MARINE STOCKADE AT WILLIAMSTOWN DISCONTINUED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Land Forces in the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation dated the sixth day of September, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, certain land, buildings and premises therein described, and called and known as the "Marine Stockade," situated at Williamstown, in the county of Bourke, were declared to be a Marine Stockade or Prison, House of Correction, and Penal Establishment within the meaning of an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders." And whereas it is deemed expedient to discontinue the use of the said premises as a penal establishment: Now therefore I, Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer and Officer administering the Government of Victoria, do, under the authority of the said Act, hereby revoke the said Proclamation dated the sixth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, and I do hereby direct that the use of the said premises, situated at Williamstown aforesaid, as a Marine Stockade or Prison, House of Correction, and Penal Establishment, be from henceforth discontinued.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this fifteenth day of September, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and in the twentieth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

LOCAL COURT REGULATION. BEECHWORTH.

REGULATION made by the Local Court of the District of Beechworth.

XXXIV. *Reservation of flooded claims.*—When at any time claims which are being worked shall become unworkable in consequence of flood or from excess of drainage water, it shall be competent for the Warden, upon written application from any claimholder affected by such flood or excess of drainage-water, to suspend by written sanction the working of such claim for a period of one month, and to extend such sanction from time to time at his discretion, provided that one man having a miner's right is daily in attendance upon such claim. A registration of all such sanctions to be kept by the Warden.

The foregoing Regulation, No. XXXIV., has been assented to by His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council.

SALE OF FERMENTED LIQUOR BY WHOLESALE IN THE DISTRICT OF BRIGHTON AND LITTLE BRIGHTON.

HIS Excellency the Officer administering the Government has been pleased to declare that the District of Brighton and Little Brighton shall come within the operation of the third clause of the Act of Council, 13 Victoria No. 29, so far as it amongst other things enacts that nothing in the said Act contained shall extend to any person who (within a town or place declared in the Gazette to come within the operation of the third clause thereof) shall dispose of any quantity, not less than two gallons, of any fermented liquor containing a quantity of alcohol not exceeding twenty-five per centum.

QUARTERLY SURVEY FOR HIGH PRESSURE STEAM VESSELS.

NOTICE is hereby given that under the fifth clause of the above cited Act the owner of every High Pressure steam vessel employed as stated is bound to have the whole of the machinery surveyed by the Engineer Surveyor appointed for that purpose by the Victoria Steam Navigation Board, in the manner and at the times following :—

A penalty of £5 is fixed by the Act for every day that the sending of any such declaration is delayed beyond fourteen days.

EMPLOYMENT OF CONVICT LABOR.

THE following Regulations as to the employment of prisoners for other than convict purposes (in lieu of the Regulations dated 15th August, 1856)* have been approved by the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, viz.:-

By His Excellency's Command,
WILLIAM C. HAINES.

1. All work performed by prisoners for other than convict purposes is to be paid for by the department or party receiving the benefit thereof, unless special directions to the contrary are given by the Chief Secretary in reference to any particular work.
2. Articles required for the Store branch of the public service are, as far as may be found advantageous, to be manufactured by prison labor.
3. Articles (not coming under clause 2) may also be manufactured, and work performed, for other departments of the public service, upon authorised application from the head of the department.
4. Such clothing and accoutrements for the Police and Penal Departments as are paid for by the men may be made, and the payment provided for in such manner as the internal arrangements of those departments may from time to time provide.
5. Prisoners may also be employed for the performance of such private work for the Officers and Wardens of the Penal Department as they may require, strictly for their own personal or household necessities, on payment of seven shillings and six pence per man, per diem, for mechanics, and five shillings for laborers, which is to be paid into the Treasury in the manner provided by the Regulations as to revenue; all materials to be found by the party for whom the work is performed.
6. The Inspector General is at liberty to sell by public auction, or otherwise, for the best price that can be obtained for the same, any stone, broken metal, or other raw material, solely the produce of prison labor, to any person or persons, paying the proceeds thereof into the Treasury, as provided by the Regulations as to revenue.
7. A return of all work undertaken by the Inspector General under the preceding clauses is to be forwarded monthly to the Honorable the Chief Secretary.

8. No benefit is to accrue to any department in consequence of receiving supplies of convict manufacture. Each department will be charged the full value of the article: the saving effected by the Government being the difference between the cost of the raw material used, and the price charged, which will be carried to the credit of the general revenue as the proceeds of the labor of prisoners.

9. The Colonial Storekeeper is not to procure in any other manner articles which can be with advantage manufactured by prison labor, provided the Inspector General is in a position to make the supply within such period as may be named.

10. Expenditure in the purchase of materials for manufacturing purposes is, as a rule, to be conducted under the same regulations as govern the entire service. Inasmuch, however, as it is difficult to estimate in sufficient time for the quarterly requisition how much material will be required, requisitions for such "raw material" may be sent in from time to time by the Inspector General to the Colonial Storekeeper, and they are to be executed by that officer without submitting them for the approval of the Governor, since the material will be required only for works authorised, and will be accounted for both in quantity and value by the Inspector General.

11. The accounts for such supplies being headed according to the requisitions, namely, "Manufacturing purposes of Penal Establishments," after certification by the Inspector General, will be forwarded by the Colonial Storekeeper in the manner customary with all accounts to the Treasury.

12. The whole of the supplies thus furnished are to be charged in the Treasury to an account for "Manufacturing purposes of Penal Establishments."

13. Such supplies as it may be desirable under clause 2 to have manufactured at Pentridge are to be ordered by the Colonial Storekeeper upon the Inspector General, and the articles required are to be manufactured at the earliest possible date.

14. The Inspector General is not to furnish manufactured articles for the public service which are comprised under clause 2 to any other department than the Colonial Stores.

15. No work except in household service is to be performed by the prisoners for the private benefit of the officers and men of the penal establishments, except as is provided under clauses 4 and 5.

16. Accounts are to be made out by the Inspector General against the departments receiving manufactured articles, or for which work is performed, as soon as possible after the execution of the order, and (as to those supplied under clause 2) are to be certified as to the price by the Colonial Storekeeper; and as to the supply by the Head of the Department; and as to the work done or articles supplied, under clause 3, by the Head of the Department only.

17. In these accounts it will be necessary for each description of article or work to be set down by the Inspector General at its value, a distinction being drawn between the cost of materials and the value of the labor.

18. On receipt of these vouchers, they will be charged by the Treasurer to the several departments, and paid in the usual manner to the Inspector General of Penal Establishments.

That officer, upon receiving the monies, will repay the amount into the Treasury, accompanying each payment with a proper voucher, and the total amount will then be brought to account at the Treasury under two heads, viz.:-"Repayment for Materials," (which will be credited to the account "Manufacturing purposes of Penal Establishments,") and "Proceeds of the Labor of Convicts," in the General Revenue.

19. At the termination of each half-year the Inspector General will draw up and transmit to the Chief Secretary a statement in the form of a debtor and creditor account, shewing on the one side the quantity and cost of materials, together with the balance from the previous half-year, and on the other the articles issued to the departments receiving same, specifying the date, department for which supplied, and value according to the accounts. The stock and value of manufactured articles on hand are likewise to be shewn; and also the stock and value—at the cost price—of raw material on hand, both of which must be ascertained from actual tally and inspection. The balance in value will, of course, shew the profit upon the transactions for the half-year.

20. These regulations are to come into operation on the 1st of October, 1856.

BARRABOOL HILLS CEMETERY.

RULES and Regulations for the Barrabool Hills Cemetery:—

1. All fees and charges must be paid to the Treasurer before the ground or vault is opened.
2. Applications for permission to make a vault or erect a monument in the Cemetery to be made to the Trustees. A certificate of permission will be granted to the persons applying on payment of the charges set forth in the schedule marked A.
3. The procession will be expected to arrive at the Cemetery punctually at the hour appointed for the funeral.
4. The Trustees will cause all common graves to be dug; but when a brick grave or vault is required it must be constructed under the direction of the Trustees, or some person duly appointed by them.
5. All vaults, graves, monuments, gravestones and fences to be kept in proper repair and condition at the expense of the owners.
6. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave must be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, granite, slate or iron.
7. A plan of every monument must be submitted to the Trustees for their approval.
8. In the erection of tablets, copper cramps must be used.
9. Wooden fenceings allowed, but if not kept in proper repair may be removed by order of the Trustees.
10. A plan of the grounds and a register will be kept, which may be examined on payment of the charges, according to schedule marked A.
11. Orders for interment to be given to the sexton or other person appointed by the Trustees, such notice to be given between the hours of Ten a.m. and sunset the previous day.
12. The name, age, late place of residence and probable cause of death of the deceased must be stated at the time of giving the order.
13. The usual hours for interment will be from Ten a.m. to Six p.m. from 1st September to 30th April, and from Ten a.m. to Four p.m. in the other months of the year, with the exceptions of Sundays, when the hours will be from Eight a.m. to Ten a.m. and from Three p.m. to Five p.m.
14. In case an interment is to be made in any private vault or grave the consent in writing of the proprietor must be left with the order.
15. The Trustees reserve to themselves the right of making any alteration from time to time in these regulations and charges, subject to His Excellency the Governor's approval.
16. All persons destroying the fences or in any otherwise injuring the Cemetery, will be prosecuted as the law directs.
17. The charges will be remitted for the burial of any person on evidence being produced to the Trustees that the relations or friends of such persons are unable to pay the costs and charges.

MUNICIPALITY OF PRAHRAN.

BYE-LAW 38.—A BYE-LAW FOR REGULATING THE FORMATION OF CROSSINGS FOR WHEELED VEHICLES OVER FOOTPATHS, AND FOR THE PROTECTION OF THE FOOTPATH AND WATER CHANNELS.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18th Victoria No. 15, intitled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is amongst other things enacted that the Council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act "shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets and public thoroughfares, and shall and may make such Bye-laws for carrying out their objects as shall to such Council seem fit." Be it therefore ordered and directed by the Municipal Council for the District of Prahran

from and after this Bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Officer administering the Government of Victoria, as required by the provisions of the said Act, That all persons having, or that may hereafter have, roadways for carts and other wheeled vehicles across the footpaths now formed, or that may hereafter be formed by the Council in the Municipality of Prahran, shall, at their own cost, provide, construct and maintain a crossing place over the water channel and footpath, in the manner following: In streets where a stone or wood kerb is now or hereafter may be laid, the crossing shall be paved with stone or wood pavement, the whole width of the footpath from the interior edge thereof to the pavement of the water channel, and the pavement shall be inclosed on both sides with stone or wood kerb of the same size and description as the street kerbing, which it must join closely at the angles; the water channel must not in any way be altered or obstructed, and it must be maintained at all times in as good repair, at the cost of the persons having the crossing, as the other portions of the water channel immediately adjoining.

In streets where a footpath and side channel is or may hereafter be formed, and where no kerbing is laid, suitable wood planks or scantlings shall be provided and fixed over the water channel, so as to have a free passage for the water underneath, to project into the public roadway not less than five feet from the outer edge of the footpath, and the crossing place over the footpath shall be paved, metalled or gravelled in such manner that it shall at all times be as clean and dry as the footpath itself is immediately adjoining such crossing place.

The materials used for such crossing places and kerbing, and the manner of laying the same, shall be subject to the approval of the Municipal Council or the duly appointed surveyor; and in cases where the material or manner of laying the same or forming the crossing places shall, on the report of the surveyor, be deemed objectionable by the said Council, it shall be lawful for the said Council (after the expiration of seven days from any day on which such Council shall give notice of objection to the persons forming or causing to be formed such crossing place) to proceed in the manner hereinafter stated as against parties refusing or neglecting to comply with the provisions of this Bye-law.

All persons about forming crossing places over footpaths shall give notice in writing of their intention, and submit a specification of the manner in which the work is to be performed to the Surveyor, who shall give permission for the same to be proceeded with as specified, provided the specified manner is not objectionable, and shall charge and receive a fee of five shillings for each examination and permission.

All persons crossing any formed water channel or footpath, or causing such to be crossed with or by any cart, dray or other wheeled vehicles, excepting the channels in the carriage ways at the intersections of the public streets, unless over and by means of a crossing place formed in one or other of the manners hereinafter stated, and any persons neglecting or refusing to comply with any other provisions of this Bye-law, on conviction before two or more Justices of the Peace, shall forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds, as enacted by the 35 section of 18 Victoria No. 15.

It shall be lawful for the said Municipal Council also whenever it appears that carts or other wheeled vehicles habitually and frequently cross any formed channel and footpath to any right-of-way, yard or other premises without a crossing place having been made as hereinbefore stated, to form such a crossing place and recover the expense and cost of its construction from the owner or occupier of the premises entered by its use; and cases of common right-of-way from the several owners and occupiers of the premises forming the boundaries thereof, or to which it is appurtenant, and any person refusing or neglecting to pay the amount owing for such construction in the manner aforesaid, shall be liable to the penalty hereinbefore stated for a breach of this Bye-law.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 38, made by the Municipal Council of Prahran, has been assented to by His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF EMERALD HILL.

BYE-LAW No. 6.—A BYE-LAW TO PREVENT THE NUISANCES ARISING FROM SUFFERING CATTLE TO BE AT LARGE IN THE STREETS AND OTHER UNENCLOSED PLACES WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF EMERALD HILL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria 18th Victoria No. 15, intitled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be competent for the Council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act to make Bye-laws for the suppression of nuisances, the preservation of the public health, and the general good rule and management of such municipal district; And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the 26th day of May, A.D. 1855, the District of Emerald Hill was duly established a municipal district under the provisions and within the meaning of the said Act; And whereas it is expedient to make a Bye-

law for the more certain prevention of the nuisance occasioned from cattle being allowed to be at large in the streets, and other unenclosed places, within the limits of the Town proper as marked out on the Government maps: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the Municipal Council for the District of Emerald Hill, that from and after the date of this Bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Officer administering the Government of Victoria, as required by the provisions of the said Act—

It shall not be lawful for any person to suffer any swine, or any horse, ass, mule, cow, sheep, goat, or other cattle belonging to him or her, or under his or her charge, to be at large in any street or public place, or in any unenclosed place within the limits of the town proper of Emerald Hill as marked out on the Government maps, or within one hundred yards thereof, whether the same be or be not public property, and any person who shall so offend shall on conviction thereof before two or more Justices of the Peace forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding five pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 6, made by the Municipal Council of Emerald Hill, has been assented to by His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF EMERALD HILL.

BYE-LAW No. 7.—A BYE-LAW FOR THE PREVENTION OF FIRE, AND THE SUPPRESSION OF NUISANCES ARISING FROM SMOKE ISSUING FROM INSUFFICIENT OR IMPROPERLY CONSTRUCTED CHIMNEYS.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18th Victoria No. 15, intitled "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be competent for the Council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act, to make Bye-laws for the prevention of fires and the suppression of nuisances within the said District; And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the 26th day of May, A.D. 1855, the District of Emerald Hill was duly established a municipal district, under the provisions and within the meaning of the said Act; And whereas serious danger from fire, and grievous nuisance from smoke have arisen, on account of the careless and insufficient manner in which chimneys have been constructed within this municipality; Be it therefore ordered and directed by the Municipal Council for the district of Emerald Hill, that from and after the date of this Bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Officer administering the Government of Victoria, as required by the provisions of the said Act, it shall be lawful for the Council, or their Inspector, on complaint in writing from any rate-payer that any chimney, flue, or vent is constructed of improper materials, or that the top of such chimney, though constructed of proper materials, is not sufficiently elevated or removed from any inflammable materials of which the roof or other portions of the building or any adjoining building is constructed, or that any chimney is not so constructed as properly to carry up the smoke so that it becomes a nuisance to the neighbours, then in case of any such complaint, or if it shall appear necessary to the Inspector without such complaint, he shall forthwith proceed to inspect the same, and if he shall find that there is proper ground for such complaint, or reasonable cause to apprehend danger or nuisance, he shall forthwith serve a notice upon the occupier of such premises, calling on him to alter the said chimney, vent, or flue, in such manner as shall be pointed out in such notice, and any occupier refusing or delaying for more than one week to make the alteration required shall, on conviction thereof before two or more Justices of the Peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding five pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 7, made by the Municipal Council of Emerald Hill, has been assented to by His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council.

BYE-LAW No. 8.—A BYE-LAW FOR REGULATING THE FORMATION OF CROSSINGS FOR WHEELED VEHICLES OVER FOOTPATHS AND FOR PROTECTING THE FOOTPATHS AND WATER CHANNELS.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18th Victoria No. 15, intitled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is amongst other things enacted that the Council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets, and public thoroughfares, and shall and may make such Bye-laws for carrying out these objects as shall to such Council seem fit; And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the 26th day of May, A.D. 1855, the district of Emerald Hill was duly established a municipal district, under the provisions and

within the meaning of the said Act: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the Municipal Council for the District of Emerald Hill, that from and after the date of this Bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Officer administering the Government of Victoria, as required by the provisions of the said Act—

All persons having or that may hereafter have roadways for carts and other wheeled vehicles across the footpaths now formed, or that may hereafter be formed by the Municipal Council of Emerald Hill, shall at their own cost provide, construct and maintain a crossing place over the water channel and footpath in the manner following:—

In streets where a stone or wood kerb is now or hereafter may be laid, the crossing shall be paved with stone pavement or broken metal the whole width of the footpath from the building line to the pavement of the water-channel, and shall be enclosed on both sides with a stone or wood kerb, of the same size and description as the street kerbing, which it must join with a gentle curve; the water-channel must not in any way be altered or obstructed, and it must be maintained at all times in good repair, at the cost of the persons having the crossings.

In streets where a footpath and side-channel are or may hereafter be formed, and where no kerbing is laid, suitable wooden bridges shall be provided and fixed over the water-channel so as to leave a free passage for the water underneath, said bridges to project into the public roadway not less than four feet from the outer edge of the footpath, and the crossing place over the footpaths, whether paved, metalled, or gravelled, shall be maintained in such manner that it shall at all times be as clear and dry as the footpath itself immediately adjoining such crossing place.

The materials used for such crossing-places and kerbing, and the manner of laying the same shall be subject to the approval of the Municipal Council, or the duly appointed town surveyor; and in cases where the material, or manner of laying the same, or forming the crossing places, shall, on the report of the town surveyor, be deemed objectionable by the said Council, it shall be lawful for the said council (after the expiration of seven days from any day on which such Council shall give notice of objection to the persons forming or causing to be formed such crossing place) to proceed in the manner hereinafter stated as against parties refusing or neglecting to comply with the provisions of this Bye-law.

All persons about forming crossing places over footpaths shall give notice in writing of their intention, and submit a specification of the manner in which the work is to be performed to the town surveyor, who shall give permission for the same to be proceeded with as specified, provided the specified manner is not objectionable, and shall charge and receive a fee of five shillings for each examination and permission.

All persons crossing any formed water channel or footpath, or causing such to be crossed with or by any cart, dray, or other wheeled vehicle, unless over and by means of a crossing place formed in one or other of the manners hereinbefore stated, and any person neglecting or refusing to comply with any other provisions of this Bye-law shall, on conviction thereof before two or more Justices of the Peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds, as enacted by the 35th section of the 18th Victoria No. 15.

It shall also be lawful for the said Municipal Council, whenever it appears that carts or other wheeled vehicles habitually and frequently cross any formed footpath or channel, to any right-of-way, yard, or other premises, without a crossing place having been made as hereinbefore stated, to form such a crossing place, and recover the expense and cost of its construction from the owner or occupier of the premises entered by its use; and in cases of common rights-of-way, from the several owners and occupiers of the premises abutting thereon, or to which it is appurtenant, and any person refusing or neglecting to pay the amount owing for such construction, in the manner aforesaid, shall be liable to the penalty hereinbefore stated for a breach of this Bye-law.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 8, made by the Municipal Council of Emerald Hill, has been assented to by His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council.
