5.—BY MAJOR GENERAL EDWARD MACARTHUR.

Where is the soldier serving within the "Australian Command," with whom the respected name of "Florence Nightingale" is not as familiar as the cherished household words of his native land?

Who has not heard of the gentle being, who, nursed in luxury, quitted its lap without one lingering thought, in order that by her presence and example, the sick, wounded, and afflicted of the British army, who have gloriously served in the Crimea, might have a compassionate hand to bind their wounds, restore their strength, and kindle anew in their minds the ardour with which they had fought in their country's cause?

The mission of this honored lady has been fulfilled with a bright and more than ordinary success; but in order to hand down to posterity the memory of her feminine devotion, and, by her own request, to obtain for soldiers in after times the succour and consolation which British troops have received at her hands, it has been resolved, with the entire concurrence of Her Majesty, and that of the Field Marshal Viscount Hardinge, Commanding in Chief, to found an Institution "for the training, sustenance, and protection of nurses and hospital attendants."

The Field Marshal wishes that all ranks should be invited to contribute towards a fund for so great and worthy an object.

It is therefore requested that Officers commanding Companies "will read this Order to Non-Commissioned Officers and men, and take upon themselves the honorable trouble of collecting whatever is given by them freely, and of their own accord."

MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF KILMORE.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Land Forces in the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is amongst other things enacted, that any district of the Colony of Victoria, the area whereof shall not exceed nine square miles, and which shall contain a population of householders not less than three hundred, may, subject to the provisions of the said Act, be constituted a Municipal District as thereinafter mentioned, provided that no one point in any such area shall be distant more than six miles from any other point; And it is further enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than one hundred and fifty householders resident within any such district, praying that such district may be declared a Municipal District under the said Act, to cause the substance and prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter petition, signed by an equal or greater number of householders resident within such locality, shall have been delivered at the Office of the Colonial Secretary within one month from the date of such publication) the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice aforesaid, may, if he think fit, declare by Proclamation such locality a Municipal District by a name to be mentioned in such Proclamation, and also by the same or any other Proclamation may define the limits and boundaries of such Municipal District, and such limits and boundaries at any time thereafter in the same manner on receipt of a similar petition may vary and alter, but so as in no case, save as thereinafter mentioned, to include within the limits or boundaries of such municipal district an area of more than nine square miles, and upon the publication of any such Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, such locality so defined shall be deemed and taken to be a Municipal District within the meaning of the said Act; And whereas a petition has been presented to the Senior Military Officer and Officer administering the Government by the householders resident within the town of Kilmore in the county of Dalhousie, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published as directed by the said Act, but no counter petition has been delivered in opposition thereto within the time allowed by law: Now therefore I, the Senior Military Officer and Officer administering the Government of the said Colony do by this my Proclamation, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, with the advice of the Executive Council, declare that the district hereinafter described and named shall be a Municipal District within the meaning of the said Act, that is to say:—Commencing at the south-east angle of suburban allotment 1, parish of Bylands; thence by the south side of Tootal-street to Graves-street; thence by the east side of Graves-street and a line north to

East-street; thence by the east side of East-street to Clarke-street; thence by the north side of Clarke-street to Junction-street; thence by the west side of Junction-street and a line south to Foot-street; thence by the south side of Foot-street to Sutherland-street; and thence by the west side of Sutherland-street to the angle formed by the intersection of Tootal-street, the commencing point aforesaid.

And I do hereby, with the advice aforesaid, direct that the Council of the said Municipal District shall be called by the name and style of "The Municipal Council of Kilmore."

The County Court of Kilmore, at Kilmore, on the fifth day of September now next ensuing.

The County Court of Kyneton, at Kyneton, on the cloventh day of September now next ensuing.

The County Court of Castlemaine, at Castlemaine, on the thirteenth day of September now next ensuing.

The County Court of Carisbrook, at Carisbrook, on the twenty-third day of September now next ensuing.

The County Court of Sandhurst, at Sandhurst, on the third day of October now next ensuing.

GENERAL SESSIONS FOR KYNETON.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Land Forces in the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "An Act to make provision for the better administration of Justice in Courts of General Sessions in the Colony of Victoria," it was among other things enacted that Courts of General Sessions of the Peace should be established, and the same should be holden in and for the City of Melbourne, the Town of Geelong, and such other Places and Districts within the said Colony as the Lieutenant Governor thereof should appoint; and it should be lawful for the said Lieutenant Governor from time to time to define and appoint by proclamation the limits and boundaries of such places or districts within which all such Courts should have jurisdiction respectively, and the places and times at which such Courts should be holden; and such limits, districts, places, and times respectively to vary and alter as to the said Lieutenant Governor should seem fit: And whereas it is expedient that a Court of General Sessions should be holden in and for the District of Kyneton: Now therefore I, the Senior Military Officer and Officer administering the Government of the said Colony, in pursuance of the said Act, and under and by virtue of the power and authorities in me vested, do hereby declare and appoint that a Court of General Sessions of the Peace shall be established in and for, and having jurisdiction over the District of Kyneton, the limits whereof are hereinafter described:—

The Court of General Sessions for Kyneton, to be holden in and for that portion of the County of Dalhousie, the boundaries whereof are hereby defined as follows:—Commencing at the source of the River Coliban in the Great Dividing Range; thence by that River to its confluence with the River Campaspe; thence by a line south-easterly to the source of the McIvor or Patterson's Creek; thence by a line southerly to the confluence of Mollison's Creek and Williams Creek; and thence by Williams Creek to its source in the Great Dividing Range; and by that Range to the source of the River Coliban aforesaid.

And I do hereby further declare and appoint that the said Court of General Sessions shall, during the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and all subsequent years until otherwise ordered, be holden respectively at the place and times following, that is to say:—The Court of General Sessions for Kyneton, at Kyneton, on the sixteenth day of September, and the sixteenth day of November, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six; the sixteenth day of January, sixteenth day of March, sixteenth day of May, sixteenth day of July, sixteenth day of September, and the sixteenth day of November, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

And I do hereby further declare and appoint, if any of the aforesaid days shall happen to fall on a Sunday or on Good Friday, the said Courts shall commence on the day next following.

And I do hereby also declare and appoint that if the Chairman of the said Court of General Sessions shall not arrive at the said place in time to open such Court on the days so named as aforesaid, the same may be opened and held on any day or days following such days so named.

GENERAL SESSIONS DISTRICTS OF SANDHURST AND KILMORE.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Land Forces in the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation bearing date the sixth day of December, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, it was declared and appointed that Courts of General Sessions of the Peace should be established and holden

in and for the City and Town and the several places and Districts therein prescribed: And whereas by another Proclamation bearing date the twenty-eighth day of December, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, the names of certain of the said Courts and the places and Districts in and for which such Courts should have jurisdiction were altered as therein set forth: And whereas it is expedient to alter the existing boundaries and limits within which certain of such Courts shall have jurisdiction as hereinafter mentioned: Now I, the Senior Military Officer and Officer administering the Government of the said Colony, by virtue of the powers vested in me in that behalf, do hereby alter the portions of the said Colony in and for which the Courts of General Sessions of Sandhurst and Kilmore shall have jurisdiction, and the limits thereof as hereinafter mentioned, and do hereby declare and appoint that the said Courts of General Sessions shall be holden in and for the respective places and portions of the said Colony hereinafter described, that is to say:—

The Court of General Sessions of Sandhurst, having jurisdiction in and for that District of the Colony whereof the boundaries are hereby defined as follows, that is to say: Commencing at the junction of McNeil's Creek with the River Loddon at Thalack Thalack; thence by a line easterly to the most northern part of the County of Talbot, north of Mount Alexander; thence by the Mount Alexander Range and the Myrtle Creek to the confluence of that Creek with the River Coliban; thence by the said River to its confluence with the River Campaspe; thence northwards by the River Campaspe to a point three miles south of its junction with the Exe Creek; thence by a line easterly to Mount Camel; thence by a line south-easterly to the northern boundary of the County of Dalhousie, near the source of Crumpton's Creek; thence by the northern boundary of the said County to the River Goulburn; thence by that River to the River Murray; and thence by the Rivers Murray and Loddon to Thalack Thalack, the commencing point aforesaid.

The Court of General Sessions for Kilmore, having jurisdiction in and for that District of the Colony whereof the boundaries are hereby defined as follows, that is to say:—In and for the County of Anglesea, and in and for that part of the County of Dalhousie, the boundaries whereof are hereby defined as follows, that is to say: Commencing at the source of William's Creek, in the Great Dividing Range; thence by that Creek to its confluence with Mollison's Creek; thence by a line northerly to the source of the Melvor or Patterson's Creek; thence by a line north-westerly to the confluence of the Rivers Coliban and Campaspe; thence by the River Campaspe to its junction with Mount Ida Creek; thence by that Creek to its source near Mount Ida; thence by the Dividing Range to the source of the Sandy Creek; thence by the Sandy Creek, the River Goulburn and the Dabyminga Creek to the Great Dividing Range; and thence by that Range to the commencing point aforesaid: and in and for all that part of the reputed County of Rodney lying south of a line commencing at a point on the Campaspe River three miles south of its junction with Exe Creek, and bearing easterly to Mount Camel; and thence south-easterly to the Dividing Range at the source of Crumpton's Creek; and in and for all that part of the District of the Murray, of which the limits are hereby defined to be as follows, that is to say:—Commencing at the source of the most eastern branch of the Broken River in the Great Dividing Range near Mount Buller; and thence by that River, excepting the Township Reserve of Benalla, to the Broken Creek; thence by that Creek to the junction with the Back Creek; thence by a line northerly to the Murray; thence by the Rivers Murray and Goulburn, and the northern boundaries of the Counties of Anglesea and Evelyn to the Great Dividing Range; and thence along the Great Dividing Range to the source of the Broken River near Mount Buller aforesaid, being the commencing point.

COUNTY COURT DISTRICTS OF SANDHURST AND KILMORE.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Major-General MACARTHUR, the Senior Military Officer in Command of Her Majesty's Land Forces in the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-first day of December, A.D. One thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, it was declared and appointed that certain County Courts should be established and holden in and for the respective portions of the said Colony, including counties and parts of counties therein described: And whereas by another Proclamation, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of December, A.D. One thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, the limits within which certain of such Courts should have jurisdiction, were altered as therein set forth: And whereas it is expedient to alter the existing boundaries and limits within which certain of such Courts shall have jurisdiction as hereinafter mentioned: Now

I, the Senior Military Officer and Officer administering the Government of the said Colony, by virtue of the powers vested in me in that behalf, do hereby alter the portions of the said Colony in and for which the County Courts of Sandhurst and Kilmore shall have jurisdiction, and the limits thereof as hereinafter mentioned, and do hereby declare and appoint that the said County Courts shall be holden in and for the respective portions of the said Colony, including counties and parts of counties hereinafter described, that is to say:—

The County Court of Sandhurst having jurisdiction and to be holden in and for that portion of the said Colony whereof the boundaries are hereby defined as follows, that is to say:—Commencing at the junction of McNeil's Creek with the River Loddon at Thalack Thalack; thence by a line easterly to the most northern part of the County of Talbot north of Mount Alexander; thence by the Mount Alexander and the Myrtle Creek to the confluence of that creek with the river Coliban; thence by the said river to its confluence with the river Campaspe; thence northward by the river Campaspe to a point three miles south of its junction with Exe Creek; thence by a line easterly to Mount Camel; thence by a line south-easterly to the northern boundary of the County of Dalhousie near the source of Crumpton's Creek; thence by the northern boundary of the said County to the river Goulburn; thence by that river to the river Murray; and thence by the rivers Murray and Loddon to Thalack Thalack, the commencing point aforesaid.

And the County Court of Kilmore, to be holden in and for the County of Anglesea, and in and for that part of the County of Dalhousie, the boundaries whereof are hereby defined as follows, that is to say:—Commencing at the source of Williams Creek in the Great Dividing Range; thence by that creek to its confluence with Mollison's Creek; thence by a line northerly to the source of the Melvor or Patterson's Creek; thence by a line north-westerly to the confluence of the rivers Coliban and Campaspe; thence by the river Campaspe to its junction with Mount Ida Creek; thence by that creek to its source near Mount Ida; thence by the Dividing Range to the source of the Sandy Creek; thence by the Sandy Creek, the river Goulburn and the Dabyminga Creek, to the Great Dividing Range and thence by that range to the commencing point aforesaid: and in and for all that part of the reputed County of Rodney lying south of a line commencing at a point on the Campaspe River three miles south of its junction with Exe Creek, and bearing easterly to Mount Camel, and thence south-easterly to the dividing range at the source of Crumpton's Creek; and in and for all that part of the District of the Murray, of which the limits are hereby defined to be as follows, that is to say:—Commencing at the source of the most eastern branch of the Broken River, in the Great Dividing Range, near Mount Buller; and thence by that river, excepting the township reserve of Benalla, to the Broken Creek; thence by that creek to the junction with the Back Creek; thence by a line northerly to the Murray; thence by the rivers Murray and Goulburn, and the northern boundaries of the Counties of Anglesea and Evelyn to the Great Dividing Range; and thence along the Great Dividing Range to the source of the Broken River near Mount Buller aforesaid, being the commencing point.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twelfth day of July, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and in the twentieth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

BEECHWORTH.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the District of
Beechworth.

xxxix. *Plurality of Shares in claims allowed.*—It shall be competent for any holder of a "Miner's Right" to purchase shares in claims other than the claim held in virtue of such "Miner's Right." Such purchased shares not to exceed the number of claims granted in one block under any one regulation, and not to apply to regulations Nos. 8 and 24.

xxx. *Interpretation of term "Wet or Flooded Ground."*—Wet or flooded ground shall be taken to be any description of workings where any tail-race, steam, horse or water-power, or any continued mechanical means are necessary for keeping down the water in the same.

xxxii. *Extent of Claims on Sheep Station Creek.*—The extent of claim upon the Sheep Station Creek shall be limited to sixty yards in length, and in no case to exceed eighty yards in breadth, it being imperative that at least six men holding the Miner's Right be employed upon such claim.

xxxiii. *Forcible seizure of Claims prohibited.*—No miner or party of miners shall be permitted to jump or take forcible possession of any claim, but when a claim is disputed the party wishing to take possession of the same shall first make application to the Warden or other authorised person to enquire into and decide upon the same.

CHINESE IMMIGRANTS' FUND.

HIS Excellency the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to approve of the following Regulations in accordance with the 5th section of the Act 18 Victoria, No. 39:—

1. All monies levied and received under the authority of the 4th section of the Act 18 Victoria, No. 39, shall be paid (at such times and in such manner as may be from time to time prescribed) to the Treasurer, and shall form a separate fund in the Treasury to be called "The Chinese Immigrants' Fund."

2. The administration of this Fund shall be entrusted to the Immigrants' Fund Board constituted by the Immigrants' Fund Regulations of 5th April, 1856.

3. No monies shall be paid out of this Fund except upon the order of the Chairman and one member of the Board. But this rule shall not apply to repayments of over entries at the Custom House, which shall be certified and paid in the usual manner.

4. Until further regulations shall have been published, this Fund shall be appropriated in accordance with the Immigrants' Fund Regulations of the 5th of April, 1856, so far as they may be applicable.
