## EXAMINATION OF MINING SURVEYORS.

AT a meeting of the Committee of Examiners of the Board of Science the following notice to Mining Surveyors was ordered to be published:—

### EXAMINATION.

Mining surveyors will be examined by written or printed papers in the following subjects:—

1. Questions in surface and underground surveying.
2. Questions in general geological principles applicable to mining districts.
3. Methods of discriminating the principal rocks, ores, and simple minerals of common occurrence.
4. Mining engineering, including construction of machinery and elementary dynamics.

Each surveyor, in addition to the above examination, will be required to write an account of the mining regulations and practice of the district for which he seeks to be licensed.

Surveyors who have satisfactorily passed the above examinations, will be required, *viva voce*, to explain mining models, and show the methods of using instruments.

Examinations will be held twice in each year.

Surveyors intending to present themselves must notify their intention to the secretary of the Board of Science, on or before the first Monday in September and the first Monday in March.

ARARAT MINING DISTRICT.

No. VI.—BYE-LAW REGULATING QUARTZ MINING.—[30th June, 1858.]

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Ararat, begun and holden at the Shamrock Hotel, Oxford street, Ararat, in the said district, on the 30th day of June, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

1. That all parties occupying quartz claims under the old mining regulations of this district shall be entitled to retain undisturbed possession of the same, whether they be held by them as capitalists or individual miners; the said parties may hire men to work them or otherwise as they may think fit, so long as the number of duly authorised miners shall be employed on, or in connection with, such claims, in proportion to the ground occupied; and all gold in or upon any quartz claim in this district shall be deemed to be vested in the employer only; and no hired miner, on any pretence whatever, shall have any right to keep or take possession of any claim, or portion of a claim, that may be vested in any other party who may have taken him in or upon such claim as a hired laborer until after the expiration of one week from the time of his dismissal therefrom, although it may not have been worked by the proper number of men, or in the manner prescribed by this bye-law.

2. That all parties marking out quartz claims after this bye-law is in force, shall do so by fixing two (2) posts firmly in the ground, not less than two (2) feet above the surface of the same, in substance not less than three (3) inches square, or four (4) inches in diameter, which must in all cases be kept visible until the claim thus indicated is abandoned.

3. Three (3) feet of neutral ground shall be left by the last party marking out a claim, which may be worked by either or both of the adjoining claimholders, or if necessary for the safety or protection of miners employed in such claims, may be left standing as a wall, until both parties mutually agree to divide or otherwise dispose of the same, but in no case will walls be allowed between the holders of less than forty feet shares.

4. In all cases where any party neglects to leave the proper thickness of wall it shall be competent for the warden to deduct the necessary thickness from the last party marking out, and assign it as a wall between such party and the adjoining claimholders; and in like manner when any party shall have marked out too much ground, it shall be competent for the warden to curtail any such claim, and assign such spare ground to any miner first claiming the same; or should the warden deem it advisable, he may order the boundary posts of any claim to be removed to their proper position; but in no case shall any warden order boundary posts to be removed beyond the limits of a single share, that is, beyond the extent of twenty (20) feet.

5. The share of vein or lode allowed shall be for

One miner twenty (20) feet,  
Two miners forty (40) feet,  
Three miners sixty (60) feet,  
Four miners eighty (80) feet,  
Five miners one hundred (100) feet

in length, and no larger sized claim shall be allowed, but any two of such full sized claims, or any greater number of shares than five (5) to the extent of ten (10) may be amalgamated at any time by complying with the conditions of the bye-law relating to the amalgamation of claims, and any lesser number of miners than five (5) shall be allowed to work their shares conjointly or separately, as it may appear to them advantageous or expedient.

6. When any party shall take up and occupy a claim or share on any lode or vein of quartz, he shall be entitled to mark and hold a breadth of claim equal to three hundred (300) feet altogether, and such breadth shall be square with the supposed line of the lode or vein, and may if the adjoining ground is unoccupied be marked off in any position such party may select, and also shifted from time to time if such party thinks proper so to do; and every lode or vein of quartz of whatever thickness lying within and beneath such boundaries shall be deemed to belong to such claim, but no party shall be allowed to follow, nor shall he follow, the underlie of any lode or vein across the boundary of any adjoining occupied claim.

7. When the dividing boundaries between any two or more claims on the same lode or vein of quartz have to be marked off, and the owners of such claims cannot agree as to the general line of the lode or vein, it shall be competent for the warden or warden and assessors, after due enquiry, to fix upon an approximate line, which when laid down shall govern the dividing line then in dispute; or if sufficient evidence as to the course of the lode or vein cannot be produced to enable them or him to arrive at a satisfactory conclusion, it shall be competent for the warden to adjourn the hearing of the case until the lode or vein be more

fully developed, and to make such an order as he may deem necessary for the protection of all parties concerned, until the boundaries in dispute be settled upon.

8. Within four (4) days of the time of marking out all parties shall begin to work at their claims in a *bonâ fide* manner, and if payable gold has been struck shall continue to do so every lawful day with a full complement of men until the same be abandoned; but in all cases where payable gold has not been struck, or where a claim can be proven not to pay, one-half the specified number of men shall be sufficient; and should the shareholders of any claim be of an uneven number, then in such case, one may be deducted from the total number, and one-half of the remainder shall be sufficient to work such claim until payable gold has been obtained; Provided always and in all cases, that within twenty-four (24) hours of the time of marking out, the names of all the shareholders, together with the date and number of their miners' rights, written in English, in a legible hand shall be posted on some conspicuous part of every claim taken up, and every such notice must be kept posted until the claim be abandoned; but in cases where parties have amalgamated, notice to that effect signed by all the shareholders will be sufficient.

9. Ten (10) minutes previous to the discharge of any blast of gunpowder or other explosive substance within (100) one hundred feet of the surface of the ground, due notice of such discharge shall be given by some person working in the claim where such discharge is about to take place to all other persons working within a distance of one hundred (100) yards from the place of such discharge; and they shall also, when such place is within one hundred (100) yards of any public road or thoroughfare, properly warn any person who may be passing that such discharge is about to take place; and in all cases where proper warning has not been given any person working in any such claim shall be held responsible for the neglect.

10. Any party in possession of a quartz claim in which at least three (3) months *bonâ fide* work has been done by two or more miners, or in which they shall have sunk a shaft or made any drive or drives from such shaft of the depth or depth and length conjoined of one hundred (100) feet, may on application obtain from the warden a registered certificate authorising such applicant to hold such claim unworked for the space of three (3) months; and if at the end of three (3) months the holders of such certificate can show that they are still unable to proceed with their work for want of means or other reasonable cause, the warden may renew the same for any reasonable length of time: Provided always that notice to the adjoining claim holders be given at least eight (8) days prior to any such certificate being granted or renewed; and all adjoining claim holders shall have the right to object to any such certificate being granted or renewed, and where any reasonable objection shall be made no such certificate shall be granted or renewed excepting in cases of great hardship and individual enterprise.

11. All parties registering their claims shall at once post a copy of the registration certificate, signed by the warden, on some conspicuous part of their claim, which must be kept legible by them until such time as they may retake possession of the same, and shall cover up the mouth of their shaft in such a manner as will prevent its being flooded to the injury of surrounding claimholders, and shall also leave it with such an appearance so as to leave no doubt of its being registered; and any person or persons found disturbing or interfering with any registered claim, or damaging the property connected therewith, or of doing any act that shall cause a loss to the owners thereof, shall be deemed to have made a breach of this bye-law, and shall be liable for the penalty attached thereto.

12. Any party wishing to retain possession of any quartz, stone, or other substance, the produce of a quartz claim, may do so for any period of time not exceeding one year, although the claim from which it may have been taken has been abandoned: Provided they stack the same in a proper manner upon ground supposed not payable for mining purposes, and erect and maintain close to such stack a post with name, place of residence, and date of stacking legibly printed thereon; and no person or persons shall remove, deface, or damage any such post, quartz, stone, or other substance, unless declared abandoned by the warden of the division in which such forfeiture has taken place.

13. The warden at any time may declare any such quartz, stone, or other substance taken from any claim then abandoned to be forfeited unless stacked in a proper manner and the aforesaid notice kept posted thereon; and in like manner where parties may be waiting the arrival of machinery to crush such quartz, stone, or other substance, he may grant them any reasonable extension of time to remove the same he may deem to be just; or in the event of the ground on which any such stack has been erected turning out to be of a remunerative nature for mining, he may order the removal thereof to any reasonable distance from the place of its original stacking.

14. In the event of any quartz claim or any number of quartz claims becoming flooded by natural springs or other causes, the warden shall have it in his power to order all claim owners to bale their fair share of water, or in the event of their refusal to order it to be done at their expense; and to give such general order in reference to matters not herein provided for as he may think fit.

15. Notwithstanding anything herein contained the mining board in this district shall have it in their power, at all times,

to give more extended areas of claims than named in this bye-law, on their being applied for in the proper form.

#### ARARAT MINING DISTRICT.

No. VII.—BYE-LAW RELATING TO PROSPECTING.—[1st July, 1858].

At a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Ararat, begun and holden at the Shamrock Hotel, Oxford street, Ararat, in the said district, on the 1st day of July, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

1. Any duly authorised miner or miners testing any unoccupied Crown lands for the purpose of discovering any new lead, tract, or deposit of gold, separate and distinct from any known lead, tract, or deposit of gold, shall be deemed to be a "prospector" or "prospectors," as the case may be, and the act of so doing shall be understood to be "prospecting."

2. Prospectors in the various divisions of mining shall mark out their claims as follows, that is to say:—In surfacing, four (4) pegs, one at each extreme corner of the claim shall be firmly fixed in the ground, and not less than two (2) feet above the surface of the same; and in all other classes of mining two (2) pegs shall be considered sufficient; and at right angles from a line drawn between such two pegs the prospectors shall be entitled to claim frontage to the extent of two hundred (200) feet over all, and such two hundred (200) feet may be taken by such prospectors, either on one or both sides of such pegs, and in any quantity not exceeding two hundred (200) feet, which they may think proper.

3. Any prospector or prospectors having taken possession of a claim under the condition specified above shall be protected in such possession until such claim be properly tested.

4. Any prospector or prospectors discovering gold in payable quantities shall make the same known to the warden of the division without any unnecessary delay whatever, and in the event of any such prospector or prospectors acting contrary to the above specified condition, such prospector or prospectors shall be refused protection for any more ground than the ordinary size of claims specified in the bye-law relative to the same under which such prospecting occurs.

5. On the discovery of gold being made known to the warden, he may authorise any number of miners—not being the prospectors—that he may think proper, to descend the shaft or otherwise enter the working where gold is said to have been obtained, to remove and wash or otherwise test earth or other substance represented to be auriferous; and in the event of the "prospect" or gold—if any be obtained—from and by means of such test being deemed payable by such warden, an extended claim, according to the distance from any known lead at which gold is discovered, and according to the class or division of mining under which such prospecting occurs shall be granted by such warden as provided in the following table:—

The words "with frontage" in the above table shall be understood to mean from reef to reef, or any distance across the course of the lead or gutter not exceeding 200 feet; and the words "along the reef" under the head of quartz mining, shall be understood to mean all the quartz, &c., lying beneath and within such boundaries of such reefs.

6. It shall be lawful for the warden, at the request of any four (4) miners, to authorise any two (2) miners to descend the shaft in any prospecting claim in order to see the probable course of the lead. Such miners shall not remain below any longer than is absolutely necessary for the purpose of inspection, and such visits of inspection shall cease entirely when once gold has been discovered in any other claim on such lead, &c., and any two miners requesting to descend a prospecting shaft shall procure the written authority of the warden for so doing.

7. In all cases where prospecting claims have been granted, such claims shall be held and worked in accordance with and subject to the bye-laws relating to the various classes or divisions of mining under which such claims occur, such as "surfacing," "dry sinkings," "wet sinkings," or "quartz mining."

8. Parties sinking (250) two hundred and fifty yards ahead of any known lead or gutter shall be entitled to a double claim, but without frontage: Provided always that the lead has not been struck by any other party within a distance of fifty (50) yards.

## MUNICIPALITY OF BEECHWORTH.

BYE-LAW No. 23.—FOR EMPOWERING THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF BEECHWORTH TO CLOSE ANY STREET, ROAD, RIGHT-OF-WAY, OR FOOTPATH, DURING THE PROGRESS OF ANY WORKS AFFECTING THE SAME, &c.

WHEREAS the care and control of the roads and streets of this municipality are intrusted to the municipal council thereof by the provisions of the 18 Victoria No. 15: Be it and it is hereby enacted by the municipal council of Beechworth, That from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, it shall be lawful for the said council, or their duly authorised surveyor, to close up and stop against public traffic, any street, road, lane, right-of-way, or footpath, or any portion of any such thoroughfare, in such manner as to them or him shall seem best, during the progress therein, or affecting same, of any works undertaken by the said council or at their instance, or for the purpose of equalising the use and wear of any such thoroughfare or any portion thereof. And be it further enacted by the said council, That any person or persons damaging or removing any barrier of whatever kind, or any notice placed for the above purpose, or in any way making use of any such thoroughfare so closed or stopped up until the same shall have been re-opened by the council for public traffic, shall, upon conviction before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 23, made by the municipal council of Beechworth, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

## MUNICIPALITY OF NEWTOWN AND CHILWELL.

BYE-LAW No. 1.—TO REGULATE, BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS, THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF NEWTOWN AND CHILWELL.

WHEREAS by the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, "An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," section 26, it is enacted, *inter alia*, "that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings:" Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Newtown and Chilwell, That from and after the date of the Governor's assent hereunto, the proceedings and business of the said council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which shall be and be called the Standing Rules and Orders of the said municipal council, that is to say:—

1. That the sittings of this council shall be open to the public, but a majority of the council may require their withdrawal.

2. The council shall commence business so soon after the time stated in the summons as there is a sufficient number of members in attendance to constitute a quorum, but if at the expiry of twenty minutes from the time specified in the summons there is not a quorum present, the meeting shall be adjourned.

3. At all meetings of the council when there are not three members present, or when the council is counted out, such circumstance, together with the names of the members then present, shall be recorded in the minute book.

4. The first business of each meeting of the council shall be to confirm the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereupon except as to the accuracy thereof.

5. The reading of correspondence, the presentation of petitions or memorials by members of the council, and the bringing up of reports of committees shall have precedence of any other regular business.

6. All communications presented to the council must be in the form of petition or memorial, addressed to the municipal council, and be couched in respectful language, for which the presenter must be responsible.

7. On the presentation of a petition no debate shall take place thereon until notice has been given in the usual manner, and the only questions that shall be entertained on the occasion of its presentation shall be, that the petition be received, and on the motion of any councillor may be referred to a committee.

8. All reports of committees shall be considered or adopted on their presentation, and all such reports shall be read and received *pro forma*.

9. The orders of the day shall be:—

All matters arising out of proceedings of former meetings of the council.

Any business the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration.

Any business of which members may have given notice of motion, in writing, to the town clerk, at least one week previously to the meeting at which the same is to be considered; such notices will be considered in the order in which presented.

10. No motion presented on the notice paper shall be proceeded with, unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, in writing, be present when the business is called on; notices not so proceeded with shall lapse.

11. No bye-law shall be finally passed until the next meeting of council after which it was first proposed, and the same shall remain open in the meantime for the inspection of the rate-payers, in the town clerk's office, free of charge.

12. Any member of council giving notice of motion, proposing any petition or address, shall submit therewith a draft of such petition or address, and such draft shall in all cases be referred to the legislative committee, who shall report thereon to the council, and the mover be *pro hac vice* a member of such committee.

13. That any member desirous of making a motion or amendment, or taking part in discussion thereon, shall rise and address the chairman, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down until the member calling to order shall have been heard thereon, and the question of order disposed of, when the member in possession of the chair shall proceed with the subject.

14. That any member desirous of proposing an original motion or amendment must state the nature of the same before he may address the council thereon, and such motion or amendment shall be signed by the mover, and delivered by him, in writing, to the town clerk, who, in the event of its being seconded, shall endorse the name of the seconder thereon. No motion or amendment once brought forward can be withdrawn without the consent of the council.

15. That a member moving a motion shall be held to have spoken thereon; but a member merely seconding a motion shall not be held to have spoken upon it. A member may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the council by directing the chairman's attention to its infringement.

16. No member shall speak twice on the same motion or amendment, except by way of explanation, or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment last proposed; and the chairman shall, without the interposition of the council, call to order any member proceeding to speak a second time on the same motion or amendment. After the reply, the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.

17. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost another may be moved before the original question is put to the vote, but upon that amendment being carried, it takes the position of the original motion, and on that one amendment can be made and no more.

18. That the members in meeting of council shall designate each other by their official titles, namely, that of chairman and councillor.

19. That if two or more members rise to speak at the same time, the chairman shall decide which is entitled to priority.

20. That the chairman, when called upon to decide on points of order or practice, shall state the standing order, rule, or practice which he deems applicable to the case, without discussing or commenting on the same. His decision as to order or explanation in each case to be final.

21. No member shall digress from the subject matter of the question under discussion, or impute improper motives to others, and all personal reflections upon any member shall be considered highly disorderly.

22. That whenever any member shall make use of any expression, personal and disorderly, or capable of being

applied offensively to any other member, the member so offending shall, if required by the chairman, withdraw the expression, and make a satisfactory apology to the council, under a penalty in case of his refusal of not more than Ten pounds.

23. Any member may require the town clerk to take down any particular words used by a member immediately on the same being used.

24. That the chairman shall rise in addressing the council to discuss any question.

25. Any member may of right require the production of any documents of the council relating to the question or matter in discussion.

26. That the council shall vote by show of hands, except in case of elections, when it shall be by voting cards, and all such cards unsigned will not be received, and such voting cards shall be preserved as a record twelve months.

27. That the chairman shall in taking the sense of the council put the question in the affirmative, then in the negative, and the number of votes shall be recorded in the minutes.

28. That if a debate on any motion moved and seconded be interrupted by the council being counted out, such debate may be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted, on motion upon notice.

29. That it shall be competent for any member to move a call of the whole council for the consideration of any subject; if such motion is carried, due notice thereof shall be given by the town clerk, and any member not attending in compliance with the order, shall be liable to a penalty not to exceed Five pounds, unless reasonable cause is shown to the council for his absence; and that when a call of the council has been determined on three clear days' notice must be given.

30. No motion the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council has been duly made for that purpose, and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the council which shall have been negatived by the council, shall be again entertained during the same municipal year.

31. That any member of the council may enter his protest against any resolution of the council; notice of intention to protest must, however, in every case, be given on the adoption of the resolution protested against, and the protest, signed by the member or members protesting, and specifying the reasons for protesting, must be entered twenty-four hours before the next regular meeting of council by the protesting member in a book to be kept for that purpose in the town clerk's office, and duly referred to in the minutes of council, the same to be considered also part of such minutes. But such protest may be expunged if declared by a majority of the council to be not in accordance with truth, or in its terms disrespectful to the council.

32. That all committees shall consist of three members, two to form a quorum, and if any member of committee shall have been absent from three successive meetings of any committee, he shall be considered to have vacated his seat, unless satisfactory cause be shown for his absence to the council; such seat if declared vacant to be filled up by a fresh election.

33. The chairman of the council shall be considered, *ex officio*, chairman of each committee, but shall not be entitled to vote.

34. All meetings of committees to be convened by the chairman or two members of any such committees.

35. That when a special meeting of committee is appointed, the member of council proposing such committee shall be *pro hac vice* a member thereof.

36. That the finance committee shall be at liberty at their discretion to expend not more than Five pounds between each meeting of council.

37. That it shall be in the power of any three members of council to convene a special meeting of the council by requisition to the chairman stating the object of such meeting.

38. All elections to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place after six clear days' notice shall be given by advertisement in one or more newspapers inviting applications, and the salary or remuneration attached to such office shall in all cases be fixed before proceeding to the election, and at all such elections the voting shall be by cards provided for that purpose to be signed by the voter, and to contain the name or names of the persons voted for.

39. No member of the council shall have, directly or indirectly, any share or interest in any contract or employment given or made by the council, except he be a shareholder in any public company, nor shall he become security for any officer appointed by the council, nor become surety for any such officer, contractor, or any other employé of the council, and any member of the council having any such share or interest, directly or indirectly, shall be disqualified from voting thereon.

40. The common seal of the council shall be in the charge and custody of the clerk, and the clerk shall not affix such seal to any document without the express order of the council, or unless such document bears the signature of the chairman, except in case of powers of attorney, declarations, or any other legal documents requiring to be verified before the chairman, when in such case the said seal shall and may be affixed by the

said clerk, the chairman's certificate thereof accompanying the same, on receipt of a fee of 10s. 6d. for each attestation.

41. Any one or more of the standing orders may be suspended *pro tem.*, with the consent of the majority of the council.

## ELECTIONS.

On the 4th of January, Messrs. J. A. Bromfield, John Davidson and Thos. Mickle, were elected members of the municipal council, in the room of Messrs. S. Macgregor, W. Bateman, jun., and John McDonald, who retired by rotation on the 5th of January. Councillor Elliott was unanimously elected chairman for the current year.

On the 20th of January, councillor J. Dobson resigned his seat, but was re-elected on the 16th of February.

On the 12th of March, the chairman and councillor T. Denney resigned their seats—the former in anticipation of his departure for Europe. The vacancies were filled by the elec-
