## PARTICULARS.

The murdered man, Lombardino Pietro, was in company with Pietro Gorio, and was left about sunrise on the morning of the murder at work a few yards from his tent, situated on Shepherd's Flat, Hepburn. Gorio left in company with two persons named Carlos and Alessandro, mates of the deceased, and returned with them to the tent about Eight o'clock on the same morning. Gorio, Carlos, and Alessandro soon after went to a store on the race-course, where Gorio left Carlos and Alessandro, and went to Sailor's Gully, about five miles distant. Gorio, on his return to the tent, about Seven o'clock in the evening, found the murdered man with his throat cut in three places, and his head beaten in.

# PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.

NEWTOWN AND CHILWELL (GEELONG).

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a Petition addressed to His Excellency, as herein-after set forth, signed by three hundred and thirty-six ratepayers and householders of the districts of Newtown and Chilwell, within the corporate limits of the town of Geelong, in the county of Grant.

The petitioners state that they are desirous of having the districts of Newtown and Chilwell separated from the corporation of Geelong, and formed into a municipality, bounded as shewn on a plan, viz.:—"Commencing at the junction of Aberdeen street with La Trobe terrace, and bounded on the north by the centre of Aberdeen street, bearing west 1 mile 23 chains; on the east by the centre of the Great Western road, bearing north 20 chains; on the north, again by the centre of the Great Western road, bearing west 51 chains; on the west by the centre of the Government road in front of the Orphan Asylum, bearing south to the River Barwon 24 chains 50 links; on the west again and south, by the centre of the River Barwon as far as La Trobe terrace; and on the east by the centre of La Trobe terrace, bearing north 1 mile 12 chains, back to the commencing point."

They further state that the area defined is less than nine square miles, that no one point therein is distant more than six miles from any other point, and that the population far exceeds three hundred.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that the said districts of Newtown and Chilwell may be declared a municipal district."

Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Sandhurst, that the said sum of £6112 17s. 8d. shall be expended in the forming, improving, and repairing the streets of Sandhurst.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is amongst other things enacted, That the council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets, and public thoroughfares, and shall and may make such bye-laws for carrying out their objects as shall to such council seem fit: And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the 23rd day of April, 1855, the district of Sandhurst was duly established a municipal district under the provisions and within the meaning of the said Act: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council for the district of Sandhurst, from and after this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, as required by the provisions of the said Act, that the occupiers, or, in cases where there are no occupiers, the owners of buildings and lands abutting upon the streets, rights-of-way, or other thoroughfares within the said municipal district of Sandhurst, shall cause to be regularly cleansed and kept free from sweepings, rubbish, offal, or any offensive matters, the footways and water-channels in front and at the sides of their buildings or lands aforesaid; and where the backs of any buildings or lands abut upon any public thoroughfares or lanes, the regulation shall apply in like manner as if the said thoroughfares or lanes ran in front or on the side. The said regulation to apply equally to formed and unformed footways and water-channels, the distance in the latter case to be at least twenty feet from the fronts, sides or backs of the buildings or lands aforesaid; and every such occupier or owner failing to comply with this regulation, or allowing any sweepings, rubbish, offal, or other offensive matter whatsoever to accumulate or remain in or upon such footways, or water-channels, or rights-of-way as aforesaid, shall, on conviction thereof, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding Five pounds. And for the purpose of this bye-law, when any house shall be let in separate apartments, the tenants occupying these apartments may be jointly and severally proceeded against.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 14, made by the municipal council of Sandhurst, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

If from any cause injury would accrue to the public service by waiting for a Board of Survey, the Head of Department, or officer in charge of station, will have the power to reject such articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead, failing which, it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged as in clause 7.

12. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

##### BYE-LAWS.

No. 8. For the appropriation of the sum of three thousand  
pounds. The first portion of the grant in aid was passed 1st  
April. Has not been gazetted.

No. 9. For regulating the conducting of public meetings of  
ratepayers, elections, &c.

This bye-law has not been assented to, certain sections  
therein being deemed objectionable, illegal, &c., but it may be  
worthy of remark, that sections of precisely similar import in  
Bye-law No. 5 of the municipality of East Collingwood were  
assented to and gazetted, 3rd October, 1856.

##### APPLICATIONS TO GOVERNMENT.

1st. To the Surveyor General, to put down posts at the  
corners of the streets to define the footways. This applica-  
tion resulted in the district surveyor being ordered to put down  
the posts, if provided by the council, which has not been done,  
the 11th section of the Towns Police Act defining this to be
