REGULATIONS RESPECTING STORES AND TRANSPORT.

HIS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct that the 77th, 78th, and 79th clauses of the Store and Transport Regulations of the 6th September, 1855, relative to the inspection of stores, store books, and accounts, be cancelled, provision for this duty having been otherwise made by the Audit Act.

The Colonial Stores are to be henceforth termed the Government Stores, and the Colonial Storekeeper is to be styled the Government Storekeeper.

SPIRIT MERCHANTS.

THE attention of wine and spirit merchants is called to the fifth clause of the Act 20 Victoria No. 4, by which the meaning of "spirit merchant" is defined as being "any vendor of duty-paid spirituous liquors, or of duty-paid wine, or of fermented malt liquors, in quantities respectively not less than two gallons."

All persons to whom the notice applies are hereby cautioned that unless they forthwith register themselves as spirit merchants, and pay the fee as required by the above recited Act, they will be proceeded against as the law directs.

BREWERS' LICENSES.

ALL persons, vendors of duty-paid wine or of fermented malt liquors in quantities respectively not less than two gallons, who have taken out "Brewers'" licenses under the impression that the "Spirit Merchant's" license was not requisite for their carrying on the trade in question, are hereby cautioned against their error, and are informed that they are liable to the penalties of the Act for selling such wine, &c., without taking out a license as a spirit merchant.

REFRESHMENT LICENSES.

THE attention of all dealers in Refreshments on the Gold Fields and other places proclaimed as Special Licensing Districts is directed to the Act 16 Victoria No. 35, by which every vendor of tea, coffee, lemonade, soda water, ginger beer, spruce beer, &c., is required to take out a License, and to pay the fee of £1.

JURY LISTS.

CLERKS of Petty Sessions are requested to take notice that the New Jury Act, 21 Victoria No. 19, has altered the time for making out the Jury Lists, as also the mode of proceeding for that purpose.

Attention is called to section VI. of the Act, by which Clerks of Petty Sessions may agree among themselves as to the limits within which each will collect the jurors' names. This arrangement had better be made at once, as every clerk is liable to a penalty if the lists are not correct, whether the default be his or not.

MOUTH OF THE RIVER MURRAY.

Notice is hereby given that a very careful re-examination
has been made of the Mouth of the Murray, during the latter
part of the month of September last, with a view of ascertain-
ing what changes have taken place in the direction and depth
of the bar channel of that estuary since the survey in April,
1857. The channel has been found to have shifted one hundred
and forty yards to the westward. The depth in the shoalest
part of the bar has increased from ten feet to eleven feet at low
water spring tides.

To point out the exact direction of the channel, the lower or
white leading beacon on Mundoo Island has been moved
twenty yards to the westward of its original position, as given
in the chart published by this department, in April, 1857.

The beacons, when in line, now bear north 62° 34' east (mag-
netic bearing), variation 6° 35' east.

Masters of vessels navigating the mouth of the Murray
should pay particular attention to the tidal signals, now dis-
played from Barker's Knoll.

The sailing directions published in April last are still ap-
plicable to this estuary, with the exception of that portion
relating to the line of bearings of the leading beacons.

Charts indicating the change lately taken place may be
seen at the Chief Harbor Office.

ment of the penalties thereby imposed.

"All laws now or hereafter to be in force relating to the
duties of customs and regulation of the customs shall extend
and apply to the said river and all vessels navigating the same as
fully and effectually as if such river were part of the high
seas within one league of the coast of Victoria and all vessels
navigating the said river shall be deemed to be vessels trading
with the said colony or on the coast thereof."

CUSTODY OF GUNPOWDER.

THE attention of dealers in gunpowder and others is hereby
directed to the 15th and 22nd clauses of the Act 21 Victoria
No. 21, copies of which are subjoined, and they are cautioned
that the penalties provided for therein will be strictly enforced.

21 VICTORIA No. 21.

Section 15.—No dealer in gunpowder shall have or keep
within any town, township, or municipal district, at any one
time, more than two hundredweight of gunpowder, and no
person not being a dealer more than twenty-five pounds within
any house, storehouse, warehouse, shop, cellar, yard, building,
or enclosed place occupied by the same person or persons, and
if any gunpowder be kept contrary hereto, the owner or person
in charge shall forfeit all the gunpowder found on the premises
and the sum of five shillings for every pound beyond such
allowed quantity.

Section 22.—Every dealer in gunpowder shall cause to be
painted or affixed, and shall keep so painted or affixed, in
legible characters, in some public or conspicuous part of the
warehouse containing the same, and on or near to every outer
door of such warehouse, the words, "Gunpowder sold here,"
and every such dealer omitting so to do, shall forfeit the sum
of five pounds for every day of such omission.

CAUTION.

TO OWNERS, MASTERS, AND MATES OF FOREIGN-GOING SHIPS.

Thames Police Court, London.—Henry Lewis, part owner of the
Avon, of Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, was summoned under section
136 of the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," for proceeding to
sea as master of a foreign-going ship of British registry, not
being in possession of a valid certificate either of competency
or service, and for which offence he was fined in the mitigated
penalty of twenty pounds.

Masters and mates of all foreign-going ships, before proceed-
ing to sea, are required to possess a certificate either of com-
petency or service appropriate to their stations, and to produce
the same to the shipping master when signing an agreement.

This regulation is also extended by section 109 of aforesaid
Act to the masters and mates of all colonial vessels when
employed in trading or going between any place in the United
Kingdom and any other place not situate in the possession in
which their ships are registered, and the masters and mates of
such vessels are hereby cautioned to obtain the necessary cer-
tificates before their departure from the United Kingdom.

PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.

NEWTOWN AND CHILWELL (GEOLOG).

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a Petition addressed to His Excellency, as hereinafter set forth, signed by three hundred and thirty-six ratepayers and householders of the districts of Newtown and Chilwell, within the corporate limits of the town of Geelong, in the county of Grant.

The petitioners state that they are desirous of having the districts of Newtown and Chilwell separated from the corporation of Geelong, and formed into a municipality, bounded as shewn on a plan, viz.:—"Commencing at the junction of Aberdeen street with La Trobe terrace, and bounded on the north by the centre of Aberdeen street, bearing west 1 mile 23 chains; on the east by the centre of the Great Western road, bearing north 20 chains; on the north, again by the centre of the Great Western road, bearing west 51 chains; on the west by the centre of the Government road in front of the Orphan Asylum, bearing south to the River Barwon 24 chains 50 links; on the west again and south, by the centre of the River Barwon as far as La Trobe terrace; and on the east by the centre of La Trobe terrace, bearing north 1 mile 12 chains, back to the commencing point."

They further state that the area defined is less than nine square miles, that no one point therein is distant more than six miles from any other point, and that the population far exceeds three hundred.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that the said district of Newtown and Chilwell may be declared a municipal district."

MEMORIAL FOR A ROAD DISTRICT.

WILL-WILL-ROOK, YUROKE, AND MICKLEHAM.

THE substance and prayer of a memorial addressed to His Excellency the Governor by the inhabitants of the parishes of Will-will-rook, Yuroke, and Mickleham, in public meeting assembled, representing that it is desirable that their locality should be constituted a road district, under the name of "The Broadmeadows Road District," are published below for general information.

By His Excellency's Command,

DAVID MOORE,
President of the Board of Land and Works.

The memorialists state that they have long suffered from the deplorable state of their roads, that the lands in their districts realized the highest prices at the time of sale, and that they are impressed with the necessity of a local road board for the purpose of forming and maintaining their roads.

They draw special attention to the fertile character of their lands, the agricultural produce of which might be made available for the Melbourne market during all the seasons, but is now excluded from that market for eight months in the year, a result inflicting serious loss upon the memorialists by pre-

venting them from competing on equal terms with other districts, and adverse, as they conceive, to the interests of the colony at large.

They therefore request His Excellency to constitute the parishes of Will-will-rook, Yuroke, and Mickleham a road district, under the name of "The Broadmeadows Road District," in accordance with the Act of Council 16 Victoria No. 40, to be bounded as follows:—

"Commencing at the south-west corner of portion number one, in the parish of Will-will-rook, bounded on the south-west by the Moonee Ponds to the north-west corner of portion number seven, in the parish of Will-will-rook; thence on the north by the north boundary line of the parish of Will-will-rook to the south-west corner of section number one, in the parish of Yuroke; thence on the west by the west boundary line of the parish of Yuroke to the south-east corner of allotment number one, in the parish of Mickleham; thence on the south by the south boundary line of the parish of Mickleham to the Deep Creek; thence on the west by the Deep Creek bearing north-easterly to the north-west corner of the village reserve of Deepdene; thence on the north by the north boundary line of the parish of Mickleham to the north-east corner of section number twenty-nine, in the parish of Mickleham; thence on the east by the west boundary line of the parish of Kalkallo to the north-west corner of section number twenty-three, in the parish of Yuroke; thence again on the north by the north boundary line of the parish of Yuroke to the Merri Creek; thence on the east by the Merri Creek to the south-east corner of portion number fifteen, in the parish of Yuroke; thence again on the south by the south boundary line of the parish of Yuroke to the north-east corner of section number six, in the parish of Yuroke; thence again on the east by the east boundary line of the parish of Yuroke to the north-west corner of portion number thirteen, in the parish of Will-will-rook; thence again on the north by the north boundary line of the parish of Will-will-rook to the Merri Creek; thence again on the east by the Merri Creek to the south-east corner of portion number three, in the parish of Will-will-rook; thence again on the south by the south boundary line of the parish of Will-will-rook to the commencing point on the Moonee Ponds, at the south-west corner of portion number one, in the parish of Will-will-rook."
