CENSUS OF VICTORIA—PRELIMINARY COMMISSION.

*By His Excellency MAJOR-GENERAL MACARTHUR, the Officer administering
the Government of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c.*

To MAJOR CAMPBELL, WILLIAM WESTGARTH, Esquire, THOMAS HERBERT POWER, Esquire, and DUNCAN LONGDEN, Esquire, of the Colony of Victoria,

GREETING,—

Whereas it is expedient that an account should be taken in the present year of Our Lord of the number of persons who shall be resident within the Colony of Victoria on a day to be hereafter appointed, as well as of the age, sex, religion, education, domestic condition, birth-place and occupation of every such person, and of such further particulars as may be required under the provisions of any Act which may be hereafter passed for this purpose: And whereas great difficulties have been experienced in past years in taking a correct census of the population of this Colony, owing to the want of a minute subdivision of the country into convenient districts, and to the migratory or unsettled habits of a large proportion of the inhabitants: We therefore have deemed it fit that a Commission should forthwith issue for the purpose, amongst other things, of making the preliminary arrangements for taking the aforesaid account of the population, preparing the form of schedule to be filled up by each householder, defining the limits and boundaries of suitable enumeration districts, and framing the necessary regulations and instructions for the guidance of the officers who may be appointed to carry out the provisions to be passed for the purpose aforesaid: Now know ye that We, reposing great trust and confidence in your knowledge and ability, have authorised and appointed, and do by these presents authorise and appoint you the said MAJOR CAMPBELL, WILLIAM WESTGARTH, THOMAS HERBERT POWER and DUNCAN LONGDEN, to be Our Commissioners for the purposes aforesaid: And We do by these presents give and grant to you, as far as in Us lies, full power and authority to call before you such persons as you shall judge likely to afford you information on the subject of this Our Commission, and to act generally in the premises as it shall appear to you expedient: And We do also constitute and appoint you, the said MAJOR CAMPBELL, to be Chairman of the said Commissioners: And for your further assistance in the execution of the premises, We do hereby appoint ROBERT BROUGH SMYTH and FRANCIS A. CORBETT to be Joint Secretaries to this Our Commission, should such assistance be deemed necessary by you Our said Commissioners. And We hereby direct and appoint that you do report to Us, in writing under your hands and seals, your proceedings, and also your recommendations of proper persons to be appointed to carry out the provisions of any Act to be passed for the purpose aforesaid.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this ninth day of September,
in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and in the twentieth
year of Her Majesty's Reign.

EMPLOYMENT OF CONVICT LABOR.

THE following Regulations as to the employment of prisoners for other than convict purposes (in lieu of the Regulations dated 15th August, 1856),* have been approved by the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council.

By His Excellency's Command,

WILLIAM C. HAINES.

X.6024.

1. All work performed by prisoners for other than convict purposes is to be paid for by the department or party receiving the benefit thereof, unless special directions to the contrary are given by the Chief Secretary in reference to any particular work.

2. Articles required for the Store branch of the public service are, as far as may be found advantageous, to be manufactured by prison labor.

3. Articles (not coming under clause 2) may also be manufactured, and work performed, for other departments of the public service, upon authorised application from the head of the department.

4. Such clothing and accoutrements for the Police and Penal Departments as are paid for by the men may be made, and the payment provided for in such manner as the internal arrangements of those departments may from time to time provide.

5. Prisoners may also be employed for the performance of such private work for the Officers and Wardens of the Penal Department as they may require, strictly for their own personal or household necessities, on payment of seven shillings and six pence per man, per diem, for mechanics, and five shillings for laborers, which is to be paid into the Treasury in the manner provided by the Regulations as to revenue; all materials to be found by the party for whom the work is performed.

6. The Inspector General is at liberty to sell by public auction, or otherwise, for the best price that can be obtained for the same, any stone, broken metal, or other raw material, solely the produce of prison labor, to any person or persons, paying the proceeds thereof into the Treasury, as provided by the Regulations as to revenue.

7. A return of all work undertaken by the Inspector General under the preceding clauses is to be forwarded monthly to the Honorable the Chief Secretary.

8. No benefit is to accrue to any department in consequence of receiving supplies of convict manufacture. Each department will be charged the full value of the article: the saving effected by the Government being the difference between the cost of the raw material used, and the price charged, which will be carried to the credit of the general revenue as the proceeds of the labor of prisoners.

9. The Colonial Storekeeper is not to procure in any other manner articles which can be with advantage manufactured by prison labor, provided the Inspector General is in a position to make the supply within such period as may be named.

10. Expenditure in the purchase of materials for manufacturing purposes is, as a rule, to be conducted under the same regulations as govern the entire service. Inasmuch, however, as it is difficult to estimate in sufficient time for the quarterly requisition how much material will be required, requisitions for such "raw material" may be sent in from time to time by the Inspector General to the Colonial Storekeeper, and they are to be executed by that officer without submitting them for the approval of the Governor, since the material will be required only for works authorised, and will be accounted for both in quantity and value by the Inspector General.

11. The accounts for such supplies being headed according to the requisitions, namely, "Manufacturing purposes of Penal Establishments," after certification by the Inspector General, will be forwarded by the Colonial Storekeeper in the manner customary with all accounts to the Treasury.

12. The whole of the supplies thus furnished are to be charged in the Treasury to an account for "Manufacturing purposes of Penal Establishments."

13. Such supplies as it may be desirable under clause 2 to have manufactured at Pentridge are to be ordered by the Colonial Storekeeper upon the Inspector General, and the articles required are to be manufactured at the earliest possible date.

14. The Inspector General is not to furnish manufactured articles for the public service which are comprised under clause 2 to any other department than the Colonial Stores.

15. No work except in household service is to be performed by the prisoners for the private benefit of the officers and men of the penal establishments, except as is provided under clauses 4 and 5.

16. Accounts are to be made out by the Inspector General against the departments receiving manufactured articles, or for which work is performed, as soon as possible after the execution of the order, and (as to those supplied under clause 2) are to be certified as to the price by the Colonial Storekeeper; and as to the supply by the Head of the Department; and as to the work done or articles supplied, under clause 3, by the Head of the Department only.

17. In these accounts it will be necessary for each description of article or work to be set down by the Inspector General at its value, a distinction being drawn between the cost of materials and the value of the labor.

18. On receipt of these vouchers, they will be charged by the Treasurer to the several departments, and paid in the usual manner to the Inspector General of Penal Establishments.

That officer, upon receiving the monies, will repay the amount into the Treasury, accompanying each payment with a proper voucher, and the total amount will then be brought to account at the Treasury under two heads, viz. :—"Repayment for Materials," (which will be credited to the account "Manufacturing purposes of Penal Establishments.") and "Proceeds of the Labor of Convicts," in the General Revenue.

19. At the termination of each half-year the Inspector General will draw up and transmit to the Chief Secretary a statement in the form of a debtor and creditor account, shewing on the one side the quantity and cost of materials, together with the balance from the previous half-year, and on the other the articles issued to the departments receiving same, specifying the date, department for which supplied, and value according to the accounts. The stock and value of manufactured articles on hand are likewise to be shewn; and also the stock and value—at the cost price—of raw material on hand, both of which must be ascertained from actual tally and inspection. The balance in value will, of course, shew the profit upon the transactions for the half-year.

20. These regulations are to come into operation on the 1st of October, 1856.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

RAGLAN.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the District of Raglan:—

i. *Classification of claims.*—Gold mining shall be divided into two classes, and distinguished as wet workings and dry workings.

Wet workings shall be understood to embrace all ground where slabbing from top to bottom is required.

Dry workings shall be understood to embrace all ground of whatever description, where slabbing from top to bottom is not required. In the event of any dispute arising as to which of the above classes any claim or claims shall belong, such dispute shall be decided by the Warden.

ii. *Wet workings.*—Size of claims, when the depth of the sinking does not exceed 40 feet—

For 2 men	15 x 24	or	360 square feet

Such claims in all cases (unless where hereinafter provided for) to be marked in the form of a square.

When the depth of the sinking is over 40 feet and does not exceed 100 feet—

and for every additional man 288 square feet.

When the depth of sinking exceeds 100 feet—

For 8 men 50 x 50 or 2500 square feet
and for every additional man 312 square feet.

iii. *Water baling and nightwork.*—When the quantity of water is so great as to require baling both day and night (of which the Warden shall be the sole judge), it shall be competent for him to compel all parties who have struck water to bale day and night; and in all cases where the above baling is requisite it shall be compulsory on all parties, in every direction, within six claims of the last shaft striking water, to sink their shafts and bale water both day and night until their claims are abandoned.

iv. *Drawing slabs from abandoned claims.*—In no case will parties be allowed to draw slabs from drifts or strata of rock where there is water, without immediately afterwards filling up the shaft below such rock or drift, so as to prevent the water from such drift or strata of rock finding its way into adjoining claims. When a claim is abandoned or left unworked, the Warden shall be empowered to make such an order as he may deem best for protecting parties holding adjoining claims from suffering injury from the flow or escape of water from such claim so left abandoned or unworked. Slabs left in any shaft for fourteen days after such claim is abandoned shall be held as forfeited, and may be drawn and appropriated by any party requiring the same.

v. *Dry workings.*—In surfacing, or where the depth of sinking does not exceed 30 feet, the size of claims shall be—

For 1 man	12 x 12	or	144 square feet

and for every additional man 144 square feet.

Where the depth of sinking is over 30 feet and does not exceed 50 feet—

and for every additional man 180 square feet.

Where the depth of sinking is over 50 feet and does not exceed 100 feet—

For 4 men	30 x 30	or	900 square feet

Where the depth of sinking exceeds 100 feet—

For 4 men	34 x 34	or	1156 square feet

and for every additional man 288 square feet.

vi. *Frontage claims.*—Claims upon all ground supposed to contain recognized leads or gutters, (as hereinafter defined) shall be of an indefinite width, until the discovery of such leads or gutters, when the extent of claims upon the supposed line of such leads or gutters shall be according to the classification before specified, subject to the following regulation:—

Marking of claim.—All claims shall be marked at right angles with the supposed course of the lead. Any party of

miners, in the absence of the warden or of an authorized surveyor, shall be allowed to mark out their claims, subject to the regulations herein provided.

vii. *Definition of lead or gutter.*—The term lead or gutter as herein used, shall mean the alluvial deposit or washing dirt containing gold, and running in a continuous line for any considerable distance; patches or alternate deposits of washing dirt occurring repeatedly and successively shall come within the meaning of the aforesaid definition of the word lead or gutter, as herein used.

viii. *Puddling machines.*—No party shall be allowed to erect a dam for a puddling machine without first obtaining a written authority from the Warden. The party first obtaining such authority shall take precedence in the selection of a site for their dam and puddling machine, and in no case will any succeeding party be allowed to construct their dam so as to throw back their refuse water on the preceding dam. It shall be compulsory on every party erecting such dam to provide sufficient drainage to carry their slush or refuse water, as well as that of the dam preceding theirs, as far as the lower extremity of the dam below. In no case will any party be allowed to construct a dam in advance of any working lead, or in immediate juxtaposition thereto, but must, in all cases, place such erection at the rear of a working lead, or in any other location at the discretion of the Warden which will not interfere with the public interests.

ix. *Old workings.*—The size of claims on old workings shall be regulated according to the classification hereinbefore specified, and shall be four times the extent of claims on new or unworked ground, in proportion to the number of miners employed, but in no case will such claims be allowed to exceed in length three times their breadth. The Warden in all cases to be the judge as to what is old workings.

x. *Amalgamation of claims.*—A comprehensive system of amalgamation is allowed, subject to the following regulations:—

xi. *Extent of claims.*—In all cases the areas of amalgamated claims shall be in proportion to the number of men holding Miners' Rights in such company. The quantity of ground for each man shall be as herein provided according to the classification.

xii. *Sanction for amalgamation.*—In no case will amalgamated claims be allowed without special permission from the Warden, and where more than three claims are amalgamated, it must be by special recommendation of the Local Court, and in all such cases application must be made to the Local Court through the clerk or chairman at least eight days previous to such sanction being given, such applications to state, first, date of application; second, situation and plan of the ground; third, the class of mining; fourth, if claims are to be worked by machinery, if so, state its description, more particularly with regard to its efficacy for the drainage of ground; fifth, whether worked or unworked ground; sixth, name or title of such firm or company; seventh, names in full, also date and number of the miner's right of every shareholder.

xiii. *Amalgamation not allowed.*—The amalgamation of claims shall not be allowed where it would be injurious to the public good.

xiv. *Rules for the management of amalgamated companies.*—When application is made to the Local Court, as herein provided, such application must be accompanied by a copy of the general rules for the management of such company, and such rules shall be registered by the clerk of the Local Court.

xv. *Competent person to inspect the ground.*—Upon such application being made to the Local Court, the Court may appoint some competent person to inspect the ground, who shall report in writing to the Local Court upon the desirability of sanctioning such amalgamated claims.

xvi. *Application to be posted.*—In all cases a notice of such application shall be posted upon the most conspicuous part of the ground applied for, and also upon the Local Court House at least eight days before the sanction for such amalgamation being given, and all objections to the same must be made in writing to the Court within six days of the posting of such application.

xvii. *Amalgamated companies shall be registered.*—When the amalgamation of claims is sanctioned by the Local Court, such claims shall be registered by the clerk, and a duplicate of such registration shall be given to the companies registered.

General Rules.

xviii. *Shepherding.*—It shall be unlawful for any miner or miners to retain any claim, or portion thereof, in reserve, or unworked, on any pretext whatever. On a claim being marked out the party or parties so doing must immediately commence to work such claim, and continue to perform every lawful day a regular day's work, in proportion to the number of men holding such claim, until it is abandoned; and should the above condition not be complied with such claim shall be held as wholly or in part abandoned, and shall wholly or in part be liable to become the property of any claimant or claimants who can satisfactorily substantiate such deficiency of labor, the party or parties in possession, in such cases, being allowed to retain such share or shares as they can work in accordance with the foregoing rules, and no more. In cases where the sinking is too deep for one man, the holder of such claim shall not be dispossessed of his share, but the remaining share or shares are liable to be taken possession of by any claimant or claimants if the required work is not performed each day as

before specified. In cases where the party or parties in possession do not, on such claim being made, comply with the above conditions, the mode of procedure shall be as follows, viz.:—Any person or number of persons claiming a share or any number of shares, under the abovementioned conditions, shall, in presence of a witness, request of the party or parties in possession of such claim either to be permitted to enter into the partnership of such claim, to the extent of such share or shares as he or they may, in accordance with the foregoing rule legally demand, or request to be permitted to apportion the party or parties in possession of such claim the proportion of ground they are legally entitled to, in proportion to the number of miners working such claim every lawful day as aforesaid. In the event of the party or parties so in possession refusing or delaying to comply with such request, the Warden shall adjudicate on such refusal, as is usual in disputed cases; but it shall be compulsory on the part of such claimant or claimants to inform, in presence of a witness, the party or parties in possession of the day on which the Warden will adjudicate on such refusal.

xxix. Ownership of shares.—No miner or number of miners shall hold at one and the same time more than one claim or share of a claim as before specified, but any individual possessing a Miner's Right may own one or more shares in any number of claims, providing always that each and every share so held and owned must and shall be represented by a practical miner holding a Miner's Right, and actually working on such claim or claims so owned.

xx. Sale or transfer of shares.—The bona fide owner of any such share or number of shares, may sell or otherwise dispose of any such share or shares, or any part thereof, providing such share or shares continue to be represented as hereinbefore provided.

xxi. Walls to be left.—When ground is marked out, a wall which will be neutral ground must be left betwixt every two claims, as follows, viz.:—

Claims for 8 men, 6 feet of a wall

" 6 " 4 "

Less than 6 " 3 "

Should the walls in any case exceed the above dimensions, they shall cease to be neutral ground, and may be taken possession of and worked by any party or parties disposed so to do.

xxii. Position of shafts.—The shaft in all cases must be placed in the centre of the claim, except in extended, amalgamated, or frontage claims. Should it in any case be impracticable so to place it, a plan of the claim must be prepared, showing the cause of obstruction and proposed position, which plan must be signed by the Warden.

xxiii. Form of claims.—Claims must in all cases be marked out in the form of a square, and be of the dimensions before specified, in proportion to the number of men to be engaged working such claim, excepting always, as herein provided, extended or prospecting claims. Parties holding an extended claim, as hereinafter provided, may mark their ground either in the form of a parallelogram or square at their option, provided that such claim shall not exceed in superficial feet the quantity allowed according to the classification before specified, and in proportion to the number of men working such claim.

xxiv. Prospecting drives, &c.—Every party or parties on bottoming a shaft shall, within a reasonable time thereafter, put a prospecting drive across the reef until the lead or gutter is found or the claim abandoned, and so soon as such lead or gutter is found a main drive shall be carried along the course of such lead or gutter to the boundaries of the claim. In no case will it be lawful for any party to fence in or drive out their claim until the above rule be complied with: declaring always that it shall be lawful for any duly authorised person to survey such claim and mark the ascertained course of such lead or gutter on the surface for the public benefit. In no case must the drives beforementioned exceed eight feet in width.

xxv. Claims to be numbered and registered.—In all claims that require more than four men, and in extended, amalgamated or frontage claims, such claims shall be numbered consecutively and registered by the clerk of the court, such registration to contain a list of the names, with the number and date of the miner's right of each individual composing such party or parties, and a duplicate of such registration shall be held by the party or parties so registering. In all cases where a claim or any part thereof is transferred or otherwise disposed of, such transfer must be registered or it will be held as null and void. A copy of such registration shall in every case be posted on a conspicuous part of the claim to which it bears reference, and be kept legible until the claim is abandoned. When the above rule is neglected, such claim or claims shall be held as belonging to four or a less number of men only.

xxvi. Position of claims in case of deviation of leads.—In cases where the gutter or lead changes its course from the supposed one, the positions of the original claims shall be changed accordingly, taking precedence as before according to their registered numbers.

xxvii. Cross and junction leads.—In cases of cross leads, viz., where one lead crosses and intersects another lead, claims shall be allowed upon such leads, subject to the conditions hereinafter mentioned for frontage claims. The claim owners upon each lead shall have protection from the claim owners upon adjoining leads. Upon the junction of two leads,

the mining parties upon such leads shall take precedence upon the lead according to the date of their registration, and those parties that in consequence have to remove ahead of the lead shall take precedence in manner aforesaid.

xxviii. Allowances for machinery, &c.—It shall be competent for the Local Court to allow larger claims than any hereinbefore specified to any company erecting a steam engine or other machinery for the more effectual working of the ground. Any company applying for such allowance must specify in writing the nature of the proposed machinery, the number of men to be employed, and the names of the individual members of such company.

xxix. Surveyor.—A competent practical miner shall be appointed surveyor, whose duty it shall be to measure and mark off claims, survey them when the gutter or lead is discovered, and mark its position on the surface by fixing a flag upon the spot, survey in all cases of encroachments, and perform such other duties as legitimately come under his notice as surveyor of the leads.

xxx. Prospecting.—Any person or persons engaged in prospecting new ground shall, on their finding a lead, be entitled to an extent of claim as follows: In dry workings, three claims in length along the course of the lead by one in width; and for wet workings, four claims in length along the course of the lead, by one in width, in accordance with the classification as hereinbefore provided, and in proportion to the number of men actually engaged in such prospecting; and it shall be in the option of such prospector or prospectors, to mark such claims in the form of a square, instead of a parallelogram if so disposed. Parties intending to prospect shall be permitted to mark their claims as follows, viz.: Commencing at any desired spot, mark the full extent in length, according to classification, and in proportion to the number of men actually engaged in such prospecting, along the supposed line of the lead—from these two points, two lines drawn at right angles and of indefinite length, shall embrace the scope of ground allowed until the discovery of a lead, when the rules as hereinbefore specified shall apply. When more than one party combines to prospect any piece of ground, it shall not be compulsory on them to sink a shaft on each claim, provided each party sink a shaft at one and the same time, either successively in a diagonal line, or at right angles with the supposed lead, or in any other way calculated to economise time, and ensure greater certainty of discovering a lead. When more than one party contemplate combining their labor to prospect a piece of ground, it shall be competent for the Warden to make a special allowance, and such allowance shall be a sufficient protection from all encroachment. Parties prospecting half a mile a-head of an established lead may be allowed an extent of two claims upon such lead, and such claims are to be under the head of frontage claims, provided such discovery may have been made public before the last bottomed hole on the lead can have got within a distance of one quarter of a mile of such prospecting shaft.

xxxi. Allowances prior to discovery.—After a new lead or other new workings are discovered, all allowance made for prospecting for or on such lead or workings shall be annulled, except that made to the bona fide discoverers.

xxxii. Prospectors shall report discoveries.—Parties discovering new leads or other workings, under these regulations, shall report and make an affidavit of the same to the Warden of the district in which such discovery shall have been made, with as little delay as possible, when the Warden can make a correct allowance for such parties, the depth of sinking and all other difficulties attending the same being ascertained by him.

xxxiii. Unsuccessful prospectors.—When it is satisfactorily proved that parties have been prospecting for a lead or other workings, and that they have spent considerable time and labor on such search, although such parties may not have been successful in making a discovery of any new lead or workings, it shall be in the power of the Warden to give such parties double claims on such lead.

xxxiv. Store sites.—Holders of business licenses shall be entitled to an extent of frontage not exceeding thirty-three feet, and of indefinite depth, when such extent is not injurious to the public welfare, of which the Warden shall be judge.

xxxv. Quartz mining.—In quartz mining the extent of claim to which each Miner's Right shall entitle the holder shall be—

For 1 miner, 20 feet along the vein with the dips and angles

xxxvi. Prospecting for new reefs.—Any person prospecting for and discovering any auriferous quartz vein shall receive a treble claim, providing such discovery be made known to the Warden immediately after such discovery.

BYE-LAW No. 8.—TO REGULATE THE ERECTION OF SHADES OR AWNINGS OVER OR ACROSS THE PUBLIC FOOTPATHS.

WHEREAS it is expedient and necessary to regulate and control the erection of shades or awnings over or across the public footpaths in the front of shops, dwelling-houses or other premises within the Municipality of Williamstown so as to prevent such erections from becoming public nuisances: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the Council of the Municipal District of Williamstown that from and after the date of this Bye-law, receiving the assent of His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, pursuant to 18 Victoria No. 15, section 33, &c., that any person or persons who shall erect or cause to be erected any shade or awning over or across any public footpath within the municipality, without having first obtained in writing the consent of the said Municipal Council to such erection, shall, on conviction thereof before any two or more of the Justices of the Peace for the said district, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding Ten pounds; 2. And be it further ordered and directed by the authority aforesaid, that every such shade or awning, when such consent to the erection of the same shall have been obtained, shall be erected with the upright posts or pillars thereof immediately at the outside of the kerbstone or other boundary of the footpath in front of any shop, dwelling-house or other premises to which such shade or awnings shall be attached, and that no plate, rafter or tie of any such shade or awning shall be of a less height above the surface of such path than eight feet in the clear to the under side of such plate, rafter or tie; And be it further ordered and directed, that it shall be lawful for the said Council to direct and require the removal of any shade or awning erected across or over any public footpath of the said municipality, except the same be in strict accordance with the foregoing directions, whether such shade or awning shall have been erected prior to the date of this Bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, or subsequently thereto; and it shall be lawful for the said Council to give notice to remove any such shade or awning by means of the surveyor or other officer of such Council to any owner or occupier, by, whom, or for whom such shade or awning shall have been erected, and any such owner or occupier who shall refuse or neglect to remove any such shade or awning within forty-eight hours from the time of such notice of removal being given, shall on conviction thereof, before any two or more of the Justices of the Peace for the said district, forfeit and pay for every such offence, refusal or neglect, a sum or penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 8, made by the Municipal Council of Williamstown, has been assented to by His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council.
