ELECTORAL LISTS.

HIS Excellency the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, in pursuance of the authority reserved by the Act of Council, 19 Victoria, No. 12, section 12, has been pleased to extend the time appointed by the said Act for making out the Electoral Lists of the Provinces, Districts, and Divisions hereinafter stated, for the several periods and until the respective dates specified in the annexed Schedule.

It is to be observed that the various times appointed by the said Act for the completion of the Electoral Lists of the said Provinces, Districts, and Divisions prior to the the revision thereof, and for such revision, are also extended in the like proportion as nearly as may be.

CONTRACTS ACCEPTED.

THE following Contracts for Advertising in Local Journals, and Furnishing Copies or Slips of Electoral Lists (according to the terms of the *Gazette* Notice of the 22nd of April, 1856) of the localities specified in the annexed Schedule A have been accepted, viz. :—

- Contract No. 120.—In the *Age*, thirty-three pounds six shillings and eight pence (£33 6s. 8d.) for each insertion of one thousand (1,000) names and other particulars, including 100 copies of the slips.
- Contract No. 121.—In the *Geelong Observer*, two shillings (2s.) per inch per column for each insertion, type not to exceed long primer; slips, ten shillings (10s.) per hundred of column of the *Observer*.
- Contract No. 122.—In the *Geelong Advertiser*, three-pence (3d.) for every line of space of the width of a column of the *Advertiser* (2½ inches) for each insertion, in the type ordinarily used in that newspaper; copies or slips, five shillings (5s.) per foolscap folio per 100, paper included.
- Contract No. 123.—In the *Portland Chronicle*, sixpence for each elector (including the four insertions); slips, not exceeding 25, ten shillings (10s.), exceeding 25 and not exceeding 100, one pound (£1).
- Contract No. 124.—In the *Portland Guardian*, thirteen shillings and fourpence (13s. 4d.) per 100 lines of the width of three columns of the *Guardian*: slips, for the first 50, fifteen shillings (15s.); for every succeeding 50, ten shillings (10s.).
- Contract No. 125.—In the *Banner of Belfast*, two pounds (£2) per 100 names, as per schedule in the *Gazette*, for the four insertions: slips, 25 copies of each publication, gratis.
- Contract No. 126.—In the *Belfast Gazette*, four pounds four shillings (£4 4s.) for each column of names, as per *Gazette* form: slips, under 100, gratis; exceeding 100, ten shillings (10s.) per 100.
- Contract No. 127.—In the *Warrnambool Examiner*, sixpence (6d.) per line for each insertion, according to the *Gazette* form: slips, four pounds (£4) per 100, for the Warrnambool list, and two pounds (£2) per 100, for the Heytesbury list.
- Contract No. 128.—In the *Kilmore Examiner*, six shillings (6s.) per inch for each insertion, according to the form furnished: slips, one shilling (1s.) each.
- Contract No. 129.—In the *Kyneton Observer*, six shillings (6s.) per inch, according to the *Gazette* form: in the type ordinarily used for that journal; copies or slips, sixpence (6d.) each.
- Contract No. 130.—In the *Gipps Land Guardian*, at the rate of two shillings (2s.) per inch of the column of the *Guardian* (the type being that ordinarily used in that journal) for each insertion, including 100 copies of the lists.
- Contract No. 131.—In the *Mount Alexander Mail*, twenty pounds (£20) per page of newspaper for each insertion (in brevier type, no unnecessary whites to be introduced), including such number of slips or copies of the lists as may be ordered by the Registrars.
- Contract No. 132.—In the *Courier of the Mines*, three-pence (3d.) per name for each insertion (in type not larger than that ordinarily used in the printing of the *Courier*), according to the *Gazette* form; slips or copies of the lists at one shilling (1s.) each copy, to be delivered to the Registrars.
- Contract No. 133.—In the *Ballaarat Star*, thirteen pounds (£13) per page of 16 x 24 inches for each insertion, in long primer type, according to the *Gazette* form: copies to be furnished at the rate of two pounds (£2) per 100 copies of each page.
- Contract No. 134.—In the *Ballaarat Times*, twenty-six pounds (£26) per insertion per page of the usual full size, in minion type: copies furnished for four pounds (£4) per 100 copies of each page.
- Contract No. 135.—In the *Ovens and Murray Advertiser*, four shillings per inch per column, in the type ordinarily used in printing the *Advertiser*: copies to be furnished at the rate of five pounds (£5) for the first 50 copies, and seven pounds ten shillings (£7 10s.) for every 100 copies after.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

BALLAARAT.

SPECIAL Regulations made by the Local Court of the District of Ballarat, exclusively applicable to the lead known as "The White Horse Lead."—

No. I. *Extent and position of Claims*.—Every party of eight men shall be allowed (34) thirty-four feet irrespective of width until they have found the "gutter" or "lead," but no party shall have protection for more than (40) forty feet in width upon the ascertained "lead" or "gutter."

No. II. *Claims marked at right angles*.—All claims shall be marked at right angles with the supposed course of the "lead," and a wall of (6) six feet be left between each claim; provided always that no miner or single company of miners shall have a grant of more than one claim at the same time.

No. III. *Change of the course of "Gutter"*.—In cases where the "gutter" or "lead" changes its course from the supposed one, the position of the original claims shall be changed accordingly, taking precedence as before according to their number.

No. IV. *Cross or intersecting "Leads"*.—In cases of cross leads, that is to say where a lead crosses or intersects the "White Horse Lead," claims shall be granted on such leads, subject to the conditions herein mentioned for the "White Horse Lead." The claim owners upon each claim on such leads shall have protection from the encroachments of claim owners of adjoining "leads."

No. V. *Registration of Claims*.—All claims shall be numbered consecutively, and registered with the names in full of the members of each company, also the number and date of the Miner's Right of every shareholder, and a duplicate of such registration shall be given to the parties obtaining such claims.

No. VI. *Posting of Names on Claims*.—As soon as any party or company is registered, it shall be the duty of such party or company to post the names in full of each shareholder on the most conspicuous part of their claim, where they shall remain until the claim is wrought out or abandoned.

No. VII. *Marking Position of "Gutter" or "Lead" on Surface*.—As soon as the "Gutter" or "Lead" is found in any claim, the shareholders upon such claim must report the same, as hereinafter provided, forthwith, and mark its position upon the surface, by fixing a flag upon the spot.

No. VIII. *Surveyor and Duties of Surveyor*.—In order that these rules be brought into effective operation, it is necessary that a competent practical miner be appointed as Surveyor, whose duty it shall be to measure and mark off claims, number and register them, survey claims where the "gutter" or "lead" is discovered in such claims, and point out to such shareholders the spot where they must fix the flag, survey in all cases of encroachments, and perform such other duties that would legitimately come under his notice as Surveyor of the lead.

LOCAL COURT REGULATION.

YACKANDANDAH.

REGULATION made by the Local Court of the District of Yackandandah:—

xv.—*Extent of claims on the Flats of the Creek*.—The extent of bank claim or claims in the Flats of the Creek, other than those authorised in Regulation No. 1, shall be five yards frontage to the Creek, by fifty yards back, to each Miner. No party will be permitted to hold more than forty yards frontage to the Creek by fifty yards back.
