SPIRIT MERCHANTS.

THE attention of wine and spirit merchants is called to the fifth clause of the Act 20 Victoria No. 4, by which the meaning of "spirit merchant" is defined as being "any vendor of duty-paid spirituous liquors, or of duty-paid wine, or of fermented malt liquors, in quantities respectively not less than two gallons."

All persons to whom the notice applies are hereby cautioned that unless they forthwith register themselves as spirit merchants, and pay the fee as required by the above recited Act, they will be proceeded against as the law directs.

JURY LISTS.

CLERKS of Petty Sessions are requested to take notice that the New Jury Act, 21 Victoria No. 19, has altered the time for making out the Jury Lists, as also the mode of proceeding for that purpose.

Attention is called to section VI. of the Act, by which Clerks of Petty Sessions may agree among themselves as to the limits within which each will collect the jurors' names. This arrangement had better be made at once, as every clerk is liable to a penalty if the lists are not correct, whether the default be his or not.

Attention is also invited to section VIII., by which a notice is required to be published when the lists are made; and to section IX., which shews how the lists are to be dealt with.

THE attention of Masters of vessels trading on the River Murray is called to the subjoined copy of the 239th Clause of "The Customs Act, 1857," and they are hereby cautioned that an infringement of its provisions will lead to the enforcement of the penalties thereby imposed.

"All laws now or hereafter to be in force relating to the duties of customs and regulation of the customs shall extend and apply to the said river and all vessels navigating the same as fully and effectually as if such river were part of the high seas within one league of the coast of Victoria and all vessels navigating the said river shall be deemed to be vessels trading with the said colony or on the coast thereof."

WHEREAS a certain building has been erected at Kilmore, in the county of Dalhousie, at the public expense, as and for a lock-up for police purposes: And whereas it is deemed expedient to proclaim such building to be a gaol within the meaning of an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the said colony, passed in the sixteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "*An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders*:" Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, do hereby proclaim the said building, called and known as the police lock-up, situated at Kilmore, in the county of Dalhousie, as and to be a public gaol, prison and house of correction within the meaning of the said Act, for the district of Kilmore aforesaid.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "*An Act for making and improving Roads in the colony of Victoria*," it was amongst other things enacted, That it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him should seem meet as and to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, in pursuance of the power so vested in me by the said Act, and of every other power and authority enabling me in this behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare that the district hereinafter defined shall be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, that is to say:—Commencing at a point on the south side of the main Dandenong road, being the north-western angle of the Cemetery reserve, in the parish of Prahran; thence south by a Government road to the main Brighton road, at the south-western angle of portion 270, in the same parish; thence south-easterly by the main Brighton road to the northern boundary of the parish of Moorabbin; thence east by the northern boundary of the said parish of Moorabbin to the parish of Mulgrave; thence north by the western boundary of the said parish of Mulgrave to the main Dandenong road; and thence north-westerly by the said main Dandenong road to the commencing point.

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be, "*The Caulfield Road District*."

PORTLAND ROAD DISTRICT ALTERED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the third day of August, in the present year, the boundaries of the Portland Road District were altered as therein specified: And whereas it is deemed expedient again to alter the boundaries of the said road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, in pursuance of the authority vested in me in

this behalf, do hereby revoke the said Proclamation, and I do hereby proclaim and declare that from henceforth the said Portland Road District shall consist of the portion of the said colony comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say:—Commencing at a point on the sea coast forty chains east of the mouth of the Fitz Roy River; thence northwards by the western boundary of Peyton and Mowbray's run to the run occupied by T. A. Brown; thence by part of the southern and by the western boundaries of the said run to the run occupied by R. and W. Jamieson; thence by the south-western and by the western boundaries of runs occupied by R. and W. Jamieson, Samuel McGregor, John McKellar, and James Whyte, respectively, to the northern boundary of the said James Whyte's run; thence by the said northern boundary, and by the northern boundary of John Mooney's run to Henry Phillips' run; thence by the western and northern boundaries of the said Henry Phillips' run to John Toomey's run; thence by the northern boundary of John Toomey's run to the eastern boundary of the county of Normanby; thence by the eastern and northern boundaries of that county to a point due north of Mount Pierrepont; thence by a line south to Mount Pierrepont; thence by a line north-westerly to the junction of the Muddy Creek and the River Wannon; thence by the River Wannon to the River Glenelg; thence northwards by the River Glenelg to Power's Creek; thence by that creek and a straight line westerly to the Mosquito Creek; thence westwards by the Mosquito Creek to the 141st meridian; thence south by the 141st meridian to the sea-coast, and thence eastwards by the sea-coast to the commencing point, excluding the municipal district of Portland.

PROPOSED ROAD FROM MOONEE PONDS TO BRUNSWICK.

MUNICIPALITY OF EMERALD HILL.

BYE-LAW No. 15.—A BYE-LAW TO PREVENT THE DANGERS AND NUISANCES ARISING FROM THE CONSTRUCTION OF BALCONIES, ETC., ON EXTERNAL WALLS, SO AS TO PROJECT BEYOND THE BUILDING LINE, AND ENCROACH UPON OR OVERHANG ANY PUBLIC FOOTWAY WITHIN THE TOWN PROPER OF EMERALD HILL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is provided that the council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets, and public thoroughfares, and shall and may make such bye-laws for carrying out these objects as shall to such council seem fit: And whereas it is expedient that a bye-law should be made for preventing the dangers and nuisances arising from the construction of balconies, &c., on external walls, so as to project beyond the building line and encroach upon or overhang the public footways within the town proper of Emerald Hill: And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the 26th day of May, A.D. 1855, the district of Emerald Hill was duly established a municipal district under the provisions and within the meaning of the said Act: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council for the district of Emerald Hill, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-chief of the colony of Victoria, as required by the provisions of the said Act:

It shall not be lawful to erect, construct or plan any balcony, colonnade, verandah or other such projection on any external wall fronting any public street or thoroughfare, so as to project beyond the building line of such street or thoroughfare and encroach upon or overhang any public footway or street, and any person contravening this bye-law, and neglecting, after seven (7) days' notice from the town surveyor to remove any such projection, shall, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding fifty pounds (£50): Provided that if within seven (7) days after any first or subsequent conviction the cause of offence is not removed, it shall be lawful to summon the offender without any notice as for a new offence, and to inflict the penalty hereinbefore mentioned.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 15, made by the municipal council of Emerald Hill, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

The petitioners state that they are desirous of having the districts of Newtown and Chilwell separated from the corporation of Geelong, and formed into a municipality, bounded as shewn on a plan, viz.:—"Commencing at the junction of Aberdeen street with La Trobe terrace, and bounded on the north by the centre of Aberdeen street, bearing west 1 mile 23 chains; on the east by the centre of the Great Western road, bearing north 20 chains; on the north, again by the centre of the Great Western road, bearing west 51 chains; on the west by the centre of the Government road in front of the Orphan Asylum, bearing south to the River Barwon 24 chains 50 links; on the west again and south, by the centre of the River Barwon as far as La Trobe terrace; and on the east by the centre of La Trobe terrace, bearing north 1 mile 12 chains, back to the commencing point."

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

CASTLEMAINE.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the District of Castlemaine:—

i. *Repeal of former regulations.*—As it is expedient that the mining rules and regulations of this gold field, passed from time to time by the local court, and assented to by the Governor, should be revised and consolidated, all rules and regulations therefore which at any time previous to the date hereof have been passed and assented to shall be repealed, and the following substituted in lieu of them so soon as the repeal of the former and substitution of the present shall have been assented to by His Excellency, or the Officer administering the Government.

ii. *Interpretation of the word "claim."*—For the purpose of these regulations the word "claim" shall be understood to mean the portion of Crown land which each person or company shall be entitled to occupy, or occupy and mine in under any document, license or lease issued by authority.

iii. *Extent of claim.*—The extent of claim in new ground to which any miner's right shall entitle the holder shall be, for one miner, 20 feet by 20 feet; for two miners, 20 feet by 40 feet; for three miners, 40 feet by 30 feet; for four miners, 40 feet by 40 feet; and 20 feet by 20 feet for each additional miner employed; and in case the depth of the sinking shall exceed 35 feet the claim for each miner shall be 30 feet by 30 feet.

iv. *Old or abandoned ground.*—The extent of claim for each miner on old workings and abandoned ground shall be 40 feet by 40 feet.

v. *Flooded ground.*—On surface flooded ground (which must be reported and proved to be such by the surveyor or some other authorised person to the satisfaction of the local court) extended claims may be granted by the court on application to the court.

vi. *Working or clearing beds of creeks.*—Where the working or clearing of beds of creeks or waterholes would be no injury to the public, the miner or miners must obtain permission to undertake the same. The portion of such beds of creeks or waterholes allowed to each miner will be fifteen yards in length, irrespective of the breadth of such creek or waterhole. Such conditions relative to such working of such beds of creeks and waterholes as the interest of the public may require, will be imposed and (if deemed expedient) a sum of money as a deposit must be paid by each miner, to ensure the due performance of the same.

vii. *Sluice washing, &c.*—Sluice washing or other water privileges will be allowed only by special sanction, in order that care may be taken to guard against conferring the privileges in places where the permanent supply of water may be injured by the operation. When a party of miners have received permission for sluice washing or other privilege, they must obtain a written sanction from the local court. Such privileges will, in all cases, be subject to the rules of the local court of the district, approved by the Governor.

viii. *Applications for extended claims.*—All applications for extended alluvial claims shall be made in writing to the clerk of the local court, and prior to such application being entertained, the warden, or other duly authorised person, shall inspect such ground or quartz reef and report thereon to the court.

ix. *Quartz claims.*—The extent of quartz claim for each miner on all reefs which shall not be opened, or old ones resumed, before the 1st day of September, 1857, shall be 30 feet along the reef with 100 feet on each side of the shaft (east and west), beyond which no greater claim shall be allowed except by amalgamation of claims or leases, except as provided in Rule x. Parties of miners holding adjoining quartz claims may combine for the purpose of expediting their work by the introduction of machinery. The areas of amalgamated claims shall in all cases be proportionate to the number of men holding miner's rights in such company. In no case will amalgamated claims be permitted without a written sanction from the local court.

x. *Extent of quartz claim to be in proportion to men employed.*—Where any party of miners are only sinking or driving in search of gold, only one half the number of men in proportion to the extent of claim shall be required to be working upon it; but immediately upon reaching quartz containing gold, the total number of shareholders or laborers for whom ground is claimed, must be employed on the ground as aforesaid.

xi. *Marking off claims.*—All leases, quartz, extended alluvial, and registered claims shall be marked by posts placed firmly in the ground 3 feet high above the surface, and painted white with the number of lease or claim, and area occupied, painted on the inner side on the ground so occupied. All claims held for mining purposes (and not provided for as above), shall be properly marked at the corners by posts or pegs 1½ feet above the surface, and always kept easily distinguishable.

xii. *Wall between claims.*—In all cases a wall shall be left between the claims of different parties of miners, viz., between quartz claims a wall of 3 feet, and between alluvial claims a wall of 2 feet, such wall not to be worked without the consent in writing of both parties, and all parties shall keep their banks and walls properly timbered to the satisfaction of the warden or other visiting inspector of mining operations. Should any miner or miners in marking off a claim neglect to leave a proper space for the wall, it shall be competent for the

warden to deduct such space for wall from the claim last marked off, and should any miner mark off more than the proper width for such wall, the warden may curtail such excess and assign it as he may deem advisable, or he may order the boundary posts to be removed to their proper relative position.

xiii. *Registration of claims.*—Any party who shall have expended considerable labor on an alluvial or quartz claim, and may be unable to obtain the reward of their labor through flooding or other uncontrollable circumstances, shall be allowed to register such claims as unworkable; but the allowing of such registration shall be at the discretion of the local court.

xiv. *Prospecting.*—For the encouragement of prospecting, persons discovering any new gold working, may have allotted to them, by special sanction of the local court, an extent of ground equal to double or treble the ordinary area of mining claims, provided the discovery be made public without unnecessary delay.

xv. *Auriferous ore to be stacked.*—Any person wishing to retain possession of quartz or other substance containing gold, the product of a claim, shall properly stack such quartz or other substance on ground not supposed to be workable, and erect close to such stack a post, with name, address and date of stacking legibly painted thereon. No person shall remove, deface or damage any post so erected, quartz, stone or other substance stacked in accordance with this regulation; and it shall be competent for the warden of the district to declare relinquished, after twelve months in quartz claims, and six months in alluvial claims, any quartz or other substance not so stacked and taken from a claim then abandoned.

xvi. *Leases.*—Leases for mining auriferous lands may be approved for periods not exceeding twelve months; such leases will be renewable provided the regulations of the local court be complied with (the same being certified by the surveyor and two members of the court), but in every case subject to the recommendation of the court. All leaseholders shall register their names with the clerk of the court, and all transfers of shares in such leases shall be registered the same as original leaseholders. All petitioners against such leases shall insert their names, surnames, present residence, and trade or pursuit, or such petition will not be entertained by the court. The number of miners on leased ground shall be in the following proportion:—

For ¼ of an acre, 3; ½ ditto, 5; ¾ ditto, 8; 1 acre, 10.

xvii. *Claims on which machinery is employed.*—To encourage the introduction of steam power and machinery in general the court will grant areas of claims of such extent as shall be considered applicable to the locality applied for, and miners and machinery to be employed. Immediately below such grant shall be left an area not less than that occupied by such engine party for the benefit of ordinary miners, through the length of which shall the engine party be required to make a watercourse to carry off their waste water, that it may not injure the ordinary miner.

xviii. *Employment of laborers.*—Any storekeeper, merchant or other person desirous of holding a quartz or other claim, without working personally on such claim, may do so by placing laborers upon the said ground proportionate to the extent of claim.

xix. *Erection of machinery.*—Applicants for leases, or parties requiring ground whereon to erect machinery, shall make a written application to the clerk of the local court. Notice of such application to be posted on the ground applied for and on the court house for eight days previous to the day of granting. If no sufficient objections to such permission shall have been made in writing, the court may allow the exclusive possession (except as against the Crown only) by the occupant of such ground.

xx. *Management of quartz-crushing machinery.*—All machinists crushing quartz for the public shall keep on the premises a correct weighing machine, and shall weigh the quartz by avoirdupois weight, viz., one hundred and twelve pounds to the hundred weight. The premises connected with all such crushing machines shall be enclosed, and the quartz (if circumstances compel it to be detained on the premises overnight) shall be deposited under a covered shed, and accommodation afforded for a watchman when required by the owner of the quartz.

xxi. *Water privileges.*—Any person or persons desirous of making and holding any waterhole, race or dam to contain water, shall make application to the local court, and post a notice of such application on the site applied for for one week previous to the day of granting; when, if it can be satisfactorily proved that no injury will result to the public by conferring such privilege, a written authority may be given to such applicant. All such reservoirs (where practicable) to be constructed on the side of the gully or flat, and excavated to the bed rock.

xxii. *Puddling machines, sludge, &c.*—No machine for puddling auriferous earth by horse or steam power shall be erected in any place where any number of miners may be obtaining their livelihood by sinking, nor shall any such machine be placed on workable ground supposed to contain gold in a payable quantity, nor in any place where the sludge from such machine shall be injurious to other mining operations or the supply of water. All parties discharging sludge or water from any engine, mill, machine or other apparatus shall make a good and proper drain to join and fall into the main channel or drain of the gully or flat in which such machine is situated. Should there exist no main channel for the effectual carrying off of sludge or superfluous water, the warden shall direct the owners

of such machines to make a general drain, and shall prescribe the course and position, depth and inclination, removal of obstructions, the allotment of work among the different owners, or such other directions as he may deem advisable. In no case shall such water or sludge be allowed to run upon or across any public road or footpath in common use, or on workable ground, to the detriment of other miners. The surveyor shall in all cases report to the court respecting the same before such puddling machine shall be permitted to be erected.

xxiii. Written agreements.—All persons engaged in or entering into any partnership or company for mining purposes shall draw up and have properly attested a written agreement, specifying the intent, terms and property of such company or partnership; such agreement to be produced when required, otherwise their causes of dispute will not be heard by the court.

xxiv. Waterholes for domestic purposes.—Any person wishing to preserve a waterhole for domestic purposes, must make application to the warden, and if deemed by him expedient, an authority in writing will be given to set apart the same, when the applicant must erect an upright pole over the hole, crossed by two bars of wood, thus, †; and any person maliciously destroying or injuring the same, shall, upon conviction, for every such offence be adjudged to pay a fine not exceeding 20s.

xxv. Mining in tents or buildings.—Any person mining within his private tent or building on the waste lands of the Crown, shall, on conviction before any justice of the peace, be adjudged to pay a penalty under the 23rd section of the Act 18 Victoria No. 37.

xxvi. Business area.—Each business license shall entitle the holder to occupy an allotment of ground having a frontage of 60 feet, irrespective of depth, provided such ground be not required for mining purposes.

xxvii. Construction and management of races or water channels.—In all cases where races or water channels are required for draining the ground and carrying off surplus water and sludge, such races and channels may be constructed through any unoccupied ground, and shall be reserved and protected for their proper purposes. All such races or channels shall become common or main races and channels, provided that all parties wishing to run a head or side race into or otherwise in such main races, shall contribute a fair proportion of labor or cash towards constructing and repairing the same, and shall, when required, clean out, and otherwise keep in order or repair, such main races, in proportion to the number of men, the use made of and the benefits derived from such races. A wall of 6 feet in width shall be left on each side of all such races or water channels, except on application to the local court an increase in width be granted, on which no party shall be allowed to dig during the continuance of any lease, grant or privilege held by the party or parties who may have constructed the same.

xxviii. Machinery.—All machinery erected on Crown lands for mining purposes left for the space of three months without being registered, on complaint being made to this court, the court shall direct the removal of such machinery, and all attendant costs shall be levied on the same. No registration of such machinery shall be in force for longer than one month at a time.

xxix. Windlasses, &c., deserted.—All windlasses, slabs or timber left on any claim one month after such claim is abandoned, shall be held as forfeited, and may be appropriated by any parties requiring the same.

xxx. Fraudulent grants.—On a claim being marked out, the party so doing must within 48 hours commence to work the same, unless he or they shall have obtained a written consent, to be signed by the chairman of this court, to hold the claim unworked for a longer period, and shall continue to perform every lawful day a reasonable amount of work according to the number of miners in the claim, as required by the rules of this court. Should it afterwards be proved to the satisfaction of this court that the party or parties applying for such consent obtained the same by any false representation, such party or parties shall be liable to a fine of not less than £10.

xxxi. Shepherding, &c., &c.—In no case shall the posting of any unauthorised notice on, the leaving of any windlass, tools or other articles in or upon, any claim in this district, be recognised as conferring upon the poster or posters of such notice, or the owner or owners of such windlass, tools or other articles, any right whatever to such claim.

xxxii. Notices.—All notices having reference to any lease or claim which shall be posted thereon to be of any effect must bear the signature of the chairman of the local court or any two members of the said court.

xxxiii. Removing notices, &c.—No person shall on any pretence whatever remove or destroy any peg or post erected to mark the boundary of any claim, except by order of the warden, neither shall any person deface or remove any authorised notice which may be fixed on any claim.

xxxiv. Tents.—All miners' tents erected on Crown lands shall be at least 20 feet apart from each other.

xxxv. Renewal of leases.—All persons applying for a renewal of any lease shall give notice in writing to the local court one week previous to the expiration of their lease, and should any alteration be required in the said lease the same shall be surveyed and a plan produced previous to granting any renewal.

xxxvi. Deposit of refuse soil.—All leaseholders shall be allowed to deposit the excavations from their first paddock on the waste lands of the Crown, provided always that no miner be at the time working on the said ground where such deposits are placed.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

CRESWICK.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the District of Creswick:—

xxviii. Quartz mining, extent of claim.—Every miner shall be entitled to twenty-five (25) feet along the supposed course of the vein, including all the dips and angles of the reef, but no one claim shall be more than one hundred (100) feet in length.

Regulation No. xi. of the Creswick local court, gazetted on the 12th September, 1856, is hereby annulled.

xxix. On discovery of an auriferous quartz vein.—Any person or persons discovering an auriferous quartz vein, shall, by applying to the warden of the district or to the local court, receive a double claim, or fifty (50) feet each man, as a prospecting claim, but no one claim so granted shall exceed two hundred (200) feet in length.

Regulation No. xiv. of the Creswick local court, gazetted on the 12th September, 1856, is hereby annulled.

xxx. Drawing slabs.—It shall be incumbent on all parties in drawing slabs to fill in their holes as they are stripped, to prevent their caving in, and thereby becoming injurious to the working of adjoining claims.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

FRYER'S CREEK.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the district of Fryer's Creek:—

xxvii. Undermining.—Any miner or party of miners wishing to mine under any machinery, stacked quartz, washing stuff, or garden, which may have been placed upon ground supposed to be auriferous, must make a written application to the local court for permission to undermine the same, by whom a written authority will be given, provided no sufficient objection may exist; but in the event of any injury accruing to the holder of any such machinery, stacked quartz, washing stuff, or garden, the same will have to be made good by the party so undermining.

xxviii. Abandonment of claims.—Any person or persons leaving their claim unworked for the space of three (3) clear working days (unless it be registered), the same shall be considered abandoned.

xxix. Prospecting quartz reefs.—Any party of miners prospecting for a new reef or quartz vein, or five hundred (500) yards in advance of the last working claim of an established reef, shall be allowed to mark off before commencing to sink and to hold for each miner actually at work, double the ordinary sized claim allowed to quartz miners; but in no case to exceed 120 feet in one claim.

The rule No. xiv. of the Fryer's Creek Local Court, gazetted on the 12th June, 1857, is hereby annulled.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

RAGLAN.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the district of Raglan:—

i. Classification of claims.—Gold mining shall be divided into two classes, and distinguished as wet workings and dry workings. Wet workings shall comprise all ground where slabbing is required. Dry workings, where slabbing is not required.

ii. Definition of lead or gutter.—The term lead or gutter shall mean the alluvial deposit or wash-dirt containing gold, and running in a continuous line for a considerable distance, and of patches or alternate deposits of wash-dirt occurring successively and repeatedly.

iii. Frontage claims.—All claims shall be of an indefinite width until the discovery of the lead, after which the extent of each shall be according to the classification hereinafter specified:—The claim must be marked at right angles with

the supposed lead, and registered by the clerk of the court. Miners, in the absence of the warden or an authorised surveyor, shall be allowed to mark out their claim. The register ticket or a copy, must be kept exposed in a conspicuous part of the claim. Transfer of the whole or any part of a claim must be registered afresh.

iv. *Mode of registration.*—All claims registered by the clerk of the court shall be numbered consecutively, and shall specify the name, the number and date of the miner's right of each individual in the party.

v. *Position of claims in case of deviation of leads.*—Where the lead changes its course from the supposed one, the claims shall be changed with it, each keeping its relative position.

vi. *Wet workings—Size of claims.*—The size of claims in wet workings shall be twenty (20) feet along the course of the lead by forty (40) feet in width for each man, without regard to depth.

vii. *Water baling and night-work.*—When the quantity of water is so great as to require baling both night and day (of which the warden shall be sole judge), it shall be competent for him to compel all parties within six claims in every direction of the shaft which has struck the water to work night and day, both in sinking and baling, until their claims are worked out or abandoned.

viii. *Drawing of slabs.*—Parties drawing slabs from shafts with water standing in them, must immediately fill up such shafts to the depth of the drift to prevent the water from injuring adjoining claims.

Slabs left more than fourteen (14) days in an abandoned claim shall be held as forfeited.

ix. *Dry workings—Size of claims.*—The size of claims on dry workings shall be fifteen (15) feet along the course of the lead, by thirty (30) feet in width for each man, without regard to depth; each claim limited to four men.

x. *Old workings.*—Claims in old workings shall be four times the size of those in new ground. In case of dispute the warden to decide what constitutes old workings.

xi. *Walls to be left.*—A wall of neutral ground, three feet in width, must be left between every two claims. Walls exceeding three feet in width shall cease to be neutral ground.

xii. *Surveyor, and hoisting the flag.*—In the absence of an appointed surveyor, the warden shall be empowered to select any person he may deem competent to survey in any case of encroachment, and to perform any other service that belongs to the duty of surveyor of the lead. And it is imperative on all parties on striking the lead to hoist a flag to indicate its course.

xiii. *Oversized claims.*—When a miner or miners have marked out more ground than entitled to (measured from peg to peg), the overplus may be taken possession of by any other miner or miners, on whom it shall be compulsory to sink a shaft for themselves, unless the first mentioned miners are agreeable to take them into their party. Where appeal is made, notice of the day on which the warden will adjudicate must be given by the appellant to the original holder of the disputed ground.

xiv. *Ownership of shares.*—Any person may own one or more shares in any number of claims, provided each and every such shares be represented by a miner holding a miner's right and working in such claim or claims.

xv. *Sale or transfer of shares.*—The owner of any share or shares may sell or otherwise dispose of them, provided they be represented as before directed.

xvi. *Allowance for machinery.*—It shall be competent for the local court to give increased claims to any company erecting steam or other machinery. Companies applying for increased claims must specify in writing the nature of the proposed machinery, the number of men to be employed, and the name of every individual in the party. The application must be accompanied by a copy of the rules proposed for the self-management of the company, which copy must be registered by the clerk of the court. Notice must be given to the chairman eight (8) days before the intended application, and a copy of such notice posted on a conspicuous part of the claim, and one also at the Court House.

xvii. *Prospecting.*—Prospectors finding a lead shall be entitled to an extent of claim as follows, viz.: in dry workings, three claims in length by one in width, and in wet workings four claims in length by one in width, in proportion to the number of men actually engaged, who must not exceed twelve (12) in number in dry sinking. A shaft must be sunk by every two men at one time and the same time in dry sinking.

xviii. *Prospectors must report discoveries.*—Prospectors discovering a new lead must report the same to the warden with as little delay as possible.

xix. *Unsuccessful prospectors.*—It shall be in the power of the warden to give any party a double claim who shall have been unsuccessful in prospecting.

xx. *Sinking in advance of the lead.*—Parties sinking three hundred (300) yards ahead of an established lead, shall, on striking it, be allowed double claims, provided the discovery be made public before the last claim on the lead has got within a distance of one hundred and fifty (150) yards.

xxi. *Puddling machines.*—Sanction must be obtained from the warden before erecting a dam for a puddling machine. The owners of all dams must provide sufficient drainage for their refuse water, so as not to injure or interfere with any other dam or claim. Dams abandoned for one month or longer shall be held forfeited, and any person destroying or injuring a dam may be fined in a penalty of Ten pounds (£10), in accord-

xxii. *Quartz mining—Extent of claims.*—In quartz mining the extent of claim shall be twenty (20) feet along the reef with dips and angles for each man.

xxiii. *Prospecting quartz reefs.*—Any person or persons discovering an auriferous quartz reef shall be entitled to a treble claim or treble claims, provided the discovery be made known to the warden with as little delay as possible. Prospecting parties limited to eight (8) in number of men.

xxiv. *Store sites.*—Holders of business licenses shall be entitled to an extent of frontage not exceeding thirty-three (33) feet of an indefinite depth, when it is not injurious to the public interest, of which the warden shall be the judge.

xxv. *Former regulations superseded.*—Whereas it has been deemed expedient for the better working of the gold fields in the district of Raglan, Fiery Creek, to cancel the former regulations (Nos. 1. to xxxvi., of 19th September, 1856), framed by the Local Court of Raglan, and to substitute others in lieu thereof: The foregoing rules and regulations are hereby enacted to supersede all former ones, except in cases where grants or other privileges have been allowed under the former rules and regulations.

The foregoing Regulations, Nos. 1. to xxv., have been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.
