IMMIGRATION REMITTANCES.

HIS Excellency the Senior Military Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct that from the first day of August next ensuing, the Immigration Remittance Regulations of the first June, 1853, and all rules made in pursuance of those regulations, be cancelled, and that in lieu thereof the following revised regulations be adopted and published for the information of persons desirous of securing passages for their relatives and friends from the United Kingdom to Victoria.

His Excellency, in Council, has also been pleased to direct the publication of the Regulations of Her Majesty's Land and Emigration Commissioners relative to the selection of Emigrants to this Colony.

IMMIGRATION REMITTANCES.

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

Persons wishing to bring their relatives and friends from the United Kingdom to Victoria, can secure passages for them in vessels chartered by Her Majesty's Government on the following conditions:—

1. The persons to be brought into the Colony must be in good health, free from all bodily or mental defects; of good moral character, sober, industrious and in the habit of working for wages at the occupation specified in the application forms. Children under the age of fifteen years must be accompanied by some competent person who will take charge of them during the voyage.

2. The names, ages, relationship, married or single state, occupation and address of the persons for whom passages are requested, must be furnished by the applicant according to the accompanying form:—

Christian Name and Surname at full length.	Age.	Whether Married or Single.	Relationship.	Trade or Calling.	Address at full length of the Place or Town and Street where living in the United Kingdom.

3. The applicant will then be informed of the amount to be paid to secure the passages, and upon payment of this sum he will receive a certificate which he will forward to his friends by post.

4. The amount to be paid will depend on the number of the persons to be introduced, their age, sex, occupation and other circumstances. It will generally be within the following limits:—

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5. Should the persons sent for be unwilling or unable to emigrate, the amount deposited towards their passages will be repaid to the applicant in this Colony on the receipt of the usual voucher to that effect from the Commissioners. But should any false statements be made as to the age, occupation, character, or condition of the persons to be brought to the Colony, passages will not be granted, and the money deposited for that purpose will be liable to forfeiture.

6. Application forms and every information will be given, and deposits received at the undermentioned places:—

and at other places by persons to be specially appointed for that purpose.

7. Persons residing at a distance from the above places can obtain application forms at the nearest Post Office, and on sending them (duly filled up and signed) to the Immigration Agent in Melbourne, will receive immediate information. The amount required can be sent to the Immigration Agent in Melbourne by cheque, or order on a Bank or mercantile house, or by bank notes in a registered letter. Upon receipt of the remittance, the usual certificate for the passages of his friends will be forwarded to the depositor, and he will transmit it by post to their address in the United Kingdom.

(CIRCULAR.)

The present regulations have been framed with a view of affording additional facilities for the passages from the United Kingdom of relatives and friends of persons residing in Victoria, and thereby of introducing a useful class of immigrants into the Colony.

2. The persons eligible for passages under these regulations are agricultural laborers of every kind, domestic servants, railway laborers, mechanics and artisans, and their wives, children, and near relations. They must be in sound health, free from bodily or mental defects, of good moral character, and accustomed to work for wages at the occupation specified by the depositor on the application form.

3. Children under fifteen years of age cannot be accepted unless accompanied by some suitable person who will take charge of them during the voyage.

4. Should a family contain more than two children under seven years of age, an extra rate of four pounds for each child in excess must be paid by the applicant before passages can be secured. The same extra rate must be paid to secure passages for single men coming alone.

5. In ordinary cases the applicant will pay a proportion of the cost of the passage according to the subjoined scale, the remainder of the cost being defrayed by Her Majesty's Government.

Class 1. Agricultural laborers, shepherds, herdsmen, firm and domestic servants, railway laborers, blacksmiths, brick-makers, bricklayers, carpenters, masons, quarrymen, sawyers, and wheelwrights, with their near relatives.

7. No payment is required by the Commissioners from the persons sent for, but they will have to defray their own expenses to the nearest railway or packet station, and to show that they possess an outfit for the voyage, in accordance with the regulations.

8. It will be advisable, therefore, whenever practicable, to receive from the applicant (in addition to the sums in the above scale) five pounds, or such amount as he may find convenient to remit, for these expenses. This amount will be paid through the Commissioners to the persons nominated, in the United Kingdom.

9. On enquiring at any of the Immigration Offices or Sub-Treasuries, the applicant is to be furnished with an application form (form A), which he will duly fill up, sign and leave with the officer. He is then to be informed of the amount required to be paid, and of the outfit (form B). As soon as he has paid this amount to the Assistant Immigration Agent or Sub-Treasurer (as the case may be) the money or a receipt for it from the Treasury is to be remitted to the Immigration Agent in Melbourne, with the application form (form C) and a statement of the sums paid for passages and outfit. The Immigration Agent will then transmit a certificate for the persons nominated, either to the office at which the money was paid, or to such address as the applicant may request. This certificate is to be sent by the applicant to his friends in the United Kingdom.

10. For the convenience of persons at a distance, the application form (A) may be obtained at the District Post Offices. The applicant will fill up the particulars, sign his name and address, and forward it to the Immigration Agent in Melbourne, who will inform him of the amount to be paid, and on the receipt of the money forward him the usual certificate.

11. The sums remitted to the Immigration Agent will be paid into the Treasury daily. The Treasurer will furnish a monthly return of the amounts, and the Immigration Agent will likewise furnish a monthly return for transmission to the Commissioners, of the names and other particulars of the persons nominated, and of the amount paid for passages and outfits.

12. Should the persons nominated decline or be unable to emigrate, the money paid towards their passages will be returned to the depositor in this Colony. All applications for sums to be refunded should be addressed direct to the Immigration Agent, Melbourne.

13. Should the applicant wilfully misrepresent the particulars of the persons nominated, the deposits towards the passages will be liable to forfeiture.

14. Should a difficulty occur in any special case not included in the above instructions, the particulars should be forwarded to the Immigration Agent, who will afford every information on the subject.

REGULATIONS

FOR THE SELECTION OF EMIGRANTS, AND CONDITIONS ON WHICH PASSAGES ARE GRANTED.

QUALIFICATIONS OF EMIGRANTS.

1. The emigrants must be of those callings which from time to time are most in demand in the Colony. They must be sober, industrious, of general good moral character, and have been in the habit of working for wages: of all of which decisive certificates will be required. They must also be in good health, free from all bodily or mental defects; and the adults must in all respects be capable of labor, and going out to work for wages at the occupation specified in their application forms. The candidates who will receive a preference are respectable young women trained to domestic service, and families in which there are fewest young children.

2. The separation of husbands and wives, and of parents from children under 18, will in no case be allowed.

3. Single women under 18 cannot be taken without their parents, unless they go under the immediate care of some near relatives. Single women over 35, and single men over 40 years of age, are ineligible. Single women with illegitimate children can in no case be taken.

4. Families in which there are more than two children under seven, or than three under ten years of age; widowers and widows with young children; persons who intend to resort to the gold fields, to buy land, or to invest capital in trade; or who are in the habitual receipt of parish relief; or who have not been vaccinated, or not had the small pox, cannot be accepted; nor can the wives and children of persons who have emigrated and left their families behind.

APPLICATION AND APPROVAL.

5. Applications must be made to the Commissioners in the form annexed. The filling up of the form is merely to bring the applicant's case fully before the board. It confers no claim to a passage; and implies no pledge that the candidates, though within the regulations, will be accepted.

6. If approved of, the applicants will receive a printed "Approval Circular," calling for the contribution required by article 7, and pointing out how the money is to be paid. After it is paid, they will, as soon as the Commissioners' arrangements will permit, receive an embarkation order (which is not transferable), naming the ship in which they are to embark, and the time and place of joining her. Applicants must not leave their homes before the receipt of this order. The Commissioners do not pledge themselves to send applicants to any particular port in the Colony.

PAYMENTS TOWARDS PASSAGES.

7. The contributions above mentioned (out of which the Commissioners provide bedding and mess utensils, &c., for the voyage), are as follows:—

I. Married agricultural laborers, shepherds, herds- men, and female domestic and farm servants; also married journeyman mechanics, and arti- zans—such as masons, bricklayers, black- smiths, wheelwrights, sawyers, carpenters, &c., under 45 years of age	£ 1
II. 45, and under 50 years of age	5
III. 50, and under 60 years of age	11
IV. Single men, not exceeding 40 years of age	1
V. Single women, not exceeding 35 years of age ...	10s.

N.B. No payments are required for wives or for children under 14 years of age accompanying their parents.

CAUTIONS TO APPLICANTS.

8. No preparation must on any account be made by the applicants, either by withdrawing from employment or otherwise, until they receive the "Approval Circular." Applicants who fail to attend to this warning will do so at their own risk, and will have no claim whatever on the Commissioners.

9. The selecting agents of the Board have no authority to bind the Commissioners, nor to promise passages in any case, nor to receive money. If, therefore, applicants wish to make their payments through the agents, instead of in the manner pointed out in the "Approval Circular," they must understand that they do so at their own risk, and that the Commissioners will in no way be responsible.

10. Should any signatures attached to any of the applicant's papers prove to be not genuine, or any personation be attempted, or any false representations be made in the papers, not only will the application be rejected, and the contribution forfeited, but the offenders will be liable, under the Passengers' Act, to a penalty not exceeding £50.

11. Should any applicants be found, on personal examination at the Depot, or on board, to have made any misstatement in their papers, or to have omitted to state any material fact, or to have any infectious disorder, or otherwise not to be in a fit state of health for the voyage, or to have any mental or bodily defect likely to impair their usefulness as laborers, or to have left any of their young children behind, or to have brought with them more children than are mentioned in their application form, or expressly sanctioned by the Commissioners, or to have attempted any deception whatever, or evasion of these rules, they will be refused admission on board the ship, or if embarked, will be landed without having any claim on the Commissioners. If after embarkation emigrants are guilty of insubordination or misconduct, they will be relanded, and forfeit their contributions and passage.

12. If applicants fail to attend at the appointed time and place for embarkation, without having previously given to the Commissioners timely notice, and a satisfactory reason,—or if they fail to proceed in the ship, or are rejected for any of the reasons specified in the preceding article, they will forfeit their contributions, and will have no claim to a passage at any future time.

OUTFIT, ETC.

13. The Commissioners supply, free of charge, provisions, medical attendance, and cooking utensils at their depot and on board the ship. Also new mattresses, bolsters, blankets, and counterpanes, canvas bags to contain linen, &c., knives, and forks, spoons, metal plates, and drinking mugs, which articles will be given after arrival in the Colony to the emigrants who have behaved well on the voyage.

14. The emigrants must find their own clothing, which will be inspected at the Port by an officer of the Commissioners; and they will not be allowed to embark unless they have a sufficient stock for the voyage, nor less, for each person, than—

For Males.
Six shirts
Six pairs stockings
Two warm flannel or guernsey shirts
Two pairs new shoes
Two complete suits of strong exterior clothing.

For Females.
Six shifts
Two warm and strong flannel petticoats
Six pairs stockings
Two pairs strong shoes
Two strong gowns, one of which must be warm.

But for each child, 9 shirts or shifts, 4 warm flannel waistcoats, and one warm cloak or outside coat, 6 pairs of stockings, 2 pairs of strong shoes, and 2 complete suits of exterior clothing are required. There must also be at least 3 sheets for each berth, and 4 towels and 2 lbs. of marine soap for each person. The necessary brushes and combs and clothes brushes for cleanliness must be provided by the emigrants. Emigrants must not have less than the above outfit; but the larger the stock of clothing the better for health and comfort during the voyage, which usually lasts about four months; and as the emigrants have always to pass through very hot and very cold weather, they should be prepared for both; 2 or 3 coloured serge shirts for men, and an extra supply of flannel for women and children, are strongly recommended.

15. With a view to the promotion of cleanliness and health during the voyage, the hair of all children under 12 years of age must be cut close before embarkation. If this has not been done before arrival at the depot, it will be cut there. Parents should provide a proper comb for the purpose.

16. The emigrants should take out with them the necessary tools of their trades that are not bulky. But the whole quantity of baggage for each adult must not measure more than 20 cubic or solid feet, nor exceed half a ton in weight. It must be closely packed in one or more strong boxes or cases; but no box must exceed in size 15 cubic feet. Large packages and extra baggage, if taken at all, must be paid for. Mattresses and feather beds, will in no case be taken.

ROAD THROUGH BEECHWORTH.

NOTICE is hereby given that a map and survey plan describing the exact course and bearings of, and the measurements required for a portion of road through the township of Beechworth proposed to be made by the Central Road Board, together with a description of the lands through which the same is proposed to pass, and the names of the owners and occupiers thereof, so far as known, and also an estimate of the expense of the said work, have been deposited in the office of the Honorable the Surveyor General, Melbourne, the particulars of which are as follow :—

It commences in allotment No. 10, at a point on the west side one chain sixty-three links from south-west corner of allotment No. 11; bearing north two degrees thirty minutes west three chains fifteen links; thence north one degree fifteen minutes east three chains twenty-four links; and thence north fifty-two degrees west thirteen links to Ford-street.

The east side commences at a point forty-nine links from the south corner of allotment No. 10; bearing north two degrees thirty minutes west three chains twenty-seven links; thence north one degree fifteen minutes east three chains seventy-five links; and thence north twenty degrees thirty minutes east two chains ten links to Ford street, the road being one chain wide, and passes through the properties of Messrs. Whetty, Brown, Fisher, Wallace, and Way.

The quantity of land required to be taken for the proposed road is three roods six perches and one hundred and ninety-five links, and the estimated cost of effecting the said work is eight hundred and sixty-two pounds eighteen shillings (£862 18s.)

All persons affected by the proposed road are requested to set forth in writing, addressed to the President of the Central Road Board, within forty days from the first publication of this notice, any well grounded objections that they may have to the said road, failing which they will be thereafter precluded from making any such objections or claiming any compensation whatsoever.

PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.
BEECHWORTH.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria, No. 15, His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a Petition to His Excellency hereinafter set forth, signed by One hundred and fifty-four landowners and householders of the town of Beechworth.

The petitioners state that they are desirous of availing themselves of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria, No. 15, intituled, "*An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*," being convinced of the advantages derivable from its provisions in promoting the improvement and good management of their district; and they propose the formation of a Municipal District, bounded as follows:—Commencing at a point at the north corner of the cemetery; thence by a line bearing west fifty chains; thence by a line bearing south one mile and seventy chains; thence by a line bearing east sixty chains; thence by a line bearing north forty chains; thence by a line bearing north-east forty-two chains; thence by a line bearing east fifty chains; thence by a line bearing north one mile; thence by a line bearing west one mile and ten chains, to the commencing point.

The petitioners further state that the area of the proposed district does not exceed nine square miles, and contains the full number of householders required by the said Act, and that no two points in such area are distant from each other more than six miles; and they pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that such district may be declared a Municipal District under the above Act."

MUNICIPALITY OF RICHMOND.

BYE-LAWS FOR REGULATING THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNCIL OF THE SAID MUNICIPALITY, TO BE CALLED "THE STANDING ORDERS OF THE SAID COUNCIL," MADE AND ASSENTED TO UNDER AND BY VIRTUE OF AN ACT FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS IN VICTORIA.

THE ordinary meetings of the Council shall be held on Friday in each week, at seven o'clock in the evening, except otherwise ordered, and shall be open to the public. The Council to have power to adjourn such meeting from time to time not being more than fourteen days from the last day of meeting. Minutes of the proceedings of all meetings of the Council shall be drawn up and fairly entered into a book for that purposes and shall be signed by the councillor presiding at the meeting; and the said minutes shall be open to the inspection of all persons on the ratepayers' roll, at all reasonable times, free of charge.

2. At all meetings of the Council, the business shall commence so soon as the legal quorum of three councillors are present; but, should a quorum not be present at the expiration of twenty minutes, such circumstance shall be noted (with the names of the members present) in the minute book, and the business of such meeting shall lapse.

3. The first business at each meeting of the Council shall be to confirm the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereupon except as to the accuracy thereof.

4. At all meetings the reading of correspondence unconnected with the business of the meeting, the presentation of petitions, notices of motion and bringing up of reports shall have the precedence of all motions or Orders of the Day.

5. All communications presented to the Council must be in the form of petition or memorial addressed to the Municipal Council, and be couched in respectful language.

6. No motion shall be discussed or decided on at any meeting of Council unless notice in writing, signed by the councillor proposing, shall have been given at a previous meeting of the Council; nor shall any report of Committee be decided on unless similar notice be given, and the Clerk to the Council shall furnish each councillor with a copy of each notice of motion three clear days before the meeting for which the same is given.

7. The Orders of the Day shall include all business of which due notice has been given, and all matters arising out of former meetings of the Council.

8. No motion shall be proceeded with unless the councillor giving notice, or one of the Council authorised by him in writing, be present to proceed with the same when called upon.

9. No Bye-law shall hereafter be proposed without due notice (as in the case of motions), neither shall any such Bye-law be finally passed or adopted by the Council, nor be presented for the assent of His Excellency the Governor, until the expiration of twenty days from the publication thereof in one or more of the Melbourne newspapers, and the posting thereof on the outer door of the Council chamber; and a copy of all Bye-laws in force under the Act shall be kept in the Council chamber, for the inspection, free of charge, at reasonable times, of all persons on the ratepayers' roll.

10. All business shall be considered in the order in which notice thereof was given.

11. Any member, when proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the Chairman; and no member shall be interrupted unless by a call to order, when he shall sit down; the member calling to order shall then be heard upon such point of order, and the question decided before the subject is resumed or any other business entered upon.

12. Any member desirous of proposing either an original motion or amendment, must state the nature of such motion or amendment before addressing the Council in support thereof.

13. Any member making an amendment shall put it in writing, sign, and deliver it to the Clerk to the Council, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder; and no question once brought before the Council shall be withdrawn without leave of the Council; nor shall any motion be entertained by the Council until the same be seconded.

14. If more than one Councillor rise at the same time, the Chairman for the time being shall decide which is entitled to pre-eminence.

15. No Councillor shall speak twice on the same question, unless by way of explanation merely, or in reply as the mover of an original motion, or upon any amendment; and after such explanation or reply, the question shall be forthwith put to the vote; but councillors merely seconding any motion shall not be held to have spoken upon it.

16. No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion, or impute motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly.

17. The presiding Chairman's decision shall be final on all questions of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument.

18. The presiding Chairman shall rise when addressing the Council.

19. Any councillor who shall use expressions capable of being offensively applied to any other councillor, shall (if required by the Chairman) withdraw such expressions, and make a satisfactory apology to the Council, under a penalty of not more than Ten pounds.

20. Any councillor may require the Clerk to the Council to take down any particular expressions immediately on their being used.

21. Any councillor may of right demand the production of any of the documents of the Council bearing on the question under discussion.

22. Only one amendment shall be discussed at one time, and upon the adoption of any amendment the original motion shall be deemed rejected, and the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as a substantive motion.

23. The Chairman shall, in taking the sense of the Council, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative, and the votes of the councillors, if a division be called for, shall be entered in the minutes.

24. The Council shall vote by show of hands except in cases of elections.

25. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment, but if the question be decided in the negative, the motion then under consideration or the next motion or Order of the Day shall be considered before the question of adjournment shall be again entertained, and any business left undecided shall take precedence at the next meeting of the Council.

26. Any councillor may record his protest against any decision of the Council, provided the same be made in writing before and presented not later than the next meeting of the Council, and be couched in respectful language.

27. No motion, the effect of which would be to rescind any previous resolution of the Council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole Council has been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the Council which shall have been negatived by the Council shall be again entertained during the same municipal year.

28. That when a call of the Council has been determined on, three clear days notice in writing shall be given of such call to, or left at, the residence of each member by the Clerk to the Council, and any member who shall, without reasonable cause, absent himself from the meeting upon the day for which such call be made shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

29. The Chairman of the Council, when appointed on Committees, shall be Chairman thereof, and the standing orders of the Council shall be observed in all Committees except as to the number of times limited for speaking.

30. That on any Committee being appointed, the Clerk to the Council shall give such notices calling the Committee together as may be requisite.

31. The Clerk shall not affix the Common Seal to any Corporate document without the express order of the Council, nor unless such document bears the signature of the Chairman, except in the case of powers of attorney, and other legal documents not relating to the Corporation, the signatures to which require to be verified before the Chairman by declaration, and in any such case the said seal shall and may be affixed by the Clerk to the Chairman's certificate accompanying the same on the receipt of a fee of ten shillings and sixpence for each attestation.

32. No election to any office at the disposal of the Council shall take place until six clear days notice have been given in two or more Melbourne daily newspapers and a local newspaper, if any, inviting applications for the same, and the salary or other remuneration of such office in all cases be fixed before proceeding to the election.

33. At all such elections the voting shall be on cards provided for the purpose, on which the voter shall write the name of the candidate he supports, and sign his own; no others will be received; and the clerk to the Council shall forthwith proclaim the same aloud and preserve the same as a record.

34. No councillor shall have, directly or indirectly, by himself or his partner, any share or interest in any contract or employment with or by the Council except he be a shareholder in any public company or corporation with which the Council may contract for the supply of gas or water, or for the insurance of premises against fire in the municipality, nor shall any councillor be received as surety for any officer, nor shall any councillor, auditor, or other officer, become security for any contractor or other employé with or by the Council. No contract with any such public company or corporation in which a councillor may be a shareholder shall be concluded until ten days after notice thereof shall have been advertised in all the Melbourne daily papers and in the local newspaper (if any), and posted on the outside door of the council chambers; any councillor or officer infringing any of the stipulations of this Bye-law shall forfeit a sum not exceeding fifty pounds.

35. Any one or more of the Standing Orders may be suspended *pro tem.* in case of emergency with the consent of a majority of the Council.

36. The neglect or breach of any or either of the foregoing Bye-laws shall (except where a sum by way of penalty is hereinbefore fixed) subject the person offending to a penalty not exceeding the sum of one shilling in respect of each Bye-law.

The foregoing Bye-laws were agreed to by the Municipal Council of Richmond, at a meeting thereof duly held on the twentieth day of June, 1856.
