## SANITARY REGULATIONS, SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

IT is hereby notified, for the information of masters of vessels proceeding to Adelaide from this port, that a communication has been received in this Department from the Immigration and Health Office, at Port Adelaide, enclosing a copy of the Sanitary Regulations now in force in the province of South Australia, with an intimation that the provisions therein set forth will be strictly enforced.

Masters of vessels are likewise requested, in the event of their not being boarded by one of the Assistant Health Officers previous to their arrival at the North Arm, to hoist at the fore-topmast No. 10 of Marryatt's Code of Signals, when they will be boarded by the Health Officer at Port Adelaide without delay.

Bills of Health will be given on application at the Custom House.

## SOUTH AUSTRALIA. PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR RICHARD GRAVES MACDONNELL, Knight, Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of Her Majesty's Province of South Australia, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of an Ordinance of the Governor of South Australia, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, bearing date the fifth day of March, One thousand eight hundred and fifty (No. 3). "To provide for the prevention of the spread of epidemic and contagious diseases on the arrival of merchant vessels," and of all other powers and authorities me thereunto enabling, I, the Governor-in-Chief aforesaid, with the advice of the Executive Council of the said province, have made and established, and do hereby make and establish, the regulations specified and contained in the schedule hereto annexed, for the prevention of the introduction and spread of epidemic and contagious diseases by merchant vessels arriving in Port Adelaide, and generally for carrying into execution the purposes and provisions of the said Ordinance.

Given under my hand and the public seal of the said Province, at Adelaide, this fourteenth day of June, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and in the eighteenth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

## SCHEDULE REFERRED TO. Regulations—Port Adelaide.

1. The commander of every vessel arriving at this port shall allow no person to leave the ship, and no goods, personal luggage, or any other thing to be sent from the ship (the mails alone excepted), till he shall have obtained permission to that effect from the health officer, or one of his assistants.
2. The commander of every vessel shall allow no one to go on board—excepting only the health officer, his assistants, and the pilot who takes charge—till permission is given by the health officer, or his assistants.

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3. No pilot shall take any vessel further than the North Arm, till the health officer, or one of his assistants, has boarded, and given directions how far the vessel may proceed.

4. The health officer, or his assistant, who may first go on board, shall request the surgeon of the ship (if any), or the commander, to give written answers to the queries in Schedule B annexed, and to verify the same with his signature; which document the health officer, or his assistant, shall countersign.

5. The pilot in charge, and the commander, crew, and passengers of each vessel, are enjoined strictly to obey the instructions which the health officer, or his assistant, may think it necessary to give for the public safety. If disease exist on board, the health officer is authorised to detain the ship, to separate the sick from the healthy, and to take measures for removing the sick or the healthy elsewhere, as may be deemed expedient.

6. The health officer is authorised to make any order he may think necessary for the proper ventilation, fumigation, or cleansing of any ship arriving; he is authorised to inspect the bedding or clothes of the passengers, and to order such bedding and clothes to be properly washed, fumigated, or otherwise purified; or, if he think it necessary for the safety of the public, he is authorised to destroy what he considers cannot be properly cleansed.

7. The assistants to the health officer are required strictly to obey all instructions which they may, from time to time, receive from the health officer.

## SCHEDULE B.

### Queries to be answered.

1. Has any case of small-pox occurred during the voyage? If so, give the names and ages of the person or persons affected; the date when the illness occurred, in each case, and the results.
2. Has any case of cholera occurred during the voyage? If so, state the number of cases, and the date of attack; the result in each case, and the latitude and longitude, as near as may be, where the last case occurred.
3. Has any case of fever occurred on board? If so, state the number of cases, the dates of attack, and the results.
4. Has any case of disease, usually supposed to be contagious or epidemic, other than those mentioned above, occurred during the voyage? If so, give full particulars of the disease, and the number attacked.
5. What number of deaths have occurred during the voyage? State the cause of death in each case, and the date of its occurrence.
6. What number of persons, above ten years of age, are at present sick or under medical treatment, and from what diseases do they suffer; stating each case separately?
7. What number of children, from two to ten years of age, are under medical treatment? State each case separately.
8. What number of children, under two years of age, are ill or under medical treatment? State each case separately.

# NOTICE TO MARINERS.

## Sunken Reef off Apollo Bay.

Masters of vessels navigating between Port Phillip Heads and Cape Otway are hereby informed that the foul ground off Apollo Bay, situated between Point Paton and Point Bunbury, and distant about twelve miles N.E. by N. from Cape Otway, has recently been examined by Commander Ross, R.N., marine surveyor, and found to consist of an isolated reef, with three fathoms over the shoalest part at low water spring tides; it is distant from the nearest land two miles, with the following magnetic bearings:—

Shoalest part of reef from Point } S. 40° 30' east.  
Bunbury

From Point Hayley ... S. 81° 3' east.

It is intended that beacons should be erected on the shore to indicate the position of this reef: due notice of their completion will hereafter be given; meantime masters of vessels of heavy draft are cautioned not to approach this part of the coast within three miles, as the sea only breaks over the reef in bad weather.

## MOUTH OF THE RIVER MURRAY.

Notice is hereby given that a very careful re-examination has been made of the Mouth of the Murray, during the latter part of the month of September last, with a view of ascertaining what changes have taken place in the direction and depth of the bar channel of that estuary since the survey in April, 1857. The channel has been found to have shifted one hundred and forty yards to the westward. The depth in the shoalest part of the bar has increased from ten feet to eleven feet at low water spring tides.

To point out the exact direction of the channel, the lower or white leading beacou on Mundoo Island has been moved twenty yards to the westward of its original position, as given in the chart published by this department, in April, 1857.

The beacons, when in line, now bear north 62° 34' east (magnetic bearing), variation 6° 35' east.

Masters of vessels navigating the mouth of the Murray should pay particular attention to the tidal signals, now displayed from Barker's Knoll.

The sailing directions published in April last are still applicable to this estuary, with the exception of that portion relating to the line of bearings of the leading beacons.

Charts indicating the change lately taken place may be seen at the Chief Harbor Office.

## 21 VICTORIA No. 13, SECTION 239.

"All laws now or hereafter to be in force relating to the duties of customs and regulation of the customs shall extend and apply to the said river and all vessels navigating the same as fully and effectually as if such river were part of the high seas within one league of the coast of Victoria and all vessels navigating the said river shall be deemed to be vessels trading with the said colony or on the coast thereof."

## 21 VICTORIA No. 21.

Section 15.—No dealer in gunpowder shall have or keep within any town, township, or municipal district, at any one time, more than two hundredweight of gunpowder, and no person not being a dealer more than twenty-five pounds within any house, storehouse, warehouse, shop, cellar, yard, building, or enclosed place occupied by the same person or persons, and if any gunpowder be kept contrary hereto, the owner or person in charge shall forfeit all the gunpowder found on the premises and the sum of five shillings for every pound beyond such allowed quantity.

Section 22.—Every dealer in gunpowder shall cause to be painted or affixed, and shall keep so painted or affixed, in legible characters, in some public or conspicuous part of the warehouse containing the same, and on or near to every outer door of such warehouse, the words, "Gunpowder sold here," and every such dealer omitting so to do, shall forfeit the sum of five pounds for every day of such omission.

## MUNICIPALITY OF RICHMOND.

BY-LAW IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND FOR THE CURRENT YEAR.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," the council of any municipal district is empowered to impose a rate on all houses and lands within the limits of such municipal districts according to the fair average annual value thereof, such rate not to exceed Two shillings in the pound:

Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Richmond, That a rate for the current year of One shilling in the pound of the fair average annual value of all property in houses and land within the limits of the municipal district be imposed and levied.

The foregoing By-law, made by the municipal council of Richmond, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.

NEWTOWN AND CHILWELL (GEELONG).

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a Petition addressed to His Excellency, as herein-after set forth, signed by three hundred and thirty-six ratepayers and householders of the districts of Newtown and Chilwell, within the corporate limits of the town of Geelong, in the county of Grant.

The petitioners state that they are desirous of having the districts of Newtown and Chilwell separated from the corporation of Geelong, and formed into a municipality, bounded as shewn on a plan, viz.:—"Commencing at the junction of Aberdeen street with La Trobe terrace, and bounded on the north by the centre of Aberdeen street, bearing west 1 mile 23 chains; on the east by the centre of the Great Western road, bearing north 20 chains; on the north, again by the centre of the Great Western road, bearing west 51 chains; on the west by the centre of the Government road in front of the Orphan Asylum, bearing south to the River Barwon 24 chains 50 links; on the west again and south, by the centre of the River Barwon as far as La Trobe terrace; and on the east by the centre of La Trobe terrace, bearing north 1 mile 12 chains, back to the commencing point."

They further state that the area defined is less than nine square miles, that no one point therein is distant more than six miles from any other point, and that the population far exceeds three hundred.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that the said districts of Newtown and Chilwell may be declared a municipal district."

10. If the Board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which, it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged as in clause 7.

11. If from any cause injury would accrue to the public service by waiting for a Board of Survey, the Head of Department, or officer in charge of station, will have the power to reject such articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead, failing which, it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged as in clause 7.

12.
