## POSTPONEMENT OF THE NEXT CIRCUIT COURTS OF CASTLEMAINE AND SANDHURST.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the 4th day of October, 1858.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session held in the fifteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better administration of Justice in the colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, by any orders to be by him, with the advice of the Executive Council, from time to time made and proclaimed, to define the times at which Circuit Courts shall be holden, and the said times to alter and vary as he shall, with the advice aforesaid, deem necessary: And whereas it is expedient to alter and vary the times at which the next Circuit Courts for Castlemaine and Sandhurst have been directed to be holden: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that the times appointed for holding the next Circuit Courts respectively at the places hereinafter mentioned shall be postponed as follows, that is to say:—At Castlemaine, from Tuesday, the twenty-sixth day of October instant, to Thursday, the 4th day of November now next ensuing; and at Sandhurst, from Thursday, the fourth day of the said month of November, to Friday, the twelfth day of the same month of November.

And the Honorable Henry Samuel Chapman, Her Majesty's Attorney General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

SIX THOUSAND AND THIRTY-ONE POUNDS PAID OUT OF THE  
PUBLIC REVENUE FOR THE YEAR 1858, AS AN INSTALMENT OF  
THE GRANT IN AID OF THE SECOND YEAR'S REVENUE OF THE  
MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF BALLAARAT EAST.**

**W**HEREAS by the Act 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled *An Act  
for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*,  
it is amongst other things enacted, that every work proposed to  
be executed by any municipal council by funds raised by aid  
from the Government, whether by endowment or otherwise,  
shall be the subject of a distinct and separate bye-law: And  
whereas an instalment of the grant in aid of the second year's  
revenue of the said municipal council of £6031 has been re-  
ceived, subject to the conditions of the said recited Act: Be it  
therefore enacted by the municipal council of Ballaarat East,  
That the said sum of £6031 shall be expended as follows:—

# ABSTRACT OF METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVATIONS TAKEN IN VICTORIA DURING THE QUARTER ENDING 30th JUNE, 1858.

By R. BROUGH SMYTH, C.E., F.G.S., ETC., ETC., DIRECTOR OF METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVATORIES.

THE air was unusually dry in April and June, and the amount of rain collected in the Melbourne district was very small. Heavy rain fell in the northern and north-eastern parts of the country on the 28th and 29th of April; and in the month of June, the amount of rain collected generally, at the inland stations, and on the western parts of the coast, was greatly in excess of that collected at Melbourne.

The weather was very warm during the first week of May, and the mean temperature of the month was above the average. In some parts of the month the weather was damp, and very cold, and rain fell frequently, but the total amount collected was not great, except at Ballarat, Castlemaine, Camperdown, and Beechworth.

The mean minimum temperature of the air throughout the country on the 5th June was 35·9°; at Ballarat it was as low as 30·9°, at Castlemaine 30·7°, and at Heathcote 29·4°; but near the coast the depression of temperature, though well marked, was not very great.

*April.*—The thermometer in shade exceeded 80° on four days, rose to 80° on one day, exceeded 70° on ten days, rose to 70° on two days, and exceeded 60° on thirteen days. The highest temperature was 87·1° on the 1st, and the lowest 38·6° on the 14th. There was much cloud during the day, but the nights were frequently cloudless, and dew was sometimes observed.

*May.*—The thermometer in shade exceeded 70° on five days, 60° on seventeen days, and 50° on nine days. The highest temperature was 77·4° on the 6th, and the lowest 38·6° on the 27th. Large nimbus clouds invariably succeeded the rise of the barometer, and sometimes the weather was squally and very cold. The sky was often free from cloud at night.

*June.*—The thermometer exceeded 60° on nine days, and 50° on twenty-one days. The highest temperature was 63·1° on the 14th, and the lowest 34·2° on the 5th. The average amount of cloud at morning was greatly in excess of that at 3½ p.m., and at night it was often cloudless. Dew fell copiously when the nights were clear.

The mean temperature of the dew-point for the quarter was 46·9°, being 0·9° lower than the mean for the same quarter in 1856, and 0·4° lower than the mean for the same quarter in 1857.

The mean degree of humidity (complete saturation = 1·000) at Melbourne, as compared with the same quarter in 1856 and 1857, was as follows:—

*Hoar Frost* was observed at Melbourne on the 5th, 14th, 15th and 30th June; at Heathcote on the 22nd, 23rd, 24th and 25th May, and 3rd, 5th, 10th, 14th, 15th, 22nd and 24th June; at Beechworth on the 20th and 21st May; at Ballaarat on the 26th May, and 3rd, 15th, 16th, 21st and 22nd June; at Castlemaine on the 15th April, and 18th, 21st and 23rd May; at Camperdown on the 14th and 17th June; at Mount Warrenep on the 22nd May, and 5th, 23rd, 24th and 28th June; at Kangaroo Range (near Mount Ararat) on the 21st May, and 16th and 17th June; at Mount Ararat on the 24th April, 18th, 25th and 26th May, and 5th, 15th, 16th and 22nd June; and at Welshpool on the 15th June.

*The Aurora Australis* was seen at Beechworth on the 10th April.

*Vines and fruit trees* were divested of leaves on the 13th June.

*Apples* (second crop) were small and sour, wholly unfit for use, and very different to those grown last year, some of which were moderately large and saleable.

*The Aphis* was seen on the indigo plant at Heathcote on the 11th April, and in the Melbourne district it destroyed much garden produce in May. In June it attacked many plants which it had formerly neglected, and in some places nearly destroyed the Cape ivy.

During the cold wind which blew from the westward on the 7th April, thousands of the COMMON HOUSE FLY attached themselves to walls, &c., where they were protected from the cold, and subsequently they were not frequently seen in the open air. A few were abroad on the 2nd May and 21st June.

The readings of the barometer appear to be too low at Castlemaine. The readings of the minimum thermometer at Sandhurst appear to be too high for April and May.

##### CRESWICK PETITION.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and sixty-six householders and landholders resident at Creswick, in the county of Talbot, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that a public meeting was held at Creswick, on the 30th of June last, whereat it was agreed that the erection of Creswick into a municipality was desirable, the meeting being impressed with the conviction that such a step was advisable for the better government and improvement of the township and its vicinity.

They further state that the area which they propose for a municipal district does not exceed nine square miles, that it contains three hundred householders, and that no point therein is distant more than six miles from any other point.

It is believed that the man Caro had a considerable sum of money upon his person, and a stock of goods consisting of drapery and jewellery; the latter comprising wedding and signet rings, ear-rings, bracelets, and brooches, of an inferior description, as well as a few watches.

Only a few articles of trifling value were found on the bodies of the deceased; the horse and spring cart, and the stock of goods, money, &c., are missing and cannot be accounted for.
