PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS. MARYBOROUGH.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency, as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and sixty-two landholders and householders in the township of Maryborough, in the county of Talbot.

The petitioners state that they are landowners and householders in the township of Maryborough, in the county of Talbot, and are desirous of having the said township incorporated as a municipal district. They further state that the space intended to be included in the proposed municipal district as set forth in a plan which accompanies the petition includes the town boundaries,† and is within the area prescribed by the Act 18 Victoria No. 15; that no one point in such area is distant more than six miles from any other point, and also that there are more than three hundred landowners and householders residing in the proposed municipal district. † The boundaries described on the plan which accompanied the petition are as follow:—Commencing at the point A, being the south-eastern extremity of the present township boundary; thence proceeding along the eastern line of the township boundary to the north-eastern point B; thence along the northern line of the township boundary to a point C; thence continuing in a straight line for one mile westward to a point D; thence in a line extending two miles and three quarters south to a point E; thence running east to a point F, taking in the Mariner's Reef; and then in a straight line northward to the first point A.

RATES OF POSTAGE.

HIS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct that the following Regulations as to the Rates of Postage chargeable on Letters, Newspapers, and Packets posted and received in Victoria, shall be published for the information of the public, and that all Letters, Newspapers, and Packets posted on and after the 15th instant, and not in conformity with these regulations, shall not be forwarded.

I. ALL LETTERS, PACKETS, AND NEWSPAPERS POSTED IN VICTORIA must be *Prepaid by Stamps*, according to the following Rates:—

II. SCALE OF RATES.

Not exceeding half ($\frac{1}{2}$) an ounce	One rate.
Exceeding half ($\frac{1}{2}$) an ounce and not exceeding one (1) ounce	Two rates.
Every additional ounce or fraction of an ounce	Two additional rates.

III. POSTAGE ON LETTERS POSTED IN ANY CITY OR TOWN.

For delivery within the limits of such City or Town.

Under half ($\frac{1}{2}$) an ounce	One rate—2d.
Exceeding half ($\frac{1}{2}$) an ounce and not exceeding one (1) ounce	Two rates—4d.
" one (1) ounce	...	two (2)	Four rates—8d.
" two (2)	...	three (3)	Six rates—1s.

And every ounce or fraction of an ounce fourpence additional.

IV. FOR TRANSMISSION BETWEEN SEPARATE POST TOWNS IN VICTORIA.

Under half ($\frac{1}{2}$) an ounce	One rate—4d.
Exceeding half ($\frac{1}{2}$) an ounce and not exceeding one (1) ounce	Two rates—8d.
" one (1) ounce	...	two (2)	Four rates—1s. 4d.
" two (2)	...	three (3)	Six rates—2s.

And every ounce or fraction of an ounce eightpence additional.

V. FOR TRANSMISSION OUT OF VICTORIA.

Under half ($\frac{1}{2}$) an ounce	One rate—6d.
Exceeding half ($\frac{1}{2}$) an ounce and not exceeding one (1) ounce	Two rates—1s.
" one (1) ounce	...	two (2)	Four rates—2s.
" two (2)	...	three (3)	Six rates—3s.

And every ounce or fraction of an ounce one shilling additional.

VI. *VIA* MARSEILLES.

French rate in addition to the above

Under quarter ($\frac{1}{4}$) ounce	3d.
" half ($\frac{1}{2}$) ounce	6d.
" three-quarters ($\frac{3}{4}$) ounce	9d.

And for every quarter ounce an additional rate of 3d.

Letters addressed to France *via* Marseilles will not be chargeable with the French rate.

VII. *VIA* TRIESTE.

No additional rate will be charged.

VIII. FOREIGN COUNTRIES AND BRITISH COLONIES, *VIA* UNITED KINGDOM.

Additional rates on letters.—See Scale A.

IX. REGISTERED LETTERS.

In addition to the ordinary rates ... 1s. for each letter.

X. TO FRANCE, OR TO COUNTRIES BEYOND FRANCE, *VIA* ENGLAND.

Additional rates.—See Scale C.

XI. LETTERS CONTAINING GOLD.

Posted for transmission between Post Towns or places within the Colony.

Under half ($\frac{1}{2}$) an ounce	One rate—1s.
Exceeding half ($\frac{1}{2}$) an ounce and not exceeding one (1) ounce	Two rates—2s.
" one (1) ounce	...	two (2)	Four rates—4s.
" two (2)	...	three (3)	Six rates—6s.

And every ounce or fraction of an ounce two shillings additional.

XII. SOLDIERS AND SAILORS' LETTERS.

From or to any non-commissioned officer, private soldier, seaman or marine, employed on actual service in the Army, Navy, Marines, or East India Company's service,

The sum of *One penny* each:

Provided that the postage be prepaid by stamp (unless sent from parts beyond the seas), the corps, regiment, detachment, or ship being given in the handwriting and with the signature of the Commanding Officer, and otherwise posted in accordance with the requirements of the 10th clause of the Act.

XIII. EXEMPTIONS FROM POSTAGE RATES.

All letters received from beyond seas, with the exception of letters and packets insufficiently paid, and loose letters and packets.

All Official letters on military and naval service (11th clause).

All letters containing correspondence of Registrar of Births, Deaths, and Marriages in the Colony, and Deputy Registrars, if posted in accordance with the Act 16 Victoria, No. 26.

All petitions to Her Majesty, the Governor, Executive Council, or any member of the Legislature, not exceeding sixteen ounces in weight and without covers, or in covers open at the sides.

XIV. NEWSPAPERS.

Printed and posted under the following conditions for delivery within Victoria, or for transmission from Victoria beyond seas, to be charged

One penny each;

but newspapers for transmission to Foreign Countries and British Colonies, *via* the United Kingdom, to be charged the additional rates in Scale B.

CONDITIONS.

To be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides, and folded in such a manner that the true date of publication shall be legible. Except the name and address of the person to whom sent, there shall be no other word or communication, letter, character, figure or number, written, printed, or otherwise marked on the newspapers posted.

Not more than three (3) copies to be posted in one packet.

If printed in Victoria, to be posted within seven (7) days after publication.

Newspapers from beyond seas will be delivered to their original address free of charge, but if re-posted in the Colony will be subjected to the postage of 1d. each, prepaid.

EXEMPTION.

Newspapers put into any post office for delivery at such post office, and directed "*To be kept until called for.*"

XV. LETTERS AND PACKETS

From beyond seas, insufficiently prepaid, will be charged with the deficient postage, and an additional rate as a fine.

XVI. LOOSE LETTERS AND PACKETS

From beyond seas will be charged with the Colonial rates of postage.

XVII. BOOKS AND PACKETS.

(With the exception of Books and Packets for transmission to the United Kingdom and India.)

RATES OF POSTAGE.

Not exceeding four (4) ounces ... 6d.
Every additional two (2) ounces or fraction of two ounces ... 3d.

In addition to which there shall be charged for transmission by ship one shilling as sea postage.

1. Bankers' packets containing notes, orders, cheques, or pass books, sent by or to any bank or banker.

2. Patterns or samples of merchandise.

3. Prices current and catalogues of merchandise, open at each end.

4. Writs and proceedings of Courts of Justice, deeds of conveyance, affidavits, letters of attorney, depositions of recognizances sent by or to any Justice of the Peace or Coroner.

5. Votes and proceedings of Parliament and Colonial Legislature, open at each end.

6. Pamphlets, magazines, reviews, or periodical publications (newspapers excepted).

7. Maps or plans sent by or addressed to the department of Surveyor General, or returns made to or from any part of the public service.

8. A single printed book—weight not to exceed one pound (1 lb.); dimensions not to exceed fifteen inches in length, six inches in breadth. There shall not be in or upon them any letter or epistolary communication or intelligence, and on the outside, in addition to the name and address, the sender must subscribe with his name and address a statement of the contents thereof as follows:—

Bankers' packet,

Patterns of merchandise,

or other proper description of the contents, with the words, *Packet without letter or writing.*

The Postmaster General may refuse to transmit by post to any place to which the mail is conveyed on horseback any such packet.

XVIII. BOOK POST BETWEEN VICTORIA AND THE UNITED KINGDOM AND INDIA.

RATES.

For every weight not exceeding four (4) ounces ... 6d.

For every additional two (2) ounces or portion thereof up to any weight not exceeding 3 lbs. ... 3d.

In addition to which there shall be charged for sea postage one shilling on each packet.

CONDITIONS.

Every book packet must be sent either without a cover, or in a cover open at the ends or sides.

No book packet must exceed two (2) feet in length, breadth, or depth, and three (3) pounds in weight.

A book packet may contain any number of separate books, almanacks, maps, or prints, and any quantity of paper, vellum, or parchment (to the exclusion of letters whether sealed or open), and the books, maps, papers, &c., may be either printed, written, or plain, or any mixture of the three.

On the cover or outside of the packet, in addition to the name and address of the person to whom the same is to be delivered, the sender thereof shall be at liberty to subscribe a statement of the contents thereof, together with his name and address.

The books, &c., may be in any binding, mounting, or covering, whether such binding be loose or attached. In the case of prints or maps, rollers may accompany them, and markers, whether of paper or otherwise, may be sent with books or other printed papers.

If a book packet be found to contain any enclosure which is sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any letter, whether sealed or not, the letter or other enclosure will be taken out, and forwarded to the address on the packet, charged with the full postage as an unpaid letter, together with an additional rate equal to the amount chargeable on a book not exceeding half ($\frac{1}{2}$) a pound in weight. The remainder of the packet, if fully prepaid, will be forwarded without any extra charge.

If a packet be not sufficiently prepaid according to its weight, but nevertheless a single book rate be prepaid, together with the one shilling sea postage, it will be forwarded charged with the deficient book postage and with an additional book rate.

In the event of a book packet being posted altogether unpaid, or prepaid less than a single rate, it will be detained and sent to the Dead Letter Office.

The packet, if correctly posted, will be delivered in any part of the United Kingdom, or of Victoria, without further charge.

The Postmaster General shall be at liberty to refuse to forward any packet of the weight of one pound (1 lb.) and upwards which shall be addressed to any place in Victoria to which the mail shall be conveyed on horseback, but he shall in such case inform the person to whom the packet is addressed by letter that such packet is lying at the General Post Office, and that it will be forwarded to such Post Office in the Colony as such person may direct to which a mail is conveyed by carriage.

No book packet can be sent through France or any other foreign country to which a transit rate of postage is payable thereon.

REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF KILMORE FOR THE SIX MONTHS ENDING THE 14TH FEBRUARY, 1857, MADE PURSUANT TO THE PROVISIONS OF THE MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS ACT, 18TH VICTORIA No. 15, SEC. 43.

PROCLAMATION AND BOUNDARY.

The district of Kilmore was duly constituted a municipality by proclamation of His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, dated the 14th day of July, 1856, and in the twentieth year of Her Majesty's reign.

Boundaries of the municipality:—Commencing at the south-east angle of suburban allotment 1, parish of Bylands; thence by the south side of Tootal street to Graves street; thence by the east side of Graves street and a line north to East street; thence by the east side of East street to Clarke street; thence by the north side of Clarke street to Junction street; thence by the west side of Junction street and a line south to Foot street; thence by the south side of Foot street to Sutherland street; and thence by the west side of Sutherland street to the angle formed by the intersection of Tootal street, the commencing point aforesaid.

Pursuant to the Municipal Institutions Act, a public meeting of the resident householders and of the landowners within the said district was convened and held at the Mechanics' Hall, at two o'clock p.m. on Friday, the 8th day of August, 1856, at which meeting, by appointment of His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, the chair was taken by John Kelly Trainor, Esq.

The meeting elected Messrs. William Spurling and Thomas John Ryan to act as assessors. It was decided that the council should consist of seven members, who should not receive any pecuniary remuneration. The nomination of candidates was then proceeded with, and twenty-five having been duly proposed and seconded, it was decided that it was fit and proper that a poll should be taken, the election to be by voting papers.

The election took place accordingly on the next day, and resulted in the return of the following resident ratepayers as members of the municipal council, namely:—

At the first meeting of the council (all the members present), held on Thursday, the 14th August, 1856, Councillor Philip Corboy was elected chairman by a show of hands, and it was resolved that the regular meetings of the council should be held weekly on Wednesdays, at three o'clock p.m. (At the twenty-third meeting the hour was changed to seven o'clock p.m.)

Of the original members two have resigned, viz. Alfred Sugden, after the ninth meeting, and John Kelly Trainor, after the tenth meeting; and, owing to non-attendance, the seat of Mr. James Maxfield was declared vacant.

To fill the vacancies thus occasioned, the following were elected by polled votes, on the 24th November, 1856, being eligible to sit at the fourteenth meeting, viz.:—

Councillor Corboy resigned the chairmanship at the twenty-first meeting, to which office Councillor Clarke was elected at the twenty-second meeting, and was sworn in a magistrate of the district on the 10th February, 1857.

The Council have held twenty-nine meetings during the six months, three of which were special meetings.

The finance committee, appointed at the nineteenth meeting, consists of the Chairman, Councillors Trainor, McPherson and Biddle, and has held three meetings, all its members being present. All payments ordered by the committee must be made by cheques, signed by the chairman and countersigned by the town clerk.

The public works committee, appointed at the twenty-third meeting, consists of Councillors Trainor, Butler, Corboy and Biddle. This committee has held three meetings, all the members forming it being present.

APPOINTMENTS.

Town clerk and collector of rates—Mr. Thos. John Ryan, 20th August, 1856.

Honorary Solicitor—Frederick Coster, Esq., 3rd January, 1857.

Valuators—Messrs. Hugh Swann and Edward Rafferty, 27th August, 1856.

Mr. Swann having obtained more permanent employment, resigned the office after eight days' service; Mr. Rafferty was in consequence directed to finish the valuation.

The town clerk was required to enter with two sureties into a bond for the sum of £400, guaranteeing to the council the faithful discharge of his duties.

COUNCIL OFFICES.

Tenders were invited for premises suitable for offices, and those of Mr. Matthew Murray having been offered at a reasonable rent, and being centrally situated, were selected, and entered upon on the 1st day of September, 1856, at a rental of £52 per annum. The town clerk offered to reside upon the premises, at a rental of £20 per annum, which offer was accepted. The District Road Board obtained permission to hold their meetings in the council offices at a rental of £7 10s. per annum.

Tenders were also invited for the supply of office furniture, and the tender of Mr. Thomas Bessence, at the sum of £16, was accepted.

ASSESSMENT.

According to the valuator's return of the assessable property within the district, there are 552 assessments, 303 vacant land, and 249 tenements; the whole valued at £11,648.

The ratepayers' roll was prepared as soon as circumstances would permit; and notice having been previously given, a special general meeting of the council was held on the 22nd October, for the purpose of hearing any objections that might be made to it. Persons whose names do not appear on the ratepayers' roll, and who have since its compilation become ratepayers of the district, may have their names placed thereon on their qualifications being made to appear to the satisfaction of the council.

FINANCE.

The council caused an estimate to be made of the probable amount of money which would be required to carry out the necessary public works for the year; and on the 5th of November struck a rate of one shilling in the pound on all property assessed, one moiety thereof to become due and payable on and after twenty days from the issue of the notices, and the other moiety thereof to become due and payable on and after 5th March, 1857. Assented to by His Excellency the Officer administering the Government on the 5th December, 1856.

Two courts of appeal against the valuation assessments were held by the magistrates in petty sessions, on the 20th and 27th January respectively; the appeals were few, and the reductions made inconsiderable.

The council are indebted to the chairman and Councillor Butler for an advance of money to pay current expenses, as it was not until the beginning of the present month that they received the first proceeds from the rate levied. The amount of rates paid into the Oriental Bank, Kilmore, is £144 14s. 3d.

The chairman has been appointed treasurer; and in the absence of the chairman the town clerk is authorised acting treasurer.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been assented to by His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, and gazetted on the dates annexed:—

1. To regulate by means of standing orders the proceedings of the council, 5th day of December, 1856.

2. For levying a rate of one shilling in the pound, 5th December, 1856.

The following are now under the consideration of His Excellency:—

3. To regulate noisome and offensive trades, and to preserve the public health.

4. To regulate the deposit of night soil, manure, or other offensive refuse.

Applications to Government, with their results:—

For a plan of the municipal district—Granted.

For a sum of money wherewith to pay preliminary expenses—Refused; but adding that a sum would be placed on the estimates.

For the *Government Gazette* from the 1st January, 1856, and a copy of all future publications—Granted.

For plans and sections of proposed tramway from Yan Yean to the Goulburn—Reply: That the trial lines had but just been commenced; that, when fully determined upon, the information asked would be furnished.

For further information with regard to the tramway to the Goulburn, and requesting that the same might be furnished prior to any line not intended to pass through Kilmore being fully determined upon—Reply: That the municipal council would be afforded an opportunity of urging their views previous to operations being commenced on any line between Melbourne and the Goulburn.

For the construction of culverts across certain parts of Sydney street—Reply: That they would be executed as soon as the Central Road Board obtained a grant from the Government.

For a set of standard weights and measures—Promised when they should be received from England.

For the payment of the moiety of the police fines under the Act 18 Victoria No. 14—Reply: That it would be paid monthly by the clerk of the bench; and that the sum due since the 14th July, 1856, would be paid through the Treasury, on receiving the proper account.

For twenty acres of land for a public garden—Granted.

For a site for quarries—Granted.

For a site for manure dépôt—Granted.

That £2000 be placed on the estimates for the erection of a town hall—Reply: That the Government is opposed to the principle of making separate grants to municipalities in aid of particular objects, deeming it more desirable to place on the estimates one sum for the endowment of each municipal institution. That it is intended to ask the assent of the legislature to a grant of £4000 in aid of the revenues of the municipality of Kilmore.

For temporary services of district surveyor to prepare plans and estimates of works to be undertaken—Granted.

That footways might be formed along that portion of the Sydney road which passed through the municipality—Reply: That the funds at the disposal of the road board are inadequate to keeping open the communication on the main roads; and regretting that any portion of them cannot be expended on the construction of footpaths.

For a site for cattle yards and slaughter-houses—Granted.

That money be placed on the estimates for the erection of a Post Office at Kilmore—Reply: That no provision appeared to be made on the estimates for 1857 for that purpose; but that the Commissioner of Public Works would be addressed on the subject.

That a gaol might be built at Kilmore, and suggesting a site—Reply: Tenders called for.

That an electric telegraph station be erected at Kilmore—Reply: That such an establishment is in contemplation.

That two sections of land, 1280 acres, be granted for the purposes of a common—Ordered to be reserved. The grant under consideration.

For a copy of Adamson's Acts of Council—Reply: That there is no provision for defraying the expense of supplying the work.

For further information regarding the erection of the gaol; as to whether any of the tenders called for had been accepted; and, if not, whether it was intended to call for fresh tenders—Reply: That fresh plans had been prepared, and that tenders would be called for forthwith.

That one of the sergeants of police, be permitted to act as inspector of weights, measures and nuisances—Granted.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The finance committee have been directed to procure a seal of office, a sketch of which will be immediately submitted for the approval of His Excellency the Governor.

The council cannot conclude this report without expressing their sincere regret that the opposition with which they had to contend at the commencement of their labors should have taken place, for, whilst that opposition effected no manner of service, it has produced much mischief, by having deterred members from entering with spirit upon the duties of office, and by having caused the resignations which have taken place; the tendency of the whole being to mar the intentions of the council, and, as a consequence, to retard the progress of the town.

MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF PORTLAND.

STATEMENT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT, FOR THE SIX MONTHS ENDING ON THE 31ST DAY OF JANUARY, 1857.

SINCE the last half-yearly report was presented the council have proceeded with the formation and metalling of such portions of the principal streets as were most needed, and portions of Julia street, Gawler street and Percy street have been formed and metalled in the centre so as to ensure a good carriage-way for the future at all seasons of the year; the northern end of Hurd street is also in the course of formation, being the principal entrance to that side of the town. The timber in portions of Otway street and Percy street has been cleared away. The public wells having been placed under the control of the council, have been put in thorough repair, and a contract has been entered into for repairing the bridge over the Saltwater Creek. The council have been in constant communication with the Government as to the expenditure of the sum of £12,000 voted last year for public works in Portland. The proposed addition to the lock-up has been made, the new jetty and post office are in course of erection, and tenders for the enlargement of the gaol have been called for. It is contemplated to appropriate any balance that may remain in extending the new jetty and putting the old jetty in thorough repair. The vacancy in the office of surveyor, caused by the resignation of Mr. Mathewson, was filled by the appointment of Mr. Ross, late of the Survey department. The attention of the council having been directed by the Central Board of Health to the propriety of extending the Public Health Act to Portland, they, after consideration, recommended that this should be done, and the Act was consequently extended to Portland by proclamation. A proclamation has also been issued at the instance of the council extending to Portland the clause in the Police Act against the use of chimneys built of wood or other inflammable material. A bye-law has also been passed prohibiting the driving of cattle through the town during the day, but it has not yet received the sanction of the Governor. An application to the Government to have the labor of prisoners confined in the gaol rendered available for the public works in the district, on the council defraying any extra expenses thereby incurred, has, after considerable delay, been complied with. The Government has also, on the recommendation of the council, exempted the several buildings used for public worship and other public institutions from the payment of municipal rates. The council have supported the road board in their application for a grant for the formation of a tramroad, although not within the limits of the municipal district; they have also, through Mr. Hughes, one of the members for the town, forwarded a memorial to the Governor, praying for the restoration of the efficiency of the harbor master's crew, but the result is not yet known. The proposed bill for the amendment of the Municipal Act has been under the consideration of the council, and they have forwarded some suggestions to the Surveyor General for his consideration in forming the proposed measure.

As the end of the year approached it became necessary to decide which three of the seven members of council should retire at the expiration of the year, which was decided by ballot, and Messrs. Browning, Finn and Smith were the three members on whom the lot fell for retiring at the end of the first year; Messrs. Crouch, Learmonth and Fitzgerald at the end of the second year, and Mr. Must at the end of the third year; but some of the members of the council doubting the legality of this arrangement, the opinion of the Attorney General was taken, who advised that the course taken by the council was correct; Messrs. Browning, Finn and Smith accordingly retired, and Messrs. Richardson Zell, Francis Henry and James Smith, one of the retiring members, were duly elected to fill the vacancies in the council.

During this, the first year of the existence of the council, they have been careful not to advance too fast in introducing new regulations for the government of the municipality, rather wishing to lead public opinion to a conviction of the advantages of local government, but the council now feel that the time has arrived for enforcing more strict discipline by carrying out the provisions of the Town and Country Police Act and Public Health Act, and by the enactment of bye-laws where the beforenamed Acts prove deficient, and thereby promoting the health, cleanliness and good order of the municipality.
