VICTORIA VOLUNTEER ARTILLERY REGIMENT.

RULES and Regulations of the Victoria Volunteer Artillery Regiment.

Construction of the Regiment.

1. The Regiment shall be open to all respectable persons, subject to the approval of the Bench of Magistrates and Court of Assistants. Each candidate for admission shall be proposed and seconded in writing by members of the Regiment.

Subscriptions to be paid on the 1st January.

2. The annual subscription, amounting to one guinea, is to be paid to the Treasurer or Adjutant; and no candidate shall be sworn in until such is paid. All subscriptions to be due on the 1st January in each year, and if not paid by the end of that month 50 per cent. increase to be enforced.

Members resigning to pay for uniform.

3. All members who resign before the expiration of six months from the date of enrolment, will be required to pay the contract price for their uniform; any member leaving in the seventh month to pay five-sixths of cost, in the eighth month four-sixths, in the ninth three-sixths, in the tenth two-sixths, in the eleventh one-sixth. At the expiration of twelve months the uniform is to become the property of the member.

Members to be responsible for Arms and Accoutrements.

4. Members will be responsible for the good and serviceable order of their arms and accoutrements, and any damage done thereto shall be made good by the parties causing the same.

Twenty-eight days notice of resignation required.

5. No member shall resign without giving twenty-eight days notice in writing to the Adjutant; and no resignation shall be accepted until the member resigning shall have paid all fines then due by him, and shall have given up his arms and accoutrements in good order.

Leave of Absence.

6. Application for leave of absence exceeding seven days, shall be made to the Commanding Officer, through the Adjutant.

Government of the Regiment.

7. The regiment shall be governed, except as to its military affairs, by a Court of Assistants, consisting of a president and an elective assistant from each company. Such president to be the Commanding Officer of the regiment, or in his absence, the next senior field-officer. The elective assistant to be chosen in the manner hereinafter named.

This court shall also form a court of appeal from the decisions of committees of companies, in all cases recommended by the Commanding Officer.

Complaints to be referred in the first instance to the Commanding Officer.

8. All complaints against any member of the corps shall be submitted to the Commanding Officer, who, if the offence is of a civil nature, shall refer the same to the Court of Assistants, who will have the power to censure, fine, or expel the offender.

Court for the trial of military offences.

9. All military offences, consisting of offences committed by members on parade, or in uniform, shall be tried by a court to be hereinafter named. Such court will be empowered to censure, fine, or expel, and such decision, subject to the confirmation of the commanding officer, will be final.

For the trial of any officer the court shall consist of six officers, to be appointed in rotation by the commandant of the regiment.

For the trial of any non-commissioned officer, the court shall consist of three officers and three non-commissioned officers, to be appointed in rotation by the commandant of the regiment.

For the trial of any private, the court shall consist of two officers (one of whom shall be of the rank of captain), and two non-commissioned officers, to be appointed in rotation, by the commandant, with the addition of two privates, to be chosen by lot from such company (except the one to which the accused may be attached) as the regimental order concerning the court may direct.

Committees of Companies.

10. The internal arrangements of each company shall be managed by a committee of five members (to be elected by ballot, by each company, once in every twelve months), exclusively of the officer commanding, who shall be an *ex officio* member and president of such committee. And every such committee shall have power to make rules for its respective company; such rules, however, in no case to interfere with the regimental rules or arrangements, and to be inoperative until sanctioned by the Court of Assistants.

Members Absent without Leave to be deemed guilty of Desertion.

11. A member being absent from his district of enrolment more than three months at any one time, without leave or notice, shall be subject to be removed from the corps and shall be dealt with by a Court of Assistants.

Mode of appointment of Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers.

12. On its being necessary to appoint corporals, the company in which the appointment is to be made shall, under the supervision of their committee, select the three members in whom they have most confidence, and, on their names being forwarded to the Lieutenant Colonel, a day shall be appointed on which they will be examined in presence of such of the members of their company as may wish to attend, and the Lieutenant Colonel will then select from the three members so examined the individual whom he may consider most fitted for the appointment.

The same course shall be adopted with the grade of sergeant.

The same course shall be adopted with the grade of officer, with this proviso, that, in the event of the company not possessing eligible candidates among the sergeants, they shall return the required number of names from the next junior grade, and should that grade not furnish such person, then the required number from the ranks shall be nominated; and, in the event of such person from a junior grade proving the most eligible, he shall, after a probation in the different grades, obtain the vacant appointment.

Right of Appeal to a General Meeting of the Corps.

13. Any member feeling himself aggrieved by the decision of the Court of Assistants shall have the right of appeal to a general meeting of the corps (to be called in accordance with Rule 21), whose decision shall be final.

Committees of Companies to elect Members of Court of Assistants.

14. Each Committee of Companies shall, every twelve months, elect by ballot one of its members to represent the company in and to form one of the Court of Assistants, the officer commanding the company being ineligible; and such elective members of the court shall remain in office for twelve months, but shall be eligible for re-election.

Committees of Companies and Courts of Assistants to remain in force until November, 1856.

15. The present elections of the Companies' Committees and Court of Assistants shall remain in force until November, 1856.

Absence of the Representative of the Company in the Court of Assistants.

16. In the event of inability to attend on the part of the member chosen as the representative of the company in the Court of Assistants the Committee of the Company of five members shall have the power to nominate another member to act during such absence.

Period of service of Members previous to Promotion.

17. No member shall be qualified to hold the rank of a commissioned officer under six months', and that of a non-commissioned officer under three months', service in the corps, except in the event of a new company being formed, when the commanding officer shall have the power to nominate such officers and non-commissioned officers as he may deem fit.

Meeting of the Court of Assistants.

18. The Court of Assistants shall meet at least once a week for general business, if summoned.

Right of Appeal.

19. The commanding officer, or the Court of Assistants, shall have the right of appeal before a general meeting of the corps.

General Meeting once in Six Months.

20. The general meeting of the regiment shall be held once in six months.

Court of Assistants may convene Special General Meeting.

21. The Court of Assistants may convene a special general meeting whenever it may be deemed expedient.

Calling a Special General Meeting.

22. If not less than fifty members of the regiment, of whom not more than fifteen shall belong to any one company, are desirous of calling a special general meeting, they shall give notice in writing to the Court of Assistants specifying the objects for which such meeting is to be held, and the Court of Assistants shall convene a general meeting of the corps, giving fourteen days notice of the same; and no business will be entertained at the said meeting unless that expressed in the notice made by such members to the Court of Assistants.

At least seventy-five members shall be present before the business of such meeting shall be commenced; but it shall not be competent for any general meeting to interfere with the military affairs of the regiment.

Order to be observed in General Meetings.

23. At every general meeting, the senior officer present shall be chairman.

No person will be permitted to speak to any question more than once (unless in explanation), except the mover, who will be entitled to a reply.

All motions shall be delivered to the chairman in writing, and be decided by show of hands, unless a division be demanded by two or more members.

Such meeting shall have the power of resolving itself into a committee of the whole. No protest shall be received. No meeting may be adjourned or dissolved without a question for that purpose.

Mode to be observed for the alteration of any rule or order at General Meeting.

24. No motion shall be made at any annual general meeting to alter or rescind any rule or order of the regiment, unless the summons for such meeting shall specify the alteration intended to be made. If ten members at least shall be desirous of altering or rescinding any such rule or order at any general meeting and shall give fourteen days notice in writing to the Court of Assistants, that court shall cause the same to be specified in the summons for such general meeting.

Fines.

25. A fine of ten shillings shall be imposed on all officers and non-commissioned officers, and five shillings on members, for non-attendance at the Commanding Officer's parade, unless a satisfactory explanation in writing be sent to the officer commanding the company, subject to the revision of the Commanding Officer of the regiment.

Fines—Expulsion for non-payment.

26. Every member shall pay every fine inflicted on him within one week after it shall have been demanded. And no person shall have a right to vote at a general meeting, or be chosen into any office, until he has paid all fines to which he shall be subject; and on refusal to comply, he shall be summoned before the Court of Assistants to answer for such neglect or refusal, and if he do not then pay or attend the said court, they are empowered to expel him the company, and to notify such expulsion in the *Government Gazette*.

Alteration in regimentals.

27. No change whatever shall be made in any part of the regimentals of the corps, except with the approbation of the officer commanding.

Officers to be drilled on appointment.

28. All officers on appointment shall be drilled by the Adjutant, one hour daily for eight successive days.

Recruit drills.

29. All recruits shall, on joining, attend drill twice a week, and shall not receive an order for uniform until dismissed from recruit drill.

Exchanges.

30. Members of equal rank may, with the consent of the Commanding Officer, exchange with each other from one company to another.

Court of Assistants may make rules and bye-laws.

31. The Court of Assistants shall be empowered to make any rules or bye-laws they may deem necessary which are not contrary to the resolutions of a general meeting to be in force until laid before a general meeting; and such rules and bye-laws shall, when requisite, be printed and distributed to all members of the corps.

Names of persons enrolled to be read at Commanding Officer's parade.

32. The names of all persons enrolled during the month shall be read at the Commanding Officer's parade, to give an opportunity to any member to object to their entrance,

Relative to recruits' drill.

33. Recruits, on joining, will be informed by the Adjutant of two days in the week on which they must attend for indoor instruction for one hour, until dismissed recruits' drill; and, in addition, they must attend at the Commanding Officer's parade as soon as provided with uniform, for further instruction in squads, according to their proficiency. When dismissed recruit drill, they will receive a card signed by the Adjutant, and join their company.

Members liable to instruction drill.

34. All members will be liable to be sent to instruction drill for want of knowledge occasioned by absence or other cause.

The foregoing Regulations, made in accordance with the Act of Council, 18 Victoria, No. 7, s. 4, having been submitted by the Commanding Officer to His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, have been approved and confirmed.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

PORT PHILLIP BAY.

Light Ship, West Channel.

IN accordance with a notice issued from this Office, dated the 20th February, the Light Ship has been moved about half a mile S. by W. from her former position, and now lies moored in 19 feet water, with the following bearings:—

Upper Light House, Shortland's Bluff, S. 35 W.
Extreme part of Indented Head, N. 39 W.
Summit of Arthur's Seat, S. 35 E.
White cone buoy on western elbow of Williams' Sound, S. 22 W.

Black cone buoy on Swan Spit, S. 24 W.
Black and white chequered buoy on 13 feet knoll, distant from Light ship about a cable's length, S. 25 E.

Mariners are further requested to take notice, that with the view to facilitate the safe navigation of the West Channel at all times of the night and tide, a *Floating Light Vessel* (the equipment of which will be completed in a few weeks) will be moored off Swan Spit, in the position at present occupied by the Swan Spit black buoy, and the latter removed. This vessel will exhibit a single fixed light.

On the exhibition of the light the upper light on Shortland's Bluff will be darkened from N.E. by E. round northerly to W. by N., and the two chequered buoys now lying mid-channel above Swan Spit will be removed, and the position of the knovies they mark pointed out by beacons on shore.

Due notice of the night on which the light will first be exhibited, together with full particulars of the above changes, will be hereafter published. The depths are at low water spring tides; bearings by compass.

GENERAL REGULATION.

HIS Excellency the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, has made the following General Regulation, in addition to the General Regulations dated the 3rd of October, 1855, under the authority of the Act of Council 18 Victoria, No. 37, viz.:

X. Claims belonging to Deceased Individuals.

Where any number of persons holding Miners' Rights or Business Licenses shall be in possession of any claim as co-partners, under such Miners' Rights or Business Licenses respectively, and any one of such persons shall die, the surviving partners shall be entitled to hold possession of the claim as against all strangers, provided that the number of persons holding Miners' Rights working such claim be according to the regulations in force in the district and without prejudice to the rights of the personal representative of the deceased, by agreement or law, against the surviving partners.

Where any person holding a Miner's Right or Business License shall be in sole possession of any claim under such Miner's Right or Business License and shall die, no other person shall take possession of such claim for the period of one month after the death of such person or for the further period of three months, if during the first month any person shall serve a written notice upon the Warden of the district, stating that he or she is about to obtain probate or administration, as the case may be, of the personal estate and effects of the deceased, and requesting him to protect the claim; and the said Warden shall protect the said claim from intrusion during the above periods respectively, and when such probate or administration respectively is obtained by any one the personal representative, or a person nominated in writing by him or her, such personal representative or nominee holding a Miner's Right or Business License respectively, shall be entitled to the possession of the said claim, according to the regulations in force in the district.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

BALLAARAT.

SPECIAL Regulations made by the Local Court of the District of Ballarat, exclusively applicable to the lead known as "The Black Lead."

No. i. *Extent and Position of Claims.*—"That every party of eight men shall be allowed thirty-four (34) feet, irrespective of width, until they have found the 'gutter' or 'lead'; but no party shall have protection for more than forty (40) feet in width upon the ascertained 'lead' or 'gutter'."

No. ii. *Marking off Claims.*—"That all claims be marked at right angles with the supposed course of the 'lead,' and a wall of six (6) feet be left between each claim: Provided always that no miner or single company of miners shall have a grant of more than one claim at the same time."

No. iii. *Position of Claims in case of Deviation of Lead.*—"That in cases where the 'gutter' or 'lead' changes its course from the supposed one, the position of the original claims shall be changed accordingly, taking precedence as before, according to their number."

No. iv. *Claims upon Cross Leads.*—"That in cases of cross leads, that is to say, where a lead crosses or intersects the Black Lead, claims shall be granted upon such leads, subject to the conditions herein mentioned for the Black Lead. The claimowners upon each lead shall have protection from the encroachments of claimowners of adjoining leads."

No. v. *Registration of Claims.*—"That all claims be numbered consecutively, and registered with the names in full of the members of each company, also the number and date of the Miner's Right of every shareholder, and a duplicate of such registration be given to the parties obtaining such claims."

No. vi. *Names of Claimholders to be posted.*—"That as soon as any party or company is registered it shall be the duty of such party or company to post the names in full of each shareholder on the most conspicuous part of their claim, where they shall remain until the claim is wrought out or abandoned."

No. vii. *Marking Position of "Gutter" or "Lead" upon the Surface.*—"That as soon as the 'gutter' or 'lead' is found in any claim, the shareholders upon such claim must report the same (as hereinafter provided) forthwith, and mark its position upon the surface by fixing a flag upon the spot."

No. viii. *Surveyor.*—"That in order that these Rules be brought into effective operation, it is necessary that a competent practical miner be appointed as surveyor, whose duty it shall be to measure and mark off claims, number and register them, survey claims when the 'gutter' or 'lead' is discovered in such claims, and point out to such shareholders the spot where they must fix the flag; survey in all cases of encroachments, and perform such other duties that would legitimately come under his notice as Surveyor of the Leads."

MOUNT BLACKWOOD.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the District of Mount Blackwood:—

ix. *Business Licenses, Extent of Claim, Undermining of Store allowed.*—"Each Business License shall entitle the holder to occupy an area not exceeding 25 ft. x 70 ft., provided such ground be not required for mining purposes; the first mentioned admeasurement to be deemed the frontage and for every such frontage an area or portion thereof occupied in addition, a similar license must be taken out."

A space of not less than six (6) feet must be left between each place of business. Stores and business premises may be undermined with the sanction of the warden.

The frontages of stores and places of business must be kept drained and cleaned by their occupants.

x. *Alluvial Lands Leases.*—"Alluvial lands unworked may be leased in portions not exceeding one acre where the locality is not upon any established gold field, and of which the auriferous character has been developed by prospecting at the instance of the applicants, provided that no application will be entertained except on the recommendation of the Local Court."

xi. *Quartz Leases.*—"Leases for working quartz claims will be granted for portions not exceeding 50 yards along the vein with all the dips and angles."

It will be required from the lessee that actual work upon the ground granted be commenced within one month from the date of the lease and at the rate of one man for every twelve (12) feet provided that no application will be granted except on the recommendation of the Local Court."

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the District of Beechworth:—

When parties have received permission for sluice washing and other water privilege, they may receive a written sanction from the Warden confirming their right to claim race and dam.

vi. *Prospecting.—Extent of claim for discovery of new Gold Workings.*—"For the encouragement of Prospecting, any parties discovering new gold workings within 500 (five hundred) yards of old workings, shall receive a double or treble claim at the discretion of the Warden, providing such discovery be made known without unnecessary delay.

vii. *Extent of Creek Claims.*—"No claim exceeding 40 (forty) yards in length will be allowed in the bed of a creek, that is to say—

- For one miner, 10 yards
 - For two miners, 20 yards
 - For three miners, 30 yards
 - For four miners, 40 yards
- } Irrespective of Width.

viii. *Cement or Rock Sinking.—Extent of Claim.*—"The extent of claim allowed to each miner in cement or rock sinking will be as follows:—

- For one miner, 20 feet by 20 feet,
- For two miners, 20 feet by 40 feet,
- For three miners, 30 feet by 40 feet,
- For four miners, 40 feet by 30 feet;

Beyond which, no greater area will be allowed.

ix. *Combination of miners allowed in cement or rock sinking.*—"Two parties of miners holding adjoining claims may obtain a written sanction from the Warden, authorising them to combine for the purpose of working the said claims from one shaft, on the distinct condition that the ground be worked by the same number of miners as would be required were it divided into smaller claims."
