LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

ST. ANDREW'S.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the District of St. Andrew's:—

1. *Interpretation of the word "claim."*—For the purpose of these regulations, the word "claim" shall be understood to mean the portion of Crown land which each person or company shall be entitled to occupy and mine in, under any document, license, or lease, issued by authority; also, that portion of land assigned to any person or persons by any warden or other competent officer, and which may be occupied by any dwelling place or stable, with a reasonable amount of ground around them, or by any dam or waterhole, machine, private cart road, drain, or as drainage ground for the supply of water to any engine, mill, or machine.

2. *Extent of claims for alluvial sinking.*—The extent of claim to which each miner's right shall entitle the holder shall be—

For one miner	...	12 feet by 12 feet.
For two miners	...	12 " 24 "
For three miners	...	18 " 24 "
For four miners	...	24 " 24 "

Beyond which no greater area will be granted, unless where it can be proved satisfactorily that two or more parties of miners taking up claims in the usual manner on worked or flooded ground, can, by combining, overcome any natural difficulties which may exist, by means not detrimental to the interests of the public or other authorised miners. Such combinations may be authorised under the distinct condition that the ground must be worked by the same number of miners as would be required were it divided into the smaller claims. Any such combination of miners must be in possession of a written sanction from the warden, to be produced when required.

3. *Extent of claim for deep sinkings.*—The local court, wishing to encourage miners in working deep and hard hills, extends the claim of each miner to eighteen (18) feet square, provided the depth of sinking exceeds thirty-five (35) feet.

iv. *Extent of claim of old workings.*—Old workings, that is, ground partially worked and abandoned: first, when the sinking is under thirteen feet, the extent of the claim shall be twenty (20) feet by twenty (20) to each miner; secondly, when the working is thirteen (13) feet and upwards, requiring tailrace or other expensive outlay, the extent of claim shall be thirty (30) feet by thirty (30) feet to each miner; thirdly, when the ground is wet or flooded, and the sinking of an average depth of twenty (20) feet at least, and the application of horse, water, or steam power is introduced for the effectual working of the same, forty (40) feet by forty (40) feet shall be allowed to each miner.

v. *Working of rivers or clearing beds of creeks.*—Where the working of rivers or clearing beds of creeks or waterholes would be no injury to the public, written permission may be granted to parties of miners to undertake the same. The portion of such rivers, beds of creeks, or waterholes allowed to each miner will be ten (10) yards in length, irrespective of the breadth. Such conditions, relative to the working of such rivers, beds of creeks, or waterholes, as the interest of the public may require, will be imposed, and, if deemed expedient, a sum of money as a deposit may be taken from each miner to insure the due performance of the same.

vi. *Extent of quartz claim.*—The extent of quartz claim for each miner shall be twenty (20) feet along the vein with the dip, exclusive of wall. Parties to be limited to four men, beyond which no greater claim shall be allowed, except by amalgamation of claims or leases.

vii. *Amalgamation of quartz claims.*—Parties of miners holding adjoining quartz claims may combine for the purpose of expediting their work. The areas of amalgamated claims shall in all cases be proportionate to the number of men holding miner's rights in such company. Applications for amalgamating more than two (2) claims, to be made to the local court of the district or the clerk of such court, and to specify the following particulars, viz.:—date of application, with situation and plan of ground; classification of sinking and difficulties to contend with; if to be worked by machinery, and if so, the power of the same, together with title of company, number, name and date of each shareholder's miner's right.

viii. *Extent of quartz claim to be in proportion to the number of men employed.*—Except in cases otherwise provided for, the extent of claim shall be absolutely in proportion to the number of authorised miners then and there actually engaged on the claim or employed in extracting the gold by any process from any stone, washing stuff, or other substance taken from his or their claim; provided that where any party of miners are only sinking or driving in search of gold, only one-half the number of men in proportion to the extent of claim shall be required to be working upon it; but immediately upon reaching stone, earth, or other substance containing gold, the total number of shareholders or laborers for whom ground is claimed must be employed as aborersaid.

ix. *Marking off claims.*—All quartz leases, extended alluvial and registered claims, shall be marked by posts placed firmly in the ground three feet high above the surface, and painted white, with the number of lease or claim and area occupied painted on the inner side facing the ground so occupied. All claims held for mining purposes (and not provided for as above) shall be properly marked at the corners by posts or pegs 1½ feet above the surface, and always kept easily distinguishable.

x. *Wall between claims.*—In all cases a wall of two feet shall be left between the claims of different parties of miners, such wall not to be worked without the consent in writing of both parties. And all parties shall keep their banks and walls properly timbered, to the satisfaction of the warden or other visiting inspector of mining operations.

xi. *Plurality of claims.*—No miner or party of miners shall hold at one and the same time more than one claim, except the same be specially registered. If left unworked for three (3) clear working days, it shall be considered abandoned.

xii. *Registration of and protection for claims under certain circumstances.*—Claims may be registered and secured from intrusion under the following circumstances, viz.: if after sinking for a vein, the party has to leave for a time from the want of means, he may be protected in his claim for a month at a time (which period may be renewed at the discretion of the court), provided that sufficient work be done on the claim to justify the court in allowing such a privilege. Also in cases where important business or illness occasions the absence of any of a party so as to interfere with the working of their claim, the claim may be registered and secured from intrusion for any period at the discretion of the court, or leave of absence may be given by the warden for any period not exceeding seven days.

And in cases where miners are employed under agreement registered in the court, where it is found necessary to suspend for a time the working of the claim, the warden shall have power to protect the claim from intrusion for seven days, and which period may be further extended for another week at the discretion of the court. In all cases the party obtaining either registration of claim or leave of absence shall notify the same in a conspicuous manner on the claim.

xiii. *Prospecting.*—For the encouragement of prospecting, parties not exceeding two persons discovering any new gold working shall be entitled to an extent of ground double the length of that allowed for quartz veins, and treble the ordinary area of alluvial claims, provided the discovery be reported to the warden without unnecessary delay.

xiv. *Miners uniting for the purpose of prospecting.*—The holder or holders of any claim on a supposed quartz reef, vein, or lead of gold in alluvial ground, who shall contribute with other miners, and in proportion to the extent of claim, to the common expense of sinking any prospecting shaft, situated within a distance of fifty yards and not more from any part of his or their claim, for the purpose of ascertaining the existence, position and character of such reef, vein, or lead of gold, shall be entitled to hold such claim unworked until the existence, position and true character of the auriferous deposits have been ascertained and determined, or until such prospecting shall have ceased to be carried on in a satisfactory manner.

xv. *Auriferous ore to be stacked.*—Any person wishing to retain possession of quartz, stone, casing, or other substance containing gold, the product of a claim, shall properly stack such quartz or other substance on ground not supposed to be workable, and erect close to such stack a post with his name, address and date of stacking legibly painted thereon. No person shall remove, deface, or damage any post so erected, quartz, stone, or other substance stacked in accordance with this regulation, and it shall be competent for the warden of the district to declare relinquished, after twelve (12) months in quartz claims and six (6) months in alluvial claims, any stone, casing, wash dirt, or other substance so stacked, and taken from a claim then abandoned.

xvi. *Leases to be granted.*—Leases may be obtained for mining purposes on Crown lands for a period of twelve (12) months, on application to the warden, contingent on the recommendations of the local court; such leases to be renewable.

xvii. *Lease of abandoned alluvial workings.*—Abandoned alluvial diggings may be so leased. In all cases the usual proportion of miners to be employed in accordance with the extent of ground leased, or to the power of machinery to be employed. All applications to be made in writing to the warden, stating all particulars of locality, nature of ground, extent to be occupied, number of men to be employed, and power of machinery to be used, also the time required to commence actual working, contingent on the recommendation of the local court.

xviii. *Claims upon which steam or other machinery is employed.*—To encourage the introduction of steam power and machinery in general, the court will allow areas of claim of such extent as shall be considered applicable to the locality applied for, and miners and machinery to be employed; immediately below such allowance of land shall be left an area not less than that occupied by such engine party, for the benefit of ordinary miners, through the length of which shall the engine party be required to construct a watercourse to carry off their waste water, that it may not injure the ordinary miner.

xix. *Deposit of refuse soil.*—All leaseholders shall be compelled to deposit the soil from their excavations within the boundaries of their posts.

xx. *Applicants' and petitioners' names in full.*—Applicants for leases, and petitioners against, shall give their names, surnames, present trade or pursuit, and a particular description of where they live.

xxi. *Employment of laborers on claims.*—Any person can hold a quartz or other claim without personally working on it, by placing laborers upon the ground proportionate to the extent of claim.

xxii. *Erection of machinery.*—Any party requiring ground whereon to erect machinery shall make a written application to the clerk of the local court; notice of such application to be posted on the ground applied for and on the court house for eight (8) days.

If no sufficient objection to such permission shall have been made in writing, the court may allow the exclusive possession (except as against the Crown only) by the occupant of such ground.

xxiii. *Management of quartz crushing machines.*—All machinists crushing quartz for the public shall keep on the premises a correct weighing machine, and shall weigh the quartz by avoirdupois weight, viz., 112 pounds to the hundredweight. The premises connected with all such quartz crushing machines shall be enclosed, and the quartz (if circumstances compel it to be detained in the premises over night) shall be deposited under a covered shed, and accommodation afforded for a watchman when required by the owners of the quartz.

xxiv. *Water privileges.*—Any person or persons desirous of making and holding any waterhole, race, or dam to contain water, shall make application to the warden, and post a notice of such application on the site applied for, one week, when, if it can be satisfactorily proved that no injury will result to the public by conferring such a privilege, a written authority may be given to such applicants. All such reservoirs (where practicable) to be constructed on the side of the gully or flat, and excavated to the bed rock.

xxv. *Puddling machines, sludge, etc.*—No machines for puddling auriferous earth by horse or steam power shall be erected in any place where any number of miners may be obtaining their livelihood by sinking, nor shall any such machine be placed on workable ground supposed to contain gold in a payable quantity, nor in any place where the sludge from such machine shall be injurious to other mining operations or the supply of water. All parties discharging sludge or water from any engine, mill, machine, or other apparatus, shall make a good and proper drain to join and fall into the main channel or drain of the gully or flat in which such machine is situated.

Should there exist no main channel for the effectual carrying off of sludge or superfluous water, the warden may direct the owners of such machines to make a general drain, and shall prescribe the course and position, depth and inclination, removal of obstructions, the allotment of work among the different owners or such other directions as he may deem desirable. In no case shall such water or sludge be allowed to run upon or across any public road or footpath in common use, or on workable ground, to the detriment of other miners.

xxvi. Written agreements.—All persons engaged in or entering into any partnership or company for mining purposes shall draw up and attest a written agreement, specifying the intent, terms, and property of such company or partnership; such agreement to be produced when required.

xxvii. Waterholes.—Any person wishing to preserve a waterhole for domestic purposes must make application to the warden, and if deemed by him expedient, an authority in writing will be given to set apart the same, when the applicant must erect an upright pole over the hole, crossed by two bars of wood (thus \perp), and any person maliciously destroying or injuring the same shall, upon conviction for every such offence, be adjudged to pay a fine not exceeding twenty shillings.

xxviii. Mining in tents or buildings.—Any person mining within his private tent or building, on the waste lands of the Crown, shall, on conviction before any Justice of the peace, be adjudged to pay a penalty under the 23rd section of the Act 18 Victoria No. 37.

at the junction of the southern fence of the Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway Company with the River Yarra, along the said fence to the post marking the north-western angle of the boundary of the municipal district of Emerald Hill, thence in a right line to that point on the left bank of the River Yarra forming the limits of the boundary of the city of Melbourne, thence along the left bank of the River Yarra to the commencing point:

RICHMOND MUNICIPALITY.

PETITION FOR ALTERATION OF BOUNDARIES.
