MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.
COUNTER-PETITION, FITZ ROY WARD.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a counter-petition (presented to His Excellency on the 16th inst.) as hereinafter set forth, and signed by thirteen hundred and eight resident householders and owners of property situate in Fitz Roy ward, in the city of Melbourne, such counter-petition being in opposition to a petition previously presented from the same ward, and gazetted on the 19th ultimo.

The counter-petitioners state that they are resident householders and owners of property in Fitz Roy ward, Melbourne, and have learned with deep regret that a portion of the ratepayers have taken steps to obtain its separation from the city, and its formation into a municipality.

That they are of opinion that the arguments and accounts adduced in favor of separation are erroneous and calculated to mislead, separation not being advisable.

That instead of the corporate revenue being insufficient by £36,000 to meet current expenses and keep in moderate repair the made streets, as calculated with questionable care by the advocates for separation, they estimate the revenue for the current year at £55,000, and the interest on the Gabrielli loan at £27,000, thus leaving £28,000 to meet the cost of management, repairs, scavenging, &c.

That they believe that the proposition made in the City Council to raise a further loan of £300,000, dwelt upon as impolitic, will not be carried out.

That in quoting from official returns the heavy charges for the staff and management of the city corporation for the year ending 31st August, 1856, the petitioners for separation concealed the fact that the same returns indicate an expenditure in that year of upwards of £130,000 of the Gabrielli loan for public works and special improvements whereby extended and professional supervision was necessitated. The counter-petitioners estimate the cost of management for the present year at less than £9000.

That the plea of the unequal representation of Fitz Roy ward rests merely on proportional acreage, and cannot be sustained, for while the assessed annual value of property in the ward for the year 1857 is £102,900, that of the city is £672,560.

That they are unwilling to relinquish their interest as citizens in the valuable city markets and buildings, or in the flagging (worth £10,000), which the corporation offers to the citizens on liberal terms.

That they feel convinced that the separation of the ward would be prejudicial to its interests, and expose it to influences operating in other municipalities, where (the counter-petitioners state) it is unfortunately known that public interests are sacrificed to party feeling; and that their interests and the interests of the ward generally will be safer in the hands of the experienced council of the city (of whose shortcomings they are fully aware) rather than in the management of a new council, under whose care they fear a repetition of the jobbery and self-seeking which are happily now being eradicated from the corporation of Melbourne.

And the counter-petitioners pray as follows:—

“Your petitioners therefore most humbly and urgently pray that your Excellency will take their case into your most serious consideration, and that your Excellency will be pleased to favorably entertain our petition by refusing to grant a separation from the city of Melbourne.”

PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.

SOUTH YARRA.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition to His Excellency, hereinafter set forth, signed by three hundred and six householders and ratepayers of South Yarra, in the county of Bourke.

By His Excellency's Command,

B.4713. WILLIAM C. HAINES.

The petitioners state that the locality of South Yarra is within the municipal district of Prahran, and that but a small portion of the municipal rates levied on the property in South Yarra has been applied to local improvements; in short, that the municipal council have almost ignored it, not having metalled or formed the roads, nor removed the rubbish from them, and that horses, cattle, pigs, goats, &c., are allowed to roam at large and commit depredations.

That South Yarra is too remote from Prahran to admit of the petitioners sharing the benefits attending municipal institutions, such as a Post Office, facilities for extinguishing fires, a Mechanics' Institute, &c., &c., and that the requirements of South Yarra, differing from those of Prahran, will be better fulfilled by residents than by strangers interested only in the improvement of distant localities contiguous to their own properties.

That the municipal council of Prahran are about to borrow £8000 on mortgage of the rates, that the properties of the petitioners have been rated for 1857 at 1s. in the pound on a rack rental, and they fear that it will be necessary to levy a yearly rate of 2s. in the pound until such loan be repaid.

That the only improvement by aid of such loan contemplated in South Yarra will consist in making and metalling a short piece of road called Yarra street, a work of little if any benefit to the petitioners, but serviceable to the Prahran municipal council for hauling stones over to make roads distant from South Yarra, and that the formation of the Melbourne and Suburban Railway will obviate the necessity for such a road.

That the majority of the petitioners consented to be included within the municipal district of Prahran upon the distinct understanding that the lowest possible rate only would be assessed, and that the council should not borrow money except with the approval of the ratepayers, signified at a public meeting convened for the purpose, which meeting has not been convened.

That the present rateable property within South Yarra is nearly, if not quite, as valuable as that of the whole municipal district was at the time of its constitution.

Lastly, the petitioners state that the area of the proposed municipal district does not exceed nine square miles, that it contains more than three hundred householders or ratepayers, and that it is bounded on the north by the River Yarra Yarra, on the east by the Kooyong road, on the south by the centre of the Commercial road, and on the west by the centre of the Punt road, as delineated on a plan which accompanies the petition.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore most humbly pray that Your Excellency will be pleased to declare the locality comprised within the boundaries hereinbefore defined a municipal district, by the name of the South Yarra Municipality, or by such other name as Your Excellency may think fit, under the Act of the 18th Victoria No. 15, intituled, "*An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*," and that for such purpose Your Excellency will, if necessary, vary and alter the present boundaries of the municipal district of Prahran: And that Your Excellency will not consent to the borrowing of eight thousand pounds by the municipality of Prahran, until the locality in which your petitioners reside has been proclaimed a separate municipality."

SAILING DIRECTIONS FOR THE PORT OF WARRNAMBOOL.

By J. B. MILLS, HARBOR MASTER, PORT FAIRY.

Position of the Port.

Warrnambool or Lady Bay is distant about thirteen (13) miles east from Port Fairy, the flagstaff which stands to the south of the town being in lat. 38° 24' 50" S., and long. 142° 32' E. The anchorage is about a mile and a quarter nearly south of the flagstaff.

The bay is open from S. to E.S.E., the anchorage being to the N.E. of the three small islands which form the S.W. limit of the bay and shelter vessels lying at the proper anchorage from S.W. gales.

Description of Bay and Anchorage.

The anchorage is also in some degree protected from southerly winds by the detached reefs which extend between a quarter and half a mile to the S.E. of the larger islands.

Description of neighboring land.

The bay may be said to extend from the small islands to S.W. to the mouth of the River Hopkins, to the eastward a distance of about two and a half (2½) miles by the beach; the land in the immediate vicinity of the bay being composed of sand hummocks without timber, very low on the N.W. and gradually rising to the eastward, where it terminates in a high bluff, which forms the west head of the River Hopkins, off the mouth of which is a sunken reef, extending nearly half a mile from the shore, the sea breaking on it when there is any swell setting in from the seaward.

Coast to the eastward from Warrnambool.

The land behind the bay is tolerably high and well wooded, while that to the east of the Hopkins is clear of timber, grassy, and rises gradually from the coast for some distance to the eastward of the mouth of the river, where it terminates in a high grassy down about one and a half miles from the coast. On the N.W. side of the clear land stand two bushy trees close together, and one solitary tree about three-quarters of a mile to S.E.; and some distance further in the same direction may be seen a heavy belt of timber skirting the coast to the eastward beyond the bold projection which is about fifteen (15) miles from Warrnambool, the trend of the coast being about S.E. by E. and N.W. by W., and bold and clear of reefs.

Coast to the westward of Warrnambool.

The coast for about seven (7) miles to the westward of Warrnambool is composed of moderately high sand hummocks, partly covered with brushwood, with few bare sand patches, which shew very conspicuously when seen from seaward, forming a great contrast with the coast further to the westward, which is formed of low grass hummocks.

The trend of the coast from the islands at Warrnambool is about N.W. by W. to Armstrong's Bay, and from thence W.S.W. to Port Fairy. Off Armstrong's Bay there are several sunken rocks, some of which extend a long mile off shore. From this bay to Port Fairy the coast is skirted by a sunken reef running parallel with the shore at half a mile distance. Vessels working up this part of the coast should therefore not stand too far in shore.

Warrnambool Hill.

On making Warrnambool from seaward a look-out should be kept for Warrnambool Hill, which, if seen, may be recognised by its resemblance to a cock's comb, being elongated and covered on the top with large bushy trees. It bears from the anchorage N. 40° E. 17 miles, and may be seen from sixteen to eighteen miles off shore in moderately clear weather.

Tower Hill.

Tower Hill is conical, and stands to the westward of some high table land eight miles N.E. of Saddle Hill. It bears from the anchorage N. 21° W., and may be seen the same distance from seaward as Warrnambool Hill.

The table land round Tower Hill has lately been cleared of much of its timber, which makes some large trees that have been left standing on the summit very conspicuous. The hill itself has also been cleared of the bushy trees which made it so remarkable heretofore, and a beacon has been erected on the summit, which, with a good glass, may be observed some distance.

The two hills would guide a vessel sufficiently near so that the islands and clear land to the east of the Hopkins and the remarkable trees on its top might be seen.

Strangers bound for Warrnambool from the westward will have no difficulty in making the port if they sight Cape Nelson or Cape Bridgewater, the first named cape being on the same parallel of latitude as the islands at Warrnambool; the distance is about fifty (50) miles, with the Lady Julia Percy Islands laying right in the track and about mid-distance. This island lies nearly five (5) miles off the coast, and is so remarkable in appearance that if once seen it could not be mistaken for any other land. It is about one mile square, and about

one hundred and fifty (150) feet in height, table top with perpendicular or over-hanging sides composed of dark looking rocks, without timber, and covered with grass. The island is only accessible by boat on the N.E. side, is steep too, and may be approached to within a short distance with safety with a commanding breeze.

As soon as this island is passed, the Saddle Hill on Griffith's Island, near Port Fairy, may be seen standing boldly out, it being the termination of the line of coast from Portland Bay to Port Fairy. After passing which, the island off Warrnambool may be distinctly seen, as also the high clear land to the eastward of the River Hopkins, with the remarkable trees before mentioned.

It is especially recommended that any person in charge of a vessel bound for Warrnambool, who may not be acquainted with this coast, should make the land if possible about Cape Bridgewater or Nelson, from whence a very few hours run would take them to their destination.

Portland Bay a place of refuge in case of bad weather.

The remarkable character of the coast between these capes and Warrnambool renders the navigation most simple, and precludes the possibility of mistake. Another advantage is, that on the approach of a heavy S.W. gale, after making the land with night coming on, Portland Bay affords good shelter until the gale abates, it being easy of access to strangers.

I consider this of great importance, as it would be dangerous to take Warrnambool Bay in a gale from S. or S.W., and should on no account be attempted, as the sea breaks with great violence across the mouth of the Bay, and for more than two miles out to sea.

South Channel.

Strangers making Warrnambool from the eastward, if, when nearing the port, they should discover that the sea is breaking across the mouth of the bay, should haul off and stand to the westward until the coast to the westward be opened clear of the islands, and the flagstaff be brought to bear N. half W., when it may be steered for, and the bay entered by the south channel. By adopting this plan the five fathom bank may be cleared, on which the sea breaks with great violence, and continues breaking from this bank into the Hopkins Reef, which renders the S.E. entrance very dangerous with a heavy swell.

Five Fathom Bank.

This bank is three-quarters (¾) of a mile S.E. half E. from the largest island, being of small extent, with a good channel of a quarter or half a mile wide between it and the detached reef, to S.E. of the islands, with from seven to eleven fathoms foul ground.

Directions for vessels beating into the Bay.

In working into the bay with the wind at N.W., care must be taken not to stand too near the Hopkins Reef, to avoid which it is advisable to fetch as near the S.E. reef as consists with safety before standing in on the port tack. By so doing, vessels with moderate sailing qualities would fetch far to windward of this danger, and in a tack or two gain an anchorage.

Eastern Channel.

There is a good passage of one mile wide between the south-east reef and the Hopkins reef, with not less than four fathoms for ships working in.

The soundings lessen gradually within the buoy as the shore is approached.

Winds and weather.

The winds on this part of the coast, from the middle of November to the middle of March, are land and sea breezes, generally terminating with the equinoctial gales in March.

The weather, from the middle of March to the end of April, is very changeable, being for the most part light airs and calms, with sudden and frequent changes.

The westerly winds so prevalent on this coast set in about May, and last till November; the former month being frequently the most stormy period of the year.

In June and July the weather is generally fair, the wind being for the most part off the land.

As a general rule the weather on this coast is very uncertain, being subject to great and frequent changes at all seasons of the year, the barometer rising highest with the south-east wind, and falling with northerly or north-west winds.

The tides on this coast are much influenced by the winds. High water takes place at full and change a few minutes before noon, but will often flow much later when the wind is strong from the westward. The rise and fall of tide seldom exceeds five (5) feet.

In fine weather the tides are regular, the flood setting along the coast to the westward, and the ebb to the eastward. Part of these directions may be considered superfluous, as there is a pilot at this port who will board all ships flying a pilot Jack, before they get into danger, should the sea not be breaking too heavy for his boat to go out.

Moorings.

The following moorings are at present laid down, viz.:—An anchor weighing thirty-seven cwt., with ninety fathoms one inch and three-quarters chain: this anchor lies in four fathoms and a half water. Also, an anchor weighing twenty-six cwt., with seventy-five fathoms one inch and three-eighths chain, and lying in three fathoms water. To the end of each chain is attached a barrel buoy, painted white.

MUNICIPALITY OF CASTLEMAINE.

BYE-LAW TO AMEND BYE-LAW No. 13, FOR LICENSING AND REGULATION OF NIGHTMAN CARTERS.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 13, intitled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," the council of any municipal district is empowered for the suppression of nuisances to regulate and license night-soil carters, &c., &c.: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Castlemaine, that every applicant for a license to ply for hire as a nightman shall at the same time submit the names and residences of two sureties, and on his being approved by the town clerk, and entering into the required bond, he shall receive a license therefrom, and the object and conditions of the said bond shall be for the due performance of the nightman's avocations, and the protection of the public health from the neglect thereof, and the amount of said bond shall be Fifty pounds (£50) jointly and severally.

The license fee for each nightman shall be Two pounds (£2) per annum for one cart, and One pound (£1) for every other cart or vehicle used by him for such purpose; and the name and address of every night-soil carter, with the number of his license and the word "licensed," shall be legibly painted in letters not less than one inch in height, in white on a black ground, in a conspicuous position on the off side of each cart or vehicle which shall so ply for hire, and each cart shall have affixed thereto when employed in removing night-soil, &c., two glass lights, one on the off side and one on the near side, and each cart or vehicle shall have a properly fitted wood covering and quite tight.

No nightman's cart shall be allowed to remain with such soil therein, except between the hours of Ten o'clock p.m. until Five o'clock a.m. from the months of September to April inclusive, and until Six o'clock a.m. after Ten o'clock p.m. from May to August, within the said municipal boundary.

In conformity with the bond and license, and the other provisions of this bye-law, there shall be due and paid for any breach of or offence against the same, a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20); and every person who shall be found employed or engaged as a nightman, without a license as aforesaid, except the bona fide servant of a licensed nightman, shall be subject to pay a like penalty, not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20).

MUNICIPALITY OF WILLIAMSTOWN.

BYE-LAW No. 18.—FOR THE APPROPRIATION OF THE SUM OF THREE THOUSAND POUNDS, PAID OUT OF THE PUBLIC REVENUE, FOR THE YEAR 1857, AS AN INSTALMENT OF THE GRANT IN AID OF THE SECOND YEAR'S REVENUE OF THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF WILLIAMSTOWN.

WHEREAS by the Act of 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is amongst other things enacted, that every work proposed to be executed by any municipal council by funds raised by aid from the Government, whether by endowment or otherwise, shall be the subject of a distinct and separate bye-law:

And whereas by a vote of the Legislative Assembly, of the session 1857, the sum of Three thousand pounds is granted to the municipal council of Williamstown, as an instalment of the grant in aid of the second year's revenue of the said municipal council, subject to the conditions of the said recited Act:

Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Williamstown, that the said sum of Three thousand pounds shall be expended in the forming, metalling and repairing of the following footpaths, viz.:

1. South end of Hammer street, from the corner of Morris street to Ann street.
2. Part of Parker street, from Cecil street to Electra street.
3. Cox's gardens or buildings.
4. One side of Dover street.
5. Continuation on one side of Douglas parade.
6. Continuation on one side of the western end of Ferguson street.
7. South end of Nelson place, from Ann street to Morris street.
8. Part of Stevedore street, on one side from Macquarie street to Melbourne road.
9. In Cole and Parker streets, adjoining the market and Catholic Church reserve.
10. In Dover place, so far as the buildings extend.
11. Douglas parade, from Yarra street northwards, six chains.
12. In Wellington parade, on one side.
13. In aid of the cost of kerbing and channelling in front of premises when the proprietors contribute one moiety of the expense.
14. In forming and metalling, to a width of twenty feet, the roadway in Cole street, from Nelson place to Cecil street.
15. In providing and erecting a weighbridge.
16. And generally in the sustaining of the roads and paths and other works already constructed.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 18, made by the municipal council of Williamstown, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

MOUNT BLACKWOOD.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the district of Mount Blackwood:—

XL. *Registration to be marked on miner's rights.*—The surveyor appointed by the local court shall, at the time of registration of any claim or privilege, mark on the miner's right the date of registration, extent and locality of any such claim or privilege for which the applicant may desire to be registered, so that the same miner's right may not be again used until the claim or share for which it may be registered shall have been worked out, abandoned, transferred, or otherwise disposed of.

XLI. *All privileges to be registered.*—All parties having possession of, or who may hereafter be allowed, any claim exceeding twenty-four (24) feet by twenty-four (24) feet, or any other privilege, shall, in a book provided for the purpose by the surveyor, register all such claims or privileges, with the names of the holders and the numbers and dates of their miner's rights.

XLII. *No privileges allowable unless recommended by the local court.*—No miner shall be allowed any alluvial claim exceeding twenty-four (24) feet by twenty-four (24) feet, or any other privilege whatever except on the recommendation of the local court.

GEELONG AND MELBOURNE RAILWAY.

BYE-LAWS, REGULATIONS AND ORDINANCES OF THE GEELONG AND MELBOURNE RAILWAY COMPANY.

THE shareholders of the Geelong and Melbourne Railway Company, pursuant to and by virtue of and in exercise of all and every the powers, authorities and privileges given to or conferred on them respectively by an Act of the Legislature of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intitled, "An Act to incorporate a Company to be called 'The Geelong and Melbourne Railway Company,'" and also of all other powers and authorities enabling the said company in that behalf, do constitute, make, ordain and establish the bye-laws, regulations and ordinances following, that is to say:—

I.—AS TO PASSENGERS.

1. Any person refusing, on request of the company's officer or officers, to produce or deliver up his ticket, or occupying without permission a superior class carriage to that for which he has paid, will be required to pay double fare from the place whence the train originally started, or in default thereof, is hereby made liable in the penalty of Forty shillings.

2. Any person refusing or neglecting to quit a carriage in which he has taken a seat, on arriving at the point to which he has paid his fare, or proceeding beyond the said point without paying the additional fare corresponding thereto, or taking or occupying a seat in any carriage belonging to the company, without previously obtaining a ticket, shall forfeit the sum of Forty shillings.

3. Passengers at the intermediate stations will only be accepted, and tickets issued conditionally, that is to say, in case there shall be room in the train for which they are booked, or in case there shall not be room for all so booked, the passengers booked for the longest distance will be allowed the preference. Passengers booked for the same distance will have priority according to the numbers of their tickets.

4. Smoking tobacco, opium, or other substance is strictly prohibited, except in the carriages appropriated for that purpose. Any person persisting in smoking after being warned not to do so is hereby subjected to a fine of Forty shillings, and in case of his persisting after a second warning, he may immediately, or at the first stopping place, be removed from the company's premises, and shall forfeit his fare in addition to the above penalty.

5. Any passenger committing any nuisance, or wilfully interfering with the comfort of other passengers, or obstructing any of the company's officers in the discharge of their duty, or not attending to the directions of the guard, will be removed from the company's premises as soon after the offence as conveniently may be, and shall forfeit his fare in addition to a penalty not to exceed Five pounds.

6. Any passenger attempting to enter or leave any of the carriages while the train is in motion, is hereby subjected to a penalty of Forty shillings.

7. Any passenger wilfully cutting the lining, breaking the windows, defacing or otherwise damaging any of the company's carriages, shall be fined Ten pounds, in addition to the amount of any damage for which he may be liable.

8. The charge made for passengers as specified in the company's table of fares does not extend to luggage. The company will not in any case be answerable for luggage unless it shall have been booked and paid for. On booking, a ticket will be given to the passenger and a corresponding ticket affixed to the luggage; and the luggage will only be delivered to the person producing such ticket. No charge will be made for luggage *bona fide* belonging to a passenger, and not exceeding Sixty pounds in weight; but a charge will be made for all excess above that weight.

9. The company's porters will render every facility to passengers in loading and unloading luggage at the different stations. No fee or gratuity is permitted to be taken by any of the company's servants, under any consideration whatever.

10. Dogs will not be suffered to accompany passengers in the carriages, but will be conveyed separately and charged for.

II.—AS TO GOODS.

11. All charges for transit of goods shall be paid in advance, or on demand; otherwise the goods shall be detained and sold in payment of such charges for transit, and of the expenses of detention and sale.

12. Any person neglecting or refusing to give the company's authorised servants a true account in writing of the quantity and description or quality of goods or materials conveyed, from whence brought, or where intended to be unloaded or left, or refusing to account or giving a false account of the same, or delivering any part of his bill of lading at any other place than what is mentioned in such account, shall be liable to pay the company for such goods at the rate of Forty shillings per ton.

III.—GENERAL REGULATIONS.

13. Any person riding, leading, or driving any horse, mule, ass, bullock, cow, sheep, swine, or other animal, upon the railway, or suffering such animal to be upon the railway (except in directly crossing the same at the places appointed by the company), shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

14. Any person walking on the railway (except in crossing the railway at the places appointed by the company), shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

15. Any person, not being a servant of the company, extinguishing any light or lights on the company's premises, or imitating the company's signals within the precincts of the line, or in any way endeavoring to mislead engine-drivers, or other persons employed on the railway, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding One hundred pounds.

16. Any person found on the railway or stations in a state of drunkenness, shall be liable to a fine of not less than Twenty shillings, and not exceeding Forty shillings.

17. No other person than the brakeman shall be allowed to ride or pass on any luggage waggon, under a penalty of Forty shillings.

18. No person or persons, except the engine-driver and fireman actually engaged, shall be allowed to ride on any locomotive engine upon or along the railway, without the leave of the company's engineer, or other authorised officer, from time to time in writing; and the engine-driver, as well as the person riding on any engine contrary hereto, shall be fined in the sum of Forty shillings.

19. No person (except those employed in the company's service) shall move any truck, waggon, or carriage, along any part of the railway, under penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

20. The drivers or conductors of all public coaches, omnibuses, drays, or other carriages or vehicles that may be admitted into the company's premises, shall obey every direction or order that may be given them by any of the company's officers or authorised servants; and every driver, or other person, refusing to obey such directions, shall forfeit and pay Twenty shillings for every such refusal.

21. Any person neglecting to shut the gate of a surface crossing after passing through the same, or in any way defacing or destroying the mile posts or boards along the line, shall forfeit and pay to the company the sum of Five pounds.

22. Any person sending gunpowder, aquafortis, vitriol, or other goods of dangerous quality, by the railway, and not distinctly marking the nature of such goods on the outside of the package, or otherwise giving notice to the company thereof, in writing, shall forfeit and pay to the company the sum of Ten pounds.

IV.—AS TO THE COMPANY.

23. At each half-yearly meeting of the company two shareholders shall be elected to audit the accounts of the company for the ensuing half-year; and in the event of such election not being made, or if any auditor elected shall die, or shall refuse or become unable to act, the directors shall appoint some shareholder or shareholders to fill the vacancy or vacancies.

24. The accounts of the company shall be made up to the last day of May and the last day of November in each year, by the accountant, and be audited by the auditors elected at the previous half-yearly meeting, or appointed as aforesaid; and a just and true statement or balance-sheet of the monies received and expended during the previous six months, shall be certified by the auditors under their respective hands; which statement or balance-sheet shall be printed, and a copy forwarded one week before the then ensuing general meeting of the company to every shareholder residing within the colony of Victoria.

25. The common seal of the company shall be kept in the chief office of the company, in the town of Geelong, in a box having three locks of different kinds thereon, and the secretary shall be responsible for the safe custody and care of the box containing such common seal, and the key of one of such locks shall be kept by the secretary, and the keys of the other of such locks by the president and one of the directors respectively.

26. The common seal shall not be affixed to any deed or document without the authority of the board of directors; and every deed or document so sealed shall be countersigned by the president and three or more of the directors, and by the secretary; or, in the absence of the president, by three or more of the directors, and by the secretary; or, in case of the illness or unavoidable absence of the secretary, by the president and by three or more of the directors of the company.

27. Every vote or resolution passed at any meeting of the board of directors, or at any general meeting of the company, requiring for its legal efficacy the affixing the common seal to

any deed or document, shall be deemed a sufficient authority for affixing the common seal thereto.

The foregoing bye-laws, regulations and ordinances were constituted, made, ordained and established at the general meeting of the Geelong and Melbourne Railway Company, held on Tuesday, the seventh day of July, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in testimony whereof the said company have hereto affixed their common seal.

REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNCIL FOR THE HALF-YEAR ENDING 30TH JUNE, 1857.

PUBLIC WORKS.

OWING to delay in the receipt of the first moiety of the Government grant in aid, the greater part of the public works could not be undertaken until after the setting in of the wet season, thus causing a degree of inconvenience to the inhabitants generally, which the council regret was unavoidable.

The following works have been completed during the half-year:—

1. The formation of Ferrers street from Bank street to the Beach road.
2. The formation of Dorcas street west from Ferrers street to Montague street.
3. The formation of Coventry street west from Ferrers to Montague street.
4. The formation of footpaths and water-channels in portions of Cecil street south and Raglan street.
5. The formation of the footpaths and water-channels round portion of block 17.
6. The metalling of that portion of York street lying between Cecil and Clarendon streets.
7. The metalling of Coventry street between Cecil and Clarendon streets.

The following works are now in progress, viz.:—

1. The formation, metalling, kerbing and channelling of portions of York street east and west.
2. The formation, kerbing and channelling of Coventry place.
3. The completion, metalling, kerbing and channelling of that portion of Clarendon street between York street and the Beach road.
4. The kerbing, channelling and metalling of Cecil street between Dorcas street and the Beach road.
5. The metalling of Ferrers street between Bank street and the Beach road.
6. Dorcas street, between Cecil and Ferrers streets, has also been excavated to the permanent level by the contractor for the formation of the south footpath of the Sandridge road, for the sake of the earth excavated, and therefore without cost to the council. The streets will shortly receive a coating of metal.

SANDRIDGE ROAD.

The south footpath of the Sandridge road has been formed and kerbed from Montague street to the small bridge west of the toll-house; a quantity of metal is now being laid down on

the road, and a contract has been entered into for the repairing and maintenance of the carriage-way.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been passed by the council and assented to by His Excellency the Governor, viz.:—

- Bye-law No. 11.—For the better prevention of fire.
Bye-law No. 12.—For the regulation of water-carriers.
Bye-law No. 13.—To prevent the mischiefs arising from the breaking-in and training of horses in the public streets, thoroughfares and reserves.
Bye-law No. 14.—For the regulation of building operations and the licensing of builders.
A bye-law to prevent the dangers and nuisances arising from the construction of balconies, &c., overhanging or encroaching upon the public footpaths, has been adopted by the council, and submitted for His Excellency's approval.

LIGHTING AND FLAGGING.

Lamps have been erected along the Sandridge road, at the termination of Montague, Ferrers, Cecil and Clarendon streets, and also at the junction of the Sandridge with the Brighton road.

Flagging has been ordered to be laid down on that portion of the eastern footpath of Cecil street between Coventry street and the Beach road.

ANNEXATION OF THE SOUTH BANK OF THE RIVER YARRA.

In accordance with a petition from the residents on the south bank of the River Yarra, which was supported by the council, His Excellency was pleased to annex to the municipality, by proclamation, on 12th February last, the land lying between the south bank of the Yarra and the railway.

RAILWAY COMPANY.

The difference which existed between the directors of the Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway Company and the municipal council, owing to the company having refused to perform certain works incumbent on them by their act of incorporation, have been amicably arranged, by the company paying over to the council the sum of £3750; in consideration of which they have been relieved from the formation of a portion of York street, and of the approaches to Bridport street, Lucan street, and the three-chain road.

The long pending question touching the construction of a bridge over the railway, in the line of Clarendon street, is still unsettled, chiefly owing to the frequent changes that have taken place in the Government. Application had been made by the Attorney General to the Judges of the Supreme Court for a mandamus to compel the railway company to construct the bridge, but on account of a technical defect in the preliminaries, the rule was discharged. The law officers of the Crown have again been put in motion, and there is no doubt whatever of the ultimate result. Meantime the Railway Board have shown a disposition to settle the question amicably, and the next half-yearly report will probably contain the announcement that the road to the Yarra is in progress, if not actually completed.

ORPHAN ASYLUM.

The council considering that it would be highly advantageous to the district if this institution were altogether removed, and the large portion of land now occupied thereby appropriated for other purposes, have been in communication both with the Asylum Committees and the Government on the subject. The matter will continue to receive attention.

TREES.

The planting of the trees along the footpaths in the principal streets has been deferred for another year, in accordance with the expressed wishes of the ratepayers.

POSTAL IMPROVEMENTS.

At the instance of the council, several important postal improvements have been promised by the Postmaster General, and will shortly be carried out.

BUILDING ACT.

The council have had under consideration the framing of a Building Act suited to the requirements of the district.
