SHOOTING STARS.—On the 2nd, at 8:53 p.m., meteor in the N.N.E.; 6th, at 0:12 a.m., large meteor from W. to E.; 13th, at 6:48 p.m., large meteor from S.W. to N.E.; 9:15 p.m., small meteor from the zenith to N.; 9:16 p.m., very small faint meteor from N. to S., about 20° above S.W. horizon; and on the 30th, at 9:18 p.m., small meteor from E. to W., about 22° above S. horizon. Meteors were also seen on the 1st, 4th and 15th, but they were not numerous.

LIGHTNING was seen at 8:15 p.m. on the 27th, on the N. horizon.

SOLAR HALOS were seen on the 6th, at 11 a.m., about 45° in diameter; on the 18th, at 9:30 a.m. (visible only a few minutes), about 35° in diameter, and between 2 and 3 p.m. very well defined, about 45° in diameter; on the 25th, at 10 a.m. (faint), about 45° in diameter; and on the 29th (faint), about 45° in diameter.

LUNAR HALOS were seen on the 2nd (prismatic), of small diameter; 17th, 45° in diameter; 18th, inner halo (prismatic) 8° in diameter, and outer 45° in diameter; 20th (prismatic), 7° in diameter; 21st, at 7 p.m., faint red halo, about 5° in diameter, and at 11 p.m., 45° in diameter; 22nd (prismatic), 4° in diameter; 24th, 45° in diameter; 25th, 44° in diameter; and 26th, 45° in diameter.

There was HOAR FROST at early morning on the 5th, 14th, 15th and 30th.

Fog (not very dense) was present at morning on the 13th, 14th and 29th.

HAIL fell in the vicinity of the city at 1:30 p.m. on the 9th.

"1. Duty will be received at any of the above sub-treasuries on small quantities of gold to be transmitted by post to parts beyond the seas. The quantity so forwarded may in no case exceed four ounces.

"2. Persons desirous of availing themselves of this permission should present their gold, together with the letter or packet in which they intend to forward it, at a sub-treasury, and pay the amount of duty required.

"3. As instructions have been given to the sub-treasurers to seal and secure such packages containing the gold so to be transmitted, and to certify to the quantity, all persons must be careful to observe that these letters or packages must in no cases be re-opened previous to their being placed in the Post Office, as otherwise the gold will be liable to condemnation in the manner provided by the Act.

MODEL FORM OF INSTRUMENT OF ASSOCIATION.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twelfth day of August, 1858.

WHEREAS by the "Mining Association Act 1858" it is amongst other things provided THAT it should be lawful for the Governor in Council to adopt a Model Form of Instrument of Association generally applicable to such associations as are contemplated by the said Act and that upon the adoption and after the publication thereof in the *Government Gazette* the same might be adopted in whole or part by any parties entering into any such association and that it should be sufficient in any instrument of association to refer to such Model Form of Instrument by mentioning the same or the parts or portions thereof briefly by reference to the number of the clause thereof or otherwise so to be adopted and thereupon that such instrument of association should be read and construed as if it had set out at length the said Model Form of Instrument or such part or portions thereof as shall have been adopted as aforesaid: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor by and with the advice of the Executive Council doth by this present Order direct that the following form be and the same is hereby adopted as the Model Form of Instrument of Association authorized by the said recited Act to be adopted as aforesaid.

And the Honorable John O'Shanassy Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

INSTRUMENT OF ASSOCIATION made and entered into this [] day of [] A.D. 185[] under and in pursuance of "The Mining Association Act 1858" BETWEEN the several parties whose names description and signatures respectively are set forth and subscribed in the schedule hereunto subjoined Witnesseth that the said parties to this instrument have agreed to become members of an association for the prosecution of mining pursuits upon and subject to the several terms conditions provisions and stipulations hereinafter contained that is to say—

1. *Term and object of association.*—The parties to this instrument shall after [one hundred] shares shall have been subscribed for of which [one-fourth] shall be money shares [one-fourth] shall be property shares and [two-fourths] shall be labor shares become members of the said association as from the day of the depositing of the duplicate of this instrument with the clerk of the court of mines for the term of [five] years determinable and renewable as hereinafter mentioned for the purpose of exploring for gold and carrying on gold mining operations and for the disposal of the gold and any other metals and minerals thereby obtained and the conversion of the same into money.

2. *Style of association.*—The business of the association shall be carried on at [] or at such other place or places as shall from time to time be agreed upon under the style of the [] Mining Association.

3. *Capital and shares.*—The capital of the association shall consist of [two thousand pounds] divided into [two hundred] shares of [ten pounds] each which shall be contributed in the following proportions that is to say:—[One-fourth] in money [one-fourth] in property and the remaining two-fourths in labor and the said shares shall be classified into money shares property shares and labor shares respectively and shall be held by the members of the association in the proportions set forth in the schedule hereunder written opposite to their respective names and the said members shall share in all the profits and losses of the association in proportion to the amount of shares held by them of whichever class the same may be subject to such transmutation increase in the value of labor shares and other incidental changes as is provided for by the Act first above referred to or as is hereinafter provided.

4. *Contribution of shares.*—The several members shall be bound to contribute to the capital in proportion to the shares set against their respective names in manner following (that is to say)—Members holding money shares a deposit of [two] pounds per share on such shares on or before the signing of this instrument and the residue as the same shall from time to time be required by the board of managing members by [five] instalments not exceeding [two] pounds per share at intervals of not less than [four] weeks from the date hereof and from each other Members holding property shares shall contribute the property the nature whereof is specified in the schedule hereto opposite to their names respectively as and when the same shall be required by the said board and members holding labor shares shall when required by the said board contribute their labor or services faithfully and to the best of their ability in the capacity described opposite their names in the said schedule or in such other capacity as may from time to time be agreed upon to the extent of their shares Provided that when the holder of any labor shares shall be unable or unwilling to contribute his personal labor or services it shall be lawful for him to send a substitute in his place to

be approved of by the said board or with the permission of the said board to contribute the current rate of wages for such labor or services in the stead thereof.

5. *Calls unpaid.*—If any member shall neglect or refuse at any time to pay contribute or expend his share of capital according to the provisions of the last clause it shall be lawful for the board either to place the amount of his deficiency to the debit of the account of such member such deficiency to carry interest at the rate of £15 per cent. per annum, or after two weeks notice to any such member to sue such member for the recovery of such calls as may be due and owing by him or for the value of the property or labor according to the said schedule which he is bound to contribute as the case may be or to sell and dispose of all the shares and interest of such member in the said association and the property thereof the balance of the net proceeds of such sale if any after the adjustment of the account of such member and deduction of what may be due by him and all expenses of such sale to be paid to such member and any member so failing shall immediately upon any such sale as aforesaid cease to be a member of the association.

6. *Board of managing members.*—The association shall be governed by a board of [six] managing members who shall be elected annually at a general meeting of the members of the association and a director who shall be *ex officio* a member of such board and the first meeting for the purpose of electing the said managing members shall be held immediately after the number of shares specified in the first clause hereof shall have been subscribed for.

7. *Director.*—[A B] shall be the director of the association subject to suspension and removal at any time as hereinafter provided.

8. *Remuneration to ordinary managing members.*—The quarterly sum of [twenty-five] pounds shall be paid to the managing members (other than the director) out of the funds of the association as a remuneration for their services and such remuneration shall be distributed amongst such managing members in such manner as the board shall from time to time determine.

9. *Resignation or removal of managing members.*—Any managing member whether the director or not may at any time vacate office by sending in his resignation in writing to the board and a special meeting of the members called for the purpose shall have power at any time to remove from his office any managing member for negligence misconduct in office or any other reasonable cause of which cause the members shall be deemed and taken to be proper judges.

10. *Filling up of casual vacancy in the board.*—In case of any vacancy in the office of managing member or director occasioned by death resignation or removal from office such vacancy shall be supplied by the election of another member or director as the case may be in his stead at a special meeting of members called for the purpose in manner provided in the twenty-sixth clause of this instrument and within [ten] days after such vacancy shall happen.

11. *Minutes to be kept of proceedings of meetings of board.*—The board shall cause correct minutes of their proceedings to be entered in a book kept for that purpose and called the minute book and such minutes shall be signed by the person who shall have presided at the time such proceedings took place or by such person as the said board shall specially appoint and the same shall be open to the inspection of any member at any time.

12. *Majority of board to decide questions but chairman to have a casting vote.*—That all questions coming before the board for consideration shall be decided by the majority of the votes of managing members present and not declining to vote or disqualified from voting including the director and if there shall be an equality of votes the chairman of the meeting shall have a casting vote but no member of the board shall vote on any question in which he shall be personally interested or concerned.

13. *Power of board to make bye-laws.*—It shall be lawful for the board from time to time to make rules and regulations for their own meetings for the distribution of the allowance reserved for their services and for their own guidance in all matters not herein specially provided for and for the collection and safe-custody of the gold or other produce of the operations and the proceeds thereof and of the funds and property of the association generally and the disposal thereof consistently with the objects of the association and for regulating the shifts or watches and distribution of labor generally and the ordinary hours of work of members holding labor shares or their substitutes or other persons employed by the association (such hours not to exceed ten per day Sundays being excepted from working days unless in cases of unforeseen emergency and absolute necessity) and for allowances for over-work extra-work or piece-work and for varying the estimated value of the labor attached to the share of any member and for the disposal keeping and repair of tools and implements and for the maintenance of any member holding labor shares and for providing for any such member medical and other attendance in cases of sickness or accident and for equitable allowances or charges to any such member in such cases and for the substitution of the services of other persons temporarily or permanently instead of those of such members or for the disposal of the shares of such members upon equitable terms and for imposing penalties on members holding labor shares in cases of neglect or misconduct or nonobservance of any rule or regulation of the board by themselves or their approved substitutes

and for the expulsion of any member holding labor shares in such cases or in the case of prolonged illness or inability to work effectually arising from causes antecedent to his joining the association and concealed from his co-members and for the management generally of the operations and for the observance of order and regularity by all engaged or employed thereon and also from time to time to repeal and alter the same or any of them and to make other bye-laws in the place or stead thereof or of any of them Provided always that all such bye-laws shall be printed or legibly written on paper and posted or affixed to the outside of the office door or on a board placed in some other conspicuous place on the premises of the association and provided further that such bye-laws or any of them shall be subject to disallowance by any general meeting of members after the same shall respectively be made.

14. *Board may appoint officers clerks &c. and regulate salaries and fix duties.*—It shall be lawful for the board from time to time to appoint or employ all such officers clerks and other persons as the business of the association may require and from time to time to suspend or remove any such officers clerks and other persons at their discretion and also from time to time to fix alter and vary the duties to be performed and the amount of remuneration to be given to such officers clerks and other persons and also for and on behalf of the association to delegate to such officers as may be appointed such powers as the said board may consider necessary or expedient for the transaction of the business of the association.

15. *Duties of director.*—The director shall under the instructions of the board have the charge and control of all the property of the association and subject to the directions of the said board from time shall receive all the funds and moneys of and make all payments for the said association and make all usual and necessary contracts and arrangements for carrying on the business thereof and shall have the general conduct and management of such business and shall observe and perform or cause to be observed and performed all covenants provisions and agreements which may be contained in any lease to which the association may hold or become entitled to and shall carry into effect the instructions and bye-laws of the board and association generally and shall faithfully discharge the duties of his office.

16. *Suspension absence or illness of director or other managing member.*—In case the conduct or position of the director or any managing member shall be such that his continuance in office shall appear to the board to be prejudicial to the interest of the association it shall be lawful for the other managing members at a meeting of the board specially convened for that purpose by any member thereof to suspend the director or other managing member and the board shall immediately thereafter call a special general meeting of the members of the association who may if they shall think fit confirm such suspension and remove the director or any managing member or may annul such suspension and reinstate the director or such managing member in his office.

17. *Substitute for director.*—During the temporary absence or illness of the director, or during his suspension, or the interval between his removal and the appointment of a new director in his stead any other managing member appointed by the board for that purpose may transact his business and perform the duties of director.

18. *Director &c. when suspended to deliver up keys &c.*—In case any director or other officer of the said association or any person holding labor shares in the association shall be at any time suspended as aforesaid he shall forthwith deliver up to such person as the board shall appoint all the keys used by him as aforesaid, and all books papers money property and effects of the association in his possession or control and in case of refusal or neglect so to do he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding [fifty] pounds.

19. *Labor shares of director &c. to be transmuted into money shares on removal from office.*—In case any director or other officer of the association shall be removed from his office under the provisions hereof for any cause other than fraudulent conduct such director or other officer shall be entitled to have his labor shares transmuted into money shares equivalent in amount to such portion of his labor shares as shall have been then actually contributed in labor such director or other officer paying up such amount of money (if any) as shall be required to make up the exact amount of so many money shares as shall be most nearly equivalent to the value of such contributed labor.

20. *Appointment and powers of auditors.*—Immediately after the election of the board in each year and at the same general meeting two members or other persons whether members or not shall be elected to act as auditors during the year then next ensuing and such auditors shall be fully authorised at all reasonable times to inspect the books of the association and to examine the accounts and affairs of the association generally and to call in the aid of the officers clerks and other persons employed by the association or any other person competent to give information as to the affairs thereof.

21. *Appointment of auditors ad interim on death resignation &c.*—In the event of any vacancy by the death resignation or removal of any auditor during his term of office such vacancy shall be supplied by the election of another member in the place of such auditor at a special meeting of the members of the association to be called for that purpose as hereinbefore provided in case of any vacancy in the office of managing member.

22. *Half-yearly audit and balance sheet.*—The affairs and trans-

actions of the association shall be brought to a just and true balance by the board on or before the [first Tuesday] in the [sixth] and [twelfth] months from and after the date hereof and thereafter in the same months respectively in each year and a balance sheet shall be prepared containing a true statement of the affairs and transactions of the association and the net profits or losses thereof during the six months immediately preceding and shall as soon as possible thereafter together with all bills securities accounts vouchers and documents necessary for verifying the same be submitted by the board to the auditors and such auditors shall examine the books of the association and sign such balance sheet in testimony of their having examined and verified the several entries contained therein and the balance sheet so signed shall be submitted to the next general meeting of the members to be held as hereinafter provided and the board shall together with such balance sheet cause to be laid before the members at such meeting a report on the affairs of the association previously approved of at a meeting of the board and such report shall contain the recommendation of the board as to the appropriation of the profits and it shall be lawful for the general meeting to confirm such report with such modifications thereof (if any) as they shall think fit.

23. *Further audit may be called for.*—If it shall appear to such general meeting desirable that the affairs of the association should be more fully investigated it shall be lawful for such general meeting either to direct the said auditors to inquire into and report upon the affairs of the association generally or in their discretion to appoint any two or more members or other persons as special auditors for that purpose.

24. *Monthly general meetings.*—There shall be a general meeting of members once in every month for the purpose of considering the report of the board to be then made and to consider and decide on such other matters and things as may then be brought forward by the board relating to the affairs of the association or which may be brought forward by any member thereof.

25. *Yearly general meeting and settlements.*—On the first Tuesday in the [twelfth] month from and after the date hereof and thereafter in the same month in every year the association shall meet and elect [six] managing members of the board for the ensuing year other than the director and shall inspect and examine all the accounts and transactions of the association for the preceding year and the accounts when passed by such meeting and the proceedings of such meeting shall be final binding and conclusive to all intents and purposes on all the members whether attending or not and shall not afterwards be opened or questioned by any member except in respect of any manifest error in any such accounts to the amount of fifty pounds at the least which may be discovered therein within the space of one year afterwards.

26. *Special meetings.*—Special meetings of the members may be held at such times and places as the board may determine and also if any number of members holding not less than [thirty] shares in the association shall at any time by writing under their hands require the board to call a special meeting for any purpose relating to the association it shall be incumbent on the board to call the same and every special meeting called for any purpose relating to the association shall be called by advertisement in some newspaper published nearest to the place of business of the association and such advertisement shall specify generally the purpose or object of the meeting and every meeting pursuant to such advertisement shall be taken to have been lawfully convened for the purposes mentioned therein.

27. *Power of special meetings.*—It shall be lawful for any special meeting of members called for the purpose to authorize by a resolution the issue of new or preferent shares under the provisions of the said Act and to set apart and appropriate original new or preferent shares in order to indemnify and protect the director managing or other member for incurring any debt obligation or other liability for the benefit of the members of the association and to make new or further laws regulations and provisions for the association not repugnant to the provisions of the said Act and to amend alter or repeal all or any of the existing laws regulations and provisions of the association Provided that no such new or preferent shares shall be issued and no such original new or preferent shares shall be set apart nor appropriated and no such new amended or altered laws regulations and provisions shall be in force unless and until such resolution shall receive the assent of a majority of the members of each class of shareholders voting separately either personally or by proxy.

28. *Definition and operation of preferent shares.*—All preferent shares which shall be issued under the provisions hereof shall be a first charge upon the profits of the association and shall have priority each to the other according to the respective dates of the issue thereof and all such shares shall be for such principal sums and shall carry interest at such rate and shall be payable or redeemable by the association at such period or periods as shall be determined at the time by a resolution of the special meeting at which the issue of such shares shall be authorized as aforesaid.

29. *Chairmanship of meetings of members.*—The director for the time being shall preside at all meetings of the board and of the members of the association unless any such meeting of the board or of the members of the association shall determine otherwise in which case such meeting shall elect a chairman for the occasion.

30. *Defective votes not to invalidate proceedings of general meetings.*—No law resolution or proceeding passed at any

special or general meeting shall be impeached or invalidated on the ground that any person voting at any such meeting was not entitled to vote thereat or upon any other ground whatever unless raised at the time.

31. *Number of votes and mode of voting at general meetings.*—At all meetings of members every member shall be entitled to the same number of votes as the number of shares held by him in the association and all questions to be submitted to any meetings of the members shall be decided by the majority of votes taken collectively except in such cases as are herein otherwise provided and any three members present at any such meeting shall be entitled to demand a ballot either before or after a vote on any question has been taken by assessment of votes and each member may vote personally or by another member authorized in writing so to do.

32. *Books of account.*—Proper and intelligible books of account shall be kept by the director for the time being or under his immediate direction and true and correct daily entries shall be made therein of all transactions and operations of the association and of all sums of money received and paid and of all the ore minerals and other produce obtained and disposed of and of all the materials machinery articles and things purchased on behalf of or belonging to the association and the names dates places and any other circumstances which may be useful for the manifestation of the state and proceedings of the association.

33. *Books of account &c. to be kept at office of association.*—The said books of account together with all securities bills notes letters maps plans or sections of the mining operations and other writings (excepting any documents of the said association which are required by the provisions of the Act aforesaid or of any other Act to be deposited and left with the clerk of the court of mines or any other public officer) shall remain and be kept at the office of the association in the custody of the director or such other officer as the board shall from time to time appoint for that purpose and every member shall at all reasonable times have free access to inspect examine and copy the same.

34. *Transfer of shares.*—The shares of the respective members may be transferred in accordance with the provisions relating to the transfer of shares contained in the nineteenth and twentieth clauses of the said act by any member to any other member or person whomsoever who shall upon any such sale or disposition (subject as aforesaid) become members in respect of such shares in the same manner as if they had been parties to this instrument originally in respect thereof and the members disposing absolutely of all their shares and interest shall (subject to the provisions of the said clauses of the said act) immediately thereupon cease to be members and shall be freed from all future claims and liabilities.

35. *Purchasers of shares &c. to sign instrument &c.*—The purchasers of any shares so sold or transferred as aforesaid and all other persons who may be entitled to become members of the association shall subscribe this instrument and such signature shall be equally binding upon such purchaser and other persons their executors administrators and assigns as if they had been originally parties hereto and all such purchasers and persons who may have been previous members shall be as effectually subject to the performance of the agreements and provisions hereof in respect to the shares so acquired as aforesaid as in respect of their original or other shares.

36. *Members advancing money.*—Any member advancing money or property on account of the association or who shall be in advance in excess of the calls made upon the other members shall be allowed interest for such money or the value of such property or on such excess for the time being as there may remain from time to time at the rate of [fifteen] pounds per centum per annum.

37. *Members offending.*—That if any of the members except as aforesaid shall apply to his own separate use any of the moneys effects or property of the association then it shall be lawful for the other members by any writing to expel him therefrom and the shares and interest of such member shall become forfeited to the association and such member shall thereupon cease to be a member thereof.

38. *Declaration of dividend.*—The balance of net profit shall be available for the payment of a dividend at such rate as the board shall recommend in their half yearly reports (subject to such reports being confirmed at a general meeting as aforesaid) and such dividend shall become payable to the members accord-

ingly at a time to be fixed by the board and the balance of net profit remaining if any after providing for the payment of such dividend shall be held as a reserve fund for the purpose of equalizing future dividends.

39. *Lien on dividend for calls.*—No dividend shall be paid in respect of any share upon which any instalment shall be in arrear until such instalment shall have been duly paid and satisfied or in respect of the share or shares of any person or persons who shall not have executed this instrument. But it shall be lawful for the board unless they shall declare a forfeiture of such shares to retain such dividend on account of such instalment until the same shall have been paid and the member entitled thereto shall not be entitled to claim any interest on the amount of such dividend and upon a forfeiture of such shares being declared such dividend shall be appropriated to the use of the association and applied in augmentation of the reserve fund.

40. *Indemnity to officers in respect of their acts.*—The managing members and other officers of the association and each and every of them their and each and every of their heirs executors and administrators shall be indemnified and saved harmless out of the funds or property of the association from and against all costs charges losses damages and expenses which they or any of them or their or any of their heirs executors and administrators shall or may incur sustain expend or be put unto for or on account of the association in consequence of any act deed matter or thing which they or any of them may do or cause to be done in carrying into effect the objects and purposes of the association or in or about any indictment information presentment action suit process proceeding or arbitration to be brought commenced carried or prosecuted defended or entered into for or on account thereof and by the order or direction of the board or in anywise relating thereto respectively or otherwise in or about the execution of their respective offices or trusts except such costs charges losses damages and expenses as shall happen by or through the unauthorised act or the wilful default or neglect of such managing members or other officers respectively.

41. *Power to dissolve.*—In case the operations of the association after a competent trial thereof shall prove to be unproductive or it shall be thought advisable on any other grounds to discontinue the business thereof then it shall be lawful for the members at a special meeting to be convened for that purpose to declare the said association to be dissolved at any time previous to the expiration of the said term of the association. Provided that no resolution to that effect shall have any force unless the same shall be carried by a majority of three-fourths of the members of each class of shareholders voting separately either personally or by proxy. Provided also that it shall be lawful for the minority in every such case if they shall be desirous to continue the operations of the said association at their option to purchase the shares at par of the members desiring to dissolve the same in which case the said association shall not be dissolved but such option shall be declared at the same special meeting at which the resolution to dissolve the association shall have been carried.

42. *Power to continue for a further term.*—In case the operations shall continue productive or promising it shall be lawful for the members at any time before the expiration of the said term at a special meeting to be convened for the purpose and by a resolution carried by a majority of each class voting as aforesaid to prolong the said association for any further period to be conducted upon the same terms conditions and agreements as herein contained and to procure a renewal of any lease which the association may hold for any further period whatsoever.

43. *Accounts on winding up.*—At the determination or dissolution of the said association an account in writing shall be forthwith made up of all the effects property and engagements of the association and the members shall make adequate provision for the sale and realization of all such property and effects and the fulfilment of such engagements for and generally for the settlement and winding up of affairs of the association and the general balance after such settlement shall be divided amongst the members for the time being in the several shares and proportions to which they may be respectively entitled thereto and upon such division and final settlement the said members shall subscribe such instruments in writing as may be required for their mutual release and indemnity.

DANDENONG PUBLIC CEMETERY.

REGULATIONS made by the Trustees of the Public Cemetery established at Dandenong:—

- All fees and charges must be paid to the treasurer before the ground or vault is opened.
- Applications for permission to make a vault or erect a monument in the cemetery to be made to the trustees. A certificate of permission will be granted to persons applying on a payment of charges set forth in the Schedule marked A.
- The procession will be expected to arrive at the cemetery punctually at the hour appointed for the funeral.
- The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug; but when a brick grave or vault is required it must be constructed under the direction of the trustees or some person duly appointed by them.
- All vaults, graves, monuments, gravestones and fences to be kept in proper repair and condition at the expense of the owners.
- Every coffin in a vault or brick grave must be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, granite, slate, or iron.
- A plan of every monument must be submitted to the trustees for their approval.
- In the erection of tablets copper cramps must be used.
- Wooden fenceings allowed, but if not kept in proper repair may be removed by order of the trustees.
- A plan of the grounds and a register will be kept, which may be examined on payment of the charges according to Schedule marked A.
- Orders for interment to be given to the sexton or other person appointed by the trustees; such notice to be given between the hours of Ten a.m. and sunset the previous day.
- The usual hours of interment will be from Ten a.m. to Six p.m. from 1st September to 30th April, and from Ten a.m. to Four p.m. in the other months of the year, with exception of Sundays, when the hours will be from Eight a.m. to Ten a.m., and from Three p.m. to Five p.m.
- In case an interment is to be made in any private vault or grave the consent in writing of the proprietor must be left with the order.

14. The trustees reserve to themselves the right of making any alterations from time to time in these regulations and charges, subject to His Excellency the Governor's approval.

15. All persons destroying the fences, or in any otherwise injuring the cemetery, will be prosecuted as the law directs.

16. The charges will be remitted for the burial of any person on evidence being produced to the trustees that the relatives or friends of such person are unable to pay the costs and charges.

SANDHURST MUNICIPALITY.

REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF SANDHURST, FOR THE HALF-YEAR ENDING 10TH JULY, 1858.

PUBLIC WORKS.

THE state of the municipal funds during the past half-year, which commenced with the council being indebted above £3400, and the delay that has occurred in obtaining the Government grant in aid, has prevented many works being entered upon that otherwise would have been; but still the expenditure under this head amounts to £2955 1s. A large portion of this has been expended in repairing and maintaining roads and footpaths previously made. Amongst the new works completed or in progress are the kerbing and channelling of portions of Hargreaves street, Mitchell street, and Arnold street; road formation in Mitchell street, Arnold street, Williamson street, and off McIvor road; sinking wells at White Hills; constructing new tanks, and deepening others, providing new lamps, fixing new weighbridge, and erecting and flagging market stalls, &c.

APPLICATIONS TO GOVERNMENT.

The want of success which attended several written applications to the Government, and the urgent necessity which existed for some work to be done to the Bendigo Creek, at that time completely filled up, induced the council in February to send a deputation to the authorities in Melbourne, personally to urge an immediate attention to various claims. The deputation, consisting of the chairman (W. Vazie Simons, Esq.), Councillor Sullivan, and the town clerk, were successful in obtaining:—

- 1st. A grant of a limited sum of money, to keep a channel open down the creek, for the current year.
- 2nd. The immediate passing of the market bye-law, which had been delayed from the August of last year.
- 3rd. The erection of police station at White Hills.
- 4th. That instructions should be given to the district road engineer to consult with the council on what portions of the roads in the district the money voted for public roads should be expended, and other minor matters.

In answer to written applications, the conservancy of the water reserve, Commissioner's Gully, has been granted; but the following have been refused or the answers are deferred:—

The immediate passing of a Building Act. The grant of sites for public parks. The prevention of illegal occupancy of Crown Lands, as in the case of the Bank of Victoria. The grant of money for municipal police court.

That thorough and comprehensive measures be taken to dispose of the sludge.

Applications frequently repeated for the establishment of a branch post office, or receiving house, in Golden square, are at last about to meet with success.

BYE-LAWS.

A bye-law, No. 15, for the regulation of municipal elections, and providing for vote by ballot, has been passed by the council, but is not yet assented to. Bye-law No. 13, for compelling the proper construction of drains, &c., and passed last year, has been twice amended, to meet objections by the Government, but assent is still withheld.

FINANCE.

The grant in aid for the present year amounts to £9636, of which £7227 has been just received.

The assessment for the present year is not yet completed. An amount of police fines (£20) due to the municipality has unfortunately got into the Treasury, and £14 1s. 6d. into the Audit Office, both which sums the council have not as yet been able to get repaid.

MARKETS.

The market was proclaimed on the 1st February, and the bye-law enabling the council to collect dues was assented to on the 26th February.

The tariff of rates was carefully reconsidered by a committee of the whole council in April, and unanimously confirmed. It being found that no parties came forward to rent the ground for stalls, and the council having also received a numerous signed petition on the subject, it was determined that twenty stalls should be erected, and which are now just completed.

The large new weighbridge imported by the council from England at a cost of £75, has been put down in the hay-market.

The market dues and weighbridge tolls have produced an average monthly amount of £80.

The market inspector's salary has been increased, in consequence of the great increase of his duties, to £350 per annum, he providing any assistance required.

MISCELLANEOUS.

In furtherance of the interests of the municipality during the first half-year, the chairman, W. Vazie Simons, Esq., has attended the Municipal Conference, Melbourne, held last June; and Councillor Sullivan also visited Castlemaine as a delegate from this council to a conference held there.

The necessity that exists for the erection of a suitable building for public offices, municipal police court, &c., has of course had the attention of the council; and a committee appointed has had many meetings, discussing various plans prepared by the town surveyor, the material advisable to use, &c., and they have now arrived at conclusions which only require the sanction of the council to be carried out.

The council having offered a premium for an improved oil lamp, obtained one, which has made the lighting much better than with the lamp first used.

A most numerous signed petition for the formation of public cattle yards and slaughter-houses has been received, which is only waiting for information wanted from other towns to receive due attention at the hands of the council.

MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF PORTLAND.

REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNCIL FOR THE SIX MONTHS ENDING ON THE 31ST JULY, 1858.

THE formation and metalling of the principal streets have been proceeded with, and much has been done in improving other parts of the town by forming the side channels and footpaths, and carrying off the surplus drainage in the proper directions, instead of allowing it to flow over the streets and private property.

The approaches to the new jetty have been completed, and the jetty has been at length opened for use.

The money granted for the Botanical Garden has been received, and a gardener engaged to take charge of the garden and make such improvements as the limited funds under the control of the council will admit of. That portion of the inclosure not included in the garden has been let for one year for £85.

Another attempt has been made to secure a separate mail bag from England to Portland, which, although not successful as yet, the council do not despair of ultimately succeeding.

There was a meeting of delegates from the different municipalities, on the subject of municipal endowment, held in Melbourne in the month of June, but, from the short notice given, it was not practicable for this council to be represented at that meeting, and no report of the proceedings of the delegates has been yet received.

Plans and specifications for the erection of a slaughter-house have been prepared; and tenders for the proposed works called for.

Mr. Must having resigned his seat in the council, an election of a successor took place on the 8th and 9th March, when Mr. T. E. Richardson was elected.
