PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of
 the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General
 and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and
 Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS a certain building has been erected at Belfast,
 in the county of Villiers, at the public expense, as and
 for a lock-up for police purposes: And whereas it is deemed
 expedient to proclaim such building to be a gaol within the
 meaning of an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative
 Council of the said colony, passed in the sixteenth year of the
 Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "An Act to make pro-
 vision for the better control and disposal of Offenders:" Now
 therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, in
 pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, do hereby pro-
 claim the said building, called and known as the police lock-up,
 situated at Belfast, in the county of Villiers, as and to be a
 public gaol, prison and house of correction, within the meaning
 of the said Act, for the district of Belfast aforesaid.

TOLLS ON MAIN ROADS.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander
 of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General
 and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-
 Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the hand of the
 Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the
 fourteenth day of May, in the year One thousand eight hundred
 and fifty-seven, certain rates of tolls therein specified were
 authorised to be collected at all toll-bars, toll-gates and toll-
 houses then erected or thereafter to be erected on main roads
 by the Central Road Board of the said colony, under the provi-
 sions of an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative
 Council of the said colony, passed in the seventeenth year of
 Her present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to amend an
 Act intituled 'An Act for making and improving Roads in the
 Colony of Victoria;'" And whereas it is deemed expedient to
 alter the said rates of tolls: Now I, Sir Henry Barkly, the
 Governor of Victoria, in pursuance of the said Act, do hereby
 alter the rates of tolls specified in the said Proclamation, and I
 do hereby declare and direct that the tolls hereinafter stated, and
 no greater, shall be payable and collected at all toll-bars, toll-
 gates, and toll-houses now erected or hereafter to be erected on
 main roads by the said Central Road Board of Victoria, under
 the provisions of the said Act, in lieu and instead of the rates
 of tolls specified in the said Proclamation, that is to say:—

PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.

KYNETON.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition to His Excellency hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and fifty-six householders of the town of Kyneton, in the county of Dalhousie.

By His Excellency's Command,

The petitioners state that the town of Kyneton has of late vastly increased in population and importance, and may now be classed among the most flourishing inland towns in Victoria.

That it is contained within an area of nine square miles, and comprises a population of householders of one hundred and fifty and upwards, and that no one point in such area is distant more than six miles from any other point.

That several local improvements and institutions are being introduced into the said town, as lighting it with gas, and the petitioners believe that it would tend materially to the stability, progress and improvement of the town if it were constituted a municipal district.

That a considerable portion of the roads and streets of the town are still unformed, and owing to the rich alluvial soil are almost impassable in the wet season, and the petitioners are desirous of metalling, lighting and draining the same.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

“Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that Your Excellency may be pleased to take into your favorable consideration the subject matter of this petition, and to declare by Your Excellency's proclamation the town a municipal district, according to the proclaimed boundary of the town of Kyneton, under the name of ‘The Kyneton Municipal District,’ pursuant to the provisions of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15.”

MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.

COUNTER-PETITION, FITZ ROY WARD.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a counter-petition (presented to His Excellency on the 16th instant) as hereinafter set forth, and signed by thirteen hundred and eight resident householders and owners of property situate in Fitz Roy ward, in the city of Melbourne, such counter-petition being in opposition to a petition previously presented from the same ward, and gazetted on the 19th ultimo.

The counter-petitioners state that they are resident householders and owners of property in Fitz Roy ward, Melbourne, and have learned with deep regret that a portion of the rate-payers have taken steps to obtain its separation from the city, and its formation into a municipality.

That they are of opinion that the arguments and accounts adduced in favor of separation are erroneous and calculated to mislead, separation not being advisable.

That instead of the corporate revenue being insufficient by £36,000 to meet current expenses and keep in moderate repair the made streets, as calculated with questionable care by the advocates for separation, they estimate the revenue for the current year at £55,000, and the interest on the Gabrielli loan at £27,000, thus leaving £28,000 to meet the cost of management, repairs, scavenging, &c.

That they believe that the proposition made in the City Council to raise a further loan of £300,000, dwelt upon as impolitic, will not be carried out.

That in quoting from official returns the heavy charges for the staff and management of the city corporation for the year ending 31st August, 1856, the petitioners for separation concealed the fact that the same returns indicate an expenditure in that year of upwards of £130,000 of the Gabrielli loan for public works and special improvements whereby extended and professional supervision was necessitated. The counter-petitioners estimate the cost of management for the present year at less than £9000.

That the plea of the unequal representation of Fitz Roy ward rests merely on proportional acreage, and cannot be sustained, for while the assessed annual value of property in the ward for the year 1857 is £102,960, that of the city is £672,560.

That they are unwilling to relinquish their interest as citizens in the valuable city markets and buildings, or in the flagging (worth £10,000), which the corporation offers to the citizens on liberal terms.

That they feel convinced that the separation of the ward would be prejudicial to its interests, and expose it to influences operating in other municipalities, where (the counter-petitioners state) it is unfortunately known that public interests are sacrificed to party feeling; and that their interests and the

interests of the ward generally will be safer in the hands of the experienced council of the city (of whose shortcomings they are fully aware) rather than in the management of a new council, under whose care they fear a repetition of the jobbery and self-seeking which are happily now being eradicated from the corporation of Melbourne.

And the counter-petitioners pray as follows:—

“Your petitioners therefore most humbly and urgently pray that your Excellency will take their case into your most serious consideration, and that your Excellency will be pleased to favorably entertain our petition by refusing to grant a separation from the city of Melbourne.”

RICHMOND MUNICIPALITY.

SECOND PETITION FOR ALTERATION OF BOUNDARIES.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition as hereinafter set forth, signed by two hundred and eight householders resident within the municipal district of Richmond.

The petitioners state that by a Proclamation bearing date 18th February, 1857, the boundaries of the municipal district of Richmond were declared to be as follow:—“Commencing at a point in the centre of Victoria street due north of the eastern boundary of Hoddle street; thence by a line passing through the centre of Victoria street, and produced thence due east to the River Yarra; thence by the western and northern banks of the River Yarra to the Punt road; and thence by the eastern side of the Punt road and Hoddle street to the commencing point.”

That the Punt road and Hoddle street from the Yarra to Victoria street are at present within the city of Melbourne, but have hitherto been under the control and management of the Central Road Board.

That several of the petitioners represented to the municipal council of Richmond the impassable condition of Hoddle street, and were informed that that street being beyond the municipal limits, the council could not legally expend its funds in making it.

That applications have also been made to the Central Road Board and the Government by the municipal council and by the inhabitants of the district respecting the state of Hoddle street, and the petitioners are informed that it has been arranged between the Government and the municipal council to place the control and management of the Punt road and Hoddle street, and also of the Richmond punt, in the hands of the municipal council.

That they are desirous that such arrangement should be at once carried into effect, Hoddle street being impassable, and access to the premises adjoining it nearly impracticable, and all the residents on the eastern side of that street being rated in the municipal district.

That in order to enable the municipal council to apply its funds to making or repairing the said road and street, they are informed the municipal boundaries will require to be altered so as to include such road and street; and in order to give the council the proper control and management of the punt, a portion of the road on the south side of the Yarra opposite the punt should also be included within the municipal boundary.

Lastly, that the area of the municipal district, if extended as proposed, will still not be nine square miles.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

“Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that the limits and boundaries of the municipal district of Richmond may be extended to the western side of the Punt road and Hoddle street, between the north side of the River Yarra Yarra and the south side of Victoria street, and thence further north across Victoria street to a point parallel with the commencing point referred to in the before-mentioned Proclamation of 18th February, 1857, and thence east to such commencing point, and that the boundary may be extended to the south side of the river, so as to include so much of the road there opposite the punt as may be necessary (say one square chain) for the proper working the punt and collecting the tolls.”

THE mean temperature of the air at Melbourne for the quarter did not differ much from that of the same period in 1856. The means for each month were as follow:—

April.—The thermometer in shade exceeded 80° on three days, 70° on eleven days, 60° on fifteen days, and 50° on one day. The weather was very agreeable during the month; many days were fine, clear and moderately warm, with light southerly winds.

May.—The thermometer in shade exceeded 60° on fifteen days, 50° on fifteen days, and 40° on one day. During the month of May, 1856, the mean temperature for which was 1.5° higher than that for the same month in 1857, obscure grey clouds and drizzle were frequently observed, and the mean of the lowest temperatures at night was 48°, while in May, 1857, the nights were usually clear, and the mean of all the lowest temperatures was 45.6°. The means of the highest temperatures in each year were nearly the same, differing only 0.1°.

June.—The thermometer in shade exceeded 60° on three days, rose to 60° on one day, exceeded 50° on twenty-three days, and 40° on three days. Fog was often present, with drizzle and light showers of rain. June, 1856, was unusually cloudy, and the temperatures at night were higher than during the month last past, differing 1.8°. The mean of the highest temperatures was, in June, 1856, 56.0°, and in June, 1857, 55.7°, the mean amount of cloud being the same at 3½ p.m. for each month.

The mean temperature of the dew-point was 0.5° less than the mean for the same quarter in 1856.

The mean degree of humidity (complete saturation = 1.000)

The mean amount of Ozone, at Melbourne, according to Schonbein's ozonometer, increased steadily from the commencement of the quarter. The mean numbers recorded during the prevalence of each wind, and the mean results for each month, were as follow:—

And if we compare the autumn of 1856 with the same season in 1857, we find that during the former the fall of rain was 10.54 inches, and during the latter 6.79 inches. The deficiency of rain has been even greater inland than near the coast.

A lunar rainbow was seen at Beechworth on the 6th May.

Hail fell at Beechworth on the 3rd May.

Snow fell at Mount Egerton on the 3rd and 22nd May; at Creswick on the 22nd May; at Mount Macedon on the 3rd and 22nd May; on the 10th, 21st, 25th, 29th and 30th* June; and at Beechworth on the morning of the 23rd May.

Hoar frost was observed at Melbourne on the 17th May; at Creswick on the 16th, 17th, 18th, 20th and 29th May, and on the 1st, 5th, 12th, 14th, 15th, 16th and 17th June; at Ballarat on the 16th, 17th, 18th, 29th, 30th and 31st May, and on the 1st, 5th, 12th, 14th, 15th, 16th and 17th June; at Heathcote on the 7th, 11th, 12th, 15th, 16th, 17th, 18th, 19th, 20th and 21st May, and on the 3rd, 7th, 13th, 16th, 17th and 26th June; and at Beechworth, Mount Macedon and Yan Yean it was frequently seen, shallow pools being occasionally frozen.

Apples (second crop) were moderately well formed in May, and some were partially ripe. The second crops of this fruit are said to be generally small and sour, but this season they attained to an unusual perfection.

Vines were generally divested of leaves in June.

Barley sown early for green fodder was in ear in June, and other crops were in a forward state.

The Aphis Brassicae appeared in great numbers during the quarter. It attacked the cabbage, turnip, and other culinary vegetables, and in June it was observed in great numbers on the Acacia.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS.

DUNOLLY.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the District of Dunolly:—

xxxiii. *Roads and Government reserves.*—Should a lead of gold be found to go under any surveyed ground or Government reserve, or under any other road or tract not having been surveyed, the local court have power to determine the desirability and manner of working the same, also paying strict attention to the public safety and convenience.

xxxiv. *Water-holes for domestic use.*—On the application of any twelve persons residing in a particular locality, the court may grant permission to the applicants to enclose and preserve for their special use a well for domestic purposes.

xxxv. *Quartz mining—the wall.*—In all cases a wall of three feet shall be left between the claims of different parties, and when any miner or party of miners, in marking a new claim, shall have neglected to leave the proper space for the wall, it shall be competent for the warden to deduct the necessary length from the claim last marked and assign it as a wall between such claims and the claim first marked, and the wall

being the common property of the parties adjoining, no party shall take down, mine into or remove any such wall without first obtaining the consent in writing of the owners of the adjoining claim.

xxxvi. *Quartz mining—claims to be pegged.*—All parties marking out claims on quartz reefs shall do so by two pegs, one at each end of the claim, on the line of the supposed course of the reef. The pegs shall be at least four feet above the ground, and must be kept visible during the working of the claim.

xxxvii. *Former rules of Avoca district repealed.*—All local court rules and regulations in force in the district before the 15th April, 1857, are hereby rescinded.

xxxviii. *Wall to be propped.*—In alluvial sinkings, where a party takes out the wall between their and the adjoining claims such party shall secure the ground by props not more than three feet apart along the entire length of the wall taken out.

xxxix. *Where shafts are to be sunk.*—In all cases, except when some natural obstruction occurs, shafts must be sunk in the centre of the claim, and such centre of the shaft shall in all cases, except where such obstruction occurs, be taken as the starting-point of measurement in all cases of dispute.

xl. *Registration of quartz claims.*—Any party having spent a large amount of labor and time in prospecting a quartz claim, and who are forced to relinquish it through sickness, want of funds, or other urgent causes, may be permitted, on application to the local court, to register their claim for one month at a time. A notice of such application shall be given to the clerk of the local court, and also posted on a conspicuous part of the claim at least seven days before the court will entertain such application, and if granted a notice of registration shall be furnished by the clerk of the court, containing the date and names of the party, which notice shall be posted on the claim registered.

Miners registering for want of funds may work in alluvial ground partly worked and abandoned, or in any other claim for wages.

xli. *Quartz mining—claims not to be left.*—No miner or party of miners shall be allowed to hold his or their claims unworked for a period of more than three clear working days, except the same is registered, and if beyond that period the claim shall be considered abandoned.

xlii. *Extended claims.*—The first party commencing to prospect a new reef, or an abandoned reef, shall be privileged to mark off triple claims, and, upon discovering payable gold, shall, upon application to the warden, be entitled to hold the same.

xliii. *Chinese encampment.*—No Chinese encampment shall be permitted within one-fourth of a mile of any township boundary, or within two hundred yards of any surveyed line of road, and a space of at least ten feet shall be left between each tent in such encampment, and all such shall be removed within fourteen days from the day on which this regulation shall have been assented to.

xliii. *Water privileges.*—Water privileges for puddling machines, sluice washing, &c., will only be granted by the court on the recommendation of the warden, in order that due care may be taken to guard against conferring such privileges in places where the permanent supply of water may be injured, or the natural water-courses obstructed by the operation.

The rule No. ii. of the Dunolly local court, gazetted on the 15th April, 1857, is hereby rescinded.

xlv. *Alteration in Rule iv. of First Regulations.*—In rule No. iv., gazetted on the 15th April, instead of the words, "it shall be competent for the warden," read "it shall be competent for the local court."

The foregoing Regulations, Nos. xxxiii. to xlv., have been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

LOCAL COURT REGULATIONS. TARADALE.

REGULATIONS made by the Local Court of the District of Taradale:—

i. *Repeal of former regulations.*—As it is expedient that the mining rules and regulations of this gold field, passed from time to time by the local court of the district of Castlemaine, and assented to by the Governor, should be revised and consolidated, all rules and regulations therefore which at any time previous to the date hereof have been passed and assented to, shall be repealed and the following substituted in lieu of them, so soon as the same shall have been assented to by His Excellency the Governor.

ii. *Interpretation of the word claim.*—For the purpose of these regulations the word "claim" shall be understood to mean the portion of Crown land which each person or company shall be entitled to occupy or to occupy and mine in, under any document, license or lease issued by authority; also that portion of land assigned to any person or persons by any warden or other competent officer, and which may be occupied by any dwelling place or stable, with a reasonable amount of ground around them, or by any dam or waterhole, machine,

private cart road, drain, or as drainage ground for the supply of water to any engine, mill or machine.

iii. *Extent of claim.*—The extent of claim to which each miner's right shall entitle the holder shall be—

For 1 miner, 12 feet by 12 feet
For 2 miners, 12 " 24 "
For 3 miners, 18 " 24 "
For 4 miners, 24 " 24 "

beyond which no greater area (except as provided for by rules of the local court) will be granted, unless where it can be proved satisfactorily that two or more parties of miners taking up claims in the usual manner on worked or flooded ground, can, by combining, overcome any natural difficulties which may exist by means not detrimental to the interests of the public or authorised miners, such combinations may be authorised under the distinct condition that the ground must be worked by the same number of miners as would be required were it divided into the smaller claims. Any such combinations of miners must be in possession of a written sanction from the warden, to be produced when required.

iv. *Extent of claim on old ground.*—On ground previously worked or abandoned, the extent of claim shall be, for one miner 36 feet by 36 feet, and for two miners 50 feet by 50 feet, beyond which no greater area shall be granted in one claim, unless it can be proved satisfactorily that two or more parties of miners taking up claims in the usual manner, can, by combining, overcome any natural difficulties which may exist, by means not detrimental to the interest of the public or other authorised miners, such combination may be authorised, under the distinct condition that the ground must be worked by the same number of miners as would be required were it worked in separate claims; any such party of miners must be in possession of a written sanction from the local court.

v. *Extent of claim for deep sinking.*—The local court wishing to encourage miners in prospecting and working deep and hard hills, extends the claim of each miner to 24 feet square, provided the depth of sinking exceeds thirty-five (35) feet.

vi. *Working or clearing beds of creeks.*—Where the working or clearing beds of creeks or water-holes would be no injury to the public, written permission may be granted to parties of miners to undertake the same. The portion of such beds of creeks or water-holes allowed to each miner, will be twelve (12) yards in length irrespective of the breadth. Such conditions relative to the working of such beds of creeks and water-holes as the interest of the public may require will be imposed, and if deemed expedient a sum of money as a deposit may be taken from each miner to ensure the due performance of the same.

vii. *Sluice washing, &c.*—Sluice washing or other water privileges will be allowed only by special sanction, in order that care may be taken to guard against conferring the privilege in places where the permanent supply of water may be injured by the operation. When a party of miners have received permission for sluice washing or other privileges, they may obtain a written sanction from the officer authorising it. Such privileges will in all cases be subject to the rules of the local court of the district approved of by the Governor.

viii. *Applications.*—All applications for extended alluvial claims shall be made in writing to the clerk of the local court, and prior to such application being entertained, the surveyor, or other duly authorised person, shall inspect such ground and report thereon to the court.

ix. *Extent of quartz claims.*—In all cases, unless otherwise provided for, the extent to each party or company of miners on the line of any quartz reef or vein shall be at the rate of twenty (20) feet for every person in possession of his miner's right, not exceeding the total number of twelve (12) then and there actually engaged in such claim, or employed in extracting gold from stone or other substance, the product of such claim only. Provided that in all cases where any party of miners is only sinking or driving in search of gold, and has not found it in such quantity as to have induced them to extract it from the substance it was imbedded in, then in such case only one half the number of men, in proportion to the extent of claim, shall be required to be working in it; and in case the total number of shareholders in the claim shall be an uneven number, then in such case one may be deducted from the total number, and one half of the remainder must be in a *bonâ fide* manner employed in the claim.

x. *Amalgamation of quartz claims.*—Parties of miners holding adjoining quartz claims may combine for the purpose of expediting their work by the introduction of machinery; the areas of amalgamated claims shall in all cases be proportionate to the number of men holding miner's rights in such company. In no case will amalgamated claims be permitted without a written sanction from the warden.

xi. *Extent of quartz claim to be in proportion to men employed.*—Except in cases otherwise provided for, the extent of claim shall be absolutely in proportion to the number of authorised miners then and there actually engaged on the claim, or employed in extracting the gold by any process from any stone, washing stuff, or other substance taken from the claim, provided that where any party of miners are only sinking or driving in search of gold, only one half the number of men in proportion to the extent of claim shall be required to be working upon it. But immediately upon reaching stone, earth, or other substance containing gold, the total number of shareholders or laborers for whom ground is claimed must be employed on the ground as aforesaid.

xii. *Marking of claims.*—All leases, quartz, extended alluvial and registered claims shall be marked by posts placed firmly in the ground, three feet high above the surface, and painted white, with the number of lease or claim and area occupied painted on the inner side facing the ground so occupied. All claims held for mining purposes (and not provided for as above) shall be properly marked at the corners by posts or pegs 1½ foot above the surface and always kept distinguishable.

xiii. *Walls between claims.*—In all cases a wall shall be left between the claims of different parties of miners, viz.:—between quartz claims a wall of three (3) feet, and between alluvial claims a wall of two (2) feet, such wall not to be worked without the consent in writing of both parties. And all parties shall keep their banks and walls properly timbered to the satisfaction of the warden or other visiting inspector of mining operations. Should any miner or miners, in marking off a claim neglect to leave the proper space for the wall, it shall be competent for the warden to deduct such space for wall from the claim last marked off; and should any miner mark off more than the proper width for such wall the warden may curtail such excess, and assign it as he shall deem it advisable, or may order the boundary posts to be removed to their proper relative positions.

xiv. *Plurality of claims.*—No miner or party of miners shall hold at one and the same time more than one claim, nor hold any claim in reserve or unworked (except claims specially registered), and if so left for three (3) clear working days, it shall be considered abandoned, unless that in all cases where a miner holds more than one claim, he or they employ in a *bona fide* manner in or upon such claims in exact proportion to their extent the number of authorised miners required by these regulations.

Neither shall the holders of any claim in a quartz reef be allowed to hold the same by drawing water at intervals, or performing any other merely nominal work, if such claim could be or is being worked in the ordinary manner.

xv. *Registration of claims.*—A party sinking for or on a quartz vein, who are compelled to abandon the same for want of means, shall be allowed to register their claim for one month at a time, provided the claim shall be sufficiently worked to justify the court in allowing such privilege. Any party who shall have expended considerable labor on an alluvial claim, and may be unable to obtain the reward of their labor through flooding or other uncontrollable circumstances, shall be allowed to register such claims as unworkable. But the allowing of such registration shall be at the discretion of the local court. Notice to be given one week previous and posted on the claim.

xvi. *Prospecting.*—For the encouragement of prospecting, persons discovering any new gold workings may have allotted to them, by special sanction, an extent of ground equal to double or treble the ordinary area of mining claims, provided the discovery be made public without unnecessary delay.

xvii. *Miners uniting for the purpose of prospecting.*—The holder or holders of any claim on a supposed quartz reef, vein, or lead of gold in alluvial ground, who shall contribute with other miners, and in proportion to the extent of claim, to the common expense of sinking any prospecting shaft, situated within a distance of fifty yards, and not more from any part of his or their claim, for the purpose of ascertaining the existence, position and character of such reef, vein, or lead of gold, shall be entitled to hold such claim unworked until the existence, position and true character of the auriferous deposit has been ascertained and determined, or until such prospecting shall have ceased to be carried on in a satisfactory manner.

xviii. *Auriferous ore to be stacked.*—Any person wishing to retain possession of quartz, stone casing, or other substance containing gold, the product of a claim, shall properly stack such quartz or other substance on ground not supposed to be workable, and erect close to such stack a post, with his name, address, and date of stacking legibly painted thereon. No person shall remove, deface or damage any post so erected, quartz, stone, or other substance stacked in accordance with this regulation. And it shall be competent for the warden to declare relinquished, after twelve (12) months in quartz claims, and six (6) months in alluvial claims, any stone casing, wash dirt, or other substance not so stacked and taken from a claim then abandoned.

xix. *Leases.*—Leases for mining auriferous lands may be approved for periods not exceeding twelve (12) months; such leases will be renewable, provided the regulations of the local court be complied with, but in every case subject to the recommendation of the court. Alluvial lands partially worked and abandoned in square or rectangular blocks, and quartz reefs with the dip or underlay, may be leased in areas proportionate to the number of miners and the description and power of machinery. Applicants for said leases to state in writing to the clerk of the court (having previously pegged the ground as in ordinary cases) the number of hands they guarantee to employ, and the description and power of machinery they will have actually at work within a given time of the date of application.

xx. *Claims upon which steam or other machinery is employed.*—To encourage the introduction of steam power and machinery in general, the court will grant areas of claim of such extent as shall be considered applicable to the locality applied for, and miners and machinery to be employed. Immediately below such grant shall be left an area not less than that occupied by such engine party, for the benefit of ordinary miners, through the length of which shall the engine party be required to construct

a water course to carry off their waste water, that it may not injure the ordinary miner.

xxi. *Deposit of refuse soil.*—All leaseholders shall be compelled to deposit the soil from their excavations within the boundaries of their stakes, or upon the ground not workable by the ordinary miner.

xxii. *Applicants and petitioners' names in full.*—Applicants applying for leases, and petitioners against, should give their names, surnames, present trade or pursuit, and a particular description of where they live, or the names not to be counted.

xxiii. *Employment of laborers on claims.*—Any storekeeper, merchant or other persons desirous of holding a quartz or other claim (without working personally in such claim) may do so by placing laborers upon the said ground proportionate to the extent of claim.

xxiv. *Erection of machinery.*—Any party requiring ground whereon to erect machinery shall make a written application to the clerk of the local court, notice of such application to be posted on the ground applied for, and on the court house for eight (8) days. If no sufficient objections to such permission shall have been made in writing, the court may allow the exclusive possession (except as against the Crown only), by the occupant of such ground.

xxv. *Management of quartz-crushing machines.*—All machinists crushing quartz for the public, shall keep on the premises a correct weighing machine and shall weigh the quartz by avoirdupois weight, viz., 112 pounds to the hundredweight. The premises connected with all such quartz-crushing machines shall be enclosed, and the quartz (if circumstances compel it to be detained in the premises overnight) shall be deposited under a covered shed, and accommodation afforded for a watchman, when required by the owners of quartz.

xxvi. *Water privileges.*—Any person or persons desirous of making and holding any water-hole, race or dam, to contain water, shall make application to the warden, and post a notice of such application on the site applied for one week, when if it can be satisfactorily proved that no injury will result to the public by conferring such a privilege a written authority may be given to such applicant. All such reservoirs (where practicable) to be constructed on the side of the gully or flat, and excavated to the bed rock.

xxvii. *Puddling machines, sludge, &c.*—No machine for puddling auriferous earth by horse or steam power, shall be erected in any place where any number of miners may be obtaining their livelihood by sinking, nor shall any such machine be placed on workable ground supposed to contain gold in a payable quantity, nor in any place where the sludge from such machine shall be injurious to other mining operations or the supply of water. All parties discharging sludge or water from an engine, mill, machine or other apparatus, shall make a good and proper drain, to join and fall into the main channel or drain of the gully or flat in which such machine is situated. Should there exist no main channel for the effectual carrying off of sludge or superfluous water, the local court may direct the owners of such machines to make a general drain, and shall prescribe the course and position, depth and inclination, removal of obstructions, the allotment of work amongst the different owners, or such other directions as they may deem desirable. In no case shall such water or sludge be allowed to run upon or across any public road or footpath in common use, or on workable ground, to the detriment of other miners.

xxviii. *Mining partnerships.*—All persons engaged in entering into any partnership or company for mining purposes shall draw up and attest a written agreement specifying the object, intentions and property of such company or partnership.

xxix. *Waterholes.*—Any person wishing to preserve a water-hole for domestic purposes must make application to the warden, and if deemed by him expedient an authority in writing will be given to set apart the same, when the applicant must erect an upright pole over the hole crossed by two bars of wood (thus †), and any person maliciously destroying or injuring the same shall, upon conviction for every such offence, be adjudged to pay a fine not exceeding twenty shillings.

xxx. *Mining in private tents or buildings.*—Any person mining within his private tent or building on the waste lands of the Crown shall, on conviction before any justice of the peace, be adjudged to pay a penalty under the 23rd section of the Act 18 Victoria No. 37.

The foregoing Regulations, Nos. 1 to xxx., have been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.
