officers as may conveniently be assembled.

XLV.
Articles, considered by the Board to be unserviceable, are not to be returned into store, but are to be divided

by the Board into two classes, such as would probably realise more than the expenses of sale, and such as are worthless. The first are to be sold by public auction, at the carliest convenient period; the second are to be defaced or destroyed in the presence of the Board, to the end that they may not be fraudulently substituted for serviceable supplies.

XLVI.

The report of survey is to distinguish such as have been defaced or destroyed from those which are to be sold, in order that the accuracy of the account sale may be checked, and a copy of the report is in all cases to be forwarded through the Colonial Storekeeper to the Colonial Secretary for His Excellency's information.

XLVII.

Full publicity by advertisement is to be given to all sales of unserviceable stores, and when the total estimated value exceeds £50, the notice of sale is to be published in the Government Gazette.

PETTY CASH.

XLVIII.

Atticles of small value, which cannot conveniently be described or inserted in the quarterly requisition, or which can be purchased at a smaller cost than by the system of tender prescribed in these regulations, repairs to stores, the transport of parcels, and minor services generally, may be paid for by the se eral heads of department, who will be held responsible for the expenditure, and will not be required to apply by requisition or otherwise for His Excellency's special sanction.

Each head of department is to keep a Petty Cash Account, in which every disbursement is to be entered, and vouchers in the form prescribed by the regulations for the time being, are to be furnished to the Auditor General.

The monthly scale of petty cash for each department is as follows, and may in no case be exceeded:

THE SUPPLY OF FUEL FOR OFFICE PURPOSES.

LII.

Fires will be allowed in Government Offices in Melbourne, Geelong, and Williamstown, from 1st May to 30th September, the requisition for the necessary fuel

being made quarterly upon the Colonial Storekeeper. The maximum quantity will be as follows;—

Wood—two tons (measurement) or } per fire per Coal—half-a-ton (weight) month.
Housekeepers will be allowed one fire during the whole year at the same scale.

In the country districts fuel must be procured and paid for by each department, under existing exertracts, where

In the country districts fuel must be procured and paid for by each department under existing contracts, where such have been entered into, or in cases where none have been entered into in the manner most economical; vouchers for payment to be rendered to the Audit Office in the usual manner; a like scale of wood will be allowed, but the substitution of coal will not be permitted except under special circumstances.

ALLOWANCES TO THE POLICE.

LIII.

The following allowances will be given wherever necessary to members of the Police Force, it being understood that the scale is in all cases to be considered as the maximum, and is never to be exceeded; but that when a less quantity is sufficient the issue is to be limited accordingly:

(1.) Fuel and Water.—Fatigue parties are to be told off whenever practicable to obtain such quantities as may be required for the use of the force.

In isolated cases where, by reason of the scarcity of the supply, the purchase of fuel or water at the public expense is indispensable, the weekly consumption is to be limited to the following scale:—

Wood.—In winter, six cubic feet per man per diem; in summer, four cubic feet per man per diem; or an equivalent in coal according to value.

Water.—Two gallons per man per diem.

- (2.) Light.—One tallow candle per night, or an equivalent in oil, for every four men, to be used only in the barrack rooms.
- (3.) PRISONERS' MEALS.—When prisoners are in transit, and there is no lock-up or contract for the supply, the guard will be allowed one shilling per meal.
- (4.) Travelling Expenses .- While out of their re-(4.) TRAVELLING EXPENSES.—While out of their respective districts officers will be allowed seven shillings per diem, and sergeants and constables three shillings and sixpence per diem for travelling expenses. Within the limits of their districts no travelling expenses will be allowed. This scale will be reduced or altered as occasion may require may require.
- (5.) Tentage.—Where tents are supplied for the use of the police, they are to be of one uniform size, viz., twelve feet by ten feet, and are to accommodate threemen, each officer however being allowed a separate tent.
- (6.) Weighing Machines and Steel-Yards.—Where six horses or more are stationed, one Avery's machine is to be supplied for the purpose of weighing forage; where the number is on the average less than six, steel-yards are to be furnished. are to be furnished.

(7.) Tools and Utensils for felling, cutting, and splitting wood, drawing water, and effecting repairs.

TRANSPORT.

The transport of supplies placed in requisition upon the Colonial Storekeeper is to be undertaken by that officer, or by the Contractor under his orders.

LV.
All supplies are to be delivered at the place mentioned upon the face of the requisition.

LVI.

LVI.

The supplies for the country districts are to be addressed to the principal officer in charge at the station to which they may be forwarded.

Every consignment is to be accompanied by an invoice or way-bill, of which a duplicate is to be transmitted by the next, or if possible, previous post, and on the arrival of the supplies, the officer in charge is to acknowledge the receipt of the articles upon the face of the way-bills, and to return them without delay to the Colonial Storekeener.

keeper.

In case of the non-arrival of the supplies within a reasonable time after the receipt of one way-bill, the officer in charge is to consider it his express duty to communicate to the Colonial Storekeeper at once the circumstances of the case, in order that such steps as may be necessary may be promptly taken.

LIVII.

If at any time the weight or quantity of the supplies received should be deficient, or should exceed that stated in the way-bill, the officer in charge is to point out the discrepancy to the carrier, and to endeavour to ascertain whether such discrepancy arose from carelessness or dishonesty, or whether it may be attributed to natural causes such as evaporation. Should the supplies be damaged, he is also to ascertain, so far as he is able, in what manner the damage occurred.

LVIII.

In every such case the weight or quantity stated in the way-bill is not to be altered; but the officer is to attach his signature, and to make a remark embracing all essential particulars of the excess, loss, or damage, on the face both of the original and duplicate.

LlX.

The quantities stated in the way-bill are in all cases to be entered in the books of the officer in charge, as having been received, and he is to take credit on the opposite side of his account for the weight or quantity which may be lost or damaged.

In Melbourne, and at all stations to which way-bills cannot be forwarded by the carrier, as at sea-ports, the officer in charge is to sign a receipt for the supplies in such form as may be required by the Colonial Store-keeper, and in all other respects is to conform to the above rules.

LXI.

The principal officer in charge at every station throughout the Colony is to be considered as specially entrusted with the receipt of all supplies forwarded by the Colonial Storekeeper, which he is on no account to refuse, and he is in all cases to take care that the supplies are adequately housed and protected from the weather, from depredations, or from loss of any kind.

LXII.

Should, however, the supplies be of inferior quality, or of an improper description, or should he from any cause be unprovided with adequate storage accommodation, he is to report the circumstances without loss of time to the head of his department, and is to transmit a copy of his report to the Colonial Storekeeper.

LXIII.

LXIII.

The transport of forage and other supplies from the head to the out stations of the police is to be undertaken by the police carts. If, however, under extraordinary circumstances it should be absolutely necessary to engage transport, the officer in charge is to communicate in writing with the Chief Commissioner, and the Colonial Storekeeper is enjoined not to pass any such transport accounts until he shall have satisfied himself that the expense was necessarily incurred.

LXIV.

All transport for bulky supplies, whether in Melhourne or the country, is to be performed under written contract. When the season of the year, the demand for cartage, and the weight of the goods are such as to render it advisable, tenders are to be called for by public advertisement as in the case of supplies, and are to be submitted to the Tender Board for consideration. In all other cases contracts with individual carriers are to be made at the most

advantageous rates.

LXV.

All persons, who may be at any time employed in entering into contracts for carriage, are to encourage the fullest competition, and to endeavour by every legitimate means to lessen the heavy charges of this important branch of the public expenditure.

SCALE OF TRANSPORT ALLOWANCES.

LXVI.

- (1.) Officers holding commissions, and clerks on first entering the service, are required to bear the whole expense of transport to the stations to which they may be ordered.

ACCOUNTS.

LXVII

All bills or vouchers are to be prepared in accordance with the regulations for the time being, having reference to public accounts.

LXVIII.

The duty of making out the accounts will devolve upon the contractor or supplier, but the head of department is distinctly enjoined to furnish to such persons every infor-mation which they may in any way require.

LXIX.

The prompt discharge of all liabilities has a material effect in producing competition, and in diminishing the rates at which supplies may be obtained. The Colonial Storekeeper will therefore report for the information of the liabilities the Converse ways any days or defined. His Excellency the Governor upon any delays or deten-tions in other departments, in the passing of store

LXX

For the purpose of enabling the head of every department to know at all times the position of the vote for his department, the Colonial Storekeeper will, on application, furnish a statement of the cost of supplies issued from stock during the year; and in all cases in which supplies may be purchased specially for a department, he will submit the account to the head thereof for entry and certification. The head of each department will be held responsible that in making his requisitions the sum voted by the Legislature is in no case exceeded, unless under the special authority of the Governor.

LXXI.

The c.rtificate which the head of department will be required to give upon each account will be as to the supply only, and the Colonial Storckeeper will be responsible for the price and the quality of the goods. The certificate is therefore to be given if the supplies, whether of good quality or otherwise, have been delivered, and the account is in no instance to be detained.

The head of department may, however, attach a memorandum on a separate paper to the account (which is never to be defaced or altered), stating his reasons for considering the price to be high, or the quality to be bad; and may, if necessary, report the circumstances of the case for His Excellency's information.

LXXIII.
When supplies are purchased in Melbourne for transmission to the country districts, a similar certificate will be required from the head of the department, and the account is not to be detained until the stores have reached account is not to be detained until the stores have reached their destination, but the certificate is to be affixed so soon as the head of department shall have been informed by the Colonial Storekeeper that the articles have been supplied to the store in Melbourne. The supply to a department is therefore to be considered as having in all cases been taken in Melbourne, the transmission to the country stations being performed by the Colonial Storekeeper, as the agent for the department.

LXXIV.
Should the Colonial Storekeeper fail to deliver any articles with which he may have been thus entrusted for transport, the matter is to be brought under his notice by the head of department, and, if necessary, the circum-stances are to be reported for the information of His Excellency the Governor.

LXXV.

In the case of forage accounts the Government has determined that a commutation is to be given wherever practicable in the country districts, and the issue is to be confined to those persons only who are specially authorised to draw their allowance in kind.

The supply out of Melbourne will therefore be almost solely for the Police, and for the Mounted Escort
Under these circumstances His Excellency has been pleased to direct that the custody of all forage in the country districts is to devolve upon the Officers of Police, who will be held accountable to the head of their department for the full quantities supplied. As a consequence who will be neid accountable to the head of their department for the full quantities supplied. As a consequence of this arrangement all forage in the country districts is to be primarily charged to the Police Department, which will afterwards (accounts in the prescribed form being rendered), receive credit for authorised issues to other departments.

INSPECTION OF STORES.

LXXVI.

When supplies shall have been delivered under these regulations by contractors or from the Colonial Stores, to an officer of another department of the public service,

the Colonial Storekeeper will be exonerated from personal responsibility as to their safe custody and due appropriation.

LXXVII.

Once however in every half-year, at farthest, the Colonial Storekeeper is to visit the head office or store of each department (except that of the military), to which during the preceding half year, stores, other than office supplies, have been furnished, and he is to inspect the stores, to examine into the books and accounts, and to see that the supplies have been consumed only in the public service, or that they are still in store, and that no improper appropriation has taken place. He is further to make in writing a report of the result of his investigation for the information of His Excellency the Governor.

LXXVIII.

Once in every twelve months the Colonial Store-keeper, or such other officer as the Governor may please to appoint, is to visit each station of his department in the country districts, for the purpose of ascertaining from personal inspection that these regulations and such other instructions as may be issued, have been faithfully carried into effect, and he will at the same time be required to inspect the stores or forage in the custody of the several departments, and to point out in writing such imperfections in the mode of keeping the accounts as may present themselves. themselves.

LXXIX.

He will, however, in no case make any alteration or amendment, but will record his opinion for the information of His Excellency the Governor.

REGISTRATION DE NOVO OF COLONIAL SHIPS IN THE UNITED KINGDOM. VHE accompanying papers relative to the Registry de novo of Colonial Ships in the United Kingdom are published for general information.

Various communications having been made to my Lords concerning the inconvenience sustained with respect to Ships registered in the British Possessions abroad, in consequence of the mode in which the changes effected by "The Merchant Shipping Act" have been brought into operation, I am directed to bring the subject to the notice of the Commissioners of Customs, and to request their attention to the following observations and suggestions.

The cases complained of are two-fold:—

1. Where a Ship being registered in a Colony, a Bill of Sale, or a Power of Attorney to execute a Bill of Sale, has been sent by the Registered Owner to the United Kingdom.

2. Where a Ship being registered in a Colony, the Registered Owner is in the United Kingdom,

and wishes to sell her here.

In both these cases the Registrars of Shipping would, before the 1st of May, have registered the Ship de novo without waiting to ascertain the state of the Colonial Register, whilst, since the 1st of May, they have refused to register the Ship de novo in this Country, and the Commissioners of Customs have supported them in such refusal.

This Board entirely concur with the view which the Commissioners have thus taken of the

principles on which the system of Ship Registry should be carried into effect.

One of the most important objects of the system introduced by the recent Act is to prevent a Ship from being disposed of in two places to two different persons at the same time, and to effect this object it is necessary that all dealings with the Register of the Ship should either be effected at her

Object to is necessary that all dealings with the Register of the Ship should either be effected at her Port of Registry or appear on the Register Book kept at that Port.

If it is wished to sell or mortgage the Ship in any part of the Empire other than that in which the Ship is registered, Statutory Powers of Attorney for the purpose (called in the Act "Certificates of Sale or Mortgage") can be procured at the Port of Registry. These Certificates will confer a perfect title on those who take under them, whilst, as they will be entered or the Register Book at the Port of Registry register who will be entered or the Register Book at the Port of Registry. of Registry, persons who might desire to purchase or lend money on the Ship there will have full notice of their existence.

My Lords consider it of very great importance for the interests of Shipping that these Certificates should be brought into use as quickly and as universally as possible, and that nothing should be done should be done to the control of the control which would have the effect of permanently infringing the principles of the new system or of inducing persons concerned in shipping to believe that it will henceforward be possible to confer a Title to a Ship by any means except those which the Act and the Regulations which have been issued under it point

out as necessary.

But since it appears that it has under former Acts been the practice to register Colonial Ships de novo in this Country upon the production of duly executed Bills of Sale without first ascertaining the state of the Colonial Register, and since it further appears that many Ships have lately been sent, and are now being sent from the Colonies, for the purpose of being sold in this Country, according to the practice which has heretofore prevailed, and that considerable inconvenience would be caused if the new system were brought suddenly into stringent operation:

My Lords wish to suggest to the Commissioners the expediency of adopting the following relaxations, to take effect at once, and to last during such time only as may be necessary to bring the

new system into complete operation.

1. Ships registered in the Colonies may, for such time as hereinafter mentioned, be registered de novo in this Country upon the production of such Documents or evidence of Title as the Registrars have heretofore been in the habit of receiving as sufficient.

2. In all such cases the Vendor or his Agent shall give to the Registrar security that the

transaction shall be completed and that the Registrar and the Commissioners shall be kept harmless from any loss or damage which they might incur if it were to happen that the Ship was in the meantime

from any loss or damage which they might incur if it were to happen that the Ship was in the meantime disposed of in the Colony. A suggested Form of Bond for this purpose is enclosed.

3. The Vendor or his Agent must fill up and sign and deliver to the Registrar at the Port of Registry de novo a form of application to the Registrar at the Port of original registry in the Colony, calling for a transfer of the registry under the provisions of the Act. This application the Registrar at the Port of registry de novo will forward with the old certificate of registry to the Colony. A suggested Form of Application is enclosed, with Forms of Letters from the Registrar in this country to the Colonial Registrar, and of the reply to be sent by the latter.

4. On registering the Ship de novo the Registrar will insert in his Book the words "Registry

4. On registering the Ship de novo the Registrar will insert in his Book the words "Registry to be transferred from the Port of ", and on receiving the requisite information from the Colonial Registrar he will write under those words, "Registry completed by transfer from the Port of " with the data."

with the date.

5. The relaxation is to take effect at once, and to last, as to Ships Registered in the American Colonies, until the end of September, and as to Ships Registered in more distant Colonies, until the end of February next.

The effect of the relaxation will be to place the persons who accept the title in this country in as good a position, so far as regards registry, as they could have enjoyed under the former practice, whilst they will have the additional advantage (which they could not have had under former Acts) that their equitable title to the ship will, under the provisions of the new Act, be perfectly good.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, 14 Victoria, No. 35, intituled, "An Act for regulating the formation, drainage, and repair of Streets, "Courts, and Alleys on private property within the Town of Geelong," it is amongst other things enacted, That where any street, court or alley, on private property, in the Town of Geelong, shall not be, or shall not have been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired to the satisfaction of the Council of the said town; it shall be lawful for the said Council, at any time and from time to time, by any Order under the hand of the Mayor or Town Clerk of the said town, for the time being respectively, to order that any such street court or Town Clerk of the said town, for the time being respectively, to order that any such street, court or alley, or any part thereof, shall be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, in such manner and within such time as to the said Council may appear expedient; and thereupon the owners of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon such street, court or alley, on each side thereof, shall in such manner and within such time as shall be expressed in such Order, at their respective costs, charges and expenses, remove all obstructions, and well and sufficiently pave, flag, macadamize, level, drain and sewer, or otherwise complete or repair, so much of the said street, court or alley, to the centre thereof, as may be opposite to, and co-extensive with, their respective tenements adjoining or abutting on such streets, courts or alleys respectively; And whereas the streets, courts and alleys enumerated in the Schedule to this Order annexed, marked A., have not been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, to the satisfaction of the Council of the Town of Geelong: Be it now ordered by the Council of the said town, that the streets, courts and alleys en unerated in the Schedule to this Order annexed, marked A., shall, within ten days from the date of this Order coming into operation, be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained and sewered, in such manner as is expressed in the Schedule to this Order annexed, marked B.; and it is hereby notified to the owners respectively of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon the streets, courts and alleys enumerated in the Schedule to this Order annexed, marked A., that if they, or any of them, shall neglect or omit to remove the obstructions, and pave, flag, macadamize, level, drain and sewer, or otherwise complete or repair the street, court or alley on which their tenements respectively adjoin or abut, in the manner and within the time expressed in this Order, then the Council of the said town will remove all obstructions in the said streets, courts and alleys, and pave, flag, macadamize, level, drain, sewer, and otherwise complete or repair the same, or such parts thereof as shall not have been so done pursuant to this Order, and will thereupon ascertain, determine and charge such respective owners with their several proportionate parts of the costs, charges and expenses thereof, according to, and co-extensive with their respective tenements adjoining or abutting on such street, court or alley, having regard in such apportionment to the state and condition of the pavement, flagging, macadamizing, levelling, drainage and sewerage in which such streets, courts or alleys respectively, or any part thereof, shall or may be at the time of making this Order.

SCHEDULE B. REFERRED TO IN THIS ORDER.

Specification of manner in which the Streets, Courts and Alleys enumerated in Schedule A., referred to in this Order, are ordered to be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, in the Town of Geelong.

The natural soil is to be reduced or made up, as the case may require, so that the longitudinal section of the whole right-of-way shall in no part have an inclination of less than one foot in one hundred and thirty-two feet, and, where practicable, the entire length is to form one incline. The transverse section of the right-of-way is to show a roadway whose crown shall not be more than three inches above the kerbs of the footway, and the fall from the crown to the water channels is to be at the rate of one foot in twenty-four feet. On either side of the roadway there is to be a water channel two feet wide, consisting of three rows of bluestone pitchers eight inches deep and eight inches wide, made square on the ends with upright sides, set in sand and well rammed, so as to subside two inches; the bottom of such channel is to be six inches below the top of the kerbs. On either side of the roadway there is also to be a footway not more than four feet wide, which is to be separated from the roadway by a hardwood plank, ten inches by three inches, set on edge, and fastened with five-inch spikes to piles four inches by four inches, three feet long, driven into the ground not more than eight feet apart.
