NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Sunken Reef off Apollo Bay.

Masters of vessels navigating between Port Phillip Heads and Cape Otway are hereby informed that the foul ground off Apollo Bay, situated between Point Paton and Point Bunbury, and distant about twelve miles N.E. by N. from Cape Otway, has recently been examined by Commander Ross, R.N., marine surveyor, and found to consist of an isolated reef, with three fathoms over the shoalest part at low water spring tides; it is distant from the nearest land two miles, with the following magnetic bearings:—

Shoalest part of reef from Point } S. 40° 30' east.
Bunbury

From Point Hayley ... S. 81° 3' east.

It is intended that beacons should be erected on the shore to indicate the position of this reef; due notice of their completion will hereafter be given; meantime masters of vessels of heavy draft are cautioned not to approach this part of the coast within three miles, as the sea only breaks over the reef in bad weather.

PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.

NEWTOWN AND CHILWELL (GEELONG).

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a Petition addressed to His Excellency, as herein-after set forth, signed by three hundred and thirty-six ratepayers and householders of the districts of Newtown and Chilwell, within the corporate limits of the town of Geelong, in the county of Grant.

The petitioners state that they are desirous of having the districts of Newtown and Chilwell separated from the corporation of Geelong, and formed into a municipality, bounded as shewn on a plan, viz:—"Commencing at the junction of Aberdeen street with La Trobe terrace, and bounded on the north by the centre of Aberdeen street, bearing west 1 mile 23 chains; on the east by the centre of the Great Western road, bearing north 20 chains; on the north, again by the centre of the Great Western road, bearing west 51 chains; on the west by the centre of the Government road in front of the Orphan Asylum, bearing south to the River Barwon 24 chains 50 links; on the west again and south, by the centre of the River Barwon as far as La Trobe terrace; and on the east by the centre of La Trobe terrace, bearing north 1 mile 12 chains, back to the commencing point."

They further state that the area defined is less than nine square miles, that no one point therein is distant more than six miles from any other point, and that the population far exceeds three hundred.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that the said districts of Newtown and Chilwell may be declared a municipal district."

If from any cause injury would accrue to the public service by waiting for a Board of Survey, the Head of Department, or officer in charge of station, will have the power to reject such articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead, failing which, it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged as in clause 7.

12. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

13. It will be competent for either party to terminate the contract, by giving in writing a notice of three calendar months to the opposite party, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made.

SECOND HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF BELFAST, ENDING 27TH SEPTEMBER, 1857.

ATTENDANCE OF MEMBERS.

THERE have been twenty-six general and nine special meetings of the council held during the half year (irrespective of meetings of committees), at which the members attended as follows:—

BYE-LAWS.

No. 8. For the appropriation of the sum of three thousand pounds. The first portion of the grant in aid was passed 1st April. Has not been gazetted.

No. 9. For regulating the conducting of public meetings of ratepayers, elections, &c.

This bye-law has not been assented to, certain sections therein being deemed objectionable, illegal, &c., but it may be worthy of remark, that sections of precisely similar import in Bye-law No. 5 of the municipality of East Collingwood were assented to and gazetted, 3rd October, 1856.

APPLICATIONS TO GOVERNMENT.

1st. To the Surveyor General, to put down posts at the corners of the streets to define the footways. This application resulted in the district surveyor being ordered to put down the posts, if provided by the council, which has not been done, the 11th section of the Towns Police Act defining this to be the duty of the Surveyor General, a portion of this Act being extended to Belfast long prior to the establishment of a municipality.

2nd. To the Commissioner of Land and Works, to expend upon certain works recommended an unexpended balance of £945, voted for public works (1856) here. Not complied with.

3rd. To the Chief Secretary, requesting that all prisoners sentenced to not more than twelve months imprisonment might serve the term here, to make their labor available for the benefit of the town. Granted; the Belfast watchhouse having been proclaimed a gaol.

4th. To the Commissioner of Land and Works, requesting that the bush poles erected for telegraph posts within the town might be removed and replaced by posts of square timber. To be complied with.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The council have appointed finance, legislative, and public works committees.

The council have received £3000, a portion of the Government grant in aid for this year.

By Proclamation, the various churches, ministers' dwellings, schools, and hospital, have been exempted from assessment.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The public works in progress at the termination of the previous half year have since been satisfactorily finished, and the council have now to report having accepted tenders from Messrs. Wagster and Watson for the formation and metalling a further portion of the Rosebrook road, at a cost of £904 8s. 6d.; from Messrs. G. and R. Johnston for the formation and metalling of the upper part of Cox street, and a portion of the Yambuk road, at a cost of £1450; from D. Hourigan for the formation and metalling a portion of Griffith street, Belfast east, and the formation and kerbing of footway on the west side of said street, a distance of 40 chains, at a cost of £400; from Wm. Watson for cutting away embankment at the approaches to the bridge over the drain on the Rosebrook road, and other work, at a cost of £21. All of which contracts have been completed.

The council have found it necessary and advantageous to authorise the town surveyor to employ hired labor for the execution of works of too trifling a character to call tenders for.

The council report that the rates have been remarkably well paid; and on the continued co-operation of the ratepayers they confidently rely to enable them to realize the greatest benefit to the town such institutions are capable of conferring.
