NOTICE TO MARINERS.

GEELONG HARBOR.

A TEMPORARY light ship has been moored opposite the Bird Rock, on the port side of the channel leading into Geelong, near the position hitherto occupied by the Second Black Buoy, which latter has been removed.

The vessel will, on and after this date, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit a bright fixed light, elevated twenty-seven feet above the sea level, and may be seen in clear weather from the deck of a vessel ten feet above the water, nine nautic miles.

The vessel is moored in twelve feet at low water, with the following magnetic bearings:—

Outer Red Dolphin, upon which a red ball has been placed	N. 82 W.
Beacon on Bird Rock	S. 89 E.
White buoy, off Bird Rock	S. 54 E.
Red buoy, off Point Wilson	S. 87 E.
White buoy, off Point Wilson	S. 52 E.
Point Henry	S. 4 W.

Should the light ship break adrift, or be otherwise shifted from her moorings, the bright light will be discontinued, and two red lights hoisted instead by night, and a large white flag by day.

The following tidal signals will be hoisted by day on board the light ship to indicate the height of water on the Bar:—

Ten feet—One blue flag.
Ten feet six inches—One ball.
Eleven feet—Ball with blue flag over.
Eleven feet six inches—Ball with blue flag under.
Twelve feet—Two balls.
Twelve and a half feet—Two balls with blue flag under.
Thirteen feet—Two balls with blue flag over.
Thirteen and a half feet—Two balls with red flag under.
Fourteen feet—Two balls with red flag over.
Fourteen and a half feet—Two balls with red flag between.
Fifteen feet—Red flag.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

A LADY interested in industrial education is prepared to appropriate £100 in the following manner:—

A premium of £50 to be given to a master in a Denominational or National School who shall give successful instruction in the growth of hemp or flax and their manufacture into rope, or £25 for the cultivation and £25 for the manufacture, in separate schools.

Also a premium of £50 to a master who shall give successful instruction in basket making, and the cultivation of suitable material as osiers, or £25 for cultivation and £25 for manufacture.

Managers of public elementary schools are requested to forward propositions before 1st August next. Not less than three schools must compete, or the premium will not be available.

It is to be observed that considerable assistance is also given by the Denominational School Board, under the rules, in carrying out industrial arrangements.

PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.

Brunswick.
(Second Petition.)

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition to His Excellency hereinafter set forth, signed by three hundred and eighty-two householders resident within the district of Brunswick, in the county of Bourke.

By His Excellency's Command,
WILLIAM C. HAINES.

A.3758.

The petitioners state that it will greatly tend to benefit the district of Brunswick that it should be constituted a municipal district, and propose that the boundaries thereof should be as follow, viz.:—Commencing at the bridge on the Merri Creek at the village of Northcote, and bounded on the south by a line bearing west to the eastern boundary of the Prince's Park reserve, by the said reserve northerly and westerly to the Sydney road; thence westerly along the northern boundary of the Royal Park reserve to the Moonee Ponds, by the said ponds north-westerly to the north-western corner of section 126, parish of Jika Jika; thence easterly along the northern boundary of section 127, parish of Jika Jika, to the Merri Creek, and by the said creek south-easterly to the point of commencement.

The petitioners further state that the area of the proposed district does not exceed nine square miles, and that it contains a population of householders exceeding five hundred, and that no one point in such area is distant more than six miles from any other point.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

“May it therefore please Your Excellency to declare by Your Excellency's Proclamation that the said district be a municipal district under the name of ‘The Brunswick Municipality,’ pursuant to the provisions of 18 Victoria No. 15.”

PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.

FITZ ROY WARD—MELBOURNE.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition to His Excellency hereinafter set forth, signed by over one thousand householders and ratepayers of Fitz Roy Ward, in the city of Melbourne.

The petitioners state that having carefully considered the management and financial position of the city of Melbourne, they are satisfied as to the inexpediency of continuing to be a portion thereof, on the following grounds, viz. :—

1st. At the present moment the city revenue is insufficient by £36,000 to meet current expenses and keep in moderate repair the "made" streets, without providing for a single mile of new street, and that to meet the deficiency double rates will be required for the ensuing year.

2nd. The streets at present unmade are twenty four miles in length, and for these and other works it has been proposed in the city council to raise £300,000 (in addition to the Gabrielli loan of £500,000), and thus to add to involvement.

The petitioners observe, that facility in raising such large sums leads to lavish expenditure and increased burthens, and apprehend that all the present rates would barely suffice to pay the interest of the loans, leaving unprovided for the maintenance and scavenging of the present streets.

That it appears from official returns, that during the year ending 31st August, 1856, the payments to the staff of the corporation, or salaries, amounted to £15,300, and the incidental expenses to £4000, making together £19,300, out of a revenue of £49,000, the management thus absorbing 40 per cent., while the corporate income is insufficient by upwards of £36,000 per annum to meet legitimate expenses.

That Fitz Roy Ward, being unequally represented in the city council, cannot obtain justice, Melbourne proper (which contains 640 acres), returning 16 members, while Fitz Roy Ward (which contains 340 acres) only returns 4 members.

Lastly, that there are in Fitz Roy Ward, 13 miles of streets and 10,000 inhabitants, that its importance is such as to require local management, and that its only hope of future prosperity rests in a total and speedy separation from the city.

And the petitioners pray as follows. —

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Excellency will be pleased to take their case into your most favorable consideration, and cause the necessary steps to be taken to have the district of 'Fitz Roy,' proclaimed a separate municipality, with the following extension of its boundaries, to obviate objections from the city council of Melbourne, namely, that its southern boundary be the centre of Victoria parade, in lieu of the north side line of the same; its western boundary, the centre of Nicholson street, continued in a straight line northwards to the Merri Creek, in lieu of the east side line of the said street ending at Reilly street; that the eastern bound-

dary be the centre of Smith street to the Heidelberg road; and thence along the East Collingwood boundary north to the Merri Creek in lieu of the west side line of the said street ending at Reilly street, and its northern boundary be the Merri Creek, in lieu of Reilly street."

MUNICIPALITY OF EMERALD HILL.

BYE-LAW No. 13.—A BYE-LAW TO PREVENT THE MISCHIEFS ARISING FROM THE BREAKING IN AND TRAINING OF HORSES IN THE PUBLIC STREETS, THOROUGHFARES AND RESERVES WITHIN THE TOWN PROPER OF EMERALD HILL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, "An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act, to make bye-laws for the suppression of nuisances, restraining offensive trades, and the general good rule and government of such municipal district: And whereas great danger to life and property arises from the practice of breaking in and the training of horses in the public streets, thoroughfares and reserves within the limits of the town proper of Emerald Hill, as marked out on the Government maps, and it is expedient to devise means for the prevention of the same: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Emerald Hill, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of the colony of Victoria, as required by the provisions of the said Act—

Any person who shall break in any horse, mare, gelding, or mule, or train or practice the same, with or without any cart, dray, or other vehicle, in or upon any road, street, thoroughfare, reserve, or public place, or on any portion of the Crown lands within the limits of the town proper of Emerald Hill, as marked out on the Government maps, with the exceptions hereinafter mentioned, to wit:—1st, That portion of land within the town proper of Emerald Hill, lying east of Clarendon street and north of York street east; 2nd, That portion of land within the boundaries of the race-course, south of Park street, shall on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20).

MUNICIPALITY OF ST. KILDA.

BYE-LAW No. 7.—A BYE-LAW FOR THE REGULATION OF BATHING ON THE SEA-COAST WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF ST. KILDA.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is among other things enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act, to make bye-laws for the preservation of public decency and the general good rule and management of such municipal district: And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of Victoria, dated the 12th day of February, 1857, the district of St. Kilda was duly established a municipal district, under the provisions and within the meaning of the said Act: And whereas it is expedient to make a bye-law for the regulation of bathing on the sea-coast within the municipal district of St. Kilda, in order to ensure the preservation of public decency:

Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council for the district of St. Kilda, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of Victoria, as required by the provisions of the said Act, the following regulation shall be in force respecting bathing on the sea-coast within the municipal district of St. Kilda, viz.:

From a point two hundred yards north-west of the south-west corner of Fitz Roy street, to another point one hundred yards south-east of the bathing establishment at present known as "The Pavilion" (and which two points are defined by posts

erected by order of the council), the beach shall be exclusively reserved for the use of females (except only the space within the enclosures attached to the bathing establishments now erected or hereafter to be erected with the consent of the council), and no male will be allowed to use the open beach for the purpose of bathing at any time in the sea, between the above mentioned two points (except as aforesaid).

Any person contravening the foregoing regulation shall, on conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 7, made by the municipal council of St. Kilda, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council. Gazetted on the 3rd day of July, 1857, pursuant to 18 Victoria No. 15, sec. 33.

MUNICIPALITY OF ST. KILDA.
BYE-LAW No. 11.—FOR PREVENTING DAMAGE TO THE PUBLIC FOOTPATHS AND WATERCOURSES, AND FOR REGULATING THE FORMATION OF PRIVATE DRAINS AND CROSSINGS.

WHEREAS for the better protection of the public footpaths and watercourses of this municipality, it is deemed expedient to make the following orders and regulations:—Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the council of the municipal district of St. Kilda, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief, pursuant to 18 Victoria No. 15, section 33, &c., any person who shall ride or drive any horse or beast, or who shall drive or wheel any carriage, cart, barrow, or other vehicle upon or across any of the public footpaths or watercourses of the municipal district of St. Kilda, or who shall in any way cause damage to the said public footpaths or watercourses, or any of them, shall, upon conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

Provided that every owner or occupier, or the several owners and occupiers of any gateway, yard, or lane to which access by horses, beasts, carriages or other vehicles can be obtained only by riding, driving, or wheeling upon or across any of the said public footpaths or watercourses, who shall make and maintain such crossing or crossings over the said public footpaths or watercourses or any of them, as may be necessary for approach and access to any such private gateway, yard, or lane at the expense of such owner or occupier, or respective owners and occupiers, and under the superintendence of such officer as the said municipal council may appoint for that purpose, shall be allowed to use such crossing without being liable to the penalty hereinbefore imposed.

The owner or occupier of any building or premises, who shall cause or suffer any water to be discharged or to overflow from any such building or premises into or over any public footpath or highway within the said district, shall, upon conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

Provided that if such owner or occupier shall make and maintain such drains leading through and under the adjoining path as shall be necessary to discharge the water from such building or premises into the public water-tables, channels, or gutters, at the expense of such owner or occupier or respective owners and occupiers and under the superintendence and to the satisfaction of such officer or officers, as the said council may appoint for that purpose, he shall not be liable to the penalty hereinbefore imposed.

MUNICIPALITY OF WARRNAMBOOL.
BYE-LAW No. 8.—A BYE-LAW TO AUTHORISE THE LEVY OF A RATE.

WHEREAS by the Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is amongst other things enacted, that the municipal council of any municipal district constituted under the said Act shall annually, within three months after the election of the chairman of such council, cause an estimate to be made of the probable amount which will be required for the then current year in addition to any tolls, rates or dues, which may have been levied or authorised to be levied within the said district, to carry on the fencing, making and repairing of any roads, wharves, piers, or other public works within the said district, and any other expenses necessary in carrying into effect the provisions of the said Act, and shall raise the amount so estimated by an assessment of all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district according to

its fair average annual value, whether occupied or not, provided that no such rate shall exceed the sum of Two shillings in the pound: And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the late Governor of Victoria, dated the 6th of December, 1855, the township of Warrnambool was duly constituted a municipal district, under the provisions and within the meaning of the said Act: And whereas, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, the council of the municipal district of Warrnambool have caused to be made an estimate of the probable amount which will be required for the current year for the purposes aforesaid, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, and have duly assessed all property in houses and lands within the limits of the said municipal district according to its fair average annual value, whether occupied or not, and have ordered upon such assessment a rate of One shilling in the pound, to be due and payable for the current year ending the 3rd of January, 1858: And whereas by the Act of the Officer administering the Government of Victoria and the Legislative Council thereof, 19 Victoria No. 15, intitled, "An Act to amend an Act, intitled, 'An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria,'" it is amongst other things enacted that no toll, rate or due shall be imposed by the council of any municipal district save by bye-law subject to the assent of the Governor as in the first recited Act mentioned: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the council of the municipal district of Warrnambool, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, as required by the provisions of the said recited Acts, the rate of One shilling in the pound shall be and be taken to be the rate on the assessment of all property in houses and lands within the limits of the municipal district of Warrnambool for the current year ending the 3rd of January, 1858, to be and remain in force until a new rate be made by the council of the municipal district of Warrnambool, as required by the provisions of the said first recited Act.

BYE-LAW No. 21.—FOR THE CONDUCT OF ELECTIONS OF COUNCILLORS.

WHEREAS it is expedient and necessary that at the election of a councillor or councillors for the Municipal District of Williamstown, a proper and convenient place or places should be appointed for the taking of the votes of the electors, and that suitable rules and regulations should be made for the proper and orderly carrying on of such elections: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the said municipal council that from and after the date of this bye-law having received the assent of His Excellency the Governor, pursuant to the 18th Victoria No. 15, section 33, &c.:

1. That it shall be lawful for the chairman of the said council, and he is hereby ordered and directed, to appoint one or more places within the said district as polling booths, providing always that no inn or public house, or any part thereof, shall be so appointed or used.

2. That the said chairman shall appoint a poll-clerk to each and every of such polling booths, and if there shall be more than one booth a deputy chairman to each additional booth, such deputy chairman to be a member of the said council, unless there be not sufficient councillors for the purpose, in which case the chairman shall appoint such other person or persons as he shall think fit. That each candidate may, if he shall think fit, appoint one scrutineer to each booth, which appointment or appointments shall be, in writing, addressed to the chairman or deputy chairman, as the case may be, and no other person shall be admitted to be, or remain, within the barrier which shall be erected in front of the chairman's table, except for the purpose of voting, and that each voter shall retire from within the said barrier immediately after recording his vote.

3. That the chairman, deputy chairman, or poll clerk at each booth, shall deliver to each voter, after having found his name on the ratepayers' roll, a voting paper in the form to this bye-law annexed, containing the names of the several candidates, which voting paper shall be signed by the chairman or deputy chairman, and no other shall be received.

4. That each voter shall strike out the name of such candidate or candidates from such voting paper as he shall not intend to vote for, and sign his name thereto; and in case such voter shall be unable to write, he shall signify the same to the chairman or deputy chairman and the scrutineers, and the chairman, or deputy chairman, or poll-clerk shall thereupon strike out the name or names of such candidate or candidates as the voter shall direct, and the said chairman, or deputy chairman, or poll-clerk shall affix the name of such voter to the said paper; and such act of the chairman, or deputy chairman, or poll-clerk shall be deemed to be the act of the said voter, and shall subject him to the pains and penalties of this bye-law, and no voter shall take out beyond the said barrier or barriers of the poll booth or poll booths any such voting paper, either before or after the same shall have been marked as aforesaid. Any voter wilfully infringing any of the provisions of this clause, or obstructing the polling by any unnecessary delay in performing any act required of him, or by any riotous or disorderly conduct in any said booth or booths shall, on conviction of any such offence before any two or more justices of the peace for the said district, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding ten pounds.

5. That the chairman or deputy chairman shall, if he think fit, or if required by a scrutineer, put the following questions to any voter before giving his vote, viz.:

1st. Are you the person whose name appears in the Ratepayers' Roll, Number (*Here state the No.*)?

2nd. Have you voted before at this election?

6. That any person personating or attempting to personate any elector or deceased elector, or who shall vote a second time on the same day, shall upon conviction of every such offence as aforesaid, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding fifty pounds.

7. That should more names be left on any voting paper than there are councillors to be elected, the chairman or deputy chairman shall call the attention of the voter to the same, and shall, under his direction, strike out such and so many names as shall be in excess of such vacancies.

8. That all places at which polling is appointed to be held as aforesaid shall be deemed to be public places.

9. That the said council shall in case of the illness or absence of the chairman of the council at any municipal election, appoint from their own body some other member to act in the place of the said chairman, who shall have and exercise all the powers and authority of the said chairman during any such election.
